Problem jetike v Sloveniji

Jetika je socialna bolezen, to se pravi, da je po svojem postanku in poteku odvisna od življenjskih pogojev, v katerih človek kot družbeno bitje živi. Predvsem pridejo v poštev gospodarske razmere.

Kakor nam zgodovina pravi, se jetika širila vzporedno s civilizacijo, ta pa tudi nudi sredstva, s katerimi se proti njej uspešno bori. — Jetika je nalezljiva bolezen, ki se prenaša po ljudeh ter se naseli v vsakem delu telesa, najpogosteje pa napada pljuča in se od tod širi dalje. Z jetiko je okuženih v Evropi 80—90% ljudi, na njej bolnih je pa le malo. Beda, pomanjkanje in nepoučenost so glavni vzroki širjenja te bolezni. Jetika se ne podeduje, marveč samo nagnjenost do obolenja.

Pri nas Slovincih umrljivost za jetiko stalno pada, je pa še vedno dvakrat večja kot pri severnih narodih n. pr. Dancih, Angležih. Leta 1905 je pri nas umrlo za jetiko od vsakih 10,000 ljudi 40, leta 1934 pa je to število padlo na 13,5. Umrljivost za jetiko je večja na Stajerskem, manjša na Kranjskem. Dalje je jetika bolj razširjena po izključno kmetijskih okrajih kot na n. pr. Murska Sobota, Doljna Lendava, Dolenjska z Belo krajino. Umrljivost za jetiko je bila l. 1935 v radovljanskem srezu najmanjša in je znašala 10.45 na 10,000 ljudi, v Kranjskem 13.5, v okraju Murska Sobota 19.2, v okraju Doljna Lendava 18.2. V delavskih centrih je bila umrljivost po poročilih iz 1935 l. v Trbovljah 6.1 na 10,000 ljudi, v Zagorju 10.6, v Hrastniku 7.7, v kmečki občini Laški 15, v Rajhenburgu pa 14.9.

Vzrok, da je jetika bolj razširjena med kmečkim prebivalstvom kot med delavskim, je, da so slednji proti njej bolj zaščiteni. S tem pa ni rečeno, da so dovolj. Nizke mezde in nezadostna podpora v slučaju bolezni v glavnem pripomorejo, da se te številke ne znižajo, za bodoče pa je nevarnost, da se te številke dvignejo. — Vzrok ogromne razširjenosti jetike med kmečkim prebivalstvom pa je ta, da kmet nima organizacije, ki bi ga v bolezni z denarnimi sredstvi podpirala in mu omogočila zdravljenje. V polovžju, v kakršnem se kmet danes nahaja, in ne more privoščiti primernega zdravljenja v dragih zdraviliščih in v počitku, ker mu to, kar pridela, komaj zadošča za davke in pa za prav skromno življenje. Deloma pripomore k razširjanju jetike tudi nepoučenost.

Če pomislimo, da v Sloveniji letno umrje 2000 ljudi za jetiko in da je pri nas 6000 bolnikov, ki nujno rabijo pomoči, moramo ugotoviti, da je gmožna škoda ogromna tako z gospodarskega kakor z narodnostnega vidika. Vzdrževanje bolnikov in izguba delovnih dni znese mnogo denarja. Z izboljšanjem socialnega položaja in s primernim poukom bi se dala ta izguba vsaj deloma nadomestiti. Kaj pomagajo vse protituberkulozne (jetične) lige, če mora kmet delati po 14 ur na dan, pri tem pa ne zasluži toliko, da bi mogel plačati zdravnika, ali če dela delavec po dva dinarja na uro in si ne more privoščiti primerne hrane in kupiti tpe obleke. Borba proti jetiki bi se morala usmeriti v borbo za zboljšanje socialnega položaja.

Mladina je jetiki najbolj izpostavljena, ker je proti njej najmanj zavarovana. Nešteto mladim ljudem onemogoči razvoj v delavca, v kmeta, v inteligenta. Koliko izmed teh je zmolnih in talentiranih?

Mladina, če hočeš, da boš bolezní, zlasti jetiki kljubovala, se bori proti njej z edinim orodjem, ki ti je na razpolago: to je, da se bori za izboljšanje delovnih ur, štirinajstredni plačani dopust, izboljšanje mezd in brezplačno zdravljenje.

Pojavlja se celo pomanjkanje delavcev, zlasti strokovnih, v posameznih strokah. Industrijska produkcija se je od 1932 dvignila za 32 odstotkov. Izvoz se je povečal za 20 odstotkov, zlasti papirja in celuloze. Ustanavljajo se nove tovarne in dela načrtno. V državi odločajo socialni demokrati in kmeti.

Convention News In a Nutshell

The Eleventh Regular Convention of the Slovene National Benefit Society was called to order last Monday morning, May 17, at 9:15 at the St. Clair Avenue Slovene Auditorium in Cleveland, O., by President Vincent Cankar.

Two sessions are being held daily, one in the forenoon and one in the afternoon. The special convention committees meet regularly and in special evening sessions.

Supreme Secretary F. A. Vider read the names of the delegates and executives. Most of the disputed credentials (11) were speedily disposed of and the delegates were seated at the initial sessions. Verifications were accorded to ten of them, and one, lacking necessary qualifications, was rejected.

The delegates and executives number 235. So far the convention business went on smoothly and unmolested; harmony prevails among the delegates which is evident that they are ready to work unitedly and cooperatively.

Let's repeat our last week's words: What is most needed now is cool, calm, level-headed and hearty cooperation for constructive ends which will be advantageous to the organization and its membership.

Bro. Matt Petrovich of Lodge 53, Cleveland, was elected convention president; Bro. Max Kumer of Lodge 715, Universal, Pa., first vice-president; Bro. Frank Vratarich of Luzerne, Pa., second vice-president; Bro. D. J. Lotrich, Lodge 559, Chicago, convention secretary.

Convention proceedings will be published in the daily and weekly Prosveta.

Tom Mooney sent greetings to the convention delegates with an appeal for financial help. Unanimously accepted that the assembly expresses its profound sympathies to Tom Mooney and contributes \$100 into his defense fund.

About six major convention committees are to be elected: the by-laws committee, committee on resolutions, appeals and charges, publications and salaries, per diem, etc.

Warning to the Convention

PITTSBURGH, PA.—I have been watching with some interest the discussions in the Prosveta of matters both trivial and of some slight importance. I noticed how vehement some were, how vitriolic and full of hatred were others. I observed with what feeling the various members fully intend to enter the convention. I noticed with particular regret the injection of a religious controversy into the papers and into the minds of those about to meet to discuss vital measures of importance to all Slovenes in the United States.

I merely wish to utter a word of caution to those whose impetuosity might jeopardize the improvement of the conditions of the Slovene workers in the United States, that fundamental purposes for which our organization does or should stand. Our people, having immigrated into a strange land, have suffered privations and hardships too numerous and horrible to need elaboration here. Our people in these times of "highly advanced civilization" still fare the prejudices of the alien-haters and the discriminations of the foreign-haters. As an inevitable result of our present economic set-up, our people are at the bottom of the social and the financial heap. The purpose of the SNPJ should be to lift them up, to proclaim to all the world that we are SLAVS, and not slaves.

Why do I hear all this petty wrangling, this small bickering? Why do I see personalities hurled into the columns of the paper? Should I as a young Slovene worker, born in Jugoslavia, striving to make a living—should I, knowing the abominable conditions under which we live and the thousands of things we could do to alleviate the situation, should I then be compelled to see in our paper the drive that fills it—am I interested in seeing writers defending their own personal positions—do their own personal positions—do they care what another person's opinion

might be concerning the existence or non-existence of something he or she knows nothing about? Give us something which will improve the industrial and cultural condition of our workers. To the young Slovenes particularly I address this plea, for they are the ones it seems who are casting the most vicious criticisms of our elders. They should pick up the burden and help the pioneers carry it on, take the traditions which they have sought to instill into us and cultivate and develop them so that our children too might know some day that they come from Slovene parentage.

My fellow Slovenes, each of you might have a problem which faces the convention today that in your mind is of paramount importance. If I were going to that convention, these are the problems that I would try to solve: How can I improve the lot of the poor, and the unfortunate? How can I make the life of those living more happy—and that of posterity more promising? How can I instill our Slovene culture, and tradition in our children so that they will thrill like I do when mother signs a lovely Slovene folksong?

The Catholic Propaganda

PUEBLO, COLO.—I am an intermittent reader of this, our paper. And, too, I hesitate to express my thoughts to the public at large, very seldom having a subject about which I can set myself down clearly. This subject, however, cannot be ignored, or simply passed over. It is too clearly a visible evidence of an outgrown regime. Several days back I received a booklet issued by the Ave Maria publication. It is this propaganda I have reference.

First, I can state that as a theological debater I am the equal of anyone. The theory of religion to me is a very simple one and needs no weighty discussion of pros and cons. Secondly, I have formed more or less concrete decisions on the subject only since I have finished school. And entirely unbiased. I pride myself on my ability to see both sides of a question, inasmuch as I can understand the problem. And finally, I have been in contact with the numerous and varied expressions of belief that are prevalent today since I first toddled the kitchen floor. How many of us haven't? None, I believe. And through my school life, my attendance at Sabbath worship has been sporadic and varied, and more or less regular. My choice at any time was my own and unhindered.

As is commonly the procedure in a scientific problem, I've formed a premise, and attempted to clarify it above. The problem itself and the conclusion may be perhaps a bit more difficult to express.

Primeval man probably had no religion as we know it today. To him, lightning and thunder, the sea, the rising and setting of the sun, were manifestations of a nature he could not understand. Therefore, he was afraid. And because he was afraid of nothing physical that lived unless it was on the order of the mammoth and the saber-tooth tiger, he believed something, or perhaps someone, unknown, unseen, absolutely a negative quantity, was the cause of these manifestations. Such being the case, in his undeveloped mind he probably said, "Whatever it is, it's bigger than I am. So I better watch my step. And give it something." That started offerings. And offerings were the beginning of prayers.

It must have been quite a problem to pray to fifty or sixty gods a day. Eventually, some primal brainstorm thought of the fact that perhaps there was a chief in the heavenly tribe, and so one prayer to him might pacify the entire unit. This happened eons before Greece ruled the Mediterranean; ages before Babylon and King Cheops of Egypt. Its beginning rose in a country that is the most downtrodden race of peoples today; a country that has been exploited from the year 1600. It had its beginning in India. Brahma is the name of the deity, and his earthly kingdom is India. His favorite subjects are Shiv, the grasshopper

god, and the living entity in the white buffalo cow. Is it religion? Definitely so. It rules with an iron hand the lives of millions of people that do not even have a common written language.

The second beginning in monotheistic religion was in China. A scholar, thousands of years B. C., began the fall of the finest civilization at the time by putting into the minds of the illiterate the obsession of reverence to the dear fore-fathers of the race. So China has retrogressed. Today enlightened men are striving to overcome this obsession, and China is "westernizing."

To return to the Ave Maria, its pamphlet, and the Catholic church. Catholicism was the beginning of a rising trend in civilization. Men that are now known as martyrs and apostles paved the way. Through secret meetings in the dead of night, they undermined the Roman empire. Through what was probably the greatest case of mass hypnotism and hysteria, it brought whole countries to its side. In the religion, mankind became brothers, and toured the world to find more brothers. Don't misunderstand this. Society as a whole owes this beginning to Catholicism and the Bible. That there has been internal strife through what is known as the dark ages, was caused by an emotional instability, due to an awakening of the power of thought.

The method of worship in the church still dates from the days of Nero. Still has a semblance of mysticism, a touch of hypnotism. I state again, the Catholic church started the march of civilization. It has given its push, and refuses to see that its day is beginning to wane.

To return to the A. M. pamphlet called "Where is the Danger?" Some things written in this booklet run contrary to the balance of laws that is nature; and nature is but another name for Brahma, or Mohamed, or God. On the first page is the statement, "Every person born to this world is inclined toward evil by his very nature." In other words, we've all got two strikes called on us before we come to bat. If this is true, is it any enjoyment playing ball when you know you've only one chance to get one base instead of three? Huhuh. If "no one is expected," why the Washingtons, the Michelangelos, the Franklins; why the Pasteurs, the Edisons, Marconis? Why this continual forward march of the human race?

The statement, to my belief, is the plea of a supreme egoist who refuses to face the fact that egoism has never had any position by the side of the electric motor.

And again the booklet mentions the fact that those who are opposed to the church had better heed these words, "It were better for him that a millstone should be hanged about his neck, and that he should be drowned in the depth of the sea." That seems to me to be contrary to the teachings of that book the united civilized nations follow. From what I have been taught in school, and what I've heard and learned through contact since then, the idea in the Bible is not to condemn, but to guide. And that an institution that considers itself the foremost in following those teachings, should employ such turnings of a language, shows a ligitated sense of retrogression.

The church attempts to prove through this bit of propaganda in the pamphlet that the SNPJ is a rigid and unyielding spike driven into a living tree. Why? I cannot sense the fact. I believe, sincerely, that each and all of us recognize the fact that there is a cause and a guiding set of rules. The fact that one might say that the devil shoved him off a roof, and another state that gravity pulled him down, doesn't alter the visible evidence that the one in question fell. Both recognize the fall for what it is, but each has a different procedure of recognition. That is the element of free-thought and expression. Different expressions of the same fact.

The booklet is filthy in its denunciation

of primarily a simplified insurance order that is classed as a brotherhood. Because it is classed as a brotherhood, and that among its members are those who are men enough to speak their thoughts without fear, and with pride, is not a reason for damnation. It is but the underlying principle of the melting pot that is the United States. The less we think and say of such a stand, the better it is for us. We have more to think of than the bandying of words.

All the above is my unsolicited opinion. I am averse to stating my stand in theological questions. Not having studied the subject, I know nothing about it, except that gained through contact. Let me, however, refer to the words of a man that knows more of the situation than any layman.

The penname of this man is Peter Whiffin, a Catholic Missionary, and a contributor to the Commonwealth and the Catholic World. As a priest of the Church, his words should be taken at face value. His article in the Forum, condensed and reprinted in the Reader's Digest dated May, 1937, is headed, "A Priest Warns the Church." In essence, he bemoans the greed and clutching hand of the fatted clerical order. He can say it much better than I.

"For example," he says, "in Spain, monarchy and clergy were practically one for hundreds of years. Now the people, rebelling against the church, are becoming atheists, disgusted with religion entirely because the priests who symbolized all religion betrayed them so cruelly." That has been true elsewhere. Russia, for instance.

He states of the situation here. "Congregations of priests, nuns, and brothers purchased so much property that in New York State Governor Smith warned Cardinal Hayes that unless their buying stopped, a citizenry already overburdened by tax-exempt church property might revolt."

"In fine, we priests were growing richer and stronger every day—and the poor had not yet got wise to us."

"If only we had tried then"—during the crash and depression—"in the poor's hour of direst need, to pay for all that the poor had done for us—"

"But we had tasted the fleshpots of wealth and power, and yearned after them."

One more statement by Peter Whiffin, then I'll let you think this over. "The non-Catholic poor have no use for us, because we have never done anything for them, despite our preaching of the fatherhood of God, and the brotherhood of man. The Catholic poor have lost faith in us, because they have seen us sitting in our fine rectories, eating and drinking of the best and living as fine gentlemen, unmoved by suffering, and saying to the faithful, 'We know you and your fathers have taken care of us for generations. But don't come to us for help. That is the government's job.'"

Whiffin is undoubtedly an artist with a pen. Yet, such fluency comes from a mind that believes.

Have you ever watched the sun peer over a mountain top, then suddenly leap clear, flooding the country with a shower of gold? Is that God? Is it Nature? I don't know.

I know it's a new day, a new year, a new age. Not to say what a people should believe in, but to say, "What can we do to make this world a finer, better place to welcome those that come after us?"

I've stated the problem.

I leave you to draw your conclusion.

A book you will enjoy reading is "Of Mice and Men" by John Steinbeck. It is a very short novel, especially so considering the recent flood of encyclopedic novels on the market. The story concerns two ranch hands—George and Lennie. George is a small, active fellow in whose charge Lennie, a giant half-wit has quite naturally fallen. Lennie, for all his brutish strength, succumbs quite simply and childishly to every wish and command of George. Lennie has a curious mania of being irresistibly drawn to anything that looks smooth and soft. A mouse, a rabbit, a girl's silk dress, a young pup—all lure him with an innocent desire to stroke it for the silkiness and smoothness. Let him become frightened, however, and his hands will clutch at the object, until the uncontrolled strength of his hands will crush whatever he has in hand.

From the very beginning there is a foreboding that a tragic end is inevitable. But so logically does each incident follow the preceding one that you do not care to omit a single word. Interesting, too, are the ranch hands where George and Lennie get a job hucking barley. Candy, who cleans out the hut; the boss' son, who is adept at strutting; Crooks, the negro, and the only one for miles around; Slim, the mule-skinner; the wife of the boss' son—these are figures portrayed with a simplicity and persuasion that make them unforgettable.

In the back of each of their minds is that age-old urge and dream: someday I'll get a piece of land, all my own, and live "offa the fat of the land." The dream encompasses in turn George, Lennie, and each of the ranch hands. It is the only romance in their otherwise-routine lives. To be their own masters, to live freely and simply—that is something to look forward to. But as too often is the case: circumstances and conditions shut out the dream and make of it a mirage beyond realization.
