May Day — Child Health Day in Schools

"Mothers and Babies First by all means," said Dr. J. F. Rogers, consultant in hygiene of the United States Office of Education, in commenting on this year's slogan for May Day — Child Health Day.

"Time passes," continued Dr. Rogers, "and we should look ahead. The school children of today will be the fathers and mothers of tomorrow and they should be better fathers and mothers and able to bring forth and bring up better children."

If school health workers have their way, this may be the case. May Day is a good day, according to Dr. Rogers to look over our school buildings, and make them more healthful if possible; it is a good time to sharpen the eyes and wits of teachers for the finding of bad eyes, bad ears, signs of bad feeding and of communicable disease; it is a good day to look over our children generally, with an eye for remediable faults in the human machine.

"Loose screws must be found and adjusted early," says Dr. Rogers, "if we would reduce the excessive crop of 'screw-loose' adults, in the physical if not the mental meaning. We have an overproduction along this line, with an annual bill for sickness and weakness which runs well over three billions. May Day might well be made a means for reducing this dreadful load."

Dr. Rogers feels encouraged that very few schools have even thought of trying to "economize" by reducing their health activities. But he reminds us that children still come to school who cannot read what is on the blackboard or hear what the teacher says to them; that there is still a vast army of children who are badly, even poorly fed, and, worse still perhaps, that more than 5,000 pupils die each year by preventable diseases. "Not very much economy here," he says, "whether in good or ill times."

On May Day—Child Health Day, Dr. Rogers believes, we should both resolve and begin to do more thorough work toward preserving and improving our most precious possessions — our children, and their most precious possession — their health. "Babies First," he says, "and especially those of the next generation who will derive their physical and mental excellence from the school children of today."

The first celebration of a national Child Health Day was in 1924, when the American Child Health Association launched a campaign to have May 1 set aside for this purpose. It is now annually proclaimed from the White House and by governors of states.

The Tax Problem

Springdale, Pa.—Many major problems have been met and others are under observation, but one that must be ironed out to suit the 20th century needs is the tax problem. Citizens committees and tax leagues are being organized to combat the continual pyramiding of taxes. Their assumption is that our tax system is worn out, and a call must be sent forth for a scaling down of the assessments. True, it is worn out, but I hesitate to call it a system, since there is practically no boundary to halt either the state or federal government for exceeding the limits.

Heretofore it has not planned, meditated, or considered the taxation applied. The states and the federal government have become competitors in a revenue drive by invading each other's taxing territories, while we suffer the consequences of being hit twice in the same spot. To make it illustrative, let's take the gasoline tax. The states adopted that form of revenue first and proved it lucrative with the least difficulty; obviously the federals were unable to restrain from retaliating, to the utter disgust of the auto driver who is compelled to pay from 3 to 7 cents a gallon in taxes, varying in the various states. Space does not permit to reveal the various forms of duplication or the list of necessities taxed; the applications have become so complex that the average individual is unconscious of its true significance, but taking the last analysis we find that the individual returns 42 per cent of his income to taxes, either directly or indirectly.

Two things are certain: First, the government cannot function without the revenue, and, second, the tax dollar is the best dollar spent. Some may view the latter with doubt, but if visioned with the proper light there is no alternative. What then makes the average person cry for a reduction in taxes? Wherein lies the remedy that will cure the disease so as to benefit both the government and the people? To the first question I will repeat without hesitation that taxes are too high. They have increased far more rapidly than social progress demands, for the simple reason that the "less able to pay the more is demanded," while those more able to pay find channels to evade taxation; namely tax-exempt securities.

One of the biggest and best sources of the government revenue is the income tax; obviously the large incomes will seek for avenues of escape. The tax-exempt securities has been found to be the haven of refuge. In its last report Pennsylvania has reported, if my memory is right, only three income tax returns on incomes of one million dollars, while the number of individuals enjoying the same incomes are several times double the returns. Here we have those who are the most capable of paying, and who derive the greatest benefit from the government, but are actually immune from income taxation by centering their large incomes in the tax-exempt category. Losing out in the income returns the government is forced to increase other taxes or pave new avenues of taxation and sometimes both.

Now to the second question, what is the cure for this? You know it. You've heard it and read about it. Close the gap in the category. In all probability it will require an amendment to the sacred constitution, but that is not impossible as its framers have provided for such an act

as often as social changes require. Let's do away with the so-called tax-exempt securities, and then—and then only—the most able to pay will contribute to the upkeep of the government, from whom they receive the most service, their share of income.

Placing a fair income tax on government securities is not only essential, but mandatory. Although we cannot lobby at Washington as those financially able do, to procure the necessary legislation, we can inform by letter our senators and representatives as to our stand; but be sure to write personally in all cases to those influenced by your vote. Vocal utterances on street corners against existing evils produces no results; but if all take the initiative to air their opinions at the proper place, provided it's worthy of consideration, greatly enhances the desired results. This tax problem is so depressing that it's killing. It must be reviewed inside and out, remodeled and revised.

The tax evil here denounced is principally between the national and state governments to solve. My original intention had been to discuss the stupendous increase in the general property tax which fall under the state and local interests, but the federal obligations are eventually of greater importance. This year will yield several billions of dollars as interest and principal to holders of government securities, while the government will receive little or no income tax.
