Opportunities For Older People

"Three score and ten" — that is, seventy years — used to be thought of as about the most a man could expect to live. But living to seventy is no longer an unusual occurrence — it is, in fact, the average life expectancy for an American child born today. A century ago the prospects were quite different. Then a man of forty-five was considered "old." Today a man of forty-five may well look forward to twenty-five or more years of life. The conquest of disease has been chiefly responsible for this longer span of life. And what's more, the men and women who reach the customary retirement age of today — sixty-five — are usually in very good health.

There are now over eighteen million people in this group of "over sixty-five." What are their needs? Medicare, of course, is the major new step that has been taken which is of direct benefit to the elderly. It supplements basic social security benefits which have been the mainstay of the incomes of older people since 1936. In addition, an older person may earn up to one thousand five hundred dollars a year — tax free — on a part-time job, and still receive his full old-age pension.

But income is not the only need of older people. Private industry is conscious of the growing demand for special facilities, such as housing designed especially for the elder-

ly. A number of retirement communities, for instance, are now being built—with smaller apartments and houses, shopping and housekeeping facilities, motion picture halls, game rooms and so on. And within homes the possibilities of special construction of doorways for wheelchairs and nonslip bathing arrangements and similar aids for the elderly are being developed. Within governments, too, the special concerns of older people are being considered more and more. A year ago Congress established in the Federal Government an Administration on Aging to coordinate and stimulate both private and public activities. The states have established similar agencies.

Many communities have already established home-maker

services — either with volunteers or paid staff — to help older people with the house-keeping chores so that even if they have handicaps they may stay in their own homes rather than go to an institution. The persons who assist with these home-maker services are mostly older women, themselves, not only serving but supplementing their incomes. This is typical of a new trend which attempts to give part-time job opportunities to the men and women of advancing years who are still able and eager to be of service to society. These elderly people can use the money, but they benefit even more from a sense of being needed.

This is the reasoning behind the new "foster grandparents" program — which arranges for

an older person or couple to "adopt," figuratively speaking, an orphaned or deserted or under privileged child who may desperately need the love and attention these older people can give. Foster grandparents are also helping teachers if children need special assistance in reading or learning other basic skills. In such projects, the elderly, usually volunteer, but sometimes they are paid a small amount for their part time work. These and similar programs and projects are aimed at bringing the elderly into active contact

with younger people and the community as a whole, at providing opportunities which will enrich their later years.
