By FATHER KAPISTRAN During the holy sacrifice of the Mass, the priest often says: OFFERIMUS.

"WE OFFER." He wonders how many are OFFERING that greatest of gifts with him.

He knows that Christ is offering Himself through the priest.

But who else really OFFERS?

He hears people say: "I went to Mass." "I heard Mass." "I attended Mass." But none says "I offered the Mass."

Even the person who requested the Mass says, "I bought a Mass."

The Church speaks of everyone participating in the Mass as "OFFERERS."

The PRINCIPAL offerer is Christ who offers Himself on the Cross and renews that death through the priest in every Mass.

The MINISTERIAL offerer is the priest who offers both in Christ's name and in his own name.

The GENERAL offerer is the universal Catholic Church. Thus all the faithful of the Church offer Christ because the priest is the representative of those faithful.

The highest INDIVIDUAL offerers are those who participate in the Mass by some WORK thus, those who serve the Mass, who offer the stipend, who provide the sacred vessels or linens of the Mass who provide the bread and wine of Mass.

The next INDIVIDUAL offerers are those who are physically present at the Mass and join themselves to the priest by an act of the will.

The third INDIVIDUAL offerers are those who are not physically present but make an act of the will to join themselves with the principal offerer.

Besides the offering and the individual for whom the Mass is intentioned, these individual offerers are first to share the fruits of the Mass.

There is no higher gift we can present to God than that of His own Divine Son. There is no other way of offering Him than through the Mass. Let us offer HIM.

(Continued from page 7) The championship game was a toss up until the final minutes of play. Matching basket for basket, the Michaels had a 16 to 11 lead at the first rest period. The smooth running Steve machine rallied in the second session, outpointed the Mikes for the period, but trailed in the 22 to 21 count at the half. The Chicagoans lost no time in going into high gear at the start of the third period and again outscored the Mikes for the period, sufficiently to hold a 32 to 28 lead. In the final quarter the Michaels' fast-breaking offensive began to click, and the South Chicagoans tied the score 32-all at the two-minutes to go mark. With machine-gun rapidity the Michaels eased in the necessary markers to give them the long end of a 37 to 32 final count and the championship. Markovich of the Michaels, one of the stars of the meet, led the South Chicagoans with 14 points, while Cech and Blazine, with 16 points and 11 points, respectively, a power-house scoring combination paced the fighting Steves. According to Jack Warrell, James Toulis and Art Engelhart, veteran tournament officials, the Kay Jay tourney was one of the finest at which they had officiated. "Kay Jay teams give all they have, and they fight to win. After the game is over it is left on the floor, and there is a remarkable display of good fellowship among the players. It is sportmanship supreme," said Referee Engelhart who is known to all Kay Jay sport enthusiasts in the Midwest. Opening one of the Saturday afternoon games was John Germ, supreme president of the KSKJ, who was introduced by Rev. M. J. Butala, president of the Midwest Basketball Association. The Reverend Father also introduced Supreme Secretary Joseph Zalar who tossed the first ball and set the championship set under way. The social program billed for both tourney nights in St. Joseph's Hall attracted capacity crowds that jammed every available space. The Sunday evening dance was interrupted long enough to allow Rev. Fr. Butala and Supreme Athletic Director Joseph Zorc to present awards. In addition to the championship prizes, sportmanship trophies were also awarded to Waukegan St. Joseph's No. 53 (Lights), St. George's No. 3 heavyweights (Joliet), and Chicago St. Stephen's No. 1 girls. High score game trophies went to St. Joseph's, No. 53 lights, Waukegan; St. Michaels, No. 152, So. Chicago; and St. Anne's, No. 127, girls, Waukegan. Color was added on the Sunday bill by the appearance of St. Joseph's Grade school band, which provided snappy tuncs between games and during intermissions. The consensus of opinion is that it was a classic event and another display of that fine Kay Jay sportmanship and congeniality.

OUR PAGE COOKING SCHOOL

Casserole Dinner

2 cups peeled and sliced potatoes, 1 pound chopped beef, 1 cup sliced onions, 2 cups cooked elbow macaroni, 2 cups canned corn, 3 tablespoons green pepper, chopped, 1 can tomato soup, 1/4 pound grated cheese, salt and pepper to taste.

Use a large greased casserole. Place potatoes in bottom of dish, add half the onions, chopped beef, macaroni, corn, peppers and tomato soup in order given. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Fill casserole with remaining ingredients in the same way. Top with grated cheese. Bake 45 minutes in moderate oven.

French Buns

1/2 yeast cake, 1/2 cup lukewarm water, 4 cups flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 cup melted shortening, 6 eggs.

Dissolve yeast cake in water, add 1 cup of flour. Let rise until it doubles in bulk about 1 hour. Mix rest of flour, salt, sugar, shortening and 3 eggs, not beaten. Beat smooth about 2 minutes, add the other eggs one at a time, beating smooth. Add first mixture (sponge), beat well. Let rise in warm place for 6 hours. Beat again 3 minutes. Set in refrigerator from 12 to 24 hours. To shape, cut or tear off pieces to make balls the size of an egg. Knead into shape, lay in greased pan, just touching, and set in top of each a slice of citron or a seedless raisin. Let rise to double in bulk. Brush with 3 parts sugar to 1 part milk. Bake in moderate oven 25 minutes. This recipe will make 24 buns.

Ice Box Pudding

3 dozen lady fingers, 1 large can shredded pineapple, 1 large bottle maraschino cherries, drained.

For custard cream 1/2 pound sweet butter and 3/4 pound powdered sugar. Add 4 egg yolks and beat into butter and sugar. Add 1/2 pint whipping cream. Split the lady fingers. Cover bottom of large, deep, round pan with round part of lady fingers down. Spread some of custard over lady fingers. Then layer of fruit over custard, then layer of whipped cream (extra half pint), and so on until all is used. Put in ice box over night. When ready to use, turn out on plate and slice into thick portions.

Barbecue For Sandwiches

2 tablespoons butter, 1 onion, 1 cup cut celery, 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1/2 cup catsup, 1 1/2 tablespoons brown sugar, 2 pounds pork and beef ground up, 1 cup water.

Brown onion in butter and fry meat in it. Add catsup, lemon juice, sauce, sugar and the rest of the ingredients and simmer slowly. Makes delicious barbecue sandwiches for cold winter days.
