## Prayer

In the excellent popular devotion of the Rosary, through its fifteen mysteries, recalling to mind the life, death and resurrection of Christ, the history of the Savior is brought within the range of the minds of all for prayerful thought and enlightenment. It is a prayer adapted to the needs of the learned and the unlettered, of the sinner and the saint. Universal in its appeal, the Rosary is comprehensive in its content. Meditation on its mysteries can envision the longings of the just of the Old Testament and the happiness of those rejoiced by His coming. The prophecies heralding the advent of the Redeemer, the pitiful details of the sufferings and death and the triumphant victory of Christ epitomize the Messianic belief of the Old Law. The humility of His Incarnation and His obedience unto death which merited for Him His exaltation are placed before us in the joyful, sorrowful and glorious mysteries that are a compendium of the New Testament.

## Program

The spirit of the prayer of Mary's Psalter dictates that as we meditate on these mysteries of the life of Christ and His Mother, we may learn to "imitate what they contain." Pondering on these matters with something of the insight and intuition of the Blessed Mother of Christ, the ideal of all contemplative prayer, the love of our heart must be endeavored to make the lessons of the life of Christ our light to guide us as becomes enlightened men. That light must illumine us toward a lovable understanding of what we can learn by repeatedly thinking about the only One Who can save us in time and in eternity. Thoughtful prayer on the life of Christ and His teaching will furnish us with the motives of right living enjoined by the law of God. "If any one love Me, he will keep My word" (John xiv, 23)—this is the challenge of Christ. That love can be fostered in simple prayer to stimulate one to carry its lessons into action best affected by imitation of Christ as our Light.

## Promise

The purpose of the Rosary devotion is also that we may obtain what its mysteries promise. This idea can be summed up admirably in the saying of the Master: "He that followeth Me, walketh not in darkness, but shall have the light of life" (John viii, 12). The life of Christ as studied in meditative thought in the Rosary is characterized by joy, sorrow and triumph. Our life cannot be different if we want to be Christ-like for the disciple is not above the Master. The joys of life receive their warrant for the Christian because Christ alone made genuine happiness here possible. The sorrows of this vale of tears are endowed with a possible consecration because Christ made them an earmark of His followers. Our life will be assured of its victories and its eventual crowning in glory only through Christ, because there is no other Name under heaven given to men whereby they may be saved. Strive to learn

From this point everything happens in a succession of humorous, sinister and romantic scenes which fully substantiate the title, "One Mad Night." Adjourning to the dining room of the new home, the delegates were served a warm dinner, for which the association is very thankful to Mrs. Anna Cvetan, Amalia Krulce, Frances Tomsic, Mary Novak and Mrs. Frank Batista as well as others who assisted in this work. ### 128 Lodges Show Marks In Booster Drive Rating

Joseph Kochevar Leads Butte, Montana, Society to Quota Honors

#### PITTSBURGH'S NO. 81 NEARS GOAL

Four Lodges Added to Active List; 58 Branches Not Heard From

Playing in the major role in keeping Montana in the upper brackets of the state standings in the current KSKJ Golden Booster Campaign, St. John the Baptist Society, No. 14, gave the state another boost when it passed its quota mark last week.

The new quota society is being led by Campaign Manager Joseph Kochevar. The society's success follows the promise made by the Northerners at the start of the drive that they intended to do their share. With quota honors safely tucked away, the lodge does not intend to remain idle, but rather The performance of the

plans to augment its total pointage. northern state now places four lodges in the honor rating of quota units. Others to make goal are Nos. 219, 70 and 220. The Montana society is the first to make quota in the Northwest.

In the past two weeks the active list of lodges was augmented by four, the total number of participating groups now being 128. The new societies are Nos. 153, 75, 178 and 134. To make participation 100 per cent, 58 lodges have yet to report they have recruited at least one member. The lodges which have not as yet reported can aid in a large measure to the success of the campaign, if they give their support in the remaining two months of the drive.

### CATHOLIC ACTION SELECTED PARAGRAPHS

#### THIS IS PATRIOTISM.

"Adequate and rational patriotism should be quite as active in peace as in war, and it should extend to every matter that affects the common good. If patriotism is love of country, its only rational and concrete meaning is love of the people who inhabit the country and compose the State. . . . Therefore, its ultimate object is the same as that of the State, namely, the common good."

#### STARTING POINT.

"Perhaps the logical starting point for parents who are interested in making the most of their opportunities for the training of their children within the home is to turn the searchlight of inquiry upon themselves, to investigate their own attitudes toward child training, and to study their own methods of fulfilling their obligations in this vital field of activity."

#### "HATE" PROPAGANDA.

"Propaganda tending to promote hostility toward foreign nations, or to stimulate militarism and imperialism, or to glorify war, is conducted by a host of organizations and individuals in every important nation. Some . . . are doubtless motivated by the most disinterested, if not the most judicious spirit of patriotism. . . . And to prevent it is impossible in a free country. At most it can only be counteracted by the teaching of international justice and tolerance."
