

## DAYTONS ENJOY MUSIC OF SLOVENIAN TARTINI

### A GRAND PERFORMANCE

On Saturday evening, February 18, we Daytonians were treated to a magnificent experience which made me proud, once again, to be a Slovenian.

We had the pleasure and the privilege of hearing the Tartini Trio from Ljubljana in a great musical performance.

Yet I wasn't alone in considering it a grand experience. The music hall was full of attentive listeners, all evidently devotees of classical instrumental music. After each number, the audience showed its appreciation and admiration by calling the artists back for several curtain calls.

These Slovenians richly deserve the title of artists because each one played like a virtuoso, capable of giving a solo performance in Severance Hall itself. As a group they played as one, never missing an entry when the music called for it.

And when the composer allowed any one of the three to show his skill individually, the artist manifested full mastery of his instrument by playing not only with technical perfection but with beauty of tone and depth of feeling as well.

The supreme test of the Trio's virtuosity came in the final number by that giant among classical composers, Ludwig van Beethoven. One would have expected this piece de resistance,

coming as it did at the end of the program, to bring on some lapses of attention in the audience. Far from it!

It proved to be a tremendous climax to the program which in the case of a less sophisticated audience, would have brought it to its feet with cheers, but which, instead, applauded the performers with an enthusiastic ovation.

It was my personal privilege to meet the artists during the intermission. All three of them: pianist Aci Bertonec, violinist Dejan Bravnicar, and cellist Ciril Skerjanc, were personable and pleasant, yet unassuming like all great artists.

They mentioned that a group from Cleveland had come all the way down to Columbus to hear them perform and they were evidently delighted.

It is my sincere hope that the Trio will return, and that the next time they will include Cleveland in their itinerary.

The newly formed Cultural Committee which was announced recently in the American Home will not be sorry if they place this project high on their agenda, for the benefit of the local Slovenian community and for that of the community at large. After all, Cleveland is known internationally as one of the great musical centers of the world.

## DANIEL SIEWIOREK IS HONORED BY SCIENTISTS

### DANIEL P. SIEWIOREK

CITATION: "For contributions to the analysis and design of fault tolerant computing systems, and for his participation in civic activities.

DANIEL P. SIEWIOREK is an associate professor of computer science and electrical engineering at Carnegie-Mellon University where he has been active in introducing numerous courses. Under his leadership, a Computer Modules Project for which he has been the principal investigator has been renewed four times by NSF. He also participated in the organization of a research group in Computer Structures and Systems at the university.

Dr. Siewiorek received his B.S.E.E. from the University of Michigan in 1968, the M.S.E.E. and the Ph.D.E.E. from Stanford University in 1969 and 1972 respectively. He is a member of Eta Kappa Nu, Tau Beta Pi, and Sigma Xi. He also holds membership in IEEE (IEEE Computer Society, Fault Tolerant Computing Group, Computer Society Education Committee, and Technical Committee on Computer Architecture), the Association for Computing Machinery, and the Marine Technology Society.

Dr. Siewiorek has supervised an unusually large number of graduate students. He was a co-developer of Carnegie-Mellon's computer engineering program. He has held summer positions with Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company, NASA Lewis Research Center, and Digital Equipment Corporation, as well as consulting positions with the Naval Research Lab, Digital Equipment Corporation, and Compuguard Securities. His publications include 17 journal articles and 31 conference pa-

pers. He has also produced 35 research reports.

Other contributions include developing a rotary switch for standby-spare; devising models for spacing systems, illustrating that design styles are a dominant factor in the cost-effectiveness of computer aided design, and developing a method to measure the effectiveness of design programs.

His community activities include work as a Church Councilman for two years, Assistant Scoutmaster for four years, and Chairman of the Mathematics Division for the Pittsburgh Science Fair.

### IRS Offers Free Tax Computation

The Internal Revenue Service again this year is offering free income tax computation to qualifying taxpayers requesting the service.

Persons wishing the IRS to figure their tax should check their instructions to insure they qualify and then complete their return to the line which says "If you want IRS to figure your tax, stop here and sign below." Both spouses must sign a joint return, even if only one had income.

The IRS urges the use of the name and address label which was mailed to taxpayers to avoid mistakes and speed processing.

The IRS will also compute Earned Income Credit for eligible persons. To apply for this tax benefit, available to parents who earned less than \$8,000 in 1977 and provided a home all year for their child, individuals should complete Form 1040A to the line indicated.

# PORTUGAL

(Continuation)  
After breakfast on a guided tour by bus, visited the section where many buildings were partially destroyed by the earthquake of 1755. Restoration now in progress. Proceeded along the main avenues, and parks, with many monuments of national heroes in the squares. The normal population of Lisbon is around a million, but in the past year, close to a million refugees came from Angola to Portugal.

Some five hundred thousand came to Lisbon, thus creating an unemployment as well as a housing problem. Many tall apartment buildings, as we make a short stop to view a monument, memorial dedicated to Maritime discoveries near the waterfront built in 1960. Our next point of interest to the Tower of Belem here stands a sentinel to the Port of Lisbon, built in 1514.

It was from this point that Bartolomeu Dias (1450-1500) discovered the Cape of Good

Hope. Vasco De Gama (1469-1524) discovered the sea route from Portugal around the continent of Africa to India. Pedro Alvares Cabral and other heroes of the 15th and 16th century began their many discoveries from these same shores. Next we toured the Museum of Coaches, from the 17th to the 19th century.

In the oldest Felipe II of Spain first journeyed from Madrid to the Capital of his recently conquered Portuguese dominions in 1619. In the most opulent, a series of three gilded Italian Baroque Coaches, the Portuguese Ambassador appeared at the Court of Pope Clement IX in 1716. Continued on to Hieronymite monastery of St. Jeronimo built in early 16th century by order of Manuel I, using the occasion and riches of the new trade route to India recently discovered by Vasco De Gama. The cloister is a two story edifice with wide arches, late Gothic and Renaissance carved wall decorations, this building is one of the few that survived

the earthquake of 1755. Lisbon Cathedral, this was an Arab mosque prior to 12th century. It overlooks Tague in the Alfama district, is the oldest church in the city, chiefly interesting as an architectural mixture of styles from Gothic to Baroque. This is this 12th century structure.

Inside the 13th century cloister garden is the "Miraculous Crow," the city mascot said to have accompanied the body of St. Vincent on the voyage to Lisbon some 800 years ago. Bones of St. Vincent and St. Antonio are among the relics on display. Our next visit to Green House, a winter garden of ponds, and gardens, grottoes, luxuriant vegetation imported from northern and tropical climates. Beautiful palatial homes are in the residential area, with large gardens as we proceed to our hotel. A three hour social was enjoyed by our entire group. The money system here 100 centavos equal one escudo. We received 40 escudo's for a dollar.

## CEI Working to prevent power stop

The Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company declared today that it is taking all possible steps to prevent the mandatory curtailment of electric power to the public, business and industry.

Karl H. Rudolph, CEI chairman, said the company is generating all the electricity possible from coal, and is obtaining additional supplies from nuclear power and from power being purchased from out-of-state companies.

"Based on our forecasted needs for 1978, the company presently has on hand a 52-day supply of coal," Rudolph said. "The coal is wet and frozen and difficult to burn, but we are utilizing it in our plant boilers as best we can."

Rudolph emphasized that the company depends importantly at this time on being able to continue to obtain nuclear power from its Davis-Besse Plant near Port Clinton and from its supplies of power from out-of-state oil-fired generating plants.

"If our company should be cut off from its supplies of oil-fired purchased power or nuclear energy, it would probably be necessary to reduce electric

city to industrial and large commercial customers," Rudolph said adding, "This would mean job layoffs and hardship for Northeast Ohio."

Rudolph noted that the company's supply of coal has been questioned. He reiterated that the company has a 52-day supply based on forecasted needs, but that the coal stockpile is only one factor in the company's ability to supply power to Northeast Ohio. He stressed that the company's ability to burn oil and obtain oil-fired power and nuclear power is necessary to avoid job layoffs and extreme public inconvenience.

"There is no profit to the Illuminating Company in the ten per cent increase that our customers will note in their electric bills during the coal strike emergency," Rudolph said. "The only alternative to higher bills in this period would be power cutbacks and job layoffs."

Rudolph said that when the coal strike emergency ends and winter weather conditions alleviate, the company expects to curtail its use of oil and oil-fired purchased power and the public can expect a reduction in the fuel charge portion of their electric bills.

## Eckart Says Ohio Merit Scholarships Now Open

State Representative Dennis E. Eckart (D-18 District) announced today that applications for the Ohio Merit Scholarship Program will be available after January 27, 1978.

The Ohio Merit Scholarship Program, which awards \$1,000 scholarships to Ohio's outstanding high school students, came about directly as a result of legislation enacted by the Ohio General Assembly and signed into law by Governor James A. Rhodes.

Representative Eckart indicated that there are several key elements for a student to be eligible for the \$1,000 Ohio Merit Scholarship Program.

Selection of scholarship recipients is based on the applicant's high school grade point average as well as the ACT national test score.

A minimum of one award will be made to students from each eligible high school throughout the state and the remaining awards will be based on a ranking of all the remaining candidates throughout the State of Ohio regardless of the school information.

or the location.

Retention of the scholarship for a four year period will be dependent upon satisfactory progress toward a degree.

The monetary awards will be paid directly to students by check which must be cosigned by the institution where the student is enrolled.

Representative Eckart said, "This program is important in that it is the first recognition by the State of Ohio of an attempt to encourage our outstanding high school seniors to attend college in the State of Ohio."

"I or my office will be happy to assist high school seniors who are eligible for this program in filling out the necessary applications."

If a high school senior is interested in applying for the Ohio Merit Scholarship Program they should contact either the University that they plan the state and the remaining dates throughout the State of Ohio regardless of the school information.

## VOINOVICH HONORED BY N.A.C.O.

County Commissioner George V. Voinovich has been honored by the National Association of Counties (NACO) for the 1976 method of Residential Appraisals conducted while Voinovich was County Auditor.

NACO President Dan Lynch this week named Voinovich a 1977 Achievement Award Winner and cited Voinovich's computer-assisted mass appraisal system as an "example of innovative programs." NACO is the spokesman for County Government throughout the United States. Awards will be presented at NACO's 1977 annual conference in Detroit, July 24-27.

The Voinovich reappraisal, a pioneer effort in the field of computer-assisted mass appraisal, got underway in 1972 when Voinovich hired C.B.M., Inc., to develop an alternative to manual appraisals and annual value changes of real property.

Voinovich believes that the annual cost of the computerized residential system, now that it is installed, will drop down to \$4 per parcel, compared to between \$6 to \$8 for traditional approaches of updating 400,000 residential parcels.

In 1970, the traditional "cost approach" to property valuation was used, resulting in 42,000 complaints from residential taxpayers. In 1976, using the computer assisted approach method, only 8,000 residential complaints were filed.
