LEGION NEWS (Continued from Page 4) by disabled Veterans, will protrude on the lapels of millions of people in honor of the men who fell in the World War I and likewise for those that fell in the present struggle. Many hundreds of disabled Veterans, working under the direction of the American Legion Auxiliary, made the 13,000,000 Poppies that will be needed on Poppy Day. They have worked at their beds or in the occupational therapy departments in 66 government hospitals. This work is carefully rationed, and spread among as many veterans as possible. Preference has been given to those receiving little or no government compensation, and to those with dependent families. To distribute this vast amount of Poppies, the Auxiliary has organized an army of 100,000 volunteers, largely from their own ranks. These women will serve without pay and every penny of the dimes, quarters, and dollars dropped into their contribution boxes will go into the welfare and rehabilitation funds for the war needy during the year ahead. New casualty lists coming from the widespread combat zones of this war have given increased significance to the little red memorial flower and increased the need for poppy funds. With the Legion and Auxiliary being called upon to use their long experience in aiding veterans and dependent families to help victims of the present conflict, generous contributions on Poppy day are needed. Glenville Cemetery was allotted to the Lake Shore Post for the decoration of graves on Memorial Day. Members appointed for this duty please "take notice."

How Much Do We Know About Slovenia

All the Slovene land between the Danube and the Adriatic was now divided into frontier baronies by the emperor in 828. Eastern Border March" took in the land between the Danube and the Drava Rivers. The districts south of the Drava including Furlania constituted the "Furlanian Border March." This was broken up into four baronies by the emperor in 828. Both Marches were ruled by special representatives of the Emperor.

Under the supervision of the Emperor's representatives, the various fiefs, districts and localities were ruled by domestic and foreign princes, counts and barons. Charlemagne found it politically more expedient to permit the local chieftains to remain and retain their respective controls. It was, of course, more prudent to let the Slovenes accustom themselves to the new rule as it was interpreted by their own native chieftains, instead of by foreign counts. Christianity also was given a greater impetus when the Slovenes saw that they were not actually oppressed. Thus it was that for a few years longer there remained small states among the Slovenes, in Carinthia and Pannonia which were headed by local men.

The Slovene self-rule, such as it was, did not last very long. In Carinthia the rebellion of Duke Ljudevit brought it to an abrupt end.

About 815, Ljudevit was mayor or duke in the district between the Drava, Sava and Kolpa Rivers. He was subversive to the Furlanian border Count Kadolai, who maltreated the Slavs. Ljudevit found it very difficult to bear the Frankish supremacy. His main hope was to rid himself of this yoke, and to this end he sought an excuse for rebellion. In 818 he sent a delegation to Emperor Louis to complain about the cruelty and severity of Duke Kadolai. When apparently the Emperor paid no attention to the delegation, Ljudevit rose up in arms. In order to quell this rebellion, a Frank Army, made up of Italian and Bavarian troops came in from Italy and advanced into Slovene lands where it met with such defeat on all sides that it was forced to return. Duke Kadolai, its leader, died suddenly in this campaign. This gave added courage to Ljudevit, who seriously sought allies. His zeal swayed the Carniolan and a section of Carinthian Slovenes, as well as some Serbs, to join him.

southern Slavs from the Italian to the Bulgarian borders were united in rebellion against the Franks—only the Dalmatian Croats under Duke Norno refused to join this movement.

Emboldened by the large number of his followers, Ljudevit moved into Carinthia with the intention of driving out the Franks. Here he met up with a large army under Duke Baldric, the successor of the deceased Kadolai. In a battle on the banks of the Drava River, Ljudevit was defeated and forced to retreat out of Carinthia. At this battle, Duke Borno, himself a Slav, fought in the ranks of the Franks. Borno, it must be understood, was a rival, an unfriendly, jealous rival of Ljudevit, who thought that he could better his situation by taking sides with the Franks. He gathered his followers to wage battle against Ljudevit. In a skirmish at the Kolpa River, his own soldiers, in refusing to shed the blood of their Slav brothers, joined the ranks of Ljudevit's army. Borno, escaping his soldiers' wrath with difficulty, retired to one of his well armed castles, while Ljudevit's army plundered helter skelter through his domains.
