S 1. julijem stopijo v veljavo pravila, katera je osvojila deseta redna konvencija in ker do imenovanega časa ne bo mogoče pravil urediti ter razposlati članstvu, naj služi naslednje naznanilo za članstvo glede asesmenta, katerega mora vsak plačevati po 1. juliju 1933:

1. Asesment za vse člane, ki so zavarovani samo za smrtnino, je po 1. juliju povisan za 1c.

2. Za člane, zavarovane za \$1 in \$2 bolniške podpore, je asesment NESPREMENJEN.

3. Člani, zavarovani za \$3 bolniške podpore, morajo po 1. juliju plačevati 25c več v bolniški sklad in njihov asesment v bolniški sklad je \$3.10.

4. Članom, ki so zavarovani za \$4 (2-2), se asesment povira za 75c in morajo v bolniški sklad po 1. juliju plačevati \$4.

5. Člani, zavarovani za \$5 (2-3) bolniške podpore, morajo po 1. juliju plačevati v bolniški sklad \$5 mesečno.

To naznanilo naj blagovolijo upoštevati vsi člani, posebno oni, kateri je asesment po navedenem datumu zvišan. Društveni tajniki naj pazijo, da bodo od članov, katerim je konvencija asesment zvišala, na podlagi gornjega poročila istega računalni.

Karlova vdova Vera in ostača dva obtoženca Josef Fess in Edward Veselka, Čeha po narodnosti, bodo imeli separatne obravnave. Karl je bil ustreljen v noči 16. julija leta v kuhinji svojega stanovanja, 2611 So. Crawford ave. Obravnavi predseduje sodnik Michael Feinberg. Sodna dvorana je polna slovenskega občinstva.

Amerika bo zgradila 32 bojnih ladij

Washington, D. C. — Mornariški tajnik Claude A. Swanson je te dni naznal, da bo njegov departement v kratkem pričel graditi nove bojne ladje v smislu programa javnih del, ki ga uključuje sprejeti zakon za ekonomsko okrevanje. Vlada bo v prihodnjih treh letih zgradila 32 krízark, rušilcev, podmornic in topničark, za kar bo izdala \$238,000,000. Swanson je dalje rekel, da bo vlada takoj pričela izvajati ta program in da bodo vladne ladjedelnice v kratkem obravale s polno paro.

DRŽAVE POZVANE NA POBILA NJE BEDE

Predsednik Roosevelt priznal, da krog pet milijonov družin živovat v pomanjkanju

Washington, D. C. — Predsednik Roosevelt je na sestanku z reprezentanti vseh ameriških držav izjavil, da je v Ameriki krog pet milijonov družin v stisku in nimajo sredstev, da bi si nabavile navadne potreboščine. Pozval jih je na sodelovanje s federalno vlado pri pobijanju bede. Vsaka država naj ustanovi pomožno organizacijo, ki naj gleda, da ne bo nihče trpel lakote.

Na tem sestanku je Harry L. Hopkins, direktor federalne pomozne akcije, izjavil, da privatne dobrdelne organizacije ne bodo dobile niti centra iz sklada \$500,000,000, katerega je kongres aproviral za direktno podpiranje žrtev depresije. Polovico te vsote bodo dobile države kot darilo, druga polovica pa bo razdeljena tako, da bo moral vsaka država prispevati \$8 v posebni sklad za vsak dolar, ki ga dobi od federalne vlade. Ta delnar se mora porabiti izključno za oskrbo brezposebnih.

Roosevelt je naglasil, da strankarska politika ne sme integrirati nikake vloge pri pomožnih akcijah in razdeljevanju podprtja. Priporočal je, naj državne vlade sodelujejo s federalno vlado pri izvajjanju programa javnih del in delitvi podprtja. Izrek je tudi napovedal, da bo mesečno oktobra dobilo zaslužek pri javnih projektih in v privatnih industrijih krog pet milijonov delavcev in da bo v teku enega leta depresija premagana.

Japonci invadirali rusko ozemlje

Moskva, 27. jun. — Sovjetska vlada je naslovila na Japonsko oster protest iz razloga, ker se je moštvo japonske torpedovke izkrcalo na ruskem ozemlju v okolici Kromotskega, Kamčatka, z namenom, da preide zadevo nekega umora treh japonskih ribičev. Japonska bojna ladja je posetila rusko obrežje kljub temu, da sovjetske oblasti niso te ga dovolile.

Razorozlitvena konferenca zaključena do jeseni

Zeneva, 27. jun. — Mednarodna razorozlitvena konferenca je odšla danes na počitnice. Snide se spet po zborovanju Lige narodov v prihodnjem septembru.

Razorozlitvena konferenca za zadnjo do jeseni

Berlin, 27. jun. — Hitlerjeva vlada je včeraj nadaljevala način na voditelje centristične (katoliške) in bavarske ljudske (tudi katoliške) stranke; obenem je regularna in pomožna (nacijski udarniki) policija lovila nacionaliste in socialiste. Vsi socialistični mandati v parlamentu so razveljavljeni in socialisti so izključeni iz vsake javne službe.

Med arretiranimi voditelji katoliške stranke je tudi 65-letni prelat Johann Leicht v Bambergu. Predstavniki fašistične bavarske vlade so izjavili, da "politični katolicizem na vse načine sabotira vladne ukrepe", zato mora biti uničen.

Skratka, v petih dneh splošne konference je bilo arretiranih 572 oseb po vsej Nemčiji. Na Bavarskem so vsi vplivnejši voditelji katoliške ljudske stranke v zapori.

Predstavnik Papen je organiziral katoliške fašiste v skupino, ki se imenuje "Križ in meč"; namen te organizacije je, da zlomi katoliško opozicijo in privede nemške katolike v Hitlerjev tabor.

Oba španska prekoceanska letala sta mrtvi

Mexico City, 27. jun. — Skoro po enem tednu intenzivnega iskanja so včeraj našli oba španska letala, Barberana in Collarja, ki sta priletela iz Španije na Kubo, od tam pa sta hotela polegati v Mexico City pred enim tednom — mrtva. Trupli letalci in razbito letalo so našli v vodi divjinah države Tabasco.

Jasno je, da je bud vihar zajel letalca in ju zagnal na tla. Silni tropični viharji v Mehiki so nekaj navadnega.

Nova davek prihaja v Illinoisu

Springfield, Ill. — Legislatura je v pondeljek sprejela novo davčno nadlogo, kupčiški davek (sales tax), s tremi glasovi večine v nižji zbornici in če senat bo odobri, bo davek veljaven 1. julija. Novi davek znaša dva odstotka od vsake kupčije brez izjem. Prejšnji davek, ki ga je državno vrhovno sodišče zavrglo, je znašal tri odstotka in potreščine, kupljene direktno od farmerja, so bile izvzete.

Desperaten boj v Londonu za zlasti standard

Panika v deželah zlatega bloka, toda Amerika in Anglia se ne ganata

London, 27. jun. — Mednarodna ekonomska konferenca, ki je zdaj v tretjem tednu, je postal toriče silovitega boja za ohranitev zlate valute. Francija na čelu zlatega bloka vodi ta boj. Medtem pa je zavaljila panika v deželah zlatega bloka in holandski goldinar je začel padati. Ljudje v teh deželah (Francija, Belgija, Holandija in Svica) izmenjavajo papir v zlato, ki ga skrivajo.

Ameriški načrt za redukcijo zlatega kritja in za povečanje srebrne valute v mednarodnih izplačilih pridobiva vedno več pristašev; zlati blok uvidi, da se bo moral podati. Amerika in Anglia, ki imata najmočnejši valuti v mednarodni trgovini, nočeta še nič slišati, da bi stabilizirali svoj denar na zlati podlagi.

Ker gozdarski in lesni delavci niso svoje unije, se zna zgoditi, da jih bo pod "new dealom" zastopala kompanijska unija Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen. Izdelala je tako zvani "etični kodeksi", ki ga predloži vladni sklepničar na smislu novega zakona.

Na delavci, ki delajo na žagah, si lasti jurisdikcijo tesarska unija. Organizacija pa je v tej industriji slabovratna. Editorial Comments

Next Saturday, July 1, the new by-laws, measures and resolutions enacted at the tenth quadrennial convention go into effect and application. To what extent the new by-laws will prove practical and sound, we repeat, will depend to a very great degree upon the co-operation offered by the entire membership and particularly by the subordinate officials to the Society's executives.

The delegates' determined and successful efforts to effect economies in the various classes of sick and disability insurance, with the express purpose of forever abolishing special levies deserve grateful recognition by hard-pressed members throughout the Society's jurisdiction. But the real result of these efforts, we again repeat, will be manifested by the willingness of the members and subordinate executives to help earnestly to execute all of the new enactments to their very best ability, for the best interest of the Society and the entire membership as a whole.

Nowhere can be finer cooperation, especially in these critical moments, than by the executive and subordinate officials, because nowhere within the system of our Society exist stronger ties which must be strengthened in order that we may meet the present exigencies and solve all major and minor problems rationally and constructively.

To bring down operating costs the salaries of all executive members have been reduced 15 per cent, and those of the Society's employees from 20 to 40 per cent.

Last week we commented lightly upon the reductions affecting the Society's employees. The comment has been made chiefly because of drastic wage-cuts for the employees only, because of the obvious discrimination between the two bodies, because of general high living conditions in Chicago, and because of the fact that these wage slashes will in no way help the economics of the organization. The fifth reason was that the responsible convention committee, through its chairman, misrepresented the employees when it stated to the convention, according to the official minutes of last Wednesday, that this question was presented to the employees. What prompted the committee to this action, is still a puzzle.

Sections 5 and 6 of article 16 of the new by-laws, regarding the organization's publications and contributions, reads as follows:

Section 5. The official organ shall publish letters and articles in which members discuss or criticize lodge and organization affairs sanely and constructively and base their statements on facts, and when they criticize objectively lodge or administrative decisions. Every letter or article of controversial nature, concerning whatever subject, which is accepted for publication, must be signed with the name and lodge number of the writer.

Section 6. The editor shall publish no letters or articles which contain personal attacks aimed at any member or members. Personal attacks shall be considered insinuations and accusations which deal with a member's private life. Further, the editor shall publish no letters or articles in which charges are made against individual members, lodges or lodges, subordinate or supreme executives, that they violated the by-laws. All charges of this nature shall be tried first before the organization's tribunals, and these tribunals alone shall have the right to publish in the organ their official decisions. Furthermore, the editor shall publish no letters or articles which are not in accord with the Declaration of Principles of the SNPJ, which might in any way jeopardize the official organ or the organization for criminal libel, or which might violate the state or federal law, or which directly or indirectly advertise some private business establishment.

Who is Balbo?

(The Italian Air Minister who will command the fleet of 24 Seaplanes from Italy to Chicago)

Balbo was instrumental in the killing of Giacomo Matteotti, the famous Italian Socialist deputy, who was murdered in cold blood because he dared to protest against the murder and oppression of Italian workers by Mussolini. Matteotti held the same place in the hearts of Italians that Abraham Lincoln does in the hearts of all Americans. So say the Italian Socialist Federation and Italian League for the Rights of Man.

Balbo was the director of many murders in province of Ferrara. His reputation as a terrorist was so bad at one time that he was removed as General of the fascist militia. When Balbo sued the "La Voce Repubblicana" for publishing the details of some of the above murders, he lost the suit. This even in fascist Italy!

It is a disgrace that this murderer and terrorist should be received by democratic America.

Official Notice

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT CONCERNING ASSESSMENT

The By-Laws of the Society accepted Tenth Regular Convention shall be effective July 1, 1933. As it will be impossible to prepare and place them in the hands of members before that time, the following regarding changes in assessment, which will be paid by every member after July 1, 1933.

1. Assessment for all members insured death benefit only shall be increased to July 1.

2. Assessment for members insured \$1.00 and \$2.00 sick benefit classes shall remain UNCHANGED.

3. Members insured for \$3.00 sick benefit shall pay an additional 25c into the sick benefit fund, and their assessment into the sick benefit fund shall be \$3.10.

4. Assessment shall be increased 75c members in the \$4.00 (2+2) sick benefit class and they shall pay \$4.00 into the sick benefit fund after July 1.

5. Members insured in the \$5.00 (2+2) class of sick benefit shall pay \$5.00 into the sick benefit fund.

All members affected by the above changes especially those whose assessment has been increased after the specified date, are carefully note the announcement. Lodge secretaries shall collect the additional assessment required amount to the Supreme Office.

The local secretaries are further advised commencing with July 1, 1933, the following classes of death benefit will become effective: \$250, \$500, \$1000, \$1500, and \$2000. The class of \$600 death benefit insurance is discontinued for new members and shall remain for those already insured in that class.

Insurance for sick benefit shall be as follows: 50c, \$1.00, and 2.00. The \$3-dollar class of sick benefit is also abolished for new members and shall continue only for those members insured in that class at the present time. No new members shall be admitted into the \$3.00 class of sick benefit.

"It cannot have escaped the attention of lynx-eyed old-line observers that the fraternal societies, in these perilous times, have remained a factor of strength and solidarity to enable them to stand. Aside from the excellent record of not only the members having been obliged to borrow money from the R. F. C. (or, actually, from any other source), the fraternals score a notable achievement in the way they have handled the matter of cash withdrawals. In this disclosure, doubtless was news to some old-liners that the bulk of fraternals write only legal reserve certificates which set up equities of cash surpluses and grant loan privileges there."

"When stress started these self-governing institutions wisely set in motion their own lodge machinery to soften the blow. Possession of the power to regulate so vital a privilege hitherto exercised by the heedless few to the injury of the whole, the laws were amended in many societies, to enable easement of payments to applicants, thus making it possible to handle these demands on a reasonable basis pro-rating the cash outgo."

"Viewing this favorable situation the fraternals occupy, one old-line executive in the East, at the height of the terrific drain by the moratoria came to relieve the strain. The fraternals are to be envied; I'd give the right arm if we had the edge on the situation as they have." The beauty of it all is that the body was hurt by the procedure; to the contrary it was wholly advantageous; it acted many instances, as a panacea by remitting certificate holders that the money was there, it was on hand to be paid, but that for the own welfare, their families, and that of the whole membership the wisdom of allotting extension payments, was salutary, whole and steady. There is occasion for admiration of the manner in which the fraternals have coped with a situation comparable to ours."

A CENTURY OF PROGRESS

Yukon, Pa.—And thus we travel to the department of medicine and notice an interesting figure which stands illuminated in a dark aperture. You will always be able to find a large crowd watching it. It is a figure of a man, a transparent man. He stands six feet in height on a round pedestal. It took about eighteen months to make this figure at the huge cost of \$10,000. There are only two of these figures in the world, the other being a female in one of the large museums in Europe. The bones of this man are taken from a human being. The outer covering is made from celluloid. Every part of the human body is shown in this man except the nerves. The interesting part of this man is that when a person pushes a button on the pedestal the brain will show by means of an electric light. From the brain you will see the lungs, heart, stomach, liver, kidneys and all other parts of the body separately. Finally the whole man is illuminated. This exhibit is a marvelous achievement and just too wonderful to watch.

The great Pasteur is also exhibited at the fair, or rather his life and work by means of an illuminated map of the world supplemented by photographs.

Exhibits of Robert Koch Institute from Germany can be seen showing the works and life of the man who discovered the tubercle bacillus in 1882. Since then the great campaign against tuberculosis has been in action by the medical science.

The story of the discovery of the mosquito that started yellow fever and how it was exterminated by Sir Henry Welcome, and the Italian exhibits of pathology, anatomy, and physiology are exhibits worthwhile seeing as are the exhibits shown by Austria, Holland and Canada.

In the Austrian exhibit, the structure and function of the nervous system is told in a simple way, in the Canadian exhibit the work of the Montreal General Hospital and James

McGill is described by photographs and transparencies. It would be interesting to know that the McGill University discovered the first X-ray two months after the Roentgen discovered the ray in 1885.

Hundreds of years B. C. shows how and what the people of that time used as medicine is exhibited. About 700 of these remedies are shown. The American Indian way of treating a patient is also shown. The original Indian Medicine bags are shown through the courtesy of the Milwaukee Public Museum. A beautiful scene of an Indian dance is seen by molded figures, that is, the dance and antics of an Indian Medicine Man and his medicine bag. The bag is nothing more than a muskrat skin trimmed with colored beads.

Through the courtesy of the American Medical Association two beautiful pictures are depicted with molded figures, and show the advance of medical attention in the last 100 years, that is in the way of transportation. The first shows a doctor answering a call to one of the country homes on horseback. At every step the horse sinks deeply into the mud. A fierce storm is also brewing as a woman waits patiently at the doorway. In the other a woman in the doorway sees a doctor alight from his car just a few minutes since the lady put her call in with a telephone.

Did you know that ether was discovered by an American? To Dr. C. W. Long of Georgia University goes that distinction. While at work in his laboratories, mixing some chemicals with his assistants he produced a fluid that put the doctor and his helpers to sleep, thus we have ether.

The Mayo Clinic, one of the largest health restorers in the country, portray three themes in medicine—diseases of the digestive tract, thyroid gland and the nervous system. A huge chart in one part of this department tells the different death rates of different sicknesses per thousand people 100 years ago and the present day.

Another New Arrangement

The Chicago District Federation of SNPJ was instrumental in lowering the costs of operations for our people about 18 months ago. At that time we felt the need of reducing medical costs because many of our people could not meet the bills. The operation fees were much higher than the compensation paid by the Society so that after all, the SNPJ members merely used the operation compensation of the Society to meet part of the bill and the balance was paid from the meager wages if members were fortunate enough in having a job. Under the terms of our arrangement, however, our members were able to secure the services of a first class surgeon, for any major operation, for only \$75 and use the balance of what the Society paid them towards meeting the hospital bills. In this way, every one of the SNPJ members that took advantage of these arrangements, was able to pay all the medical and hospital costs out of the money received from the Society. They had no additional bills to worry about.

Beginning with July 1, 1933, SNPJ operation benefits will be greatly reduced, as per decision of the tenth regular convention. The new compensation shall be based upon the length of membership in the Society, which, after all, is a very sensible and businesslike arrangement. This should positively ban all special assessments for this fund. It is quite a satisfaction to know that our membership will not have to dig in for the extra dimes and half dollars, as we did in the past 21 months, in order to keep this fund secure. Special assessments always handicap us and cause us a great deal of trouble and inconvenience.

Benefits shall now be paid as follows:

1 to 5 years membership \$50.

6 to 10 years membership \$60.

11 years and upwards \$75.

In order to meet these new benefits and so that none could say that the younger members would leave us or would not join our Society, the Chicago District Federation of SNPJ has now succeeded in lowering the cost of all major operations for SNPJ members to \$50. In addition we have received an added 10% reduction on all hospital equipment and special low terms on rooms. We believe these arrangements are good and reasonable which should satisfy everyone.

One of the prime reasons for the establishment of the Chicago District Federation of SNPJ has been to assist and be of service to the SNPJ members, and this latest arrangement is only another proof of its value. It merits the support of all the lodges.
