Važno naznanilo glede članskega asesment

8. 1. julijem stopijo v veljavo pravila, katera je osvojila deseta redna konvencija in ker do imenovanega časa ne bo mogoče pravih urediti ter razposlati članstvu, naj služi naslednje naznanilo za članstvo glede asesment, katerega mora vsak plačevati po 1. juliju 1933:

1. Asesment za vse člane, ki so zavarovani samo za smrtnino, je po 1. juliju povišan za 1c.
2. Za člane, zavarovane za \$1 in \$2 bolniške podpore, je asesment NESPREMENJEN.
3. Člani, zavarovani za \$3 bolniške podpore, morajo po 1. juliju plačevati 25c več v bolniški sklad in njihov asesment v bolniški sklad je \$3.10.
4. Članom, ki so zavarovani za \$4 (2-2), se asesment poviša za 75c in morajo v bolniški sklad po 1. juliju plačevati \$4.
5. Člani, zavarovani za \$5 (2-3) bolniške podpore, morajo po 1. juliju plačevati v bolniški sklad \$5 mesečno.

To naznanilo naj blagovoljivo upoštevati vsi člani, posebno oni, katerim je asesment po navedenem datumu zvišan. Društveni tajniki naj pazijo, da bodo od članov, katerim je konvencija asesment zvišala, na podlagi gornjega poročila istega računali.

Od 1. julija naprej se novi člani lahko zavarujejo le za \$250, \$500, \$1000, \$1500 in \$2000 smrtnine. Dougherty je odklonil vse izžrebance za poroto, ki so rekli, da ne verujejo v smrtno kazen. Iz tega se lahko sklepa, da bo država zahtevala smrtno kazen za obtožena. Grlic ima tri odvetnike, Milošič pa enega. Država bo skušala dokazati, da so obtoženci zasnovali umor grocerista Georgeja Karla, da se okoristijo z njegovo zavarovalnino v vsoti \$15,000. Karlova vdova Vera in ostarala dva obtožena Josef Fess in Edvard Veselka, Čeha po narodnosti, bodo imeli separatne obravnave. Karl je bil ustreljen v noči 16. julija lanskega leta v kuhinji svojega stanovanja, 2611 So. Crawford ave. Obravnavi predseduje sodnik Michael Feinberg. Sodna dvorana je polna slovenskega občinstva.

Amerika bo zgradila 32 bojnih ladij

Washington, D. C. — Mornariški tajnik Claude A. Swanson je te dni naznanil, da bo njegov department v kratkem pričel graditi nove bojne ladje v smislu programa javnih del, ki ga vključuje sprejeti zakon za ekonomsko okrevanje. Vlada bo v prihodnjih treh letih zgradila 32 križark, rušilcev, podmornic in topničark, za kar bo izdala \$238,000,000. Swanson je dalje rekel, da bo vlada takoj pričela izvajati ta program in da bodo vladne ladjedelnice v kratkem obratovale s polno paro.

DRŽAVE POZVANE NA POBIJANJE BEDE

Predsednik Roosevelt priznal, da krog pet milijonov družin živi v pomanjkanju

Washington, D. C. — Predsednik Roosevelt je na sestanku z reprezentanti vseh ameriških držav izjavil, da je v Ameriki krog pet milijonov družin v stiski in nimajo sredstev, da bi si nabavile navadne potrebščine. Pozval jih je na sodelovanje s federalno vlado pri pobijanju bede. Vsaka država naj ustanovi pomožno organizacijo, ki naj gleda, da ne bo nihče trpel lakote.

Na tem sestanku je Harry L. Hopkins, direktor federalne pomožne akcije, izjavil, da privatne dobrodelne organizacije ne bodo dobile niti centa iz sklada \$500,000,000, katerega je kongres aproriljal za direktno popiranje žrtev depresije. Polovico te vsote bodo dobile države kot darilo, druga polovica pa bo razdeljena tako, da bo morala vsaka država prispevati \$3 v posebni sklad za vsak dolar, ki ga dobi od federalne vlade. Ta denar se mora porabiti izključno za oskrbo brezposelnih.

Roosevelt je naglasil, da strankarska politika ne sme igrati nikake vloge pri pomožnih akcijah in razdeljevanju podpore. Pripočel je, naj državne vlade sodelujejo s federalno vlado pri izvajanju programa javnih del in delitvi podpore. Izklel je tudi napoved, da bo do meseca oktobra dobilo zaslužek pri javnih projektih in v privatnih industrijah krog pet milijonov delavcev in da bo v teku enega leta depresija premagana.

Japonci invadirali rusko ozemlje

Moskva, 27. jun. — Sovjetska vlada je naslovila na Japonsko oster protest iz razloga, ker se je moštvo japonske torpedovke izkrcalo na ruskem ozemlju v okolici Kromotskega, Kamčatka, z namenom, da preišče zadevo nekega umora treh japonskih ribičev. Japonska bojna ladja je posetila rusko obrežje kljub temu, da sovjetske oblasti niso tega dovolile.

Zeneva, 27. jun. — Mednarodna razorožitvena konferenca je odšla danes na počitnice. Snide se spet po zborovanju Lige narodov v prihodnjem septembru.

Springfield, Ill. — Legislatura je v pondeljek sprejela novo davčno nadlogo, kupčijski davek (sales tax), s tremi glasovi večine v nižji zbornici in če senat to odobri, bo davek veljaven 1. julija. Novi davek znaša dva odstotka od vsake kupčije brez izjeme. Projantji davek, ki ga je državno vrhovno sodišče zavrglo, je znašal tri odstotke in potrebačine, kupljene direktno od farmerja, so bile izvete.

Desperaten boj v Londonu za zlati standard

Panika v deželah zlatega bloka, toda Amerika in Anglija se ne ganeta

London, 27. jun. — Mednarodna ekonomska konferenca, ki je zdaj v tretjem tednu, je postala torišče silovitega boja za ohrano zlate valute. Francija na čelu zlatega bloka vodi ta boj. Medtem pa je zavalovila panika v deželah zlatega bloka in holandski goldinar je začel padati. Ljudje v teh deželah (Francija, Belgija, Holandija in Švica) izmenjavajo papir v zlato, ki ga skrivajo.

Ameriški načrt za redukcijo zlatega kritja in za povečanje srebrne valute v mednarodnih izplačilih pridobiva vedno več pristašev; zlati blok uvidi, da se bo moral podati. Amerika in Anglija, ki imata najmočnejši valuti v mednarodni trgovini, nočeta še nič slišati, da bi stabilizirali svoj denar na zlati podlagi.

Danes je prišel na konferenco Rooseveltov posebni poslanec profesor Raymond Moley, ki je prinesel važna navodila za ameriške delegate in za konferenco sploh. Zanimanje zanj je splošno.

Naval nemških fašistov na katoliške stranke

Bavarske ječe polne nasprotikov fašizma. Podkancelar Papen tudi pomaga zatirati svoje sovornike

Berlin, 27. jun. — Hitlerjeva vlada je včeraj nadaljevala naval na voditelje centristične (katoliške) in bavarske ljudske (tudi katoliške) stranke; obenem je regularna in pomožna (nacijski udarniki) policija lovila nacionaliste in socialiste. Vsi socialistični mandati v parlamentu so razveljavljeni in socialisti so izključeni iz vsake javne službe.

Med aretiranimi voditelji katoliške stranke je tudi 65-letni prelat Johann Leicht v Bambergu. Predstavniki fašistične bavarske vlade so izjavili, da "politični katolicizem na vse načine sabotira vladne ukrepe", zato mora biti uničen.

Skratka, v petih dneh splošne gonje je bilo aretiranih 572 oseb po vsej Nemčiji. Na Bavarskem so vsi vplivnejši voditelji katoliške ljudske stranke v zaporu. Podkancelar Papen je organiziral katoliške fašiste v skupino, ki se imenuje "Križ in meč"; namen te organizacije je, da zlomi katoliško opozicijo in privede nemške katolike v Hitlerjev tabar.

Oba španska prekoceanska letalca sta mrtva

Mexico City, 27. jun. — Skoro po enem tednu intenzivnega iskanja so včeraj našli oba španska letalca, Barberana in Collarja, ki sta priletela iz Španije na Kubo, od tam pa sta hotela poleteti v Mexico City pred enim tednom — mrtva. Trupli letalcev in razbito letalo so našli v vodi v divjinah države Tabasco. Jaasno je, da je hud vihar zajel letalca in ju zagnal na tla. Silni tropični viharji v Mehiki so nekaj navadnega.

ZNANSTVENIKI ODKRILI NOVO VEDO

Ugotovili so, da človeški možgani vsebujejo nad 10 milijard električnih stanic

Chicago. — Človeški razum ni več nepoznan svet za novo revolucionarno vedo, elektro-biologijo. Ta veda omogoča merjenje aktivnosti človeških možganov. Znanstveniki so dognali, da se mentaliteta človeka reflektira v električnih tokih in valovih.

V gornjem delu človeških možganov so znanstveniki aktualno našli od deset do štirinajst milijard separatnih stanic, od katerih ima vsaka nad sto zvez s drugimi stanicami. Od tega kompliciranega transportacijskega sistema energije zavija delovanje možganov, kar imenujemo razum.

Drugi čudes znanosti je matematična reprezentacija človekove osebnosti kot celote, ki omogoča merjenje inteligence in značaja vsake osebe.

Ta nova odkritja so bila pojasnjena na zborovanju Ameriške asociacije za podvig znanosti po Judsonu Herricku, profesorju čikaške univerze, in C. E. Spearmanu, članu psihološkega departmanta londonske univerze.

Profesor Herrick je dejal, da med milijardami stanic v človeških možganih nista niti dve enakosti v proizvajanju električne energije in valed tega se mora vsako proučavati separatno, vendar je vedno v teku masna akcija cele možganske mašinerije teh električno aktivnih stanic.

Na bazi tega enotnega možganskega vzorca sloni struktura razuma, inteligence in značaja vsake osebe. Po izjavi dr. Spearmana tvorita individualnost vsake osebe dva važna faktorja. Eden teh je faktor inteligentnosti, G; drugi značajnost, W.

Pri vsakem moškemu ali ženski je faktor G. drugačen. To je inteligenca, katero je dala narava, in posebne zmožnosti, katere človek pridobi v življenju. Ako je G pomankljiv, ne more oseba postati genij niti razviti posebnega talenta. Značaj, ki ga je Spearman označil za W, je človeku prirojen. Od potencialnosti tega zavisi življenjski pogon. Izgleda, da se karakteristični znaki te potencialnosti odražajo v vztrajnosti, stabilnosti in zanesljivosti osebe, vendar se ti znaki razlikujejo pri vsakem posamezniku.

Tekstilna industrija prva, ki se je podvrgla kontroli

Predložila je pravila federalnemu administratorju

Washington, D. C. — Bombažna in tekstilna industrija je prva in Združenih državah, ki se je organizirala za federalno kontrolo in 27. junija je predložila pravila ali kodeks federalnemu administratorju Johnsonu. Kodeks je podvržen javni preiskavi, ki se je začela vršiti takoj. Tekstilni magnati so se zedinili za maksimalni delovnik 40 ur v tednu in za minimalno mesdo \$10 na teden na jugu in \$11 na severu. Od administratorja je zdaj odvisno, če to odobri ali ne.

Delavska tajnica Frances Perkins zahteva, da mora kodeks vsake industrije zajamčiti delavcem kolektivno pogajanje in izključiti otroško delo.

Prvi mesec razstave privabil dva milijona ljudi

Chicago. — Razstava stoletja napredka je zdaj odprta mesec dni in v tem času je imela skupaj 2,491,000 obiskovalcev, ki so plačali vstopnino. Zadnja razstava v Chicagu leta 1893 je imela prvi mesec nekaj čez en milijon posetnikov.

ELEKTRIČNA SMRT V KLAVNICA

Učinki električnega toka niso vselej enaki. Znani dunajski elektropatolog profesor Jellinek je imel v dunajski živnozdravniški družbi predavanje o skrivnostih električne smrti v zvezi z uporabo električnega toka za klanje živali. Skrivnosti električne smrti do danes še nismo pojasnili. Dočim so prej mislili, da jo povzročajo ožgaline v telesu, so v najnovjšem času ugotovili, da so učinki elektrike na telo zelo mnogostranski. Včasih povzročajo urez kakor operacijski nož, včasih poškodbe v kosteh ali mikroskopsko majhne poškodbe.

Čudno je to, da poteka proces zdravljenja brez mrzlice, brez zastrupitve krvi in da ne zahteva nobenih operativnih posegov. Najvažnejši posledek elektropatologije je ta, da zapadejo po električnem toku zadeta bitja navidezni smrti. Telo živi še cele ure in ga je mogoče dostikrat rešiti z umetnim dihanjem, spuščanjem možganske vode itd. Dostaj pa so poskuse za ponovno obuditev vse prehitro končavali, tako da ne moremo o tem povedati nič določnega. Kot vzrok električne smrti ugotavljajo večinoma ohranitev srca, otekllost možganov in notranjo izkrvavitve.

V dunajski klavnici, kjer koljejo živali kakor že marsikje drugod s pomočjo električnega toka, omenjajo zanimiva dognanja glede električne smrti. Glavni učinek toka se kaže v nekakšnem živčnem soku ali narkozi. Prvotno niso vedeli, da-li živali v tem stanju res ne občutijo bolečin, izkazalo pa se je, da jih električni tok vsaj močno omeji. Najbolje se je izkazala električna metoda pri klanju prašičev. Ob ušesa jim položijo nekakšno vilico iz trdega gumija, skozi katero spuste tok 70 voltov. Živali se trenutoma zgrudijo brez glasu. Ta čas skušajo izpopolniti aparate za električno narkozo v toliko, da bi se klanje še bolj pospešilo.

Suša uničuje ameriško pšenico

Chicago. — Junjska suša je požgala letino pšenice v Nebraska in naredila veliko škodo v drugih državah. Ta dogodek bo pomogel več, ko vsi zakoni, ki jih je diktiral Roosevelt kongresu, da porastejo cene pšenice. Vse kaže, da letos ne bo treba na umeten način omejiti pridelka pšenice; suša bo to storila.

Nova pravila še niso tiskana, zato ponatiskujemo na tem mestu iz originala novih pravil dve novi točki, ki se tičeata dopisovanja v Prosveto. Omenjeni dve točki (5. in 6. XVI. člena "Publikacije") se glasila:

5. Prosveta priobčuje dopise in članke, v katerih člani stvarno, dostojno in na podlagi resnice razpravljajo o enotnih in društvenih stvareh in kritizirajo sklepe ali postopanja društvene ali jednotine uprave. Vsak dopis ali članek polemične vsebine, sprejet od uredništva, pa naj se kritika tiče česar koli, mora biti podpisan v celoti za javnost od pisca in poleg imena mora biti objavljena tudi številka društva, katerega član je pisec.

6. Uredništvo rednih publikacij ne sme priobčiti dopisov in člankov z osebnimi napadi na člane SNPJ. Za osebne napade se smatrajo predvsem očitki dejanj iz privatnega življenja člana. Editorial Comments

Next Saturday, July 1, the new by-laws, measures and resolutions enacted at the tenth quadrennial convention go into effect and application. To what extent the new by-laws will prove practical and sound, we repeat, will depend to a very great degree upon the co-operation offered by the entire membership and particularly by the subordinate officials to the Society's executives.

The delegates' determined and successful efforts to effect economies in the various classes of sick and disability insurance, with the express purpose of forever abolishing special levies deserve grateful recognition by hard-pressed members throughout the Society's jurisdiction. But the real result of these efforts, we again repeat, will be manifested by the willingness of the members and subordinate executives to help earnestly to execute all of the new enactments to their very best ability, for the best interest of the Society and the entire membership as a whole.

Nowhere can be finer cooperation, especially in these critical moments, than by the executive and subordinate officials, because nowhere within the system of our Society exist stronger ties which must be strengthened in order that we may meet the present exigencies and solve all major and minor problems rationally and constructively.

To bring down operating costs the salaries of all executive members have been reduced 15 per cent, and those of the Society's employes from 20 to 40 per cent.

Last week we commented lightly upon the reductions affecting the Society's employes. The comment has been made chiefly because of drastic wage-cuts for the employes only, because of the obvious discrimination between the two bodies, because of general high living conditions in Chicago, and because of the fact that these wage slashes will in no way help the economies of the organization. The fifth reason was that the responsible convention committee, through its chairman, misrepresented the employes when it stated to the convention, according to the official minutes of last Wednesday, that this question was presented to the employes. What prompted the committee to this action, is still a puzzle.

Sections 5 and 6 of article 16 of the new by-laws, regarding the organization's publications and contributions, reads as follows:

Section 5. The official organ shall publish letters and articles in which members discuss or criticize lodge and organization affairs sanely and constructively and base their statements on facts, and when they criticize objectively lodge or administrative decisions. Every letter or article of controversial nature, concerning whatever subject, which is accepted for publication, must be signed with the name and lodge number of the writer.

Section 6. The editor shall publish no letters or articles which contain personal attacks aimed at any member or members. Personal attacks shall be considered insinuations and accusations which deal with a member's private life. Further, the editor shall publish no letters or articles in which charges are made against individual members, lodge or lodges, subordinate or supreme executives, that they violated the by-laws. All charges of this nature shall be tried first before the organization's tribunals, and these tribunals alone shall have the right to publish in the organ their official decisions. Furthermore, the editor shall publish no letters or articles which are not in accord with the Declaration of Principles of the SNPJ, which might in any way jeopardize the official organ or the organization for criminal libel, or which might violate the state or federal law, or which directly or indirectly advertise some private business establishment.

Who is Balbo?

Balbo was the director of many murders in province of Ferrara. His reputation as a terrorist was so bad at one time that he was removed as General of the fascist militia. When Balbo sued the "La Voce Repubblicana" for publishing the details of some of the above murders, he lost the suit. This even in fascist Italy!

It is a disgrace that this murderer and terrorist should be received by democratic America.

Official Notice

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT CONCERNING ASSESSMENT

The By-Laws of the Society accepted at Tenth Regular Convention shall be effective July 1, 1933. As it will be impossible to prepare and place them in the hands of members before that time, the following regarding changes in assessment, which be paid by every member after July 1, 1933 hereby given:

1. Assessment for all members insured death benefit only shall be increased 1c July 1.

2. Assessment for members insured in \$1.00 and \$2.00 sick benefit classes shall remain UNCHANGED.

3. Members insured for \$3.00 sick benefit shall pay an additional 25c into the sick benefit fund, and their assessment into the sick benefit fund shall be \$3.10.

4. Assessment shall be increased 75c members in the \$4.00 (2+2) sick benefit, and they shall pay \$4.00 into the sick benefit fund after July 1.

5. Members insured in the \$5.00 (2+3) class of sick benefit shall pay \$5.00 into sick benefit fund.

All members affected by the above changes and especially those whose assessment has been increased after the specified date, should carefully note the announcement. Lodge retaries shall collect the additional assessment as required on the above basis and remit required amount to the Supreme Office.

The local secretaries are further advised commencing with July 1, 1933, the following classes of death benefit will become effective: \$250, \$500, \$1000, \$1500, and \$2000. A class of \$600 death benefit insurance is provided for new members and shall remain in force for those already insured in that class.

Insurance for sick benefit shall be as follows: 50c, \$1.00, and 2.00. The \$3-dollar class of sick benefit is also abolished for new members and shall continue only for those members insured in that class at the present time. No new members shall be admitted into the \$3.00 class of sick benefit.

The following comment in the Western Worker, published at San Francisco, written by the Editor, C. Drew:

"It cannot have escaped the attention of the lynx-eyed old-line observers that the fraternal societies, in these perilous times, have been a factor of strength and solidity to be envied. Aside from the excellent record of not only them having been obliged to borrow money from the R. F. C. (or, actually, from any source), the fraternal score a notable achievement in the way they have handled the matter of cash withdrawals. In this disclosure doubtless was news to some old-liners that the bulk of fraternal write only legal reserve certificates which set up equities of cash surpluses and grant loan privileges therefrom.

"When stress started these self-governed institutions wisely set in motion their support machinery to soften the blow. Possession of the power to regulate so vital a privilege hitherto exercised by the heedless few to the injury of the whole, the laws were amended in many societies, to enable easement of payments to applicants, thus making it possible to handle these demands on a reasonable time basis pro-rating the cash outgo.

"Viewing this favorable situation in the fraternal occupy, one old-line executive in the East, at the height of the terrific drain on the moratoria came to relieve the strain. 'The fraternal are to be envied; I'd give my right arm if we had the edge on the situation as they have.' The beauty of it all is that the body was hurt by the procedure; to the contrary it was wholly advantageous; it acted in many instances, as a panacea by reminding certificate holders that the money was theirs and was on hand to be paid, but that for their own welfare, their families, and that of the whole membership the wisdom of allotting extension payments, was salutary, whole and steady. There is occasion for admiration of the manner in which the fraternal societies have coped with a situation completely new in their experience."

He capably fulfilled his duty as a vice president since we organized and served as president for some time on account of the president's absence, later on retaining his vice presidency until he was forced to resign due to passiveness.

Arriving home from the 10th convention in Chicago, I find a few of the members wholly unsatisfied with the results of the work of this convention. Criticism, we are sure glad to take it, but at the same time give us some constructive criticism also. The convention's work may not have been what it really should have been on some questions; but as a whole this convention made some radical changes in the by-laws to try to completely wipe out the special assessments. The convention to the English speaking delegates is an education all to itself and should be on inspiration to those of us who wish to carry on the principles and policies of the SNPJ. Another thing I wish to stress, and this is that the recent convention gives a delegate a good idea of "Who is Who" in the SNPJ movement.

Universal, Pa.—So much is always being said of such virtues as honesty, courage, modesty, chastity, perseverance and others, that I wonder if a fellow meekly pipes up, "How about the Spirit of Radicalism? Why not erect a monument commemorating this spirit or pay it some other such fitting tribute?" Would he merely be superciliously frozen into silence by his hearers or would he be more forcibly dealt with and possibly be thrown into a padded cell? Or would his hearers in some miraculous manner grasp the point and say, "By Golly! he's right. Let's do just that!"

The point is this: Assuming that the world has constantly progressed—with deviations of course—in all its phases as in the mental and physical development of man, in science, in invention, the arts and philosophy of living; to what type of people might be attributed the most credit for this progress? The answer is obviously, "To the radicals."

Let's just glance briefly over recent history, always bearing in mind that the assumption is made that there has been continual progress. Let us also think of radicals as those people who are not content to have a prescribed course of knowledge doled out to them, but rather as ones who dare to let their minds stray into strange pastures; who do not think in straight, narrow roads of conservatism but who let their minds stray into the by-ways of thought.

Columbus in his time was considered a radical and was ridiculed for believing that the earth was round and that by going West he could arrive at a point East. The fruits of his thinking and subsequent action are so manifest that they need not be mentioned here.

At about this same time, and stretched over a long span of years, another change occurred in the various European countries, in which the Papacy was forced to concede to Nobility some powers of government. This was a radical change and it naturally was brought about by radically thinking people.

Still later another radical movement brought on by conditions resulting from the advent of the machine age known as the Industrial Revolution brought into existence another

ruling class, the Bourgeoisie, who ushered in the philosophy of laissez faire.

Paralleling those events we note changes wrought by radicals in science, commerce and invention. Every school boy knows of the ridicule to which Robert Fulton was subjected with his "Fulton Polly" or Eli Whitney with his cotton gin, or De Witt Clinton with his "Clinton's Big Ditch." Ecclesiastics denounced with pious fervor "that instrument of the devil—the steam locomotive—which sped along at the un-godly rate of 20 miles per hour."

It was a small militant minority which first started agitation against Negro slavery in the United States, and the leaders of this movement were dragged through the streets and were subjected to other forms of persecution for trying to deny plantation owners the liberty (T) of enslaving the Negroes.

With the development of the machine the philosophies of Socialism and Communism were introduced as a natural consequence, differing fundamentally only in the tactics to be used to bring about their existence. These philosophies to-day are generally outlawed through the ignorance of the masses. The average person's conception of a Socialist or a Communist is a picture of a dirty-necked, unshaven, wild-eyed individual furtively skulking in the shadows with pockets suspiciously bulging and hands over in a position to throw a bomb or some other such instrument of destruction. Yet intelligent, progressive thinking persons throughout the so-called civilized world who have familiarized themselves thoroughly with these isms, recognize their merits and the inevitability of their practical existence with a short time.

Just as utterances of the clergy with regard to the aeroplane when the Wright brothers were experimenting with it when they said, "If God had intended that man should fly he would have given him wings" did not hinder the development of air travel when the proper time came; so will not the obstructionists stop the onward rush of Marxism. An the ghosts of Marx, Engels, Eugene Dets and other radicals who have gone before, will beckon out of the past and say, "It is well."

A CENTURY OF PROGRESS

Yukon, Pa.—And thus we travel to the department of medicine and notice an interesting figure which stands illuminated in a dark aperture. You will always be able to find a large crowd watching it. It is a figure of a man, a transparent man. He stands six feet in height on a round pedestal. It took about eighteen months to make this figure at the huge cost of \$10,000. There are only two of these figures in the world, the other being a female in one of the large museums in Europe. The bones of this man are taken from a human being. The outer covering is made from celloid, a hard substance in the order of celluloid. Every part of the human body is shown in this man except the nerves. The interesting part of this man is that when a person pushes a button on the pedestal the brain will show by means of an electric light. From the brain you will see the lungs, heart, stomach, liver, kidneys and all other parts of the body separately. Finally the whole man is illuminated. This exhibit is a marvelous achievement and just too wonderful to watch.

The great Pasteur is also exhibited at the fair, or rather his life and work by means of an illuminated map of the world supplemented by photographs.

Exhibits of Robert Koch Institute from Germany can be seen showing the works and life of the man who discovered the tubercle bacillus in 1882. Since then the great campaign against tuberculosis has been in action by the medical science.

The story of the discovery of the mosquito that started yellow fever and how it was exterminated by Sir Henry Welcome, and the Italian exhibits of pathology, anatomy, and physiology are exhibits worthwhile seeing as are the exhibits shown by Austria, Holland and Canada.

In the Austrian exhibit, the structure and function of the nervous system is told in a simple way, in the Canadian exhibit the work of the Montreal General Hospital and James

McGill is described by photographs and transparencies. It would be interesting to know that the McGill University discovered the first X-ray two months after the Roentgen discovered the ray in 1885.

Hundreds of years B. C. shows how and what the people of that time used as medicine is exhibited. About 700 of these remedies are shown. The American Indian way of treating a patient is also shown. The original Indian Medicine bags are shown through the courtesy of the Milwaukee Public Museum. A beautiful scene of an Indian dance is seen by molded figures, that is, the dance and antics of an Indian Medicine Man and his medicine bag. The bag is nothing more than a muskrat skin trimmed with colored beads.

Through the courtesy of the American Medical Association two beautiful pictures are depicted with molded figures, and show the advance of medical attention in the last 100 years, that is in the way of transportation. The first shows a doctor answering a call to one of the country homes on horseback. At every step the horse sinks deeply into the mud. A fierce storm is also brewing as a woman waits patiently at the doorway. In the other a woman in the doorway sees a doctor alight from his car just a few minutes since the lady put her call in with a telephone.

Did you know that ether was discovered by an American? To Dr. C. W. Long of Georgia University goes that distinction. While at work in his laboratories mixing some chemicals with his assistants he produced a fluid that put the doctor and his helpers to sleep, thus we have ether.

The Mayo Clinic, one of the largest health restorers in the country, portray three themes in medicine—diseases of the digestive tract, thyroid gland and the nervous system.

A huge chart in one part of this department tells the different death rates of different sicknesses per thousand people 100 years ago and the present day.

The House of Morgan partners, but it is really his one man—J. P. Morgan, himself—others partners are just figs on the chess board.

One man controlling one-fourth of America! And he and his associates refused to contribute a penny support of the Federal government the years of its greatest need!

Jones: "How do you manage you salary?"

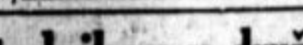

Another New Arrangement

The Chicago District Federation of SNPJ was instrumental in lowering the costs of operations for our people about 18 months ago. At that time we felt the need of reducing medical costs because many of our people could not meet the bills. The operation fees were much higher than the compensation paid by the Society so that after all, the SNPJ members merely used the operation compensation of the Society to meet part of the bill and the balance was paid from the meager wages if members were fortunate enough in having a job. Under the terms of our arrangement, however, our members were able to secure the services of a first class surgeon, for any major operation, for only \$75 and use the balance of what the Society paid them towards meeting the hospital bills. In this way, every one of the SNPJ members that took advantage of these arrangements, was able to pay all the medical and hospital costs out of the money received from the Society. They had no additional bills to worry about.

Beginning with July 1, 1933, SNPJ operation benefits will be greatly reduced, as per decision of the tenth regular convention. The new compensation shall be based upon the length of membership in the Society, which, after all, is a very sensible and businesslike arrangement. This should positively ban all special assessments for this fund. It is quite a satisfaction to know that our membership will not have to dig in for the extra dimes and half dollars, as we did in the past 21 months, in order to keep this fund secure. Special assessments always handicap us and cause us a great deal of trouble and inconvenience.

Benefits shall now be paid as follows:

- 1 to 5 years membership \$50.
- 6 to 10 years membership \$60.
- 11 years and upwards \$75.

In order to meet these new benefits and so that none could say that the younger members would leave us or would not join our Society, the Chicago District Federation of SNPJ has now succeeded in lowering the cost of all major operations for SNPJ members to \$50. In addition we have received an added 10% reduction on all hospital equipment and special low terms on rooms. We believe these arrangements are good and reasonable which should satisfy everyone.

One of the prime reasons for the establishment of the Chicago District Federation of SNPJ has been to assist and be of service to the SNPJ members, and this latest arrangement is only another proof of its value. It merits the support of all the lodges.
