

## Porazum o razdelitvi italijanske mornarice

oglasljava in Grčija bosta dobili parnike

OMPROMIS GLEDE TRIPOLITANIJE

Paris, 29. apr.—Zunanji ministri štirih velesil—Rusije, Amerike, Velike Britanije in Francije—so storili nadaljnji korak pri dosegu sporazuma glede razdelitve italijanske bojne trgovske mornarice. Sporazum določa razdelitev ladij in parnikov med šest žaveznških držav. Te so Rusija, Amerika, Velika Britanija, Francija, Jugoslavija in Grčija.

Končna odločitev glede števila italijanskih parnikov, katere bodo dodeljene enemu od držav, bo pozneje. Rusija in Francija zahtevata, da mora vsaka država dobiti eno tretjino skupne tonaže italijanskih ladij in parnikov.

Ruski zunanji minister Molotov, ameriški državni tajnik Stimson, britski zunanji minister Bevin in francoski zunanji minister Bidault so se na konferenci reševanja problemov, katerih niso mogli rešiti njihovi ministri. Eden izmed problemov je vprašanje začetanja nove med Italijo in Jugoslavijo med Italijo in Francijo.

Francija hoče dobiti italijanske ozemlje ob Alpah in Rivije. Diskuzije o njeni zahtevi so vršile na konferenci zunanjih ministrov zadnjo soboto, toda ni bilo noben zaključek.

Drugo sporno vprašanje je bomo Italijanski kolonij v Afriki. Velika Britanija in Amerika sta za to, da pridejo kolonije pod poverništvo organizacije Združenih narodov, dočim Italija zahteva poverništvo za politično. Opozicijo proti temu poverjenstvu vodi zlasti Velika Britanija, ki hoče ohraniti svojo življensko črto s kolonijami v Afriki. Možnost je, da se sklenjen kompromis glede političnosti.

Govorje, da bo Grčija dobila dekaneske otoke. Vprašanje o Trstu še čaka rešitve. Posebne komisije, ki so oblikovali Trst in Julijsko Krajino, niso predložili poročila zunanjim ministrom. Prej je bilo znanjeno, da so se izrekli, da Trst ostati pod Italijo, za kar pa naj bi prišlo pod Jugoslavijo.

McGrady imenovan za posredovalca

Washington, D. C., 29. apr.—Zaradi tajnik Lewis Schwellenbach je obnovil prizadevanje za končanje stavke rudarjev na mehkem premogu, ki so oblikovali umsko UMWA. Naznanil je, da je imenoval Edwarda F. McGradyja za posredovalca in da bodo pogajanja med rudarji in operatorji obnovila jutri.

Schwelienbach in McGrady sta se razgovarala o operatorji. Po končani sta naznanila, da bosta razgovore s člani pogajalnice odbora unije UMWA, katere predsednik je John L. Lewis, da sta priznala, da še ni izgleda na izravnavo konflikta in končanje stavke, ki je bila okolišča pred enim mesecem.

Stavka je izbruhnila, ko so se pogajanja glede sklenitve nove pogodbe izjalovila. Veljavnost stare pogodbe je potekla 31. marca.

Schwelienbach je dejal, da se pogajanja med reprezentativno rudarske unije in operatorji obnovila na konferenci, ki se vršila v hotelu Shorehamu.

## VAŽNA SOCIALNA ZAKONODAJA V CALIFORNIJI

Bolni delavci bodo dobili odškodnino za izgubo zaslужka

USTANOVITEV POSEBNEGA SKLADA

Sacramento, Cal.—Najvažnejša socialna zakonodaja, sprejeta v Californiji v zadnjih desetih letih, je zavarovalniški zakon. Sprejet je bil v izrednem zasedanju državne zbornice.

Na podlagi zakona so delavci, ki zbole ali se poškodujejo pri delu, upravičeni do odškodnine za izgubo zaslужka. Zakon krije vse bolezni in poškodbe.

Unije so se borile za sprejetje zakona. V vodstvu borbe je bil državni senator Jack Shelley, ki je predsednik sveta unij v San Franciscu od l. 1941. Californija je s sprejetjem zakona prišla v ospredje. Edina druga država, ki je osvojila sličen sistem, je Rhode Island.

Vsota podpore in odškodnine bo v sorazmerju s brezposelnostno podporo—deset do dvajset dolarjev na teden v dobi deset do 23 tednov. Zavisela bo od vsote zaslужka posameznega delavca. Podpora se bo v izrednih slučajih plačevala 35 tednov.

Zakon določa ustanovitev posebnega sklada, iz katerega se bo plačevala podpora in odškodnina. Delavci bodo dobili nove ugodnosti brez dodatnih stroškov.

Izvajanje provizij novega zakona je bilo poverjeno državni komisiji za stabilizacijo, ki uravnava tudi zakon brezposelnostnega zavarovanja. Aplikacija za podporo iz posebnega sklada mora biti spremljana s certifikatom nesposobnosti za delo. Certifikate izdajajo zdravniki.

Aplikacija za podporo se lahko vložil v vseh uradih brezposelnostnega zavarovanja.

Senator Shelley je vodil uspešno borbo proti onim, ki so skušali preprečiti sprejetje socialne zakonodaje v državni zbornici.

Pogajanja se pričela v Teheranu

Sovjetske aktivnosti v perzijski provinci

Teheran, Perzija, 29. apr.—Komisija iz Azerbadžana je dospela v to mesto, kjer se zdaj vrše važna pogajanja s člani centralne vlade.

Načelnik komisije je Sadik Padegan, v o d j a demokratične stranke, ki je ustanovila avtonomno vlado v Azerbadžanu v decembru preteklega leta. Komisija se je odzvala povabilu F. Ipakašiana, odposlanca perzijskega premierja Saltaneha, naj obišče Teheran.

Premier Saltaneh je zadnji teden naznanil načrt, na čigar podlagi se bi provinca Azerbadžan lahko pridružila centralni vladi. Centralna vlada je zagotovila imuniteto demokratične stranke. — Britski opazovalec, ki se je vrnil v Teheran iz Azerbadžana, je orisal sovjetske aktivnosti v provinci. Dejal je, da so ruske in azerbadžanske čete imele skupne manevre v bližini Tabriza, glavnega mesta. Opazovalec je razkril, da se v Azerbadžanu nahajajo ruske pehotne in oklopne enote.

Poročila, da se ruske čete zbira jo v bližini mej Kurdistana, Iraka in Turčije, se vzdržujejo. Azerbadžanska armada šteje čez 25.000 mož. Jafar Pševari, predsednik azerbadžanske province, je imel že več razgovorov z ruskim konzulom v Tabrizu.

## Nadaljnji rudarji bodo zastavkali

Seja illinoiske trgovske komisije

Springfield, Ill., 29. apr.—Produkcija mehkega premoga v Illinoisu bo morda popolnoma ustavljena v torek popoldne, če ne bo sklenjena nova pogodba med progresivno rudarsko unijo in operatorji. Člani rudarske unije UMWA so zastavkali pred enim mesecem.

Hugh White, predsednik rudarske unije UMWA v Illinoisu, je izjavil, da je stavka značala produkcijo mehkega premoga za 80 odstotkov. Člani progresivne rudarske unije še delajo v premogovnikih, ker je bila stara pogodba začasno podaljšana.

John Marchlano, predsednik progresivne rudarske unije, je naznanil, da bo 30. marca, da bodo rudarji zastavkali 30. aprila, če ne bo sklenjena nova pogodba. V tem smislu je obvestil Coal Producers Assn. Walter Gill, predsednik organizacije operatorjev, je dejal, da je okrog 12.000 rudarjev, članov progresivne unije, usposlenih v premogovnikih te organizacije, nadadnjih 6000 pa v drugih premogovnikih.

Pogajanja med organizacijo operatorjev in progresivno unijo, ki so se pričela 11. marca, še niso prinesla nobenega rezultata. Glavna sporna točka je zahteva glede oskrbe rudarjev in članov njihovih družin v bolnišnicah. Rudarji zahtevajo tudi novo mezdno lestvico in skrajšanje delovnega tedna na 30 ur. Rudarji naj bi prejeli isto plačo za 30 ur dela kot jo prejema zdaj za 35 ur dela v tednu. Normalna letna produkcija premoga v Illinoisu je okrog 6.000.000 ton.

Chicago, 29. aprila.—Člani državne trgovske komisije se bodo sestali na izredni seji v sredo in razpravljali o peticiji, katero so jim predložile Commonwealth Edison Co., Public Service Co. of Northern Illinois, Western United Gas & Electric Co. in Illinois Northern Utilities Co., za drastično redukcijo porabe električne sile v Chicagu in severnem Illinoisu.

Peticija naglašala, da je rudarska stavka značala zalogo premoga. Sedanje zaloge bodo izčrpane do 21. maja.

Filipinski predsednik priznal poraz

Manila, Filipini, 29. apr.—Sergio Osmena, predsednik Filipinskih otokov, je priznal poraz pri volitvah za novega predsednika. Zmagal je njegov protikandidat general Manuel A. Roxas. Vsi pri volitvah oddani glasovi še niso prešteti, toda poročilo pravi, da ima Roxas večino okrog 150.000 glasov. Osmena je bil predsednik Filipinskih otokov od septembra l. 1944, ko je umrl Manuel Quezon.

Poljski general pride v Chicago

Chicago, 29. apr.—Poljski general Tadej Bor-Komorowski (Bor), poveljnik poljskih podtalnih sil v času nemške okupacije, bo dospel v Chicago iz Londona prihodnji petek ali soboto. On bo glavni govornik na shodu, ki se bo vršil prihodnjo nedeljo v parku Humboldt, ko se bodo vršile proslave 155-letnice sprejetja poljske ustave.

Sovjetske restrikcije na Ogrskem

Budimpešta, Ogrska, 29. apr.—Vest iz ameriških virov pravi, da so ruske vojaške avtoritete odredile trgovske restrikcije na Ogrskem. Prizadeti so Američani, Angličani in drugi tujci. Noben ne zna potovati po deželi brez posebnega dovoljenja ruskih avtoritet.

## General Tojo in drugi japonski militaristi obtoženi

Nemški desničarji v ospredju

Dobili so največ glasov pri volitvah

Frankfurt, Nemčija, 29. apr.—Desničarska krščanska demokratska stranka je prekosila vse druge stranke v številu glasov, ki so bili oddani pri občinskih volitvah v ameriški okupacijski coni v Nemčiji.

V Gemundenu, severna Bavarska, so vandali raztrgali letake demokratičnih strank, preden so se volitve pričele, in jih nadomestili z zastavami z znakom svastike ter gesli in pozivi za boljše Nemčijo. Uradniki ameriške vojske vlade so bili informirani o incidentu, naker so odredili restavriranje policijske ure v mestu.

Prva poročila o izidu volitev na Bavarskem kažejo, da so kandidati krščanske demokratske stranke dobili 96.639 glasov, socialistične 71.778, komunistične 2158, neodvisne pa 2224 glasov.

V severnem Wurttembergu in Badenu so krščanski demokrati dobili 71.379 glasov, socialni demokrati 30.944, liberalci 5016, komunisti pa 2648 glasov.

Židovski begunci napadli Nemce

Ameriške čete pozvane v akcijo

Frankfurt, Nemčija, 29. apr.—Židovski begunci so zapustili svoje taborišče v Landsbergu in napadli Nemce z noži, kamenjem in drugimi predmeti. Ljute bitke so divjale na cestah tega mesta.

V akcijo so bile pozvane ameriške čete. Streljale so na množico in jo končno razpršile. Avtoritete trdijo, da je bilo čez 6000 židov in nemških civilistov za vojevanih v bitkah.

Poročila o številu žrtve izgredov se ne ujemajo. Poveljstvo devete ameriške pehotne divizije v Augsburgu pravi, da sta bili dve osebi ubiti in najmanj 40 ranjenih. Druga vest pravi, da ni bil nihče ubit.

Izgredi so sledili nepotrjenemu poročilu, da so nemški civilisti ugrabili in umorili šest mladih židov.

Landsberg je v južnem delu ameriške okupacijske cone, 35 milj zapadno od Monakova. Židje so ustavili avtobus, na katerem so se nahajali Nemci. Avtobus so zažgali in potnike pretepli.

Ameriške vojaške avtoritete so izjavile, da ni bil noben ameriški vojak ranjen.

Pogajanja v Amsterdamu se razbila

Amsterdam, Holandija, 29. apr.—Vlada je priznala, da so se pogajanja z reprezentanti Indonezije razbila. Slednji so prišli v Amsterdam na razgovore o zahtevi, da Indonezija dobi neodvisnost. Holandija je ponudila Indoneziji status dominiona v februarju tega leta.

Poljski premier dobil zaupnico

Varišava, Poljska, 29. apr.—Parlament je izrekel zaupnico premierju Osobka-Moravskemu. Glasovanje je bilo odprto po tem, ko je premier predložil parlamentu poročilo o položaju v deželi.

Postavljeni bodo pred zavezniško sodišče kot vojni zločinci

DATUM OBRAVNAVE DOLOČEN

Tokio, 29. apr.—General Hideki Tojo, predsednik tokijake vlade v času zavratnega napada na Pearl Harbor, in 27 drugih članov japonske militaristične klike, je bilo formalno obtoženih vojnih zločinov. Obtožnica jim očita umore, ropanja in druge zločine.

Zavezniški tribunal, pred katerim so bodo morali zagovarjati obtoženci, tvorijo sodniki enajstih držav. Obtožnico je objavil Joseph B. Keenan, ameriški prosekutor. Obravnava se bo pričela prihodnji petek v palači japonskega vojnega ministrstva. Zagovorniki obtožencev bodo dobili priliko za priprave glede obrambe pred začetkom obravnave.

Obtožnice proti vodilnim japonskim vojnim lordom in civilistom, ki so jih podpirali, omenjajo, da so začeli vojno proti enajstim zavezniškimi državam. Te tudi naglašajo, da so obtoženci skovali zaroto proti svetu in kršili mednarodno pravo.

V obtožnici so omenjeni člani japonske vlade v času napada na Pearl Harbor. Med temi sta admiral Osami Nagano, bivši šef mornaričnega štaba, ki je dal ukaz za napad na Pearl Harbor, in general Kenji Dohhara, bivši vojni minister.

Japonski vojni lordi so obtoženi, da so se pripravljali za vojno proti Rusiji in izvršili več agresivnih činov proti Sovjetski uniji v letih pred napadom na Pearl Harbor. Japonske oborožene sile bi bile napadle Rusijo, če se ne bi bile sovjetske armade izkazale močne v vojni proti Nemčiji.

Lista obtožencev in obtožbe kažejo, da bo tribunalu predložena evidenca o japonski agresiji pred napadom na Kitajsko. Japonci so uporabljali strupene pline v vojni proti Kitajcem in izvršili druge zločine proti človeštvu.

Keenan je dejal, da so obtožbe razdeljene v tri kategorije, katere je orisal general Douglas MacArthur v svoji izjavi v januarju tega leta.

Diskuzije o obrambi britskega imperija

Načrti pred konferenco v Londonu

London, 29. apr.—Diskuzije o obrambi britskega imperija se nadaljujejo v uradu premijera Attleja. Člani britskega generalnega štaba, Joseph Chifley, predsednik avstralske vlade, in Walter Nash, finančni minister v vladi Nove Zelandije, so predložili načrte na konferenci.

Načrti med drugim določajo gradnjo strateških projektov na Pacifiku. Večina se ogreva za skupno notranjo obrambo.

Predlog glede izmenjave vojaških misij je bil sprejet. Dominioni bodo imeli misije v Londonu in člani teh bodo imeli stalne stike z generalnimi štabi. Izmenjane bodo informacije, da bodo generalni štabi lahko delovali enotno v vojaških zadevah, dočim bo politična kontrola ostala v rokah vlad.

Attlee, Chifley in Nash so tudi razpravljali o metodah, ki naj bi pospešile formiranje skupnega sistema za obrambo britskega imperija. Načrte, ki bodo sprejeti na konferenci, bodo predloženi v odobritev vladam dominionov.

### Our Society's Juvenile Units

**OUR JUVENILE CIRCLES**—the newest institution of the SNPJ—are in existence eight years, and wherever given a fair chance, they have shown remarkable progress.

The idea to organize juvenile units within our Society was adopted at the 1937 convention and the first units were formed the following year. In the very first year more than a dozen units were organized. Then came the war years and the progress of our units was retarded because many of our young leaders were either in the armed forces or working long hours in war plants. But now the war is over and our young people are back home, many of them eager and willing to resume their fraternal activities.

Realizing, as we should, that our juvenile units are an important feature of our Society's lodge system, it is necessary that we give more attention to this, our newest institution. It is our duty to help maintain, organize and expand the work of these units.

We all know that our Juvenile Circles can become vital pillars of the SNPJ. There is no sound argument against their existence; on the contrary, every argument substantiates the fact that they have a very prominent place in our fraternalism.

The relation of the juvenile units to our Society has been manifested repeatedly in a number of instances. We can say that those lodges and federations which have tried and succeeded in forming and maintaining a juvenile unit, have fully grasped their importance.

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**THOSE ACTIVE LODGES** and federations that are sponsoring circle activities have shown that the ties between the lodge and circle have become genuinely strong as a result.

Moreover, they have shown that the youngsters are willing and eager to cooperate. The main requirement of a lodge in this undertaking is to furnish capable leadership and to maintain an active and friendly interest in the venture.

Through Juvenile Circles the youngsters not only learn the true meaning of our Society's mission, but they also actively participate in the many lodge sponsored programs, thereby making such events a living thing. The benefits so derived by the Society are shared by the children.

All this and much more can be achieved through active juvenile circles. But are we doing our full duty in this respect? Are we forming circles in sufficient number in proportion to the number of our lodges operating within the jurisdiction of the SNPJ? The 25-odd active circles now on the roster as against more than 600 lodges prove that we are not performing our work in the juvenile field as we should.

Right now is the time to begin organizing new circles. We must revive the dormant circles as well as form new ones where none exist, and in this work our English speaking lodges can be of especially great service.

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**THERE IS NO GETTING AWAY FROM** the fact that children the world over like entertainment, to which they are entitled to the fullest extent under proper guidance.

Of course, too much cannot be expected of them at first, but gradually the purpose of their organization can be stressed. Simple, wholesome food is needed for the building up of their bodies; likewise, simplicity should be the keynote in building up their formative minds. Meetings and socials, athletic activities and educational programs along progressive cultural lines should be the main features.

To be sure, care should be taken in not promising them something we cannot fulfill. Let's not forget that they feel that they are responding voluntarily and that they will resent any forceful obligation. A form of self-discipline should be cultivated for the purpose of obtaining good results.

The approaching Mother's Day observance is one of the best opportunities to bring the juveniles together by arranging suitable programs under the banner of the SNPJ. Our English speaking lodges are in position to influence the juveniles more than the elder members primarily because of their closer interests as well as because of language ties.

There is no better way to interest the young people in lodge affairs than an active Juvenile Circle. Therefore, let's begin now! We will find the children responsive to the programs sponsored and promoted especially for them!

Some of these people have transferred to other lodges, some have left the SNPJ, and one member, Katherine Klasinsz Copi, has rejoined during the present membership campaign. Four members only remained in the lodge all twenty years, namely, John Kerar, Amelia Furlick Gray, Albina Furlich Hammit, and Joe G. Brinocar.

Really Big War Criminals Escape

The so-called "war crimes trials" in Germany and Japan threaten to become immense flops.

From Tokyo comes the report that Kiyoshi Gogo, former president of Mitsubishi heavy industries, has been released "because of lack of evidence." Some weeks ago the same thing happened at Nuernberg. The court was told that Krupp, the chief of the concern which did so much to put Hitler in power and to make the weapons with which Hitler assailed the world, was "sick" and, therefore, could not stand trial.

The judges obligingly complied, despite the protests of Justice Robert H. Jackson, chief American prosecutor.

Also from Tokyo comes the story that Prince Morimasa Nashimoto, member of the imperial family, is also released "because of lack of evidence." In the European area, we find King Victor Emmanuel, who eagerly collaborated with Mussolini for more than 20 years, living in luxury and efforts are being made by London, and possibly by Washington, to boost his son or his grandson to the vacant throne.

These events emphasize the question: What must a man do in order to become a war criminal? Why make so much noise over the execution of a general, here or there, if the big fellows are to escape?

## Juvenile National Bowling Champions

During the same weekend that the regular National Bowling Tournament of the SNPJ was staged at Cleveland, Ohio, approximately seventy-five juvenile bowlers vied for championship honors and trophies in their own class on hometown alleys in Strabane and Sharon, Pennsylvania, in Girard, Ohio and in Waukegan, and Chicago, Illinois. They had the time of their young lives shelling the pins with amazing accuracy in the second annual SNPJ Juvenile Telegraphic Bowling Tournament.

The results of all five local juvenile tournaments have been reported by their respective secretaries. From the official score sheets and other records received from them, we have drawn up a list of the 1946 champions and, also, the standings of all the teams and the leading bowlers in each of the individual events.

In checking and comparing results we find that the most spectacular performance in this year's juvenile telegraphic tourney was given by the boys representing Circle 21 of Sharon, Pa. They blasted the maples in real championship style for the grand total of 2475 on games of 623-651-801, exactly 200 pins more than the next nearest team, to win the title and trophy emblematic of the Boys' team championship of the SNPJ. Richard Robich, anchorman of the team and an all-round athlete, led the new champions to victory and record-breaking score with a brilliant 597 series. All five members of the team were in great form and amazed the on-lookers with their superlative bowling and lofty scores. Sharon SNPJ is mighty proud of them!

The runners-up in the boys' class was Circle 19 of Strabane, Pa., whose first team defeated the Pioneer Jrs. Circle of Lodge 589, last year's champions, by the close score of 2275 to 2252. This was a thrilling duel all the way with the final outcome in doubt right on up to the very last frame. Circle No. 19 took the opening game 782 to 750, lost the second 734 to 749, and came back to win the third and deciding contest 759 to 753. They were about as evenly matched as two teams could be and gave a great account of themselves. The outstanding bowlers here were Eddie Kocian, James Podboy and Chester Kaminski, with the latter two bringing home all the "bacon" in the Doubles, Singles and All-Events and, also, a tie for high game honors. Young Kaminski shot 623 in the Singles and 1615 in All-Events, three pins higher than Richard Robich of Sharon, and shared the Doubles honors on a 1047 with Podboy. For teen-age boys, that's the tops in bowling!

In the girls' division the "Dawn of Youth" Circle No. 7 defended their title successfully by again defeating a Waukegan Jolly Juvenile Circle entry, but this year by the narrow margin of only 12 pins, 1646 to 1634, with Margaret Maeck, Jeanette Tancok, Margaret Kenik and Mildred Gregorin starring for their respective teams. The Waukegan juveniles took the first two games by scores of 542 to 519 and 571 to 527, but fell down in the third and final contest 521 to 600, and so lost a good opportunity to win the 1946 championship trophy.

The Doubles title was won by Margaret Kenik and Mildred Gregorin of the Jolly Juvenile Circle with a combined score of 763, as compared with the 700 total rolled by the runners-up, Grace Ann Gerdanc and Helen Cech. For Perfect Circle of Chicago. The Singles trophy went to Margaret Maeck of the Girard Circle, who won it with a splendid 445 series, including the high game of 171, while the All-Events title was taken by Margaret Kenik of the Waukegan Circle on a nine game total of 1167, well ahead of Blanche Mesec in second place with a 1052 score.

Although the Perfect Circle bowlers of Chicago and the Waukegan boys failed to win any of the beautiful trophies awarded by the SNPJ, nevertheless they gave a very good account of themselves in all three events. Many of them already promise to be back next year for another try at the coveted titles and trophies, and then watch those pins fall. They'll be bigger, stronger, older and more experienced, which will mean better bowling for our SNPJ juveniles in 1947. Good luck to you all!

The Championship trophies will be mailed to the winning Circles sometime this week. A picture of all of them has been taken and will be published in the Prosveta and possibly in The Voice of Youth in the very near future.
