za zadnega predsednika republi-

nez pobegnil iz dežele, resignir.

včeraj prekoračili mejo in do-
šli v Argentino.

Da je Opazo podal ostavko kot
začasni predsednik, pripisujejo

ljudstvu, ker je Opazo sorodnik
žene odstavljenega diktatorja I-
baneza.

Washington, D. C., 28. jul. —

do 30. julija.

Chicago, 28. jul. — Čikaška
delavška federacija je včeraj za-
htevala od ščopana Cermaka, na-

ski kompaniji. Federacija pravi,
da je dovoljenje preveč enostran-
sko in krivlčno.

Nepokoj med ru- darji v Kentuckyju

Operatorji in oblasti se boje ra-
dikalnega gibanja, ki dobiva
čedalje večjo zaslombu med
rudarji

Harlan, Ky. — (FP) — Tu-
kajšnjo časopisje in operatorji
so silno vznenirjeni, ker dobiva
National Miners unija vedno več
pristašev med rudarji. Ta orga-
nizacija, ki je bila pred par
meseci skoraj neznana v tem delu-
države, je še dobita kontrola v
par naselbinsih in njena mod-
rate. Časopisje veliko piše o novi
nevarnosti in apelira na rudarje,
da napodijo "rdečarje" iz svo-
je sredine in tako rabi "ameri-
ške ustanove in svoje domove."

Toda rudarji gledajo na "svoje"
domove, na razmere, v katerih
so prisiljeni živeti, z drugo-
ga vidika. Gledajo na svoje lač-
ne družine, na evakcije, ki so jih
odredili operatorji samo radi te-
ga, ker so se pridružili rudarji zani-
mati za novo organizacijo. Oper-
atorji lahko svobodno zborujejo,
dočim policija razbijava rudar-
ska zborovanja. Prvi imajo vse
pravice, dočim se jih drugim odra-
že. Več kot trideset rudarjev je
bil danih v črno listo. Petnajst
tisoč drugih živi v bedi in pom-
njanju. Ti vede, "kdo razbija a-
meriške ustanove in domove."

Poskus operatorjev, da zlomi-
jo unikajo gibanje med rudarji
potom aresata soditeljev UMW,
se je izjavil. Stara unija je
sicer poravnana, toda s tem je
bila ustvarjena podlaga za bolj
militantno unikajo gibanje. O-
operatorji in oblasti so obsojali
staro unijo in skupino raketer-
jev, ki se brigajo le za svoje in-
tereze. Sedaj so v večjem strahu
kot kdaj-kaj, ker je nova u-
nija podvajala budi in izvajala za-
tevne rudarjev.

Irski dramatik, cigar ime je

Veedol", katerega pilotirata
Clyde E. Pangborn in Hugh
Herndon. Njun cilj je Moskva,
od koder bosta nadaljevala po-
let okrog sveta, kajti namenje-
na sta, da posekajo rekord, ki
sta ga pred par tedni napravila
Willey Post in Harold Gatty.

Dva vojaška aeroplana sta

Help the Miners!

In Henrietta, Oklahoma, the other day, three hundred jobless men marched upon the local storekeepers. Why? To beg for food? No; to demand it! And they went from shop to shop, saying that they would take what they wanted, peacefully, if the storekeepers would not resist their demands, but they would take it by force otherwise. Owing only to the influence and great tact on the part of a leading resident of that town, these almost desperate men were willing to abandon their plans of resorting to violence to satisfy their hunger. This may be but a mild foretaste of what is coming next fall and winter, unless the responsible local, county, state and federal officials awaken to the fact that they are facing a grave situation.

Hunger is the strongest of human desires. We must remember that starving men will take the law into their own hands when they are denied adequate food and shelter. And in the event that such hunger marches and subsequent disturbances begin spreading, will the responsible officials be found ready to cope with the situation?

In western Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio and Illinois the coal miners and their families are deprived of livelihood. Conditions in these coal mining districts are incredibly deplorable, so much so that the miners were forced to walk out. Thousands of miners and their families are starving with no promise or hope of the future. But they must live! They are willing to work only if there were any work to be gotten. Denied this privilege to work, by which they could earn their most essential necessities, they appeal for help.

Splendid conditions, indeed!

In the great industrial centers conditions are bad, but there are other means, at times, through which the unemployed in big cities find help however meager that help may be. But the innocent little children in the coal fields of Pennsylvania and other mining districts find no relief. Therefore, it is our fraternal as well as human duty to help them. Our subordinate lodges in the more fortunate districts where the present industrial and economic depression is not so acute, should undertake immediate action to start a relief fund for the stricken miners and their families in the coal fields. Legion Justice

It is a poor mouth that does not bring a report of a labor "trial" that resembles a Faustus court. California "justice" heads the list. Eight men said to be Communists who attempted to organize a strike of agricultural workers were sentenced to the longest terms of imprisonment ever imposed in a labor case in this country. However, the terms of five have been reduced from 5 to 42 years, to one to 14 years, one has been released as he was not near the scene of the strike, and two are held for deportation. The case will be taken to the U. S. Supreme Court.

The character of the "trial" may be imagined from the cocky statement of the head of the American Legion at El Centro. "The way to kill the red plague is to dynamite it out," said the Legionnaire. "That's what we did in Imperial County. The judges who tried the Communists was a Legionnaire: 50 per cent of the jurors were war veterans. What chance did the Communists have? That's the way we stamped it out in our county."

Indeed, it is surprising that this popinjay did not demand that the trial be held by a Legion post. By his own admission the cards were stacked against the accused men and, of course, they didn't have a chance. Any man who coolly writes his approval of this is a scoundrel and should be quarantined against contact with civilized human beings.

Those who can help the Civil Liberties Union to carry the case to the U. S. Supreme Court should send their contributions to that organization at 100 Fifth Avenue, New York City. — "New Leader."

Dividends and Dole

It is reported that \$9,000,000,000 in wages were lost last year by the workers due to unemployment. The income of big business increased 5%.

Over \$120,000,000 is paid by private charities in normal times. It was over a half billion last year. Notwithstanding President Hoover's aversion to the dole, we pay it in many forms. Billions of dollars are paid in the form of dividends to non-producers, while like enormous funds are paid to maintain unemployed workers and their families.

WESTERN ATHLETIC BOARD NOTICE

A special meeting of the Western Athletic Board shall be held at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, August 8, 1931, at 2562 So. Central Park avenue, Chicago, for the purpose of considering the charges of conspiracy as made by the Pioneer officials in their article "Pioneer Cause," published in Prosveska, July 22, 1931. The Western Athletic Board, composed of English speaking lodges, conspires, knowingly or otherwise, to harm the Pioneers," so charges the article, "Pioneer Cause," published in Prosveska, July 22, 1931. Such blanket accusations, without proof, made by the Pioneers and published in our official organ, are done for the sole purpose of discrediting organized athletics in the SNPJ as well as to injure the reputation of the English-speaking lodges which compose the Western Athletic Board. If there was any conspiracy committed by anyone to harm the English-speaking SNPJ Movement, it was done by the Pioneer officials when they published such "bunk" as contained in the article, "Pioneer Cause."

"To us it looks as though all of this was done intentionally by the Sunflowers." What is the purpose of the Pioneer officials to broadcast such

falsifications, if it is not done in the spirit to create hatred between the English-speaking lodges?

The Pioneer letter was not mailed to the Secretary of the Western Athletic Board, and to this date, I have not received any communication from the Pioneer Lodge.

Glass Justice

Breast Hill, Kans.—Why do we have so many crimes? People are committing all kinds of crimes every day and there seems to be no means of preventing them. Of course you say they have different punishments for different crimes. Yes, they do; but do all the criminals get their punishments as they should? No.

Supposing a man of high social standing in some town goes out and kills a poor man whom he dislikes. An indictment, a trial, excitement, and public sentiment increased by politics. Freedom of the accused and silence is usually the result.

But supposing a poor man kills a rich man. Will he get out of it as easy as this other criminal did? No.

There would be no doubt this poor man would get either life imprisonment or capital punishment. Is this American justice?

Michigan, you may remember, is the state where a man was recently sent to prison for life because he was caught with a pint of whiskey as his fourth felony. It is the same state which early this year sent three bankers to prison for embezzlement something like \$3,000,000. The bankers have been released after serving five months in jail. The man who was caught with the pint of whiskey, remains behind the bars.

Government is proving itself a stark failure when it can not meet such a condition. There has come into power a force mightier than the people themselves. Local rule in our big cities is no longer one of right, but one of might. The man with the quickest trigger finger is the new boss.

If our friends were a little more brotherly, they would say that this is a matter that concerns both organizations. But they omitted themselves. The Federation will see to it, without such insults, that its reports shall be clear and known to the members and we expect the same from others, and we'll be friends.

5. That the Federation of Chicago SNPJ Lodges at the time of merger shall have the same amount of money in its treasury as the Union of Chicago SNPJ Lodges.

We can discuss this at the time of the merger. The Federation held a dance and had other income for its unemployed fund, which has mostly been used up for its specific purpose. The United Lodges had incomes for a like purpose. If it uses the funds for the purpose collected and the Federation does the same this question will be easily settled. The support for unemployed shall then be taken care of by the merged body.

6. That all assets of the Federation of Chicago SNPJ Lodges shall be merged with the assets of the Union of Chicago SNPJ Lodges.

Think about this miracle. Just as if the Federation of SNPJ in Chicago was an overpowered State, to whom the over zealous visitor declares and dictates: That and that you must do. If the Committee of the Union has honest intentions, and cares for a merger and unity they should never offer such conditions again. If any one has any right to "demand" an unconditional merger, that would sooner belong to the Federation, because it was in existence first, and because it was not organized in an "around the bush" style, but directly from the beginning as a Federation for all the lodges of Chicago and Illinois.

7. That every lodge shall have three representatives to the Union of Chicago SNPJ Lodges, eligibility to be determined by rule No. 1 which excludes Supreme Board members and employees.

The Question of Unity Among SNPJ Lodges in Chicago and Vicinity

Federation of SNPJ.—(Summarized from the Slovens)

Their second condition was as follows:

2. That the policy of the Union of Chicago SNPJ Lodges with reference to polities shall be that there shall be no polities in this Union or in any of its affiliated lodges; no propaganda to be issued by them (them always herein meaning Union and its affiliated lodges) shall boost any state political party other than the one that might so be recognized as a Labor Party by the American Federation of Labor. Each member is entitled to his own political beliefs.

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The winner of this League will play in the Inter-city Tournament.

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As to the "great conspiracy" to injure the Pioneer Lodge, the truth is,

that an announcement was made in Prosveska asking that lodges desiring to have games scheduled at their picnics should write to the secretary of the WAB. The Pioneers made no request for any game, to be scheduled at its picnic; in fact, I was informed by a certain Pioneer official that the Pioneers will play some outside team at their picnic, whereas the George Washington Lodge 270 asked the WAB to schedule a game at its picnic on July 26, 1931, which the WAB did.
