IZ PORURJA SE JE IZSELIL 4 DO 5 MILIJONOV LJUDI

Neprestano bombardiranje Nemčije in drugih ozemelj po zavezniški in ameriški zračni sili

VELIKE IZGUBE ZAVEZNISKEGA LETALSTVA

LONDON, sobota, 26. junija. — Angleška zračna sila je srednje zopet bombardirala Nemčijo.

Bej ljudi iz Porurja

London, 25. junija. — Ameriški bombniki so danes zopet razbijali po Nemčiji, kamor so prileteli takoj za napadom angleških bombnikov, ki so bombardirali Porurje, odkoder se je moralno zaradi bombardiranja že izseliti 4 do 5 milijonov ljudi.

Izgube zavezniškega letalstva

Pri snočnjem napadu je bilo izgubljeno 18 ameriških bombnikov, v šestih dneh pa 173 zavezniških letal. Od izgubljenih bombnikov je bilo 38 ameriških, 135 pa angleških. Ta letala so vrgla na Porurje v enem tednu več bomb kot so jih vrgli

Nemci v treh mesecih na Londona za časa svojega najhujšega bombardiranja Anglije.

Težki štirimotorni angl. bombniki so se v sredo ponoči vrnili v Wuppertal, važno nemško industrijsko mesto v Porurju, kjer so vrgli še tisoč ton bomb na ene distrikte, katerim je bilo prizaneseno tekom prejšnjega napada.

Istočasno so udarili ameriški in angleški bombniki na italijanske kraje v Sredozemlju.

Afriška zračna sila je z vso močjo udarila po Siciliji in Sardiniji ter bombardirala letališče osišča v Solunu.

Povročena škoda je bila ogromna. Angleži naznajajo, da so izgubili v teh napadih 33 bombnikov.

Velika zmeda in nervoznost v Italiji, ki se nahaja sedaj med dvema ognjemeta

Črna borba v polnem razmahu. Nezaslišana cena ameriških cigaret. — Nemci kradejo ko srake. — Dežela prihaja z dežja pod kap.

STOCKHOLM, Švedska, 24. junija. — Italijanski narod je do grla sit vojne. On želi izbegati bombardiranju iz zraka, izogniti Mussolinijevi in nacistički tiraniji. Italijanski narod si želi predvsem miru, in še enkrat miru. To so vesti, ki vse pogosteje prihajajo iz Italije.

Razočarano ljudstvo

Razočarani zaradi pomanjkanja živil in nad črno borzo, in dan za dnem bombardirani po zavezniških letalcih, so Italijani izgubili vero v Mussolinija in njegov fašistički režim ter danes željno pričakujejo invazijo zaveznikov, o kateri pričakujejo, da jih bo rešila mizerije.

Med dvema ognjemeta

Italijani se zavedajo, da so med dvema ognjemeta in pravijo: "Ako danes zaprosimo za mir, bodo že jutri nad našimi mestami nemški bombniki ter bodo oni namesto zaveznikov sipali bombe na nas."

V tej vojni konfuziji se Italijani vedno bolj ozirajo na parožje, o katerem upajo, da jih bo na kak način rešil iz njihovega mučnega položaja.

Ali bo Rim bombardiran?

Ker je Vatikan v Rimu in ker se dalje sodi, da iz tega razloga Rim ne bo bombardiran, je to mesto že tako natrpano z ljudmi, ki so priborali tja iz bombardiranih krajev, da se stanovanja sploh več ne dobi, cena živil je silno visoka, poleg tega pa tudi njih zaloge ni zadostna.

LONDON, 24. junija. — Jugoslovanska inteligenčna služba poroča, da je general Draža Mihajlović, vodja jugoslovanskih četnikov, na varnem v srbskih gorah, kamor je pobegnil nacistom, ki so obkolili neko krčmo v Črni gori, kjer je imel v kmetu preoblegen Mihajlović posvet z drugimi voditelji.

General Mihajlović je obvestil svojo vlado, da stori vse, kar je v njegovih moči, da izkira okupatorje iz Jugoslavije.

Na podlagi storije, ki je dosegla semkaj, so našli Nemci v krčmi sedem kmetov, pijočih vino. Eden teh kmetov je bil general Mihajlović, cesar pa Nemci niso vedeli. Nemci so sedili in si tudi sami naročili vina.

Poročilo dalje naznana, da so Nemci preiskali krčmo, toda niso našli v nji ne orožja ne streliča. Nato pa so pregledali dokumente onih sedmih kmetov, kateri dokumenti so bili v redu.

PAŠKO KALITERNA USTRELJEN KOT TALEC

LONDON 21. junija (ONA) — Jugoslovanski krog poročajo, da so Italijani ustrelili enega od interniranih prvakov Hrvatske Kmečke stranke, naravnega poslanika Paško Kaliterina, katerega so vzeli za talca ob prilikah uboja fašističnega podprefekta in sekretarja stranke v Splitu, Giovannija Savo. Sploščani so obračunali s krivočimnim fašistom v mesecu marca.

Kaliterina je bil v internaciji že od začetka italijanske okupacije — za talca pa je bil doloren takoj po smrti Giovannija Savo-a.

GRŠKE "LIDICE"

LONDON, 23. junija. — Mali grški kraj Domeniko v Larissa provinciji je doživel isto usodo iz rok Italijanov kakor kraj Lidičce iz rok Nemcov. Kakor poroča alžirski radio, so Italijani postrelili vse prebivalstvo tega kraja, moške, ženske in otroke, kraj pa porušili in požgali.

SEJA AJPU

Jutri popoldne ob 1:30 uri se v Slovenskem domu na Holmes Ave. vrši važno zborovanje AJPU (glede Primorskega društva). Vsi oni, ki so zainteresirani v akcijo za osvobodenje Primorcev, so vabjeni, da se udeležijo.

Premogarji kljubujejo predsedniku F. D. Rooseveltu

V deželi je zastavalo nadaljnih 20,000 premogarjev. — Od 521,000 premogarjev jih polovica ne dela.

Dočim je predsednik Roosevelt izjavil, da ne bo priznal datumu 31. oktobra kot datumu, da katerega bodo obravljali rovi, so nekatere ljude popoloma pozabili, da se nahajamo v vojni, v kateri so na kocki vse naše ustanove in pridobivte. Predsednik Roosevelt ni še namreč dobro izgovoril svojih misli, ko je zastavalo nadaljnih 20,000 premogarjev.

Stavke so se pričele širiti v Pensylvaniji, kjer je na stavki okoli 145,000 premogarjev od 200,000, ki so v državi.

Pregled položaja vseh ameriških premogarjev izkazuje, da je na stavki še vedno približno polovico od 521,000 premogarjev. Unijski voditelji izjavljajo, da so poslali v premogovno okrožje svoje organizatorje, ki nagovarjajo premogarje, naj se vrnejo nazaj na delo.

O nadaljnem zastoju dela in izostajanja premogarjev od svojega posla, poročajo tudi iz drugih držav.

Koncentracije načistov ob Brennerjevem prelazu

Nemci se boje, da se bo Italija zrušila ob prvem invazijskem sunku zavezničkov.

LONDON, 25. junija. — Nemci koncentrirajo v severni Italiji deset divizij vojaštva, to je približno 150,000 mož, katerih naloga bo, braniti Brennerjev prelaz. Ista poročila naznajajo, da so Nemci v velikih skrbeh, da se bo Italija nemudoma porušila, čim bodo zaveznički izvedli v razvoju dežele.

Iz Sicilije v Sardinije so Nemci že odvedli vse svoje vojaštvo, razen zračne sile.

Nadaljni znaki nervoznosti v Italiji so vidni iz Mussolinijevih izjav, da bo fašistična stranka izključila vse one svoje člane, ki ne bodo v vsemi svojimi močmi služili domovini.

Admiral Otto Ciliax, poveljnik nemške mornarice v Norveški, je izjavil svojemu vojaštvu, da pričakuje, da bodo zaveznički kmalu napadli Norveško.

Boji v Rusiji

LONDON, sobota, 26. junija. — Moskva poroča, da so ruske čete zavzele neki oblijdeni kraj v okraju Velikih Luk, poročila iz Berlina pa naznajajo, da izvaja ruska armada silne napade v tem kraju kakor tudi v okraju Dorogobuža na smolenski fronti, kateri okraj je bil dolgo mireni.

V treh srditih protinapadih so izgubili Nemci 600 mož, ki so bili ubiti, Rusi pa so obdržali vse pridobljeno ozemlje. Rusi so sestrelili Nemcem trinajst letal.

KONGRES NEZADOVOLJEN Z ROOSEVELTOVOM ADMINISTRACIJO POPUŠCANJA

WASHINGTON, 25. junija. — Predsednik Roosevelt je vetril ali odklonil Connally-Smith predlogo, ki je naperjena proti stawkam v vojnem času, toda senatna zbornica kakor tudi zbornica poslancev sta predlogo sprejeli preko predsednikovega veta.

Senat je glasoval s 56 glasovi proti 25 proti predsednikovemu vetriranju, kar pomeni, da sta bila oddana dva glasova nad potrebno dvetretjinsko večino. V poslanski zbornici pa je bilo oddanih za predlogo oziroma proti njenemu vetriranju 244 glasov, za sprejem vetriranja pa 108 glasov.

All around the world, our young men are giving their lives so that mankind can be freed from tyranny and oppression, free to live their lives without the shadow of impending destruction every decade. We at home have been asked to give our dollars so that our sacrifice may contribute in some small way to that freedom. But it is not enough to invest our money—civilians can invest their lives too—and especially those civilians whose parents and grandparents are rooted in the culture of Europe that has given to mankind such rich treasures as music, art, literature and wisdom.

The Slovenes have shown fair generosity in giving to the Yugoslav Relief for those who have suffered so terribly under the heels of the Germans and the Italians. Thousands of dollars have been contributed by men and women, who have felt that this was one thing they could do to heal the wounds of their national kin. This relief must go on. And at the same time much more is needed—others will need to invest their lives in the country of their second allegiance, to make it a better place to live after the war, that relatives and friends who are suffering through no fault of their own, may be assured of a happier future in the peace that is to come.

For those who feel an urge to spend a year, two years, or perhaps several years in Slovenia after the war, Baldwin-Wallace College is offering a course which will prepare them to render the maximum service. Any high school graduate is eligible to take this course. Due to the exigencies of the draft, most of these will probably be young women. But there will doubtless be young men who for

NEW TAXES IN EFFECT JULY 1st

The new Withholding tax, effective after July 1, is not expected to effect or hinder the sale or purchase of War Bonds when it is correctly understood by the public, Harold H. Bredlow, executive secretary of the Ohio War Savings Staff, said today.

Mr. Bredlow based his statement on the fact that the new Withholding tax will not be an additional tax but merely a means of current collections against tax obligations hitherto paid in annual or quarterly installments.

"We do not expect any falling-off in either over-the-counter sales or in plants where payroll deduction plans for War Bond purchases are in operation," Mr. Bredlow said.

"The new tax is not a flat 20% tax, but 20% on that portion of income in excess of allowable exemptions. The 20% includes 17% for income and 3% for Victory taxes."

(The above table takes into account family status exemptions only. In the final reckoning, allowance will be made for other allowable exemptions as in the past.)


