THE PLEDGE

To the President of the United States, as a living memorial to our late President, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, members of the Supreme Board and the delegates of the 13th National Convention of the Slovenian Women's Union of America, on behalf of themselves and the entire membership of 12,000, offer this pledge:

That we shall freely accept the torch which has been passed on to our generation, that we shall replace all hate with tolerance, all rashness with patience, all bigotry with love, that we shall commit ourselves to the implications of the brotherhood and sisterhood of man under the fatherhood of God, and thereby spread those ideals for which John Fitzgerald Kennedy gave his last full measure of devotion.

The President calls for the reading of reports. President's Report:

Greetings Father Claude Okorn, officers, delegates and friends. My first term as president has passed very fast and it was a pleasure to work with the officers and members as they all co-operated very well.

Duties that I have performed in the past three years I have written in the Zaria every month.

I had charge of the Cleveland Bowling Teams which consisted of 22 to 24 teams; yearly bazaars that are held in Cleveland by the Cleveland branches. Attended the following State Conventions: Minnesota in 1961 and 1962, Pennsylvania in 1961 and 1963, Ohio State Convention in 1961 and 1962 and Illinois in 1961 and 1963.

With State President, Ella Starin, we helped to organize the new branch No. 101 at Bedford, Ohio in 1961.

I also attended the 35th anniversaries of Branches 10, 14, 21 and 25, and visited the following: Br. 6, Barberton, 73, Warrensville Hgts., Ohio and 28, Calumet, Mich.

Congratulations to our Convention Queen, Vicki Faletic of Br. 25, Cleveland, who enrolled 42 new members. She not only was the winner of this last campaign but also in the previous three campaigns, enrolling a total of 198 members. Congratulations also to the runner-ups who put their untiring effort into winning the honor of "princess" titles: Rose Zelodec (50), Ann Podgorsek (33) and Rose Kraemer (43). In the past three years we have enrolled 1099 new members.

Slovenian Women's Union has made history in the past three years which we should all be very proud of — for our Zveza was the first Slovenian group to ever visit the following places with such large groups: 1st. 1961 Trip to Hawaii under the leadership of Frances Chiodo. 2nd. 1961 trip to the Shrines in Canada with Liz Zefran as leader. 3rd. 1962, Three bus convoy of 117 passengers visited the Washington D.C. area, Gettysburg and Immaculate Con-

ception Shrine, in charge were Corinne Leskovar of Chicago and myself. In 1963 we are also on record of having the largest group visit Europe. Sponsoring tours in this way, we are helping our Zveza members to visit countries, shrines and places of interest where they otherwise would never venture by themselves. We also have enrolled a number of new members through all this fine publicity.

We should strive by all means and ways to keep up all ventures of travel, sports, activities for juniors and keep our Zveza going up and let everyone in this wide world know that you are proud to be a member of the one and only Slovenian Women's Union of America.

We better not forget also that our Zveza was the first to help students with funds that they raised into a scholarship fund, to enable students to reach their goal in education. Other Slovenian and Croatian organizations are following in our footsteps.

Let us all work together and keep our beloved Zveza and help to make her progressive in the years to come.

Transferred to the Scholarship Fund

The Scholarship Committee is pleased to have been able to assist, to date, twenty-five young people in continuing their education and reaching their goals. Many and varied interests have been helped: eight teachers, three theology students, two doctors, nurses, accountants and dentists, and one sociologist, engineer, biologist, musician, scientist, and medical technician. The Committee is also indeed grateful for the generous contributions it has received from the public. Mrs. Anna Pachak, State President from Pueblo, Colorado, is the most substantial supporter.

This report would not be complete without mentioning some of my activities. Since the last convention, I attended all the state conventions in Wisconsin and one in Illinois. It was my pleasure to be present at the anniversary celebrations of Branches No. 12, 17. Besides giving the scholarship awards, I also have administered the Benefit Fund and invested Zveza's surplus and gains in the best securities on the market.

Two new projects which I completed were the "History of the Slovenian Women's Union," in English, and an article entitled, "Christmas Customs in Slovenia" which appear in the current edition of our cook book, "Woman's Glory — The Kitchen," of which I am co-editor. I also compiled the history of our organization in Slovenian for the National Library and University of Ljubljana, Slovenia, which will later issue a book on Slovenian immigration to the United States. This history, together with other historical material, was sent to the University of Minnesota Library for their collection on Slovenian immigration to United States.

The Slovenian monthly column, "Oh, Ta Svet," now in its eighteenth year, appears in Zarja. I no longer edit "Pots and Pans and Pastime." This column is now in the hands of my daughter.

I am most happy to see that our treasury is close to the half million mark. To achieve this with our small assessment, and covering the many disbursements, is really an accomplishment. We can be proud of our administration!

On behalf of all of us, I expressed our sincere sympathy to Mrs. John F. Kennedy at the time of the tragic death of her husband, the President of the United States. She replied with a lovely letter of gratitude and enclosed a dear picture of the Kennedy family. (See page 183.)

I am indeed grateful for the friendship and co-operation I have received from the officers and members. I am proud of them and I am proud of the organization! May God bless you all!

The official opening yesterday with Holy Mass and the get-together dinner and program surely must have proven to you that we are all most interested in making the 13th National Convention one which will go into the records as the best so far!

Branch No. 2 of Chicago is blessed with a number of very ambitious and congenial officers and members who have been well-aware of the work involved for a successful outcome and they have given their best for the preparations, realizing that to achieve the goal it takes effort and many sacrifices. On behalf of the entire assembly, I extend heartfelt thanks to everyone for whatever part they have had in planning the convention. Our parish, St. Stephen's, is not a large one because the parishioners have been taking an interest in living in the outskirts were they have more land and better homes and also, many have passed on; however, the present members of St. Stephen's, which have been greatly boosted by the new Americans from Slovenia, have every reason to be very proud of the leadership in the clergy and the younger generation which is contributing in many cultural aspects.

I could mention many individuals for their contributions, but, I'll omit names because those who have given much have done it without thought of reward — rather, to have the satisfaction of seeing the happiness on everyone's face. God will surely bless them and we will keep the memory fresh a long time to come.

To all: A BIG THANK YOU from the depths of our hearts!

This is my twelfth convention, starting with the second one held in Sheboygan in 1930. I began by serving in the Supreme Board in 1930 having had two years of practical experience previously as an organizer and branch officer. Those were the years when we were building, or in other words, "sowing the seed" for a good growing organization. Our Founder, Mrs. Marle Prisland, and those who started from the very beginning will forever remember the many sacrifices that were made for the cultivation of good ground whenever the S.W.U. planted a new root. Time, effort and personal expenses were not counted by the pioneer workers. But, times and conditions over which we have no control, made our work more difficult. No one who lived through the depression will ever forget that money was scarce and it took double-duty work to keep the torch burning. It was at that time that public demonstrations of appreciation became more and more evident. We responded by our own displays of the colorful, uniformed groups that were organized. We spread the good word for our Slovenska Ženska Zveza in every Slovenian community in the United States and also, before the American public. The young ladies of those teams are now homemakers, mothers and even grandmothers; but, the spirit still lives in many of them as we have seen in the wonderful performance of yesterday. Our brave soldiers showed us that the saying "a good soldier never dies" is true also in their minds and hearts. All honor to them — we hope that much of their energy will rub off on their offspring and that three years from now, we will see the younger generation again taking an interest in public demonstrations because we know that it adds to the beauty of our culture and also the good name of S.W.U.

Perhaps the thought of what happened to our drill teams? has entered your minds before. The Second World War is the cause for most of their disappearance and of course, the few leaders we had to promote and carry out the idea of uniformed groups, were greatly overworked. Too much was expected from the same people and successors were not found. I'm hoping now, after seeing the Cleveland members of Br. 50, that the spark still burns and will start a bigger flame so that this spectacular work will again get going.

Before assuming the office of Supreme Secretary, I served in three very important administrative positions. As an auditor, I had the experience of finding out what is the central office and what is administrative work. As an editor, I had the experience of encouraging publicity and creating contacts with members who had the inside news of every branch. As president for six "hard years," I had the top executive experience and it was in 1952 that I took over the office of Secretary that the reins of the big team were really put into my hands. With the knowledge of the business part of our organization as a good basic beginning, I knew that it would be a new era of work for me and that it would take time to get fully acquainted with the work that deals directly with the subordinate branches and secretaries, in other words, the "moneycollectors." Suffice it to say, our secretaries are our mainstay and we could not function without them. I must admit that at the present time, the Home Office is not only dealing with financial reports but as an administrative and counseling office. Most of all, the Supreme Secretary must be a humanitarian to keep the wheels moving while understanding each problem as it comes. There are times when the wheels have to be greased to keep a good motion, but, with the many good mechanics that we have in branches, we somehow keep going . . . There are times, with full speed ahead and then again, with a slow-down, as for instance between campaigns.

Being that our Home Office is actually operated by one person, who had the good fortune of having a family dedicated to Zveza service, no one should judge too fast in criticism or complaint, because there are times when it is physically impossible to do everything at the same time. I have had the patience and good will of many of our secretaries and hope they know I appreciate their friendship and cooperation.

I would like to present a serious thought to you and I hope that you will make full consideration of it. We should have an assistant at least on a part time basis who will acquaint herself with the properties of the Home Office so that the work will be familiar to her in case of sickness or death. I would not wish that anyone would have to come into this job without having someone to help her or guide her. Remember, we are aging and the responsibilities of the office are many. It isn't merely a bookkeeper's job . . . there is much more to it that that. From personal experience, I must state that this realization must be made that we are no longer a small business operation.

This being the time and place for serious business, I wish to mention that my proposal is not a suggestion alone, but a thoughtful appraisal of the situation. I propose that the future Board of Directors be given the authority to make a decision in this respect. You may rest assured that the Directors will not waste any money because they do their work very conscientiously; however, they'll not act on their own rights, although they have them, because

of the possible misunderstanding on the part of the membership.

With all these points in mind, please accept the following suggestion, as it fits in best at this time. There is an absolute necessity of asking the members to contribute two cents per month for the increased expenses for printing official organ, ZARJA. It seemed that the main argument centered around the fact that this increase of 2ϵ was decided after the convention of 1961. The Directors, assuming their rightful authority, felt that it was their duty, not just a privilege, to ask for this small contribution from each member because they were well aware of the State Insurance Department opinion that demands all added or increased expense be distributed, at least in part, among the membership.

The resentment on this decision was based on the argument that the convention should have decided. We were given notice on the increase six months after the convention, just as our December 1961 issue was being printed. Immediately, we consulted with authorities in the printing business, but no one would give us any satisfaction that we could get the same amount and quality of work for a lesser price. There was nowhere to turn for a lift out of this problem. The Dec. issue of Zarja was printed for the old price but from January, 1962 on, we have had to pay the new, additional cost which is over \$6,000.00 per year. At the Feb. 1962 Directors' meeting, many hours of discussion were spent on this increase and the best course agreed upon was that members be asked to contribute a small sum to at least cover one third of the cost. The organization still is paying the remaining two thirds. To take care of the entire increased cost, it would necessitate 75¢ per year from each member. My first suggestion was that we ask for a \$1 contribution from every member and use the extra 25¢ for the cost of having a 32 page issue every month. But, being careful not to excite the membership too much, it was decided that we stay within the very minimum. Time has proven that it would have been almost easier to collect a dollar per year from each member and be able to give them an official publication which would be a pride for the organization and the best publicity in getting new members. I do not know that by being economical we are wisest. I believe that if every member were asked, the majority would take the larger Zarja for a dollar a year increase, for they'd realize they would be getting their money's worth. Our S.W.U. has the most popular official organ of any similar organization and if anything is going to be added to our program for the real benefit of the membership, it should be the continuation and expansion of Zarja, and to make it yet finer and appealing. We must not be afraid to approach our members for something that is worthwhile and needed for the promotion of our growth because as things are now, the future depends solely on the solicitation of new, young members and it is our solemn obligation and duty as true representatives of the entire membership to do everything we know to make S.W.U. known and still more popular among the Catholic element in the U.S.A.

The point that comes in order now is the decreased assessment of members attaining the age of 75 years and the free assessment for those over 80 years. There are times when we let our hearts rule our minds. Such was the case when we let generosity take hold of us. It is known fact and statistics prove it, that the average age for us mortals is much higher than it was ten years ago when the decision for free assessment was made.

At the present time, we have 712 members who pay only 15ϕ in the mortuary fund and nothing to the expense fund and 310 members who pay nothing at all. Of the 713 members there are at least 300 who will be 80 years old this year. This takes a big slice out of our monthly income. The State Insurance Dept. Examiners have cautioned us against this article in our by-laws and I had to make them a promise that this convention in 1964 will dissolve this amendment to the article on dues. In fact,

they are of the opinion that the dues are too low and should be at least 50ϕ per month for every Class A member. They base this on the fact that we are offering our members protection, a social and cultural activity through our programs and mostly because the age average is getting higher and the provision for the solidity of our funds must be our main concern if we are to continue in operation.

In the past three years, we successfully sailed through three campaigns. The Post-Convention campaign enrolled 430 members. The top honors went to Vicki Faletic, who was credited with 82 members, and branch 25 was thereby the first place winner. The Supreme President's Campaign which followed, enrolled 339 members. In first place among workers again was Vicki Faletic with a total of 42 new members which again brought first place honors to Br. 25. The Convention Queen Campaign which closed March 31st enrolled 373 members. The title of Convention Queen belongs to Vicki Faletic of Br. 25 with 42 new members. As has been the regulation of previous campaigns, the workers who enrolled 25 members or more were honored with the title "Princess." We have three Princesses to honor at this Convention, namely: Ann Podgorsek (32), Rose Kraemer (43) and Rose Zelodec (50) through whose hard work and efforts the branch was increased considerably. The total of new members enrolled by workers of Br. 50 is 62 members which brings their membership to 202 at the close of the recent campaign. They counted only 116 in Jan. 1961. This increase in membership of 88 members is an achievement worthwhile complimenting in the highest manner! Adding to these totals the new members solicited between campaigns, we can report 1,300 new members enrolled in three years! To all who have helped in the progress of our membership, goes our deepest gratitude. If there were only more such good and faithful workers! The campaign awards were paid in the amount of \$850,70.

Death has also visited the homes of 516 members. This number is counted as of Dec. 1963. We have lost 65 members since then among them, our very worthy member, Mrs. Barbara Kramer of Br. 13 in San Francisco. She wished more than any other person, to be in Chicago for the 13th National Convention because number 13 meant more to her than almost anything. But, God called her from our midst on Feb. 27, 1964 and she is now looking down on us and surely wishing us best and hoping that the work of the pioneer officers will be recognized with honor.

An amount of \$54,025.00 has been paid to the 516 claims. These were 480 in Class A, 33 in Class B and 3 Juveniles. A solemn memorial tribute will be presented on Tuesday evening of the Convention. May their souls rest in peace everlasting.

Every year, for some years back, an annual award of .05 per member is mailed to the secretaries who have striven to keep their membership in good standing. Secretaries in small branches receive a very nominal amount but it shows our good will to them and we receive letters of appreciation from many. In the three years, these awards amounted to \$1,793.45 which is actually small in comparison with the actual service our secretaries render. They deserve to be remembered in this special way.

Bowling is the only sport that is very much alive among our members. There are two main tournaments, one for the Midwestern section that brings over 35 teams together annually and the other the Eastern Tourney for that section which actually sponsors an adult and junior tournament. We have given \$1,594.00 in prize money to these Tournaments. Officers active in this sport include Director, Eliz. Zefran, herself an ardent bowler who takes a great interest in the sport. Branch 2 of which she is an officer has ten teams in its regular bowling league. It's no simple matter to manage a sports club of this size and Mrs. Zefran holds the group together nicely. Our Supr. President, Mrs. Toni Turek, another champ in bowling is certainly doing her part in Cleveland and so is Mrs. Pauljne Vegal among the 50 junior bowlers. Let's hope that

this convention will formulate an interesting program for the sports minded members, both young and old.

Our office has tried to keep the administrative expenses down to a minimum. Nothing new has been installed in equipment during last three years. However, the regular expenses for supplies and postage were only for the absolute necessities.

As secretary of the Finance Committee, Mrs. Prisland has prepared the report on investments. There is no need in repeating these figures as they are accurately reported by her. She works untiringly for the welfare of the organization and sees to it that our investments are made in the very best institutions where they receive the highest interest and at the same time, deposited and held in institutions which are good and sound.

The work involved in editing and publishing our cookbook, Woman's Glory - the Kitchen, until the convention of 1961 was all that I wanted to have a part in, because it's no small job and most of all, I detested the work of handling, that is, mailing and distributing the books. I resolved at that time that I was completely through with this work. However, when the stock was depleted and orders kept coming in, the thoughts on another supply of cookbooks began to grow again. President, Toni Turek felt that we should start the ball rolling on another printing because she, too, was receiving so many requests in Ohio. At the Directors meeting in 1962, the urge for another book spread to all present. But, to make the book a more wanted one, the deliberation on a revised edition became a reality. Mrs. Prisland was assigned to gather some new material and since the material in the previous book was still very popular, we decided to use it - or a good portion of it. It took months and months of work to get everything in order and the book, as you know, was ready for the market around Christmastime. Since Woman's Glory - The Kitchen is not merely a seasonable book, the popularity of it is endless. When the supply that was ordered will be sold out, we should net a substantial gain for our great cause.

Some of the branches, that is, individual officers and members, are wonderful salespeople. We only wish that their big help would rub off on other officers and members. There is no reason why every member isn't a promotor of our cookbook because it is one of the best on the market. Mrs. Prisland and I are very proud of the work put into the book and we are also thankful to President, Toni Turek for taking over the job of distribution. If more members would do as much good for the organization as do a few, what big progress we would all enjoy! It could be done. The old proverb: "Where there's a will there's a way!" still counts in this world!

putation of S.W.U. in our city as around the coutry. On behalf of the committee, entertainers and workers, thank you for your grand reception of our efforts.

As your editor for the past twelve years, I have come to know the feeling of our members through close contacts with reporters and officers who assume double-duty in reporting for Zarja as well as serving in their offices. The President calls for the convention to come to order at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, May 19, 1964 at the Embassy Room. Invocation is given by Rev. Claude Okorn.

Minutes of the previous day's proceedings are read by the recording secretaries, A. Novak and C. Leskovar. They are accepted as read.

The President calls for the report of the Greetings committee. The President, Rose Kraemer (43) and Sec'y, Stephanie Ryan (28) report that greetings from the convention were sent to the following:

The Secretary, Mrs. Novak shows the new Memorial Plaque designed for the organization for use at the funerals of departed members. She explains how the idea came about to use this type of memorial and the way the design was decided by herself and the editor. The plaque is free standing and engraved "In Loving Memory" - "V blag spomin" and shows the emblem of the organization in a gold frame standing on a walnut base. The Union will supply every branch with as many of these plaques as needed for their locality so that each funeral director will have one to place near the bier of a departed member of S.W.U. Scattered districts will have other provisions for the keeping of the plaque - for instance it may be kept with the officer in charge and placed at the time of need. The delegation is very much in favor of the idea and admire the beauty of the plaque, approving wholeheartedly with the idea.

The Secretary then explains the procedure for the Wednesday morning Memorial Mass at 10:00 a.m. at St. Peter's Church across the street from the Morrison Hotel when the Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago, Most Rev. Aloysious J. Wycislo will offer a mass in memory of our departed members. She shows mass cards which have been prepared at the Home Office for each delegate to carry to the mass. On the cards are names of the deceased members of each branch in the past three years. The names are to be remembered during the mass and cards may be taken home and given to the branch for further remembrance. The delegates also approve this means of memorial for the deceased members.

The President calls for the report of the Resolutions

Committee. President of the Committee, Marie Floryan gives the following report. A recommended resolution was sent to the following governmental officials: Hon. John A. Blatnick, M.C., Hon. Frank J. Lausche, U.S. Senator, Hon. Michael J. Feighan, M.C., Hon. Roland Libonati, M.C., Hon. Paul H. Douglas, U.S. Senator, Hon. Everett M. Dirkson, U.S. Senator. The resolution is as follows:

The Slovenian Women's Union of America, an educational and benefit organization, convening in Chicago, Illinois for their 13th National Tri-enniel convention representing 13,000 Catholic women throughout the United States.

We kindly submit the proposals accepted at our first Convention meeting, May 18, 1964 and ask your support of them when legislation is before Congress.

- 1. An appeal for the aged. There are many elderly people who are in need of medical aid through a plan which would benefit them under the Social Security Act.
- 2. The establishment of Trade Schools and Free training facilities and centers in every major city for the Youth who need guidance.
- Enact legislation to prevent pollution of the air and water by harmful industrial wastes and fumes which are endangering human beings, plants and wild life.
- Conserve our national resources, forests, farm lands, water supplies, and national parks.

It was moved by Stella Dancull (21) and seconded by Rose Scoff (13) that the resolution be adopted. It was carried.

The President calls for the report of the By-Laws Committee. The President of the committee, Marie Prisland, gives the following report:

By-Laws Committee Report:

The By-Laws throughout the years have required many changes and additions to keep the organization abreast of times. At this time, however, not many changes are needed and the most important revision concerns the organization's investment program. The investment by-laws reads as follows:

Article 89: "The Finance Committee shall invest the Union's funds into reliable banks, in State and Government bonds, in Catholic institutional securities, in Mutual Funds and in such institutions where investments are insured by the Government" . . . meaning Savings and Loan Associations.

The Finance Committee, — especially the secretary, — is responsible for all investments. Of course, we are under the supervision of the insurance department of the State of Illinois under whose laws Zveza is incorporated. We are limited to purchase only those securities which are prescribed for organizations such as ours. A few years ago, bonds of religious institutions were not permissible, but mutual funds investments were. Now that is changed. Mutual shares are not permissive investments while Catholic bonds are. The following are the kinds of bonds we can buy today:

1. We can invest without limitation in United States Government bonds. The interest rate of 3-4% is a little lower than in some other investments. We have invested at least one-fourth of our total assets in United States Government bonds since this is our patriotic duty regardless of interest yield.

2. We can invest any sum of money into State bonds which carry direct obligation; that is, where the state has direct responsibility through its tax laws. The interest rate of 3.31/2% is also low.

3. Savings and Loan Associations, which carry Government insurance of \$10,000 are permissible investments and there are no limitations on the amount of investment. These are our good interest producing investments with rates of 4-4%%.

4. The allowable single investment in bonds issued by religious institutions is 2% of total assets. That is why we do not hold more than \$10,000 of any one issue. In this type of bonds we can invest only 23% of the total of Zveza's assets. At present it will mean about \$150,000 can be invested. We now hold close to \$100,000 of these securities and have only \$50,000 to go to the limit. These bonds bring us the best interest of from 4%-5½%.

5. Public utility bonds include such companies as gas, electric, telephone, etc. We can invest 2% of our assets or \$10,000 in any one issue. The limitation is 33% of our total assets. Interest from these bonds vary from 4-4%% for long term investment. Very long term investments are questionable since we do not know how much the dollar will be worth thirty years from now. The maturity of our present investments does not exceed fifteen years.

6. City, Village and County bonds which carry direct obligation are good investments, but carry low interest of only 3-31/4%. Sometimes we can buy these under par—that is, below a hundred—which increases the interest rate.

To insure a continued program of safe and good yielding investments for the future, we propose that article 89 be amended to include investments in public utilities and city and county bonds. Article 89 should be amended as follows:

"The Finance Committee shall invest Union's funds in reliable banks, United States Government and State Securities, in Catholic institutional bonds, in Savings and Loan Associations which carry \$10,000 government insurance, in high rated public utility bonds and in city and county bonds which carry direct obligation."

By "high rated" public utility bonds it is meant that all bonds, including Catholic bonds on the market, are rated even if they are not sold on the Wall Street market. The highest rating by "Standard and Poor" is AAA (prime), AA (high grade), A (sound). Then comes BBB (medium grade), BB (lower grade), B (speculative). The bonds rated CCC, CC, and C are also on the market which are sometime risky investments.

All our bonds are highly rated and carry direct obligation to protect Zveza's investments. So far we have not lost one cent in bonds during these 37 years, but have made good profits when bonds were sold.

Mrs. Prisland moved that the amendment of Article 89 be adopted. The motion was seconded by Josephine Zeleznikar, Supreme Treasurer, and carried.

Further changes in the by-laws were proposed as follows:

Article 50 A — The last paragraph should be omitted since the Benefit Fund is now closed.

Article 105 — The first sentence of this article should read: "The right of membership shall begin on the first day of the month when the member is accepted by the Branch and at that time, her assessment is paid."

Article 112. Assessments.

The By-Laws committee offered three proposals for convention's consideration:

- 1). A raise of 5 cents per month per member of Class A and B. The present 25 cents special yearly assessment shall be deleted, reducing the raise to only 3 cents per month. Members will pay full assessment until they rich 75 years of age. After that they will pay for Zarja and administrative expenses 20 cents per month for the rest of their life membership. Zarja will not be altered but will be issued as of now: 6 issues on 32 pages and 6 issues on 16 pages.
- 2). The present 25 cents extra assessment remains. All members will pay full assessment until they reach 80 years of age. After that they pay 25 cents monthly for Zarja and administrative costs as long as they are members. Zarja would be 16 pages for 10 months and 32 pages only in May and December.
- 3). No raises in the assessment and no 25 cents extra assessment per year, but all members pay full assessment as long as they are members. There will be no free as-

sessment for anyone and no cut-off at 80 years. (Insurance department of the State of Illinois, where Zveza is incorporated, does not approve of free assessments into expense funds). Zarja will be decreased to only 16 pages per month.

4). The membership which now pays 15 cents at 75 years of age would keep on paying this amount as long as they are members. Those who are now free of assessment after 80 years will remain free. All those, being 75 years this month, (May 1, 1964), and after, should comply with the new laws.

Mrs. Prisland gave the following information which bears on these proposals:

Members are now paying ten cents per month for Zarja with their regular assessment, which amounts to \$10,105 per year. This covers only two-thirds of Zarja's expenses since the present cost of Zarja is \$15,600 per year excluding editor's salary. The 25 cents per member special yearly assessment amounts to \$2,200 per year, leaving \$3,000 deficit. Five cents additional assessment per month per member — if adopted — will bring in \$5,100 a year which with the 10 cents present assessment will just about cover Zarja's present printing and mailing costs.

The president opened the discussion of the three proposals of the assessment as offered by the By-Laws Committee.

Mrs. Golinski, secretary of By-Laws Committee, read the proposals and Mrs. Prisland explained thoroughly each proposal. She reported that the By-Laws Committee voted the adoption of proposal No. 2. providing that every member will pay the extra 25 cents per year. According to the report of the supreme secretary only half of the membership has paid that extra essessment. In that case Article 113, must be enforced, which reads: "Any extra assessment must be paid by each member or her regular assessment is not accepted."

The delegation recommended that proposals No. 1 and No. 2 be discussed. Recommendation No. 3 did not receive vocal support. Since the majority of delegates are secretaries at their branches they were of the opinion that it will be much easier to collect a raised assessment then the extra 25 cents per year now in force. Many members pay the assessment once a year - some by mail - and an extra contact must be made for the additional 25 cents which they forget to pay. Being evident from the supreme secretary's report that only half of the membership has paid the extra 25 cents, this has resulted in mounting the deficit in expense fund. The delegation is also fully aware of the trend of times and the higher cost of publication. The final vote was 64 for increased assessment and 5 against, with an expressed wish to keep Zarja in the same proportion as now.

The raise of assessment of 5 cents goes into effect on January 1, 1965.

Proposal No. 4 will become law effectively May 1, 1964. Article 115. Proposed that two last sentences be delated and the following inserted as replacement: "After a member reaches 75 years of age she shall pay — for Zarja and administrative expenses — 20 cents per month for the duration of her membership."

Article 195 will be changed to conform with date and place of the next national convention.

It was moved by delegate Mary Otonicar (25) that all the changes and amendments as proposed by the By-Laws Committee be adopted. The motion was seconded by delegate Anna Modiz (1) and carried.

The president thanked the By-Laws Committee for its diligent work and then discharged them from further duties.

The meeting is adjourned at 12 noon for luncheon.

SIMPLICITY IN PRAYER

A man's prayer should be simple. We should appear before God as we are without pretension. While praying we should think about God and not about ourselves.

Three young men discussed prayer.

"My ideal of prayer," said one, "would be to lie out here in the sun, day after day and away from all contact with the world, and contemplate the Being of God. Just the sky and the sea and my own soul. No exams to work for, no piano practices, no manual labor . . . nothing. The very occasional flight of a gull and gentle lapping of waves would be a help rather than a distraction: they would take the mind on from the natural to the supernatural, from space and time to limitless eternity. What about you two?"

"To me the ideal would be," said the second member of the group, "to get myself bricked up in a sort of niche or very small tribune overlooking the Blessed Sacrament exposed. And it would have to be so arranged that nobody could see me and that I could see nobody else. And there should not be any bells, any calls . . . nothing. And you?"

"I would like to be locked in a cabin trunk," said the third man, "with just enough air to allow me to breath. I have to be very ill — aching in every limb with the fever of some sort and raging temperature — but still not quite unconscious or delirious. I would need just enough presence of mind to accept my condition as the will of God and unite my little discomfort with the Passion of our Lord. Yes, I think that's all. Except that to complete the picture I would have to have the guilty feeling that somehow it was my fault, and that really I should be doing my garden work or going to shop or sitting down to study or answering bells."

Well, that was all very nice. But each man was seeing prayer in terms of himself and as reflection of himself. And a prayer is raising heart and mind to God.

The three men in question would have given a far more accurate picture if they had deliberately avoided projecting themselves. They would probably agree today in their middle-age, that prayer is a very different business from feeling remote from the world, concentrated on the Blessed Sacrament, or resigned to considerable discomfort. Far better take the lead of the Gospel and the saints: forget about your reaction altogether, and if you are making the use of mental images, be sure that they are drawn from the things which have no feelings. Nothing misleads like feeling. Given a chance, it can spoil almost anything.





SUMMERTIME

Eating outdoors is fun. A few food preparations pointers are:

 Salad vegetables travel well in a crisper pan or plastic bag with some ice cubes.

2. If you are cooking over a fire, rub soap on the outside of cooking vessels. The soot from the campfire will wash off more easily.

3. Plan a well balanced meal. A meal of hot dogs, buns, potato chips, pickles, frosted cakes and cokes may appeal to young appetites, but it doesn't supply its share of the basic food needs for the day. Add some vegetables such as carrot and celery sticks, green pepper strips, fresh tomatoes, cucumbers or lettuce. Milk or fruit juice and fresh fruit all add to the nutritional value.

Don't heat unopened cans of food
 they may explode.

Sandwiches taste better if made on the spot. They will be fresher and each person can make his own.

6. According to Col. Edgar W. Garbisch, chairman of National Barbecue month suggests these barbecue tips:

Line bottom of grill with two thicknesses of heavy duty Reynolds Wrap, and place fuel in center of foil. Allow fire to burn 10 to 15 minutes, or until briquets are covered with a fine white ash, before starting to cook. Later — gather up ashes in foil, after using, for easier cleaning.

Brush meat before and during cooking with Kitchen Bouquet, to seal in flavors and add tempting, mouth watering color. Have can of baking soda handy to fight flareups.

Place grill about 4 inches above coals, unless for quick searing. If placing food directly in fire. wrap in double thickness of foil.

KABOBS

For each person allow:

1/4 pound meat (beef cut into 1 inch

1 slice bacon cut into thirds or fourths ½ medium onion cut lengthwise into thirds or wedges of ½ tomato.

Use long metal skewers, or a green stick of sweet wood about 4 feet long peeled and sharpened at one end. Now "thread" pieces of meat, bacon and onion or tomato alternately on the stick. Broil over coils until cooked through. For well-done meat leave space between the foods. For medium and are meat, pack pieces closer to-

gether. Place between halves of buttered large buns.

Kabob variations:

1 inch cubes of cooked ham and pineapple chunks.

1 inch cubes of lamb soaked for an hour or more in a mixture of 2 tablespoons salad oil, 1 tablespoon vinegar, some onion slices, 1 clove garlic crushed, and a bay leaf. Combine with partially cooked potatoes cut into large chunks. Fresh mushrooms can also be used.

GRILLED STUFFED FRANKFURTERS

12 frankfurters

Prepared mustard

1/4 pound cheddar cheese

2 dill pickles

½ pound bacon, sliced thinly

12 frankfurter rolls

Cut frankfurters lengthwise, almost through but not quite, and spread cut sides with mustard. Slice cheese and pickles into long strips and lay a strip of each in the frankfurters. Wrap slice of bacon around in spiral fashion, fastening the end with toothpicks. Arrange frankfurters, cut side down, on broiling rack and broil 4 to 5 minutes or until bacon is crisp. Turn and broil 5 minutes longer or until cheese starts to melt. Tuck into hot rolls and serve. Stuffed frankfurters can also be baked in oven at 350° until bacon is crisp.

GARLIC BREAD

To ½ cup softened butter add 1 to 2 peeled cloves of mashed garlic. Remove garlic after 30 minutes. Cut crusty French bread diagonally into thick slices down to but not through the bottom crust. Spread garlic butter between slices. Wrap loaf in aluminum foil and place near the fire until warmed 10 minutes or so. Can also be heated in oven at 350° for about 10 minutes. (Delicious).

Mrs. Antonia Turek, our Supreme President from Cleveland, Ohio, shares one of her favorite recipes with us:

2 packages strawberry jello

1 and 1/2 cups of boiling water

1-10 ounce package frozen strawberries and juice

1 small can crushed pineapple and juice

1/2 cup chopped pecans

1 cup sour cream

Dissolve jello in boiling water; add frozen strawberries, pineapple and nuts. Pour half in jello mold (jells fast); set in refrigerator to jell. Pour sour cream over jelled jello. Pour rest of jello on top.

One of the members from Greenwood, Wis. wrote: "I am in the Cafe business. I use your recipes from time to time. I am in need of a recipe for chocolate covered frozen bananas. I have searched in books, papers, etc., but in vain. Can you help me?"

After telephoning a number of prominent eating places in Madison and a large Dairy Company with no success, in desparation, I finally phoned the home economist at the Madison Gas and Electric Company. She, much to my joy, had a very detailed recipe which she was glad to share. It is as follows:



CHOCOLATE COVERED FROZEN BANANAS

4 ripe bananas

1 - 6 oz. package chocolate chips

1 cup cold water

1 teaspoon ascorbic acid

Peel bananas. Cut in half crosswide. Quickly dip in 1 cup cold water to which has been added 1 teaspoon ascorbic acid (this prevents fruit from darkening; most stores carry it). Then freeze about 3 hours until firm. Melt chocolate chips over hot (not boiling) water. Spread chocolate with knife over each banana half working quickly because chocolate hardens fast. Place on lightly greased baking sheet and return to freezer. When frozen wrap separately in foil or plastic bag getting out as much air as possible. Return to freezer. Serves 8. Store up to one month. To serve: remove from freezer and let stand in refrigerator about 10 to 15 minutes. Serve before completely thawed.

● Sweater of man-made fibers may pill or form small balls of fiber on the surface. The pilling doesn't brush or break off easily because of the strength of the fiber. You can remove the pills by running a safety razor across the surface. To do this place one layer of the sweater over a foam rubber pillow and hold it tight. Use a new blade in the razor and run it carefully across the sweater.

Priporočilo št. 2. — Sedajna naklada 25 centov letno ostane, a plačati jo mora sleherna članica. Članstvo plačuje poln asesment do 80 let starosti, nato pa 25 centov

mesečno za ZARJO in poslovne stroške. ZARJA izide na 16tih straneh 10krat, meseca maja in decembra pa na 32tih straneh.

Priporočilo št. 3. — Asesment ostane kot običajno. Nikakega poviška in nobene naklade. Članstvo plačuje poln asesment do smrti, oziroma za vso člansko dobo. ZARJA izide na 16tih straneh vsak mesec.

Glavna predsednica je odprla razpravo o priporočilih odbora za pravila:

Priporočilo št. 3 ni dobilo odobravanja. Pri priporočilu št. 2 so tajnice delegatke bile mnenja, da bi veliko lažje bilo pobirati zvišan asesment kot letno naklado, na katero članice rade pozabijo.
