













"PAGE" FAVORED IN RESOLUTION

Florian Boosters Circulate Petition Advocating Improvement of Our Page

That Our Page should be enlarged was the contention of several hundred bowlers and fans in attendance at the recent KSKJ bowling tourney.

The approval was manifested in the form of signatures affixed to the following resolution formulated by a committee of St. Florian Boosters and circulated at the Tower alleys:

RESOLUTION

Whereas, at the recent Convention of the KSKJ, held at Waukegan, Illinois, the assembly of delegates authorized the use of two pages for the English Section, known as "Our Page" of the KSKJ Glasilo.

Whereas, while two pages are since being utilized, in the printing of "Our Page," the effectiveness of such increased space is being destroyed by the use of 10 point type in lieu of 8 point type as previously used.

Whereas, contributions to "Our Page" have increased in such volume that the space of two pages printed in 10 point type is not sufficient for their publication in current issues.

Whereas also, the nature of many contributions submitted, are such as to require the printing of photographs, drawings and cartoons in order to make them more effective in published form.

Whereas, the Editor of "Glasilo" complained that sufficient funds are not available for the publication of "Our Page" in 8 point type and, for the preparation of cuts for the printing of photographs, drawings and cartoons.

Therefore, be it resolved, by the undersigned members of the KSKJ and contributors to "Our Page" of the Glasilo, attending the Fourth Annual Bowling Tournament held at South Chicago, Illinois, on April 18th and 19th A. D. 1931: That the Supreme Board of the KSKJ authorize the Editor of "Our Page" of the Glasilo to use 8 point type in the printing thereof and, provide for the printing of photographs, drawings and cartoons, whenever deemed advisable, in the preparation of "Our Page."

And, be it further resolved that the Supreme Board of the KSKJ vote a fund of sufficient moneys for the use of the Editor in publishing and printing said "Our Page" in manner and form above outlined.

Although the resolution reads the wish of a goodly number in attendance at the tournament, the St. Florian Booster committee wishes to extend the opportunity of expression of opinion to all readers of Our Page.
