



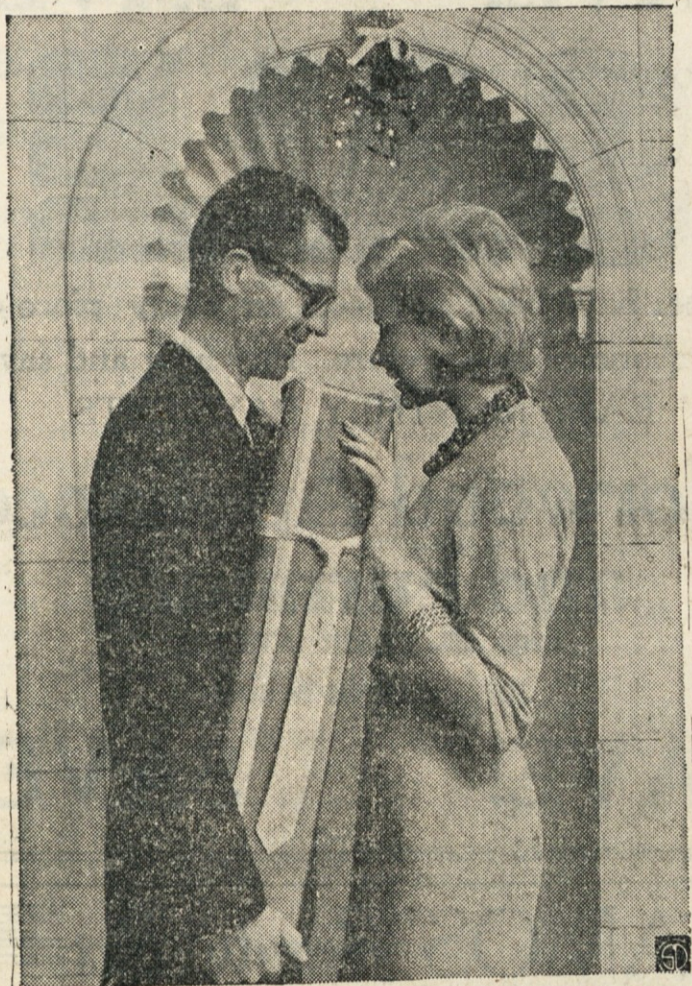

SHORTS ON SPORTS

Homecoming for Army-Navy: For a large segment of the playing personnel, the Army-Navy game at Philadelphia Stadium this Saturday will represent a homecoming affair. Twenty-four of the fifty players on the West Point roster hail from the Keystone State. Thirteen of 51 on the Annapolis list also hail from Pennsylvania.

Paige Arrived on Mound by Air: During his illustrious career, Bill Veeck pulled one of his most unusual stunts in Miami. It was the opening night of the International League season in Miami, where Veeck, and his associates, were introducing Triple-A baseball.

Early in the game, a helicopter landed on the grass in back of the infield and out stepped a gangling player in Marlin uniform. He was Leroy (Satchel) Paige, who had pitched for Veeck at Cleveland in 1948.

Paige remained with the Marlins for three seasons, being most effective as a starter, reliever and in drawing fans.

Giants Have Most Crowns in NFL: Since the National Football League was set up in East-West divisions in 1933, the N.Y. Giants have taken the most sectional titles, 11. However, the runner-up Cleveland Browns, with seven, were entered only in 1950. The Redskins, in Boston and Washington, won six, and the Philadelphia Eagles four.

In a much wider distribution in the West, the Chicago Bears won nine titles, the Green Bay Packers, Detroit Lions and Cleveland-L.A. Rams five each. Baltimore two and the Cards, then representing Chicago in the west, two.

Baseballers Watch Gridders for Expansion Hint: The American Football League, now in its second year of operation, has served as a guinea pig for major league baseball observers.

Several of the clubs in this league are located in cities where expansion in the majors either has taken place or is being considered. Fan interest has been closely watched. Certainly Harry Wismer's challenge in New York with his Titans in competition with the grid Giants has been of interest to the NL Mets.

Participating are Bay Village, Berea, Bedford, Cathedral Latin, Cleveland Heights, East High, Glenville, Holy Name, John Marshall, Lakewood, Lutheran West, Magnificat, Notre Dame Academy, Our Lady of Lourdes, Parma Senior High, and West High.

All net proceeds from the album will go directly to The Society for Crippled Children for services to local handicapped youngsters at two Rehabilitation Centers and CAMP CHEERFUL in Strongsville, Ohio.

Co-ordinating Committee for the project included Miss Evelyn Sabol, Supervisor of Music, Cleveland Catholic Diocese; Ernest Manning, Director, Supervisor of Music, Cleveland Public Schools; T. R. Evans, Supervisor of Music, Lakewood Public Schools; Richard Woolley, Technical Director of the Recording; and Milt Widder, Cleveland Press.

"CHRISTMAS IN CLEVELAND" will be available by December 1st at \$3.98 per record with the cover showing a photo of the Terminal Tower in holiday dress. Electric Accounting System Installed at St. Clair Savings



This unit of the new Remington-Rand Univac Computer is part of a recent installation in the main office of the St. Clair Savings Association. Punched cards, representing customer accounts, are fed into the equipment for automatic computation and verification of balances.

Installation of an electronic data-processing system for bookkeeping and accounting has been completed at St. Clair Savings Association, according to an announcement by Paul J. Schneller, President.

"Speed and accuracy are two outstanding characteristics of the Remington Rand Univac electronic punched-card computer system now in operation at our main office," Schneller reported. "It can perform 360,000 additions or subtractions in an hour, or 72,000 multiplications or divisions in a like period of time."

Accuracy is assured because the computer is self-checking, automatically verifying each of its internal calculations.

Mortgage loan accounting is the first application being placed on the system. Univac makes it possible for the Association to provide customers with a monthly bill giving a complete breakdown of each month's payment distribution, as well as providing a bill for the total amount of the current payment.

Each St. Clair customer will have informative mortgage loan records in his possession at all times. Under the previous passbook method, receipts records often were in transit through the mails during substantial periods of time.

Faster service at tellers' windows is a major benefit. Because accounting chores will be handled electronically, the tellers will be relieved from much manual work and detail. As a result, tellers will give customers more attentive personal service.

The new Univac system will also provide customers of St. Clair Savings with comprehensive figure information for their income tax returns. The interest portion of the payments made will be computed for them with electronic accuracy.

The new automated bookkeeping system makes it possible for the customer to make payments on his mortgage at any of the Association's offices with equal ease and speed. And, the customer at all times has a true picture of his liability to the Association because, under the new system, his mortgage and tax-insurance expenses are always clearly defined and kept constantly up to date.

"Savings accounting, which will bring additional benefits to St. Clair Savings Association customers, will also be placed on our new Univac system during the first half of 1962," Schneller added.

Medical Specialists Urgently Needed for Air Force

The United States Air Force has announced an urgent need for dietitians and medical specialists, to fill hospital vacancies in Air Force hospitals throughout the United States and in foreign countries.

Women in these specialties are granted immediate commissions as officers in the Air Force and receive the same full pay and allowances as male officers. When a nurse, dietitian or medical specialist is given a commission, she also gets her choice of hospitals, provided the area they choose has a requirement for their specialty.

The Air Force Recruiting Service has an experienced Air Force Nurse assigned to this area to interview women in the medical profession and to give them first hand particulars about opportunities.

SPOTLIGHT ON NUTRITION

The American Meat Institute has just issued a booklet called "The Spotlight Is On Nutrition". A primary purpose is to encourage retailers to place more emphasis on the nutritional value of meat in their advertising. But, beyond that, the main gainer will be the public at large—and, particularly, those among us who have been led astray by quack diets and food faddism.

This kind of faddism has reached serious dimensions in late years. As leading nutritional authorities warn, it can have serious adverse effects on health and longevity. Additionally, of course, it leads its victims to spend big sums of money on diets and alleged dietary aids which, at best, are valueless and, at worst, are definitely harmful.

A sound diet, save in those exceptional cases where qualified physicians recommend special diets, is based on the standard items carried in any butcher shop and food store—meats, fruits, vegetables, dairy products, and so on. And meat is certainly one of the most important elements. In no other food has nature placed so much and so many of the proteins, vitamins and minerals we must have to keep healthy and strong. In one form or another, meat suits the requirements of people of all ages. It is essential to mental as well as physical vigor. And, of no small moment, we can eat meat every day without losing our taste for it.

So—the spotlight is on nutrition. And it is really needed there.
