USA ne priznava kitajske komunistične vlade


Washington. — USA ne priznava odredbe komunistične vlade o blokadi kitajskih voda, ki so pod komunistično zasedbo.

POROKE

Višinski o svoji zmagi na pariški konferenci

Moskva, Rusija. — Zunanji minister Višinski je v uradnem listu Pravda pojasnil pariško konferenco kot uspeh sovjetske politike. Pravi, da je on populoma zmagal na konferenci. Tudi, da je Marshallov načrt obnovne Evrope propadel in zato je USA bolj popustljiva. Marshall je moral odstopiti radi slabega uspeha svojega obnovitvenega načrta. Višinski napoveduje, da bo morda treba še kaj medsebojnih koncesij glede potsdamskega sporazuma. Rusija je napravila edin odstop v tem, da je popustila v zahtevah Jugoslavije glede Avstrije. To pa je storila, ker je zvedela, da se Jugoslavija že leto dni pogajala z Veliko Britanijo in tej stvari.

Krščanski demokrat sestavlja belgijsko vlado

Bruselj, Belgija. — Na osojni izida volitev je princ regent Karl prosil zastopnika krščansko-socijalne stranke, da naj sestavi novo vlado. Pozvan je bil bivši predsednik vlade, znani ekonomist Van Zeeland. Dosedanji predsednik Paul Henry Spaak je odstopil. Končni rezultati so dali krščanski demokratom še en mandat, skupno 105. Razmerje politične moći je tole: Krščanski demokrati 48.53%, socialisti 29.78% liberalci 15.52% in komunisti 7.5%.

Razne najnovejše svetovne vesti

ATENE, GRČIJA. — Vodja liberalne stranke Aleksander Diomedes je sestavil novo grško vlado. V novi vladi bodo isti ministri kakor so bili v dosedanjem vladi pokojnega Sophulisa, ki je pred tednom umrl.

BERLIN, NEMČIJA. — Vprašanje preskrbovanja Berlina s hrano in drugimi živiljenskimi potrebuščinami je zopet odprt. Rusi so si zopet prilastili pravico, da kontrolirajo blagovni promet med zapadom in Berlinom in med zapadnim in vzhodnim Berlinom. Ustavili so vse tovorne avtomobile, ki se niso mogli izkazati z ruskim dovoljenjem, da smejo v Berlin, bilo v vzhodno, bilo v zapadne cone. Rusi pravijo, da so prisiljeni na nek način preprečiti, da bi Berlinčani prodajali vso hrano v zapadni Berlin, ker je zapadna marka štirikrat močnejša kot sovjetska.

PRAGA, ČEŠKA. — Komunistične oblasti so začele napadati slovaške škole češi da so med vojsko sodelovali z nacisti. Napadi na nadškofa Berana so začasno ponehali. Prišlo je do večjih nemirov v Moraviji, kjer so hoteli komunisti arretirati več duhovnikov, pa se je ljudstvo uprlo in protestiralo. Morala je priti obrožena policija, da je z orožjem napravila red in mir.

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W. VA. — Vodja premogarjev je odredil naj premogarji dela med tem ko teko pogajanja za novo pogodbo, do nadaljnega po tri dni na teden. Prvega junija poteče pogodba z lastniki mehkega premoga. Po dosedjanju Lewisovi praksi bi morali ruderji ta-dan stopiti v stavko.

WASHINGTON. — Finančni odbor senata je izglasoval predlog, da se znižajo nekatere takse na višino kakršne so bile v letu 1942. To so zlasti takse na telefonske račune, na železniške vozne listke, na srebrnino in podobne pol luksuzne stvari.

Nedeljsko pismo

Dragi prijatelj.

Še se spominja kako slovesno smo leto za letom v domovini obhajali praznik sv. Petra in Pavla? Kajne, lepo je bilo. Tu, kjer sem jaz, tega praznika ne poznamo. Pa ti moram povedati, da ga nisem menda še nikdar tako globoko doživljal kot prav letos, tako naš, tako sodoben se mi je letos ta praznik zdel. Ali naj ti povem zakaj? Poslušaj, takole sem ves ta dan premišljeval:

"Pojdite po vsem svetu in učite vse narode" — to je bila zadnja zapoved našega Odrešenika. Sv. Peter in Pavel pa sta bila prva, ki sta to Kristusovo naročilo tudi v dejansku izvršila. Prestopila sta meje ozkostrejudovstva, ki je hotelo Kristusovo blagovest in odrešenje imeti samo zase, prva sta bila, ki sta se zavedla, da onstran judovskih mej tudi žive ljudje, trpe v jokajo, ljudje, ki so tudi božje podobe in potrebitni odrešenja, ki so prav tako iz božjih rok prišli. Zato sta nesla Kristusa in odrešenje tudi njim.

Peter stoji pred Rimom, tedanj prestolico sveta. Poglejte ga, tega preprostega, neukoga galilejskega ribiča, kakor ves potan in zaprašen stoji na široki Apijski cesti. Tak mož gre v Rim, da preobrasi obličeje svera! Ali bi mogel Bog izbrati bolj neokretnega v bolj nesposobnega človeka za to veliko nalogo? Brez moči je, brez oblasti, brez vojske, ki edina je imela tedaj kakšen pomen, nobenih privržencev, nobenih zvez z vladajočimi krogli, nobenih protekcij, brez prave izobrazbe, brez denarnih sredstev, res brez vsega, kar ta svet ceni. In tak Peter se pridruži ogromnim kolonom rimskih legij in voz v druhalni, ki se pomika po Apijski cesti v Rim.

In nekaj let pozneje stopa po isti poti sv. Pavel, toda vše veliko bolj žalostnem stanju, vkovan v verige rimskega soldatov. Pavel je bil sicer izobražen, obiskoval je visoke šole, vendar po človeško gledano, ni imel niti najmanjših možnosti in sposobnosti, da bi si podvrgel ves svet, saj niti latinsko ni znal, pa gre v Rim, svet za Kristusa osvobodit.

Ta dva naj torej pišeta nove liste svetovne zdgodovine vsemu človeštву. Ali ni bila to mar predpravica rimskega cesarjev in legij, kaj naj vendar ta dva naredita? In kljub temu je to eden največjih trenutkov v zdgodovini človeštva. Ničesar drugačega nista prinesla seboj kot neskončno vero, upanje in ljubezen do Kristusa. Torej tiste luči so gorele v njihovih dušah, ki smo jih doslej prižgali mi v svojih nedeljskih premišljevanjih. Samo to je bilo njuno orožje, sila in vojska, s tem sta dala svetu nov obraz.

In druga misel: V kakšne politične in socijalne razmere sta v Rimu prišla? Najboljši zdgodovinar stare zdgodovine Gregorius je takole označil tisti čas: "Rim je tedaj greče hrepelen po kapljici človečanstva in po dihu ljubezni." Rimsko ljudstvo je bilo ukovano v težke okove suženjstva, stokrat je bilo ogoljufano za najosnovnejše pravice, kot sužnji so prihajali v svet, kot sužnji so odrhajali iz doline solz. Na drugi strani pa so bili vladni krogi, ki so se kopali v neskončnem bogastvu in razkošju, bili veleposestniki s čredo sužnjev. Vsem tem ni človeško življenje prav nič pomnilo, barantali so z ljudmi kot s živino, le v toliku so jih rabilni v kolikor so ščitili njihovo moč in oblast in premoženje. (Kako dobesedno se človeška zdgodovina ponavlja!) Ta plast rimskega mogotcev seveda Petra in Pavla ni rabil. Pri njih je bilo prostora za vse poganske bogove, za vse orgije, za vso pohoto in strast, za vse umore in zločine, ne pa za Petra in Pavla, ki sta oznanjala ljubezen, pravičnost, čistost, enakost vseh, cesarjev in sužnjev, Rimljjanov in Judov. Da, zanju ni prostora, zato Petra križajo in Pavla obgljavijo.

Prijatelj, ali nisva prav tako danes ti in jaz posiana v svet, poslana v Argentino in Chile, v Brazilijo in Avstralijo, Kanado in Ameriko, poslana z istim naročilom: Pojdite in učite vse narode? Vsakdo od nas ima poslanstva: vero, zaupanja v božjo pomoč in ljubezen do Kristusa in nemrjočih duš. Z isto beračijo kot onadva smo odsli v svet, neuki, raztrgani, zmučeni od dolgih begunkih poti in borbe za vsakdanji kruh, pa vendar velja: pojrite in učite v svet, upamem in ljubezni, dajte svetu nov obraz. Čeprav neznatni, nepoznani, brez protekcij, da celo oblateni od naših sovražnikov kot zločinci in izdajalci, nam je Bog dal to veliko nalogo, da povemo svetu, kje je rešitev, kje sreča in pravi mir. In to temu svetu, ki je na las podoben rimskemu, ki je hrepelen po "kapljici človečanstva in dihu ljubezni."

Kajneda bova skušala to veliko nalogo vršiti, kamor koli naju je Bog postavil?

Ali si se morda tej nalogi odpovedala? Poslušaj. Legenda pripoveduje, da je nekoč Peter v Rimu omagal od silnega boja s poganskim svetom, pa je na skrivaj Rim zapustil.

Komaj gre skozi mestna vrata, pa že sreča Kristusa, s križem obloženega. "Kam greš Gospod?" ga Peter vpraša. In Kristus odvrne: "V Rim, da se dam spet krizati." Gospod je izginil, Peter pa je razumel Gospodovo besedo, osramoten se je vrnil v Rim, oznanjal spet Kristusa in zanj umrl.

Zdi se mi, da je tudi marsikaterega od nas že srečal Kristus na begu z njegovoga vinograda. Pa smo se ga izognili. Prijatelj, Peter ti jasno pove, kaj ti je storiti.

Program for Slovenian Catholic Day

WASHINGTON REPORT

By SENATOR ROBERT A. TAFT

IN these weekly columns I shall try to tell the people of Ohio in the fairest possible way some of the developments in Washington. I shall try to report just what goes on in Congress, and to clarify the issues on controversial subjects.

From time to time I shall also set forth my own philosophy of government and the beliefs which lead me to vote as I do, and to feel an intense indignation when certain other policies are advocated.

What happens in Washington is of vital concern to every resident of Ohio. A fully-informed citizenry is the greatest safeguard we have for the future of our country.

CONGRESS has now been in session almost six months. In the Senate we have passed the public housing and slum clearance bill and the bill for Federal aid to education which goes, for the most part, to the poorer states of the Southeast. I was one of the authors of both these measures. They were both passed by the Senate of the 80th Congress and I have felt that both of them are necessary to give something like equality of opportunity to families, and particularly to children, who do not have the income to provide a minimum decent living.

The Senate has also passed a bill giving Federal aid to States to enable them to make universal the program of examining all children in school once a year and providing standard treatment for defects found. The broader health program is being studied by the two Congressional committees, but because of the wide difference between President Truman's national compulsory medical care plan, and the voluntary State-aid plans, the Administration apparently plans to put off until next year any basic action on health. We may, however, be able to provide some State aid for the extension of local public health units and some aid to personnel.

THE SPENCE bill gives the President power to fix prices, fix wages, ration commodities and put the gov-



ernment into business has almost been forgotten by the Democratic leaders themselves. The farm plan proposed by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan has only just been presented in bill form, and seems to have the opposition of the leading farm organizations. The plan to socialize and nationalize medicine has been postponed until 1950. Shortly after the session started, the Labor Committees of both Houses by a strict party vote reported out the bill to repeal the Taft-Hartley law without even permitting the minority members of Congress to offer amendments. The bill was defeated and sent back to the House Labor Committee. The Administration is still trying to pass its bill in the Senate. The civil rights program has gotten nowhere.

In short, it appears that very little progress has been made on the enactment of the Truman program, except on the measures supported by the Republicans. This, in spite of the fact that the President's party controls Congress with a majority of 12 votes in the Senate and 92 in the House of Representatives. Of course a large number of Democrats differ from President Truman on his more radical proposals.

IN future weeks I hope to discuss in detail the status of important issues like labor, social security and relief, the Atlantic Pact, agriculture, aid to Europe, civil rights, housing, education, expenditures and taxes and many others.

Socialism Brings Disillusionment

An article in The Atlantic Monthly observes that socialism has brought a good deal of disillusionment to Britain. The coal mines are an especially apt example. Absenteeism is as frequent and disputes as great as under private management. The slight increase in output per man-shift is attributed to progress that has been made in copying American production methods, rather than any increase in worker morale. The article goes on to say, "Nationalization, to the ordinary miner down in the pit, has always meant that the industry would become his own. Now the miners claim it is not nearly the same thing to discover it is the nation's industry. In fact, they claim that the old private owner was always present to be conferred with—he was not the helpless agent of a remote and soulless board in London."

Can anyone believe that American coal miners would have made such remarkable progress in bettering their lot if we had had a socialized industry? Under private enterprise, the mine union has grown enormously powerful. Management is always present to confer with union heads over wages, working conditions, and any other controversial point. The result is that the average American coal miner earns some \$75 a week, and many earn \$100 and upwards. Living standards in our typical mining towns would seem unbelievable to the British miners.

The Atlantic's article also said, "In Britain today such old-fashioned ideas as enterprise, efficiency, and thrift are at a dangerous discount. The British community has come to put other economic and social ideals a long way ahead of productivity." That always happens when socialist and communist ideologies take over. All the people become poorer—and the workers become poorest of all.



Here are recipes and helps.

Tomato Juice Cocktail
Chill well flavored tomato juice. Pour some of it into the ice cube tray. At serving time add a cube or two to each glass of cold juice. Serve with firerunner rolls.

Pinwheel Pie
Buy the largest round loaf of rye bread you can find. Cut off the bottom crust. Cut two round slices, about 1/4 inch thick. Remove crusts. Butter each slice. Spread a thick layer of deviled ham on the bottom slice. Top with second slice of bread. Spread three bands of colorful food on the top slice. First

band uses sieved hard cooked egg white mixed with softened cream cheese, horseradish, and chives. Second band is made of sieved hard cooked egg yolk mixed with mayonnaise. Add a little anchovy paste, if desired. Third band is made of chopped beets held together with a suggestion of a gelatin base. Soften 1 teaspoon plain gelatin in 1 tablespoon cold water. Heat 2 tablespoons vinegar with 1 tablespoon beer juice. When boiling pour it over the softened gelatin. Stir to dissolve the gelatin. Add beets. Chill until rather firm, then use as the outside or third band of color.

Remove a slice from a peeled hard-cooked egg. Take out the yolk. Fill the opening with washed, perky parsley. Set the egg cup in a hole made at center of top bread slice.

Place the "pie" in a large platter. Surround with crisp potato chips, the more the better.

Years ago Fourth of July torpedoes were in the form of small balls. Small stones and a mild explosive were wrapped in gaily colored tissue paper. When thrown to the sidewalk the torpedo exploded with a bang. Round radishes may be called today's torpedoes.



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Straight From Washington

Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr. has now become a Member of Congress. The American people during recent years, cast close to one hundred million votes for Franklin D. Roosevelt. There is magic in that name. Millions of people will be watching with curiosity and interest to see how much of a chip off the old block Franklin D. Jr. really is. He made a sound and forthright campaign for election. He announced support of Administration policies; in fact, he has been in the forefront of the fight for low-cost housing. If he applies the same tremendous energy in the House of Representatives as he did in his campaign to get here, this may indeed be the first rung in the ladder of his political progress.

The House of Representatives is an intellectual and political arena in which men struggle to the utmost for their political traditions and convictions, for their constituents and for the welfare of their nation. The Member who gets along has to fight for it. He who forges to the front wins and wears the agnomens of a strong and able man. Young Roosevelt not only is endowed with a magic name but he is personable, well educated, has a superb war record and apparently is endowed with real ability and great energy. If he can take it as well as hand it out, he is a promising future.

REPUBLICANS TO GAIN IN SOUTH

Progressive Liberal Northern Democrats in Congress who have created TVA by their votes have moved the South forward at great strides, industrially and financially. Notwithstanding his Southern Democrats frequently defeat progressive legislation. For example a coalition in the House of

representatives between all Republican members of the important Rules Committee, with the three Dixiecrat members blocked for several weeks reporting out the Administration Housing Bill. This important and needed legislation was about to be brought up for consideration by petition because of delay caused by this combination when two Dixiecrats and one Republican on the Rules Committee changed their votes.

Perhaps adoption of the proposed Constitutional Amendment providing that the electoral vote for President and Vice President be counted in proportion to the popular vote will eventually break down the Court House rings politics south of the Mason-Dixon Line. As matters now stand, the only contests in the South are at the Democratic Primary. Under the proposed Constitutional Amendment, the electoral vote of every State would be according to the percentage of popular vote. Therefore, minority voters in so-called "sure" states who might not bother to vote at all would have an incentive to work and vote for their candidates because their work and votes might actually affect the results.

Last November President Truman carried Ohio by a small margin, yet he received all of our State's electoral votes. The proposed amendment, sponsored by Senator Lodge, has been recommended for adoption by both House and Senate Committees. The amendment, if approved by Congress and ratified by three-fourths of the states, would abolish the Electoral College as such but each state would continue to have as many electoral votes as it has Members of Congress.

GOOD HEALTH, A NATION'S PROBLEM

The question of adopting a nationwide health program will be debated in Congress later this year or next January. The object of the Administration's health program is two-fold: (1) to make available enough medical services to go around and (2) to see that everybody has a chance to obtain medical care at reasonable cost. American medical science provides the best medical care in the world. European nations are many years behind us. It is contended that this service is now provided for anyone who can spend unlimited funds for treatment and for

charity patients who can spend nothing whatever but that millions of families in the small income group go longed illness. Without a doubt, it without adequate medical care because would be beneficial to all ever your

they lack funds to meet emergencies such as accidents or serious and prolonged illness. Without a doubt, it would be beneficial to all ever your Government to provide more medical training facilities and try to have trained medical men and clinics available everywhere in our country. Public health facilities and scientific research should be expanded. Preventive medical care should be encouraged. Increased Federal aid for hospital construction should be provided. A program of this sort could be enacted without making doctors employees of the Federal government. The main purpose of the Administration public health program is to bring medical care within reach of all. A national system of prepaid medical care is likely to be considered next year.

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
