1/4 cup lemon juice

1/4 cup grape juice

2 cups bread flower (doggone it, never could spell the word "flour").

4 teaspoons baking powder

11/4 teaspoon cinnamon

½ teaspoon mace

½ teaspoon allspice

3/4 teaspoon salt

1 lb. raisins

1 lb. currants

1/2 lb. sliced citron

1/4 lb. candied lemon rind 1/4 lb. candied orange rind

1 pkge. dates

1/4 lb. almonds

1/2 cup candied cherries

½ teaspoon soda

Combine sugar and butter. Break in one egg at a time and beat well. Add spices sifted with flower, baking powder and soda, alternate with the fruit juices. Add flowered fruit last. Bake slowly in moderate oven (250 degrees) for 2½ hours. Fill baking pan ½ full of mixtures, on which arrange cherries and blanched almonds in a snowman fashion.

Now, ladies including chefs, after you have tried this lovely cake and it turns out okay, you can then call yourself a good baker.
