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OGROMNI DOLGO-VITLAČIJO ZDRUŽENE DRŽAVE

Povprečni delavec mora delati 73 dni v letu za upnike

Washington, D. C. — The Twentieth Century Fund, raziskovalna organizacija, je pravkar objavila študijo o dolgoročnih ameriških dolgovih, ki je vzbudila veliko pozornost v javnosti.

Na bazi te študije znašajo dolgoročni ameriški dolgovi ogromno vsoto \$134,000,000,000. Ti vključujejo zadolžnice vseh vrst, ne pa kratkoročnih dolgov, ki igrajo veliko vlogo v bizniških transakcijah.

Vladni dolgovi predstavljajo 25.9% omenjene vsote. V tem je vključen dolg federalne vlade, ki znaša 11.2%, dočim dolgovi državnih in mestnih vlad znašajo 14.7%.

Vse ostalo breme splošnega dolga je na ramah posameznikov in korporacij. Prve vključbe na farme predstavljajo 6.7% skupnega dolga 134 milijard dolarjev. Industrijske korporacije nosijo 8.2% dolga, javne naprave 8.9%, finančne korporacije 17.3%, hiše v mestih pa 21.7%.

V sedanjem času, ako bi bil poglavar družine stalno uposlen, kar seveda ni, bi moral delati 73 dni v letu za upnike in samo 227 dni za svojo družino, se glasi poročilo omenjene fundacije.

Dolgovi na lastnino v mestih znašajo \$35,000,000,000, kar predstavlja 58% sedanje vrednosti mestne zemlje in poslopij. Na vsako osebo v Združenih državah pride \$1,072 dolga, dočim so narodni dohodki, iz katerih se mora plačevati ta dolg, padli več kot za polovico v zadnjih treh letih. To je eden od vzrokov, da postajajo zahteve po inflaciji čedalje glasnejše.

Zakon za kontrolo industrije še popravljajo

Konferenčni odsek zavrgel davke od javnih zadolžnic

Washington, D. C. — V torek je senat ponovno debatiral o popravkih v zakonu za javna dela in federalno kontrolo industrije. Nekateri klavzule, ki jih je sprejel senat zadnji teden, so bile zavržene v konferenčnem odseku. Med temi je tudi važna klavzula, ki je določala, da ne sme biti nobene izjeme za dohodninski davek in tudi federalni, državni in municipalni bondi morajo biti podvrženi davku. Doslej so dohodki (obresti) teh zadolžnic prosti tega davka. V senatu je vsled tega nov boj, kajti predlagatelji zahtevajo, da se zavržena klavzula uvrsti nazaj v zakon.

Teško pa bodo uspeli, kajti Rooseveltova administracija je nasprotna obdavljenju federalnih in drugih javnih bondov.

Socialistična eksekutiva in "enotna fronta"

Chicago. — Eksekutiva socialistične stranke je potom referendumu sprejela sklep, da se v bodoče ne sme spuščati nobena državna ali krajevna organizacija stranke v "enotno fronto" brez njenega privoljenja. Za ta sklep so glasovali Hillquit, Hoan, Graham Hoopes, McLevy, Packard in Wilson, proti pa Coolidge, Haggood, Krzycki in Thomas.

Milijon oseb obiskalo svetovno razstavo

Chicago, 13. jun. — Krasno vreme je včeraj privabilo 58,947 obiskovalcev na svetovno razstavo in s tem je bil prekošen rekord, ki je bil dosežen zadnji sredo. Doslej je razstavo obiskalo nad milijon oseb. Milijon oseb vstopnico je imela miss Eleanor Frost iz Syracuse, N. Y. Bila je presenečena, ko je prejela od glavnega upravitelja razstave L. R. Lohra uradno kolajno v spomin tega dogodka.

Cenejša elektrika in plin prihajata Chicagu

Chicago. — Po dolgotrajnem pritiskanju na javnopravne družbe v Chicagu in severnem Illinoisu za redukcijo pristojbin so te družbe dale te dni definitivno besedo, da znižajo pristojbine za elektriko in plin. Znižanje bo znašalo štiri do pet milijonov dolarjev letno.

Bombne eksplozije na Dunaju

Dve osebi ubiti in tri ranjene pri eksploziji bombe v zlatarski trgovini. — Fašist umorjen v bitki s komunisti

Dunaj, 13. jun. — Včeraj je bila vržena bomba v neko zlatarsko trgovino, ki je ubila lastnika in neko drugo osebo, tri osebe pa so bile ranjene. Socialistični list Allgemeine Zeitung je pisal, da je bil lastnik žid in da so fašisti odgovorni za eksplozijo. Policija je takoj konfiscirala izdajo lista, v kateri je bila ta vest priobčena.

Istočasno so se vršile velike demonstracije, katerih so se udeležili tudi fašistični študentje. Drhal je razbila okna nekega časopisa, toda policija je po kratki bitki raspršila demonstrante. V bližini parlamenta je eksplodiralo več bomb, toda ranjen ni bil nihče.

V bitki med fašisti in komunisti v bližini Gradca je bil eden fašist umorjen, nakar je policija vdrla v glavni stan fašistične organizacije in ga zasledila. Poročila o nasiljih prihajajo iz drugih avstrijskih mest. V Inomestu je policija aretirala 21 oseb, federalne čete pa so okupirale tamkajšnji fašistični glavni stan.

Moskva, 13. jun. — James Mattern, ameriški letalec na poletu okoli sveta, ki je sinoči poletel iz Kabarovska preko pacifične ožine proti Alaski, je danes prispel na cilj v Nome, kjer je našel slabo vreme. Mattern se je vrnil na ameriško celino deseti dan po svojem poletu iz New Yorka, odkoder je porabil devet dni, šest ur in 54 minut do Kabarovska na obalah Pacifika.

ZDRAVNIK NAPoveduje ZMAGO NAD BOLEZNIMI

Fishbein govori o velikanskem napredku, ki ga bo dosegla zdravniška veda v prihodnjem desetletju

Milwaukee, Wis., 13. jun. — Od danes deset let bodo zdravniki s pomočjo novih priprav in strojev lahko videli delovanje vsakega živca v telesu pacienta, kar bo pomenilo največji napredek v diagnozi vsake bolezni, kar sedaj še ni mogoče in spravlja zdravnike v zagato in zahteva številne žrtve.

Tako velik napredek v zdravniški vedi je napovedal dr. Morris Fishbein, vodilna osebnost Ameriške zdravniške asociacije, na konvenciji te organizacije, na katero je dospelo na tisoče zdravnikov z vseh strani Združenih držav.

Fishbein je dejal, da prihaja doba strojne revolucije tudi v zdravniški znanosti kot je že prišla v industriji, ko so stroji izpodrinili ročno delo. Isurjenost zdravnika ni glavno v zdravilstvu, temveč razvoj znanstvenih pripomočkov in strojev. Kot primer, kaj blokemija lahko napravi, je Fishbein omenil, da zdravnik že sedaj lahko ugotovi v teku prvih pet mesecev nosečnosti, da li bo rojeni otrok deček ali deklica. Znanost o endokriniki žlezi napreduje tako hitro, da bodo v bližnji bodočnosti zdravniki lahko kontrolirali spol otrok, njihovo rast in teho ter mentalno kvaliteto.

Letalske družbe se ne bri-gajo za varnost ljudi

To dejstvo je odkrila preiskava, ki se bavi z nesrečo na šikaški razstavi

Chicago. — Trojna preiskava, ki ima na rešetu letalsko nesrečo od zadnje nedelje, pri kateri je sedem posetnikov čkaške razstave izgubilo življenje, je doslej dognala, da glavna skrb družbe, ki operira Palwaukee Airport na razstavišču, je bila, da izvleče čim več denarja iz posetnikov razstave. Dognano je, da letalo, ki je padlo na tla in zgorelo z devetimi osebami vred, je bilo pokvarjeno in pilot Carl Vickery je delal 14 ur dnevno skozi osem dni. To so težke kršitve aeronavtičnih zakonov in odgovorne osebe pridejo v škripce.

Dve žrtvi še danes nista spoznani. Med mrtvimi so trije moški in ena ženska izven Chicaga, ki so obiskali razstavo.

Prva posledica katastrofe je, da morajo lastniki aeroplanov hraniti imenik in naslovnik vseh oseb, ki jih vzamejo na gračno vožnjo.

Zahtevajo embargo za poljske pridelke

Montevideo, Minn. — The Minnesota Farm Holiday Assn. zahteva od governerja Olsona razglasitev embarga za vse poljske pridelke. Druga resolucija, ki je bila sprejeta na konvenciji te organizacije, zahteva, da federalna vlada podprži banke in razglasi moratorij za sodnijsko prodajanje zadolženih farm. Konvencije se je udeležilo nad 4,000 delegatov, ki so obsodili obe stari stranki kot predstavnici privilegiranih interesov.

Arstacije brezposelnih

York, Pa. — Trije voditelji demonstracij brezposelnih pred uradom tukajšnje pomožne postaje so bili aretirani in pozneje obsojeni na plačitev globe \$100 vsak ali na 30 dni zapora. Uradniki so pozvali policijo, da razšene demonstrante in pri navalu je bilo več oseb ranjenih.

Pri glasovanju je priporočilo odseka za plače z večino oddanih glasov odklonjeno.

Br. Lokar predlaga, da se da hišniku \$10 plače. Br. Bratkovich protipredlaga \$25. Oba predloga sta podpirana.

Br. Pečnik pravi, da ti predlogi niso potrebni, kajti čikaška društva bodo dala plačo iz dobička kuhinje in točilnice.

Poročilo o pregledovanju poslovanja glavnega urada

Vaš odsek je pregledal delo glavnih odbornikov, kolikor je bilo v tem kratkem času mogoče. Zaslili smo vse glavne odbornike, ki so zaposleni v uradu, ter tudi nadzorni odsek. Obenem smo zaslili tudi vse uslužbence. V tem zaslili smo se je izkazalo, da je poslovanje v redu, in izvemši par malih zadev ni bilo nobenih pritožb. Priporočila in nasvete, katere so nam dali gl. odborniki in uslužbenec, smo vzeli na znanje in jih oddali na pristojna mesta; druge, ki se pa direktno tičejo nas, pa prilagamo v zaključku našega poročila.

Predsednik Cainkar je poročal za svoj urad v detajlu. Delo se je vršilo vestno in če je katerikrat prišlo do kakega nesporazuma v uradu, je bila včasih kriva nervoznost ali pa različna mnenja. Ali vselej se je poravnalo. Z gospodarskim odsekom je prva leta po zadnji konvenciji bilo večkrat malo nesporazuma, zadnje leto pa se je to zelo izboljšalo.

Glavni tajnik Vidler je poročal za svoj urad: da je vse v redu, delo se izvrši ob času in kadar je potreba (kar se večkrat primeri), se mora delati čez čas, in to delo izvrše uslužbenec v njegovem uradu brezplačno.

Bolniški tajnik Novak je istotako poročal za svoj urad. Delo je izvršeno v njegovem uradu ob času — in če je potreba, čez uro — brezplačno.

Glavni blagajnik Vogrich pojasni za svoj urad, da navadno izvršuje svoje delo sam, in kadar je potrebno, dobi pomoč od v uradu nastavljenih uslužbenec. Kar se tiče denarja, investicij, itd., nam je vedno na razpolago s pojasnilom.

Upravnik glasila Godina poroča za svoj urad in za tiskarno. Govori o težakah, ki so v zvezi s tem uradom. Na vprašanje, če je resnica, da je ena in po moči preveč v njegovem uradu, pojasnjuje, da tega on ne tolmači tako. Delo se deli v njegovem de-

partmentu isto tako kot v uredniškem: torej dela samo toliko ljudi, kot delo zahteva. Glede lista je že dal svoja priporočila in svoje mnenje odseku, kateremu to spada. — Za tiskarno pove, da se izplačuje. Res je pa, da težko konkurira z drugimi vnanjimi tiskarskimi tvrdkami, ali pa malimj unijskimi podjetji, kjer tiskajo lastniki sami in kjer ni zadostne unijske kontrole. Jaz bi rad nekaj, na kar bi se opiral, kajti ti ljudje vedo, da smo vedno in povsod zagovarjali unije in da nam je nemogoče že iz moralnega stališča vzeti stališče za odprto delavnico. Ali nekaj bo vseeno treba ukreniti, da se te ljudi malo ustraši. V tem oziru sem že govoril z odsekom za ustanove in publikacije."

Gl. urednik Ivan Molek poroča za uredništvo in pojasni na vprašanje — če je preveč moči v uredništvu — da ne. Odkar se je list zmanjšal in odkar izhaja petkrat v tednu, se tudi delo deli v njegovem oddelku tako, da so faktično nastavljene samo tri moči. Drugače je vse v redu.

Predsednik nadzornega odseka Frank Zaitz poroča za svoj odsek, da se je vršilo strogo nadzorstvo, o katerem poda detajlirano poročilo vsakih šest mesecev na polletni seji glavnega odbora. Resolucija glede tiskarne

Vaš odsek za ustanove in publikacije je vzel v pretres tudi tiskarno in njene odnošaje do tiskarskih delavcev, ki so organizirani v petih različnih strokovnih unijah.

Pojasneno nam je bilo po upravniku, da unijaska pogodba stavec poteče meseca aprila 1934, v teku pa so pagaranja za podpis nove pogodbe. Unija insistira, da vodstvo tiskarne podpiše pogodbo za štiri leta. V pogodbi unija tiskarjev pristaja na redukcijo meze za 15% za prvo leto, nakar bi z drugim letom pričela naraščati po pet odstotkov za vsako nadaljnje leto, kar pomeni, da bi bila v četrtem letu dosežena sedanja lestvica.

Naša jednota je bila vedno naklonjena organiziranemu delavstvu in Prosveta dnevno propagira principe unionizma ter stoji na braniku delavskih pravic. Sedanja kriza je posebno težko udarila Prosveto iz razloga, ker je večina članstva brez dela ali pa slabo zasluži, vsled česar je moralo mnogo naročnikov pustiti list, drugi ga pa težko plačujejo. Na drugi strani so plače tiskarskih delavcev za te čase izredno visoke, to posebno še, če se upošteva gospodarski položaj lista, kateremu gre za obstanek. Editorial Comments

The labor press recently published interesting figures shedding light on financial manipulations of some private insurance companies. The salaries of some officials of private companies were considerably increased last year, in the third year of the severest economic crisis. And so the private insurance companies had to declare a moratorium on policy loans, because they were experiencing "hard times."

It was at their suggestion, says the Locomotive Engineers Journal, that the National Transportation Company was formed, for the purpose of recommending ways and means of saving their investments in railroad securities. They have in some cases, we are further told, secured millions in loans from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. But with all their pleading poverty, opines the Journal, they have had ample funds to increase the salaries of some of their officers as much as \$25,000 per year.

The presidents of most of these private insurance companies do not care about the depression and misery prevalent among their policy-holders, as it is prevalent among all the workers, or perhaps they do—by "only" taking \$25,000 per year increase each! And yet, the naive public continues to believe that private insurance companies are better than fraternal societies.

Wage cuts are general everywhere for the workers, and propaganda for further wage cuts for all the workers is being assiduously broadcast and executed. One of the main "arguments" is that wage cuts are "needed"—to protect the investments of the employers. But we are sure that wage cuts most certainly will not bring back "better times." The propagandists think that all employes wages should be slashed to enable the fat boys of big business to eke out a miserable existence on a bare \$200,000, \$300,000 and more per year.

The salaries the fraternal societies are paying to their officials and employes can in no way be compared to the salaries received by the officials and employes of the private insurance companies. The fraternal societies are mere pikers in this respect. Fraternal societies are maintained and operated in the interest of their members.

The salaries of the SNPJ officials have been cut 15% at the last convention, while the salaries of the SNPJ employes have been slashed even more drastically—20% and more. The delegates to the tenth convention voted themselves \$6.50 per diem.

Two Slave Systems

In all the so-called plans for reviving capitalist system in Europe and America, it to be observed that the central idea is to preserve the right of one man to profit at the expense of others.

If you recall the days just before the Civil War, either from your own personal recollection, or through reading history, you will remember that every conceivable scheme was suggested to "solve" the chattel slave problem and those growing out of it, by still allowing chattel slavery to exist. The right of the slave master to the body of his slave was inviolable and must not be disturbed. That its continuance threatened the existence of the United States was not of so much concern as the right of the master to the wealth his slave could dig out of the ground. But it was found that the panaceas did not work, and the inevitable climax was reached in the terrible Civil War that devastated the nation and bankrupted the South.

Today there is much that is analogous to the times before the Civil War.

We have wage slavery instead of chattel slavery. The slave-holding South was facing bankruptcy because of the obsolete slave system of producing wealth—but the slave owners did not recognize this fact. Had they seen as clearly what slavery would do to them, Helper, a southerner, did at the time he wrote his Crisis, in 1857, they might have saved themselves billions of wealth and hundreds of the sands of lives and such agony as few nations had been called upon to endure up to that time. Today the United States is facing bankruptcy due to a faulty system of distribution. We have the machinery to produce, and the skill to operate the machinery—but the channels of distribution are clogged by the "profit" system.

It was this faulty system of distribution that plunged the nations into the bloody Civil War. The aftermath of that struggle is still with us—bringing disaster after disaster. It is too much to hope that the owners of the machinery of production and distribution, which today corresponds to the chattel slave of antebellum days—will see the disaster which threatens the nation, and voluntarily relinquish their ownership to the workers. Panacea today, as before the Civil War, will not solve the pressing problem. Progress—in the form of masterful youth—marches on with unimpeded tread, and the next step is with us on the unfolding scroll of time. Only the blind do not see!—The American Freeman.

Bunks For Graduates

We wonder what line of bunk the speakers at commencement exercises will spring on the graduates this year.

It is customary for alleged notables of types to be invited to give commencement addresses. Now and then a thinker slips in by accident or design, but many of the speakers are hardshell conservatives who are careful not to lead the graduates onward a fraction of an inch.

It will be hard to glorify things as they are this year.

The students know that most of the graduates of 1932 are still looking for jobs. They know that they themselves—all but about 10 per cent of them—are about to enter the army of the unemployed. It is a poor time for the artists to try to impress them with the beauties of rugged individualism and the capitalist brand of equal opportunity. There is no perceptible rugged individualism in a breadline and equality of opportunity in outdoor relief is not exactly thrilling to the youthful mind.

Last year some of the bunk shooters resorted to praise of Mussolini and more or less veiled assertions that we need a similar dictator for this country. Perhaps they will laud Hitler to the skies this year. Anything to get away from the facts as they exist.

A percentage of graduates will fall for what ever is said to them by respectable and influential speakers; but a great many of the young people are thinking for themselves now, and will not listen with patience to any of the old lines of bunk. This is one of the few blessings which have come out of the depression.

Like other groups, the graduates cannot solve this problem alone, but they can be a powerful factor in solving it. Their brains and their vigor should be enlisted, not only to overcome the immediate obstacles, but also to change this brutal social system into a brotherhood in which all will have suitable employment—a matter of course.—Milwaukee Leader.

The Peoples' State Relief March

Cleveland, O.—Starvation is rampant in this State. Only 12% of the jobless receive relief of any kind, while the farmers and small home owners and part time workers are not considered by the relief agencies.

The amount of relief received in the State of Ohio is among the lowest in the United States. In Cleveland, the average relief per family is \$19.55 a month, and in parts of Eastern Ohio, the average is as low as \$6 a month.

Gas, electricity, water and rent, are not included in relief. These are being cut off and people are being thrown on the streets. Roosevelt's inflation has resulted in increasing prices on all commodities, with no increase in wages or relief. Governor White proposes a tax which passes the burden from the rich to the poor by taxing everything the workers must buy.

Whenever the needy demand more relief from the local relief agencies, they are invariably met with buck passing statements to the effect that the State laws will not permit it. Therefore, knowing that relief will not be provided and that the demands of the common people, be they workers, farmers, or small home owners, will not be provided unless we organize to obtain it.

So in order to get adequate relief and Unemployment Insurance, the State Action Committee, which was elected at Columbus at the United Front Conference for Unemployment Insurance, January 9, 1933, together with the Unemployed Council has called the Peoples' Relief March on the State Capitol. All working people, irrespective of political opinion or organizational affiliation or religion should support and take part in this mighty movement of the unemployed and part-time workers and present our demands to the State Legislature on June 25 at Columbus, Ohio.

- The main demands of the marchers will be:—
1. More Relief and Unemployment Insurance at the expense of the State and employers.
 2. Against forced labor! Relief for jobless youth! Public works with free labor at union pay!
 3. No evictions! Rent, gas and electric to be paid for the unemployed.
 4. Stop persecution and discrimination against foreign born and Negro workers.
 5. Moratorium on debts and taxes for small farm and home owners.
 6. Defeat the sales tax!

A CENTURY OF PROGRESS

At a distance in many places on the shores of Lake Michigan in the great city of Chicago, you can see the glistening and sparkling of many bright colors in the sun. The World's Fair was opened on May 27 and will last until November. A showing of a progress that has brought the world to the wonderful advance since 1833 to our present day.

The first thing that will attract your attention if you visit the place, even at a distance, is the huge Sky Ride. Two huge towers stand apart from each other 1850 feet. They rise to an elevation higher than any other building in Chicago, 628 feet, with observation floors atop them. This is 100 feet higher than the Washington monument in Washington, D. C. At 200 feet rocket cars offer you a thrilling ride across the lagoon. The towers and rocket cars can handle as high as 5,000 visitors per hour. At night huge searchlights rotate at the extreme top of these towers to mingle with other lights of the fair. This is considered as one of the many marvelous feats of American engineering, and to show confidence that such will be the world's way of traveling in the future years to come, five of America's largest constructing companies undertook the job in building this Sky Ride for the World's Fair.

And now let us enter the huge fairgrounds and go into one of the most beautiful and largest buildings, Hall of Science. Two floors are used in exhibiting the seven basic sciences, mathematics, astronomy, physics, chemistry, biology, geology and medicine. As a person enters on the ground floor into one of the large rooms he is confronted by an illustrated story of mathematics, through the ages. Some of the mathematical inventions, or how mathematics play an important part in our daily work is displayed. You can see how trigonometry is used in navigation, a machine that depicts curves formed by ball bearings, another which utilizes the beam of light and a photo-electric cell to determine the prime factors of numbers, and still another device which makes simple harmonic curves. The Heterodyne of radio is one of the many interesting curves produced. Exhibits by the U. S. Naval Observatory show how the correct time is obtained and transmitted. Through the courtesy of Italy implements used in the discovery of wireless by Marconi can be seen. These are only few examples of mathematics that are shown, many more can be studied with much interest.

From the mathematical department we enter into the department of Physics. Here are some of the questions you can have answered by seeing machinery in motion and other exhibitions. Why and how tires hold so much weight? Why steam exerts pressure when in contact with heated water? How do electric powers produce cold in refrigerators? How are sound waves produced, how do they travel, how do speech sounds differ, and how are sound films produced? In the electrical industry we find how fundamental the dynamo, the transformer, and the motor are. We learn that the frequency of green light is higher than red. Another exhibit shows us how we know that the wave length of light is about twenty millionths of an inch. The photoelectric cell or the "electric eye" found by the scientific research is another interesting spectacle. You might wish to know that without the photoelectric cell television would be impossible. Many other physical phenomena we leave untold as we enter a large brightly colored room on the second floor.

The first thing that will surely catch your eye will be two large exhibits in the form of a ball on a main axis. The bottom exhibit is a steel sphere in which William Beebe and his companion descended and explored the ocean one half mile below the surface. The upper globe is the very same one that August Picard used to ascend ten miles from the earth into the stratosphere. It is interesting to see just how these two wonders are made. Next we come to our "Mother Earth," or it should be said a large ten foot rotating replica of mother Earth. On this sphere it can be noticed where our common chemicals and raw materials come from. A better view can be made from a balcony just next to this exhibit.

Just how would you like to see a model of an atom or a gyroscopic compass? These two can be seen with four other exhibits in the very same room. Under the balcony, space is provided for the chemical

section. Many and various methods of producing the three types of chemical changes, by combination, by separation, and by exchange, are shown. More interesting facts are the demonstration of the development of petroleum from a dirty oily substance to a clean white gasoline, the change of raw rubber to finished rubber goods, and even the chemical utilization of our foods in our bodies is portrayed in a manner that is easy to understand. Two other features of the physical department are, a miniature operating plant that shows just how phosphorus is made actually and what phosphorus is used for. The other is the showing through what sort of rock, oil wells must be drilled through to get to oil and how the oil settles beneath the rock.

The science of life section contains a mechanical apparatus that shows the growth of a bass-wood twig seven and one-half feet in diameter. The visitor is able to see a year's growth in seventy five seconds. The demonstration is conducted by means of a series of plates and canvases on a moving model, showing the direction and amount of growth of wood.

Another interesting figure to see in action is the human body actually at work. The heart with its series of valves pumping blood into circulation. The mechanical reproduction of a digestive system shows the visitor the way food is absorbed and digested by the different organisms.

No doubt, if you have studied biology in your school days you have also read the change that caterpillar must go through in order to become a beautiful butterfly. This you can see by means of a movie which is greatly magnified, a caterpillar in the art of feeding on the silk threads of wood, the change into a cocoon, from which the fully grown butterfly emerges to fly at once to the nearest flowers.

In the geological section we find just how the beautiful landscape and geography has been formed by erosion of rivers of ice, by deposits of earth by a river, and by shearing and compressional forces still operating over a large area. This is all seen by a "Clock of Ages" which ticks off two billion years of the earth's history. On the face of the clock pictures appear on a screen and each one is described in detail by a synchronized phonographic record. The earth features of Yellowstone geysers and the Grand Canyon can be seen in a similar way. Other exhibits show the wonderful modern methods that man uses to enable him to locate raw materials beneath the earth's surface. Science can be seen connected with human being wherever he may turn. Actual process of the different forms of science is seen from their gathering to a finished product. The majority of visitors to the world's fair have never seen a rubber tree. One is on display with rubber latex flowing from it. In another section the actual process of rubber making is shown.

Banking Dictators Notify Congress They'll Not Tolerate Union Labor

From the upper reaches of the American financial throne has come an imperial order to the Senate Finance Committee at Washington.

The industry stands positively for the open shop; it is unalterably opposed to the closed shop, said Lamont, spokesman for the Morgan-dominated iron and steel kings.

On May 27 the Senate passed the Emergency Rail Coordination Bill which carries a labor clause and the House committee has also approved this clause.

No judge or trustee acting under this Act shall deny or in any way question the right of employes on the property under his jurisdiction to join the labor organizations of their choice.

pany unions, or to influence or coerce employes in an effort to induce them to join or remain members of such company unions.

Here is the Senate on record in favor of organization of workers on the railways and against any form of coercion in support of company unions.

The steel industry in many ways is the dominating industry of the nation. Since the bloody Homestead struggle of some forty years ago organization of workers has been outlawed in all but some independent plants.

In no industry are spies so thick as in the steel empire of the Morgans. They are maintained to weed out any workers who try to organize.

It remains to be seen whether the imperial tax-dodgers, those who order wage slashes in industry, dictate policies to local governments and take care of high politicians with stocks offered far below the market rate.

The steel kings will not tolerate an organized working class; a Socialist Commonwealth would end the impudent reign of these kings.

President Roosevelt recently made public his plan for exchange and control of gold currency. From his report, and especially from the report of the federal treasury, shows a recovery of only six hundred million dollars in gold and gold certificates to the treasury, while people, organizations and banks still have in their possession over ONE BILLION dollars in gold and gold certificates!

One BILLION dollars in gold still in the hands of private citizens! Roosevelt is somewhat drastic in his actions. A heavy penalty to the offenders: TEN YEARS IMPRISONMENT or \$10,000 FINE OR BOTH!

Persons having less than one hundred dollars in gold currency or certificates, may hold same. What exceeds this amount, must be returned and exchanged. This provisional exception is made because of persons holding gold coins as a token of remembrance, etc., and therefore will not part with it at any price.

Only 2 cents went for purposes which the budget bureau describes as follows: "The promotion and regulation of commerce and industry, education, labor interests, air and land transportation, fisheries, and general science and research."

The Growth of Juvenile Crime

Juvenile delinquency in New York City has increased 50 per cent in the last year, according to a report of the Boy Scout Foundation. Fifty-five per cent of the crimes in one borough in that period were committed by boys under twenty.

"The increase of crime among our boys is appalling," declared District Attorney James T. Hallinan of Queens.

"I believe it is due to economic conditions which divert parents' attention from the activities of the boys. The parents have their own pressing problems, and the boys naturally join street gangs."

Mr. Hallinan's explanation is the right one; but he might have gone further. When a boy's family is on or near the breadline, when his father is discouraged, his mother in tears, and not a dime can be spared for amusements, what can he join except a street gang?

The real wonder is that these gangs do not always go wrong, and that the increase in juvenile crime is not greater. That so many youngsters are coming unspoiled though not unscarred through the depression is a tribute to the essential rightness of youth.

Inquiry in Chicago and other cities revealed long ago that most young offenders come from the ranks of "under-privileged boys," as the social workers call them. In times like these, nine-tenths of the lads of a city are underprivileged. If we hope to stop the growth of juvenile crime, we must remove the economic cause.

War Clouds Lift

Certainly the last few days have seen a great lifting of the war clouds. Hitler's speech was—for him—rather reasonable and pacific. It was followed rapidly by a four-power agreement between England, France, Germany and Italy to keep the peace and then by the promise of the United States through Norman H. Davis at Geneva to take part in a consultative pact for dealing with an aggressor nation.

It would be a great error, however, to think that this means that the sun of peace will never again be dimmed. Neither their characters, their records nor their philosophies make Mussolini and Hitler guarantors of peace. The nationalism they profess and are obliged to keep on professing in order to drug the workers is itself opposed to a sure and reasonable peace.

The plain truth is that we are still too near the World War for any nation likely to contemplate a renewal of such struggle. Each year is likely to dim the memory. The struggle for peace must be carried on steadily, at home as well as abroad. There is no peace when Socialists and Communists and others are subject to the oppression and indignities heaped upon them in both Italy and Germany. Yet for this the remedy lies in action by the workers, not in pitting nation against nation.

Accursed Craving for Gold

It was to be noticed, in the early days of last March, when a general moratorium was effected on all banks, also payments in gold currency stopped, that the capitalistic press reported high and wide, on how the faithful citizens were returning their gold currency into the reserve banks. "Hoarded gold is being recovered!" "Gold is returning to the treasury! So and so much every day!" So ran the headlines in an average capitalist newspaper.

Socialists were aware of these capitalistic lies. They told the people that the reports were false. They stated that the headlines and news appearing in the capitalist press, pertaining to the salvaged gold, was merely a propaganda to effect the recovery of gold, which is truly hoarded by the many individuals. They were not mistaken in their contentions. The people were not returning their gold into the reserve banks, nor in such huge amounts, as was stated by the capitalistic press.

Where the U. S. Tax Money Goes

Out of each dollar of the approximately four billions spent by the government in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1933,—

29 cents went for national debt. 27 cents went for war pensions and care of veterans.

16 cents went for military and naval purposes.

(In other words, 72 cents out of every dollar went for military expenses of some sort. Down to the year 1931, the United States national debt was entirely a war debt, and it is nearly all so today. Seventy-two cents out of every dollar went to bind the wounds and pay the debts of past war, or to prepare for future ones.)

9 cents went for public construction, roads, bridges, harbors, etc.

4 cents went to pay the post office deficit.

13 cents went for all the routine functions of government—President, Congress, courts, cabinet, administration of justice, public health service, promotion of agriculture, and some other things.

Only 2 cents went for purposes which the budget bureau describes as follows: "The promotion and regulation of commerce and industry, education, labor interests, air and land transportation, fisheries, and general science and research."

12 States Ratify Child Labor Act

Washington.—New Hampshire became the 12th state to ratify the child labor amendment to the federal constitution, the first to ratify in the industrial East.

The amendment has been before the states since 1924.

It provides that Congress "shall have power to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age." It was passed by both houses of Congress by more than the requisite two-thirds majority and submitted to the state legislatures.

After four states had ratified interest in the amendment on the part of the two old parties suddenly died. Indeed, states that had pledged ratification suddenly forgot all about it. There was a spurt of interest again this year, and eight more legislatures have already ratified.

The roster of states that have ratified the amendment is as follows: Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Montana, Wisconsin, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Washington, Michigan, and New Hampshire.

The Amendment will be numbered the 21st, unless the repeal of prohibition gets 36 ratifications first; in that case it will be the 22nd.
