

Vesti s seje gl. odbora SNPJ

Letoanja članska kampanja naše jednote. Glavni odbor SNPJ se je krepko izjavil za združenje jednot in zvez. Razširjen radioprogram ob 35-letnici SNPJ. Jednota je spet prispevala \$100 za španske reveže in gl. odbor je poslal telegram prezidentu Rooseveltu, naj se humanitarno zavzame za ográžanje jetnike

Letna seja gl. odbora SNPJ se je odvijala v trajanju tri dni, 9., 10. in 11. februarja v jednotni dvorani v Chicagu. Navzoči so bili vsi glavni odborniki.

Najvažnejša zadeva je bila članska kampanja ob petintridesetletnici SNPJ za oba članska oddelka jednote. Kampanja je prišla 1. aprila t. l. in traja do konca leta. Podrobnosti glede nagrad in drugega v tej kampanji bodo uradno objavljene v kratkem. V zvezi s to kampanjo bodo tudi članski shodi po celem, na katerih bodo nastopili gl. odborniki kot govorniki.

V zvezi s 35-letnico SNPJ bo oddajen tudi radioprogram, ki bo razširjen v tem ali onem obsegu po vsej Ameriki za vse članstvo naše jednote; ta radioprogram, ki bo kulturne vsebine, bo oddajen v Chicagu sredi meseca aprila, ko bo čikaška federacija SNPJ priredila prvo pravo petintridesetletnico SNPJ. Radioprogram je v skrbi eksekutive SNPJ.

Drugi važen sklep na tej seji je bil soglasna izjava glavnega odbora SNPJ za združenje vseh slovenskih naprednih jednot in odborov v Ameriki. Glavni odbor naj se iskreno pripravi vsak čas na pogajanja s katerokoli jednoto ali zvezo, ki po naše resno voljo za združitve.

Glede atletike pri SNPJ je bila sprejeta večja reforma. Atletično gibanje se razdeli na tri distrikte (vzhod, srednji in zahod) in atletičnemu odboru je dodanih pet članov iz gl. odbora za sodelovanje. Fred Lotrich, John Klanšek, Donald Lotrich, Fred A. Vider in John Olip so bili izvoljeni v ta odbor.

Prstovanje v nova razreda prstniškega zavarovanja E in F je podaljšano za nedoločen čas, sklenjeno je pa bilo, da član, ki enkrat prestopi v razred E ali D, ne more več prestopiti nazaj v razrede A, B ali C.

Nadalje je bilo sklenjeno, da jednota spet prispeva \$100 za španske reveže, begunce iz republik, ki trpe pomanjkanje hrane, obleke in zdravil; dalje je bil sprejet in poslan predsedniku Rooseveltu (prav tako razvnu tajniku in senatorju iz Illinois) telegram z molom, naj ameriška vlada, ki je pokazala veliko humanitarnost glede masnih beguncov iz Nemčije in Avstrije, vložil zdaj svoj vpliv tudi za španske ujetnike iz republikanske armade, ki so in bodo izpostavljeni barbarim persekucijam in eksekucijam. Sprejeto je tudi bilo, da gl. predsednik ponovno opozori na družstva SNPJ, naj po vseh močeh še prispevajo za španske žrtve fašizma, zlasti za tiste, ki so se umaknile čez mejo in katerih pomanjkanje in trpljenje je zdaj večje kot je bilo v času vojne.

Iz poročil gl. izvršnih odbornikov je razvidno, da je leta 1938 pristopilo čez 3000 novih članov k SNPJ. V istem času je v obeh oddelkih umrlo 346 članov in črtanih je bilo 1472 članov.

V oddelku odraslih je umrlo zadnjem letu 331 članov in jednota je izplačala \$247,500 v smrtninah. Največ članov je umrlo za srčno hibo (72), rakom (60) jetiko (34) in za pljučnico (34).

Italija, Rusija podpisali pakt

Pogodba velja za eno leto

New York. — (The New York Leader.) — Trgovinska pogodba med fašistično Italijo in Sovjetsko unijo je bila podpisana 7. februarja in velja za eno leto. Uradna vest pojasnjuje, da nova pogodba vključuje več protokolov in gospodarskih dogovorov, na podlagi katerih so bila likvidirana sporna vprašanja, ki so v letu 1937 pretrgala trgovinske vezi med Italijo in sovjetski. Na temelju te pogodbe bo Italija dobivala iz Rusije v glavnem surovine (olje, rudo, žita itd.), Rusija bo pa dobivala iz Italije motorje in druge stroje, južno sadje, oljivo olje itd. — Istočasno poročajo iz Bruslja, Belgija, da se trgovinski odnosi med nacijsko Nemčijo in sovjetskim režimom vedno bolj razširjajo in utrjujejo.

Naciji zahtevajo \$100,000,000 od židov

Odškodnina za umor nemškega diplomata

Berlin, 14. febr. — Nemški židje bodo morali jutri plačati drugi obrok v vsoti \$100,000,000 v nemško blagajno kot del odškodnine za umor Ernsta von Rosta, tajnika nemškega poslanika v Parizu. Rosta je pred nekaj meseci ustrelil neki poljski žid in Hitlerjeva vlada je naložila židom kazni v vsoti \$400,000,000.

Prvi obrok v vsoti \$100,000,000 so nemški židje plačali Hitlerjevi vladi v zadnjem decembru. Ker židje niso imeli tolike vsote v gotovini, so morali za postaviti svoje imetje in vrednostne papirje. Drugi obrok bodo plačali na sličen način.

Senatni odsek podprl Roosevelta

Washington, D. C., 14. febr. — Rooseveltova administracija je izvojevala zmago večeraj, ko je senatni odsek za militaristične zadeve odglasoval z enajstimi proti petim glasovom, da ostanejo pogajanja med Rooseveltom in francosko vlado tajna. Pogajanja so se nanašala na francoska naročila ameriških bojnih letal. Nasprotniki so očitali Rooseveltu, da je sklenil dogovor s francosko vlado kljub opoziciji članov vrhovnega štaba armade in vojnega tajnika.

V istem času je SNPJ izplačala vsoto \$38,522.50 za 566 slučajev operacij in \$8,325.00 za 34 slučajev telesnih odškodnin. Največ operacij (150) je bilo na vnetem slepiču in (104) na kil.

Skupna vsota izplačane bolniške podpore vseh treh razredov v letu 1938 pa znaša \$359,081.89.

Vsa druga poročila in zaključek bodo objavljene v uradnem zapisniku.

FILIPINSKI PREDSEDNIK PONUDIL ZAVETJE ŽIDOM

Amerika lahko sprejme 30,000 begunov letno

RAZPRAVA O HITLERJEVEM NAČRTU

London, 14. febr. — Manuel Quezon, predsednik Filipinskega otočja, je informiral londonski odbor za begunce, da se lahko več tisoč nemških židov izseli na otok Mindanao. Njegovo ponudbo je prečital na seji odbora George Rublee, Američan in načelnik odbora, ki je obenem naznanil svojo resignacijo. Odbor je takoj izvolil naslednika. Ta je Anglež Herbert Emerson, pomožni vrhovni komisar za begunce Lige narodov.

Rublee je dejal, da je sprejel pozicijo načelnika odbora za begunce le začasno, ko je podal ostavko. Članom odbora je nato predložil Hitlerjev načrt glede izselitve židov iz Nemčije. Ta med drugim določa takojšnjo izselitve 150,000 do 200,000 židov iz Nemčije in ustanovitev posebnega sklada za financiranje izseljevanja iz imetja nemških židov. Hitler je dalje objubil, da bodo nacijske avtoritete odnehale v gonji proti starim židom v času izvajanja načrta izselitve.

Quezonovo ponudbo je predložil članom odbora za begunce Myron C. Taylor, ameriški reprezentant v odboru, ki ga tvorijo predstavniki 32 držav. V tej je rečeno, da je predsednik Filipinskega otočja pripravljen dati zavetje tisoč židom letno. Taylor je v svojem govoru poudarjal, da tuje države lahko najdejo prostor v svojih mejah za vse begunce iz Nemčije, ne da bi morale radikalno spremeniti svojih imigracijskih zakonov. Samo Združene države lahko sprejmejo 30,000 nemških beguncev letno.

Dr. Max Urena, reprezentant dominikanske republike, je izjavil, da njegova država lahko sprejme 10,000 beguncev pod gotovimi pogoji, reprezentant Avstralije pa je ponudil zavetje 15,000 beguncem. Razprava o Hitlerjevem načrtu se bo danes nadaljevala.

Japonci bombardirajo kitajski otok

Ameriška ladja odplula proti otoku

Šanghaj, 14. febr. — Ameriški rušilec John D. Edwards je večeraj odplul iz Hongkonga proti otoku Hainanu, ko so pričela prihajati poročila, da japonske bojne ladje obstreljujejo otok. Japonske čete so se izkrcale v glavnem pristanišču tega otoka zadnji teden. Ameriška bojna ladja bo vzela na svoj krov ameriške državljane, ki se nahajajo na otoku.

Francoske bojne ladje so tudi dospjele v bližino otoka. Japonska okupacija ograja pomorsko zvezo med Francijo in Indokino, francosko kolonijo, kakor tudi zvezo med Hongkongom, angleško kolonijo, in Singaporom. Francoska vlada je že naslovila oster protest Tokiju proti okupaciji otoka.

Papežovo truplo položeno v grobnico

Rim, 14. febr. — Truplo papeža Pija XI. je bilo danes položeno v grobnico v katedrali sv. Petra. Ceremonijo so se udeležili Mussolini, italijanski kralj Victor in reprezentantje zunanjih držav. Med slednjimi je bil tudi William Phillips, ameriški poslanik v Rimu.

Vrhovni sodnik Brandeis resigniral

V pismu Rooseveltu ne omenja vzroka

Washington, D. C., 14. febr. — Louis D. Brandeis, član federalnega vrhovnega sodišča, je večeraj predložil resignacijo in v pismu predsedniku Rooseveltu izrazil željo, da resignacija takoj stopi v veljavo. V pismu ne omenja vzroka in njegova žena je rekla reporterjem, da ne bo Brandeis podal nobene izjave.

Resignacija ni prišla nepričakovano. Brandeis je star 82 let in član vrhovnega sodišča je bil 23 let. Za člana ga je imenoval predsednik Wilson l. 1916. Poročila, da bo kmalu resigniral zaradi slabega zdravja, so krožila že več tednov. Nedavno je dejal, da je pripravljen sodelovati v gibanju v prid židovskim beguncem, ki morajo iskati novo domovino.

Brandeis je bil znan kot najbolj liberalen član vrhovnega sodišča. Rojen je bil l. 1856 v Louisvilleu, Ky., kjer je potoval privatne in ljudske osnovne šole. Pozneje je študiral pravo na univerzi v Dresdenu, Nemčija, in na univerzi Harvard. Odvetniški poklic je izvrševal najprej v St. Louisu, Mo., potem pa v Bostonu, Mass., dokler ga ni William Denny in San Francisco in Robert M. Hutchins, predsednik elitaške univerze. Odkar je Rooseveltova administracija na krmilu, so že trije člani vrhovnega sodišča resignirali, do čim je sodnik Cardozo v tem času umrl.

Njegov naslednik bo najbrže Harold M. Stephens iz Utaha, član federalnega prizivnega sodišča v federalnem distriktu. Drugi možni kandidati so senator L. B. Schwellenbach iz Washingtona, federalni sollicitor R. H. Jackson, federalni sodnik William Denny in San Francisco in Robert M. Hutchins, predsednik elitaške univerze. Odkar je Rooseveltova administracija na krmilu, so že trije člani vrhovnega sodišča resignirali, do čim je sodnik Cardozo v tem času umrl.

Amendiranje nevtralnostnega zakona

Predloženi načrt daje veliko oblast predsedniku

Washington, D. C., 14. febr. — Senator Elbert D. Thomas, demokrat iz Utaha in član senatnega odseka za zunanje zadeve, je večeraj predložil načrt glede amendiranja nevtralnostnega zakona. Ta naj bi bil v smislu načrta amendiran tako, da bi imel predsednik popolno oblast v določanju, katera država je agresivna.

Akcija glede amendiranja nevtralnostnega zakona je bila že prej napovedana, toda Thomasov načrt je prvi v tej smeri. Pristajajoč program ameriške izolacije so se že izrekli proti amendiranju nevtralnostnega zakona tako, da bi Roosevelt dobil še večjo oblast. Opozicija trdi, da bi Roosevelt lahko pognal Ameriko v konflikt v slučaju izbruha vojne v Evropi.

Hullova izjava o razorožitveni konferenci

Washington, D. C., 14. febr. — Ameriška vlada je pripravljena sklicati razorožitveno konferenco v momentu, ko se pokažejo izglede, da bo taka konferenca uspešna, je sinoči izjavil državni tajnik Hull. To je bil njegov odgovor kongresniku Ludlowu iz Indiane, ki je pozval državnega tajnika, naj skliče konferenco. Hull je dejal, da bo Amerika utrjevala svojo obrambo, dokler druge države ne pokažejo volje za omejitve oboroževanja.

Zadnje lojalistične čete se umaknile iz Katalonije

FRANCO ZAPRETIL S KAZNIMI

Madrid, 14. febr. — Španska ljudska vlada je pozvala ljudstvo na odločen odpor proti fašistom. "dokler ne pride mir v atmosferi neodvisnosti, varnosti in svobode." Proklamacija je bila naslovljena vsem prebivalcem na teritoriju, ki je še pod kontrolo lojalistične vlade, po seji članov Negrinovega kabineta, ki se je vršila v času, ko so fašistični topovi sipali kroglice na Madrid.

Sedež španske vlade, ki je bil premeščen v Valencijo in potem v Barcelono, je zdaj spet v Madridu, starem glavnem mestu Španije. Vlada proklamacija naglašala, "da je zdaj pred nami odločitev, ali naj se vsi rešimo ali pa podležemo v borbi."

Perpignan, Francija, 14. febr. — Polkovnik Marquez, poveljnik enajste lojalistične armade "pozabljenih mož", je večeraj s svojimi četami prekorčil mejo pri Prats-de-Mollis in stopil na francosko ozemlje. Naznanil je, da mu ostanki lojalistične armade v Kataloniji sledijo in da bodo kmalu vsi miličniki, ki so odbijali fašistične naskoke na svoje pozicije v pirenejskem gorovju, v Franciji. Pred umikom so lojalisti uničili vsa skladišča municije in orožja.

Burgos, Španija, 14. febr. — V pričakovani popolne zmage v španski civilni vojni je fašistični režim večeraj uveljavil odredbo, ki določa stroge kazni za osebe in podjarmljenih krajev, ki bi se upirale rebelam. Te med drugim določajo izgubo državljanstva in izgon, razpust vseh političnih strank in konfiskacijo posebnih tribunali, ki bodo določali civilni status oseb v podjarmljenih krajevih.

Madrid, 14. febr. — Fašistični nadovi bombardirajo Madrid. Glavna tarča obstreljevanja je bil južni del mesta, kamor je priletelo okrog 150 krogel v štirih urah bombardiranja. Porušeni je bilo več hiš in krogle so ubile in ranile veliko število ljudi.

Fašistični letalci so v istem času vrgli čez sto bomb na Alicante in Kartageno, ki so razdejale več hiš in ubile doslej še ne ugotovljeno število ljudi. Lojalisti so sestrelili v bitki v zraku, nemško bombno letalo, ki je sodelovalo v napadu na mesto Palos.

Naciji spet posvarili češko vlado

Praga, 14. febr. — Člani češke vlade so bili presenečeni, ko so bili ponovno posvarjeni pred zatiranjem nemške manjšine. Svarilo je naslovil vladi Ernst Kundt, desna roka Konrada Henleina, ki je v oddaji agitacijo za priključitev Sudetске k Nemčiji pred razkoskanjem češke republike. Kundt trdi, da Čehi še vedno zatirajo Nemce, ki so še ostali v republiki, zaeno pa jim očita, da se niso nič naučili iz dogodkov v zadnjem letu.

Irška vlada priznala Francov režim

Dublin, Irsko, 14. febr. — Irška vlada je večeraj uradno priznala fašistični režim v Španiji. H. L. Kerney je bil imenovan za poslanika in bo kmalu odpotoval v Burgos, kjer je sedež Francove fašistične vlade.

ANGLIJA KMALU PRIZNA FAŠISTIČNI REŽIM

Chamberlain hoče imeti proste roke v pogajanjih

KRITIKA PREMIERJEVE POLITIKE

London, 14. febr. — Premier Chamberlain je večeraj naznanil v parlamentu, da bosta Anglija in Francija kmalu priznali Francovo administracijo v Burgosu kot legalno špansko vlado. To je bil odgovor na vprašanja, ki so mu jih stavili voditelji laboristične opozicije. Chamberlain jim je povedal, da hoče imeti proste roke v pogajanjih s španskimi fašisti in izjavil, da se ne bo posvečeval s člani parlamenta glede priznanja Francovega režima. Naglašal je, da ne more dati nobenega zagotovila v situaciji, ki se naglo izpreminja, toda njegova vlada prevzame popolno odgovornost v pogajanjih, katerim ima slediti priznanje Francove vlade v Španiji.

Dalje je Chamberlain rekel, da je v stalnih stikih s francosko vlado, toda doslej še ni bil storjen definitivni zaključek. Po informacijah iz Pariza sklepajo, da bo Daladierjev kabinet na svoji seji danes priznal Francovo režim v načelu in Anglija bo sledila zgledu Francije, toda prej mora dobiti zagotovilo od generala Franca, da bo pognal Italijane in Nemce iz Španije, ko bo civilna vojna končana.

V svojem govoru je Chamberlain zagovarjal angleško pomoč generalu Francu v pogajanjih, ki so rezultirala v fašistični okupaciji otoka Minorke. Franca je v teh pogajanjih zastopal grof San Luis, governer na Malorki, vršila pa so se na angleški bojni ladji Devonshire, ki je potem vzela lojaliste na svoj krov in jih odpeljala v varno zavetje.

Arthur Henderson, vodja laboristične opozicije, je zahteval od Chamberlaina pojasnila, zakaj so italijanski letalci uprizorili šest napadov na otok Minorke in to v času, ko je bila angleška bojna ladja zasidrana v pristanišču tega otoka. Premier je odgovoril, da so bili napadi uprizorjeni proti volji poveljnika španske fašistične oborožene sile.

Berlin, 14. febr. — Napol uradno glasilo nacijske vlade

Dienst aus Deutschland je večeraj napadlo angleško in francosko diplomacijo. Očita ji oportunističnost, ki ga je demonstrirala v prijateljski gesti napram Francovemu režimu. V zagotovilo, da bosta Anglija in Francija priznali Francovo režim in mu dali tudi posojilo za rekonstrukcijo po vojni opustošene Španije, vidijo naciji poskus izločitve italijanskega in nacijskega vpliva v Španiji, čeprav sta Italija in Nemčija pomagali Francu v civilni vojni.

Nemška bojna ladja spuščena v morje

Hamburg, Nemčija, 14. febr. — Nacijska Nemčija je danes obvestila svet, da hoče postati spet mogočna sila na morju, ko je bila z velikimi ceremonijami spuščena v morje prva bojna ladja s tonažo 35,000 ton. Ladja je dobila ime Bismarck, po "železnem kancelarju", ki je dvignil Nemčijo na stopnjo velesile v zadnjem stoletju. Ceremonijo so se udeležili Hitler, admiral Erich Raeder, vrhovni poveljnik nemške bojne mornarice, maršal Goering, zunanji minister Ribbentrop in drugi visoki vladni uradniki ter mornarični in vojaški častniki.

Supreme Board Proceedings

This Year's Membership Campaign; Supreme Board Strongly Supports Merger with Other Fraternal; Nationwide Radio Program in Observance of SNPJ's 35th Year; Society Again Contributes \$100 to Spanish Cause; Supreme Board Sends Telegram to President Roosevelt Urging Him to Use His Influence in Aiding Loyalist Prisoners in Spain

The Supreme Board of the SNPJ met at its annual session Feb. 9, 10 and 11 at Society Headquarters in Chicago. In attendance were all board members.

The most important decision concerned the membership campaign for both departments in celebration of the 35th anniversary of the Society. The campaign opens April 1 and will close at the end of the year. The prizes offered and other details about the campaign will be officially announced soon. It is planned also to hold membership mass meetings throughout the country at which board members will be the speakers.

In connection with the 35th anniversary of the SNPJ a nationwide radio program will be sponsored over a national network for all the members; this radio program, cultural in content, will be broadcast from Chicago in the middle of April, when the Chicago SNPJ Federation will sponsor the first celebration of the Society's jubilee. Arrangements for the radio program are in the hands of the Executive Committee of the SNPJ.

Another important decision of the meeting was the unanimous endorsement of the idea of merging all Slovene progressive fraternal in America. The Supreme Board is ready to sincerely enter into negotiations at any time with any kindred fraternal organization which shows its willingness for a merger.

In regard to SNPJ athletics, a broader reform was enacted. The athletic movement is to be divided into three districts (Eastern, Midwestern and Western) and five members were added to the Athletic Board from among the Supreme Board members for general cooperation. Fred Malgai, John Klasek, Donald J. Lotrich, Fred A. Vidler, and John Olip were elected to serve in this capacity.

The period of transferring from the mortuary class to insurance E and D has been extended indefinitely, but it was decided that a member who transfers into class E or D, can-

not transfer back into classes A, B or C.

The Society contributed \$100 for Spanish victims who are in need of food, clothing and medical assistance. Further, it was unanimously decided to send a telegram to President Roosevelt (also to the Secretary of State and the two Illinois Senators) appealing to the American Government which has shown great humanitarian interest in the mass expulsions of refugees from Germany and Austria, to exercise its influence also in the case of Spanish refugees and prisoners of the republican army who are and will be exposed to barbaric persecutions and executions. It was also decided that the Supreme President appeals anew to the SNPJ lodges to contribute according to their ability for the Spanish victims of fascism, especially for those who sought refuge across the border and whose suffering and want will now be greater than it was during the war.

It is evident from the reports submitted by the members of the Supreme Executive Committee that during 1938 a total number of 3000 new members were admitted into the SNPJ; in the same period 346 adult and juvenile members died, and 1472 were cancelled.

Last year a total number of 331 adult members died and the Society paid \$247,500 in death benefits. Causes of deaths were 72 from heart failure; cancer, 60; tuberculosis, 34, and pneumonia, 34.

In the same period the SNPJ paid out \$38,522.50 for 566 cases of operations and \$8,325.00 for 34 cases of physical disability. The greatest number of operations (150) were appendectomies and (104) for rupture.

The total amount of paid sick benefit in all three classes in 1938 was \$350,081.89. Other reports and decisions will be published in the official minutes.

Comments on This and That

Mutual Good—A Corroboration—Our Political Policy Still Holds Good

A slight criticism leveled against the "spendthrifts" in the SNPJ athletic units in general will undoubtedly do some good to all concerned. Nothing is better than a healthy criticism appearing from time to time when things become too strained.

First, there are critical voices from the senior lodges and federations telling us that ES lodge athletes are bent on spending the athletic fund without regard to the Society's benefit in increased membership, and at the same time urging the Supreme Executive Committee to tighten the purse for these "spendthrifts," while, secondly, the Main Office has let it known that, in many cases, the senior lodges are eagerly elbowing to the "fleshpot"—before it is empty!—to get a share for promoting their own ballina games and such. Truly, the old folks are becoming sports-conscious! All this because there is a goodly sum of money available.

Now, things are sprouting evenly and they tend to cancel each other—for our mutual good. It will be—and it must be—more and more realized that SNPJ athletics are not an end in itself, but only one of the means to make the Society still bigger and better!

A short time ago, in discussion about fraternal merger problems, we pointed out the case of a small society just being merged with a major society without any difficulty AFTER the secretary of a smaller organization had been assured a permanent job in the office of the other organization.

The secretary in question (Mr. Jos. Chesarek, of the Slovene-Croatian Union, Calumet, Mich., the other society being the Croatian Fraternal Union, of Pittsburgh, Pa.) now writes in his organ agreeing that we are entirely right. In other words, he indirectly points to himself as proof of our contention. Whether any merger action of this character is beneficial to the members involved, whether it is democratic or even ethical, is beside the point. The leaders must be satisfied first—and there you are!

To those SNPJ fraternal in hilly Pennsylvania who are criticizing us for the standpoint thus expressed—whether they saw the obvious satire in it or not—we recommend the admission by Mr. Chesarek for study.

An earnest warning to Bro. Louis Jartz, of Cleveland, is necessary. His jibes in the Prosveta pertaining to a sad plight of Socialist wing politics in this country are premature—at least as far as our policy is concerned.

All, or at least part, of the jam those groups find themselves in (in a bad fix, as Bro. Jartz sees them) is of their own making; it came about as this Editor predicted some two years ago. As for the American Labor party in New York, the situation is not as dark as he would make us believe. True, there were some unholly compromises, but this was a far cry from the disgraceful opportunism the Stalinists indulged in all over the country and are still indulging in without sense of shame.

We still firmly believe in the advent of a genuine Labor party, and the policy of this paper, as laid down at the last SNPJ convention, still holds good.

FINANCE COMMITTEE PROCEEDINGS

Meeting of Dec. 17, 1938

Brother Petrovich called the meeting to order at 9 p. m. In attendance were Brothers Cankar, Lotrich, Olip, Petrovich, Vider and Vogrich; Zupan asked to be excused, the request was granted and he came to the meeting at 11 a. m. Minutes of the previous meeting approved.

Brother Petrovich made the following report:

1.—He read Moody's letters on the Wakulla County (Florida) bonds in which they recommended the sale of the bonds; on the Michigan Public Service bonds and their recommendation to dispose of them; on the Montgomery County (Maryland) bonds; on the Detroit City Ice and Fuel Company bonds giving us considerable information on the earnings and the make up of the corporation; and on the financial condition of the Bladen County (North Carolina) bonds, which letters were placed on file. No FHA mortgages are available in Cleveland area at 101.

The following report was made by Brother Vider:

1.—Ohio Forge and Machine declared a dividend of 50c a share, payment of which was received. 2.—City of McAllen, Texas, made a final distribution of \$41.85 on their past due interest coupons. 3.—The Edinburg Consolidated School District refunding has been reported completed. 4.—Although Moody's reported a distribution of interest for 1938 on the Detroit City Ice and Fuel Co. bonds, no such interest has been received by our Society. 5.—A letter from Speers and Co. regarding the Tessville bonds explained that we should be able to realize a fairly good mark-up over the present price of these bonds. The letter was placed on file and a motion was passed to hold these bonds for the present. 6.—He also read a letter which he had sent to Phillip B. Heller on his bill for the extension agreement on our investment in the McKinley Land and Lumber Co. and Heller's reply, in which he explained that half of the cost would be shared by the McKinley Land and Lumber Co. The bill was then approved and the letters placed on file. 7.—A letter was read in which Brother Vider asked Moody's for an analysis of our investment portfolio similar to those received in previous years.

Brother Vogrich reported as follows:

1.—Since the last meeting, \$16,500 has been invested in FHA mortgages in the Cleveland area. 2.—The \$6000 Wilson County (North Carolina) bonds matured and were paid. Lorraine Telephone Company recalled \$25,000 of our holdings in that Company and paid 104 for them. This transaction netted us a profit. 3.—Loan 14-J was repaid. The original loan was \$3300. 4.—No information was available on our holdings in the Los Indios, Texas, bonds. It was agreed to ask for bids for the next meeting on this holding. 5.—An offer was received for our past due interest certificates of the City of Robstown bonds. Brother Vogrich was authorized to dispose of these past due interest certificates at the best price available. 6.—Offers of 63% were received on the McAllen (Texas) bonds. It was agreed to secure more information and new bids for the next meeting.

Brother Lotrich reported as follows:

1.—The deal for the Cherne property at 2670 East 79th street has been completed. The purchaser paid \$1500 down and balance \$90 monthly. 2.—The proposition to exchange Hrvatski Dom for a 37 acre plot of land with improvements in Grand Beach, Michigan, was investigated and reports indicate that the proper-

Mooney and His Release

PITTSBURGH, PA.—One of the main subjects these days seems to be Tom Mooney. Since his release early this year so much has been said that it takes this writer back to the day of his release, the day when Gov. Culbert Olson gave him his pardon, which followed by a speech by Mooney. He didn't sound like the man that has spent 22 years in prison, but like a man with great intelligence. He related his story how he faced the trial and how he spent the long years in prison. All this was heart breaking to those who listened to his speech. Then he appeared on "We the people" program and again briefly stated his story.

This writer, for one, was thinking of the other people who had so much to do with his release. One of them is Gov. Olson who since the day of Tom Mooney's pardon has been critically ill. What lies ahead for him? Another is his wife Rena Mooney. There were persistent rumors about a divorce, only to be later denied. The truth, however, has come out that Mooney wants a divorce. Why? Because the long separation during his imprisonment made them unsuited for each other. What will become of Mrs. Mooney who at the age of 61 is on relief and even threatened to be taken off, now that Tom is out of prison.
