Prva stvar je kruh!

Clovek, ki hoče biti zdrav in živeti normalno, mora redno jesti, mora biti oblečen in imeti mora streho, ki ga varuje dežja in sonca poletu in mraza pozimi.

To so prvi in poglaviti pogoji za eksistenco slahernega posameznika. Ta fundamentalna resnica je tako znana in enostavna — prav za prav bi moral biti znana tudi največjemu tepru — da je škoda, ker jo omenjam. Toda moramo jo omenjati dan za dnevom, mesec za mesecem in leto za leto vse naše življenje — kakor da smo odrasli ljudje kopri otrok!

Omenjati moramo to resnico zaradi tega, ker je na žalost in sramoto vsega civiliziranega cloveštva baš to še danes glavno vprašanje obstanka za devetdeset odstotkov vseh ljudi na svetu. In na žalost in sramotu je to glavno vprašanje, ki bi morale biti že davno rešeno, ker je docela cloveško vprašanje, še danes — zadnje vprašanje na vseh onih visokih mestih, kjer se kujejo postave in kjer odločajo o življenu in smrti sto in sto milijonov ljudi.

Na svetu, po vseh deleh, še danes celo roji cloveških trogov, ki nam neprestano trbijo na ušesa, da nas hočejo zaglušiti, o "največjih potrebah" našega življenja. In kaj so te "potrebe"? Ali imajo vsi mogoči tretje na prvem mestu "naših potreb" — kruh? Ali imajo obleko? Ali imajo streho za milijone brezdomcev?

Ne! O vsem tem niti besede! Po sodbi cloveških trogov to ni glavno vprašanje, to ni nijihovo vprašanje! Ako je to kakšno vprašanje, naj se pečajo z njim reverži sami, oni, ki nimajo kruha, nimajo obleke in nimajo strehe! — Za cloveške trote — razume se: vsega site trote — je to grdi materializem, je to živalsko vprašanje želodca, ki jih ponizuje na živali... Clovek pa ne sme biti žival — čeprav pogine kakor vsaka žival, če nima dolgo časa nič v želodcu, ali če ga napade pljučnica vsled mraza!

Trotje, ki žive le od brige za "največje potrebe" milijonov reveržev in imajo zmirom polna usta in debele knjige ter kope časopisov o teh "potrebah", nam histerično kriče — na primer v tem momentu v Združenih državah — da "največja potreba" za 120 milijonov Američanov je — stara ustava! Sporedno s temi troti prihaja med reveže druga armada trogov, ki hinavsko zavijajo oči v zrak in svečano pridigajo, da naša "največja potreba" je vera v Boga in molitve k Bogu. To je vse, kar je treba! Vprašajte te trote, če oni žive samo od svoje vere in se debele samo od molitve, če jim morda prekleta materija ne premiče nog, ne obrača jezik in ne kuha intrig v njihovih glavah, pa vas prekločujejo kot najgršč materialiste!

V Ameriki je danes 20 do 25 milijonov oseb — mož, žena in otrok — ki živo občutijo svojo "največjo potrebo": kruh, obleka in streha. Tudi najzabitejši med zabitimi lahko vedo, da ustavnih in državnih pravic ne morejo jesti, politična svoboda jim ne more potolažiti praznega želodca in molitve jih ne more obleči ter jim dati strehe. Vsi ti milijoni vedo, da za kruh, obleko in streho, za fundamentalni pogoj življenskega obstanka mora biti denar, zaslužek, mora biti delo. Toda dela in zaslužka ni.

Cloveški trotje, ki brusijo pete in jezike za "največje potrebe" milijonov reveržev, se ne brigajo, kako in kje naj brezposelnih reverž dobije kruh, obleko in streho. To ni nijihova potreba! Oni so s tem preskrbljeni. To ni nijihovo glavno vprašanje.
