O marvellous miracle! incomprehensible mystery! unspeakable power and dignity of the Priesthood! (St. Ephrem)

In the great respect of the priesthood and in extraordinary regard for the reverend Slovene clergy of the Cleveland diocese and especially for the Rt. Rev. John J. Oman of St. Lawrence's, the above verse and the following short treatise on the sacred calling is dedicated to them who have been given a direct slap in the Chicago "Prosveta" by one of our own Clevelanders, Mr. August Kuznik of Newburgh with such offensive words as "lenuharji" and other words rather too obscene to mention and not so very appealing to the human eye when in print.

To each and every sincere Christian and Catholic a priest is an "alter Christus"—another Christ, set aside from the rest of the world by Christ to be His personal Ambassador to this earth, to forgive and to retain sin—a power not given to anyone else upon this earth and a power not given to God's angels in heaven. As St. Ephrem says, his words in the above short verse in the great "unspeakable power and dignity of the priesthood" are altogether too humble and could never express his great respect for the "priest of God!" Yes, it is all well and done right and perhaps worth the highest praise from this column that Mr. Kuznik recalls back in a reasonable publication some of the obscenity and blasphemy that he has splashed in a filthy Chicago newspaper! One who has given a terrific slap to the writer of "Newburške novice," the Rt. Rev. Cannon of Newburgh, now publicly realizes his mistake and asks for a correction on his part. Yes, we say again, worth our highest compliment, Mr. Kuznik! But to our many Slovene writers and reporters who almost daily report news events of their communities in the various Slovenian publication of America, it would be advisable at times to consider your adverbial and adjectival clauses and also consider a few of the major rules of journalism in writing articles of such nature as the one written by Mr. Kuznik in the "Prosveta" some time ago. Show the greatest respect for your priests, dear readers and writers. We in

the diocese ought to be proud indeed of our Slovene clergy here in this diocese who have done splendid work since the formation of the first Slovene parish in this part of North-eastern Ohio. Proud indeed, we should say again, to have also numbered among them a domestic prelate of the personal household of the Pope—a prelate who just recently was invested with the office of Honorary Canon. Therefore, only your humble respect for the ordained, the one set aside by God—the Priest! This column also feels the welcome which has been accorded the previous article some time ago in this paper on the stand the Dispatch took on the infallible Church of Rome and its priests and which has induced your scribe to write the above article on practically the same subject. Should our words on the above article account for any consideration, criticism and comment in the near future in this publication, either among our reverend clergy or other columnists of this page, we shall feel more than amply rewarded.
