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## ANGLEŠKI PARLAMENT ODOBRILO PAKT Z ITALIJOM

Premier Chamberlain citiral Rooseveltovo izjavo

## SODELOVANJE Z MUSSOLINIJEVO VLADO

London, 3. maja. — Premier Chamberlain je včeraj ponovno pozabil v parlament svojo izjavorenje, ko je v apelu na poslance, naj odobrijo sporazum med Anglijo in Italijo, citiral Rooseveltovo izjavo kot argument. "Francija ni edina, ki odobrava sporazum," je dejal premier. "Dobili smo čestitke od držav Balkanske zveze in predsednik Združenih držav je tudi pozabil svoje zanimanje, ko je izjavil, da je sklenitev paktu dosegala, da se lahko mnogo dosegne z mirovnimi pogajanjem."

Herbert Morrison, vodja labotniške manjine, ki se je nedavno vrnil v Anglijo iz Amerike, je kritiziral premierja. Dejal je, da Chamberlain sploh ne bi smel citirati Rooseveltove izjave kot podlubo o paktu. "Čudim se, kako more premi trditi, da predsednik mogoče države odobrava sklenitev paktu med Anglijo in Italijo," je rekel Morrison. "Omoma Rooseveltovo izjavo na novo način v škodo Angliji, v nare interisu je prijateljstvo z druženimi državami."

David Lloyd George, bivši angleški premier, je tudi kritiziral Chamberlaina. Rekel je, da ne bi smel trditi, da je Roosevelt odobril pakt. Nekdo ga je napačno informiral in zdaj hoče potegniti domi Ameriko v evropsko politiko.

Debsti je sledilo glasovanje, pri katerem je bil predlog labotnikov proti odobritvi pogodbe usvojen s 322 proti 110 glasom. S tem je parlament tudi odtril pogodbo, ki je bila sklenjena med Anglijo in Italijo 15. aprila.

Chamberlain je v svojem govoru parlamentu omenil, da je bil od Mussolinija zagotovil, a ne bo delal potežko angleški administraciji v Palestini. "Obisk nezaupanja in sumnicenja se razprisili," je rekel premier. "Odkar je bila pogodba sklenjena, so se odnosili med eno državama izboljšali in ustvarjena je bila podlaga za tesnjo kooperacijo."

Argument laboritorov in liberalcev je bil, da ne more nihče upati Mussoliniju. On, je nevino izjavil, da bo potegnil italijanske čete iz Španije, kar se ni zgodilo. Italijani se še eden borijo v armadi generala Franco in dovolj je tudi drugih okazov, da italijanski diktator izpoljuje danih obljub.

## Japonci se skušajo izmotati iz pasti

### Kitajske kolone oblegajo mesto Tančeng

Sanghaj, 3. maja. — Sem došlo poročilo se glasi, da tri kitajske vojaške kolone oblegajo Tančeng, strategično in utrjeno mesto, ki leži 20 milij severno od proge lunghajske železnice. Japonci so zazili v past, in katere se bodo težko resili, ker prihajajo nove kitajske čete v ta sektor.

V obupnem poskušu, da preprečijo ojačanje kitajske armade, japonski letalci silovito bombardirajo kitajske pozicije. Vse kaže, da bo ozemlje pri Tančengu pozorišče nove bitke, ker kitajske vojne operacije ogrožajo japonske komunikacijske zveze med Tančengom in zaledjem.

Zunanji vojaški eksperci so določili, da preti Japoncem nov poraz v bitki v Kitajci, sličen onemu, ki so ga doživeljili pred nekaj tedni v bitki pri Tajčervangu v provinci Šantung, v kateri je padlo več tisoč japonskih vojakov. Japonci so poslali nove čete na fronto v centralni Kitajski, to pa je omogočilo Kitajcem prodiranje na ozemlju ob Rumeni reki.

Japonska akcija proti teroristom v Sanghaju je izvajala nov konflikt med Japonci in avtoritetami v mednarodni naseljini. Konflikt se je razvil, ko so japonski policisti zasedli postajo v središču naseljene. Poveljnik angloške vojaške posadke je protestiral, nakar so se japonski vojaki umaknili. Nekoč oprobilo praviti, da so se v Sanghaju vtihtopili člani kitajskih guerilskih čet, ki delajo velike pregrevnice Japoncem.

## Španske čete odbile fašistične naskoke

### Uporniki vrženi nazaj na teruelski fronti

Hendaye, Francija, 3. maja. — Nova ofenziva, ki jo je odredil general Franco na teruelski fronti, se je izjavila. Lojalisti so odbili vse naskoke fašističnih čet na svoje obrambne pozicije, ki se vlečejo ob črte Teruel-Aliaja, in vrgli sovražnike nazaj.

Fašisti so se v pričetku ofenzive približali hribu San Anton, tu pa jih je pozdravila toča krogelj iz strojnega pušča. Več sto fašistov je bležalo na bojišču, ostali pa so se morali umakniti.

Španska vlada poroča, da so bili fašistični naskoki odbiti na vsej črte. Aliaga leži 30 milij severovzhodno od Teruela in 70 milij od Sredozemskega morja. Hrib San Anton je v bližini črte, ki veže Allago z mestom Mora de Rubielos in gudarskim gorovjem.

Fašistični letalci so včeraj bombardirali lojalistične pozicije v hribih, toda bombe, ki so jih vrgli, niso povzročile velike škod.

## Razsodišče u makinilu odlok proti avtni družbi

Washington, D. C., 3. maja. — Charles Fahy, glavni pravni svetovalec federalnega delavskega razsodišča, je vložil pri federalnem prizivnem sodišču v Covingtonu, Ky., peticijo glede prekraka odloka proti Ford Motor Co., katero je razsodišče nedavno spoznalo za krivo kršenja Wagnerjevega zakona in odredilo, da mora ponovno upošlit delavce, katere je vrgla na cesto zaradi unijevih aktivnosti. Peticija pravi, da je bila ta akcija podvzeta, ker hoče razsodišče revidirati svojo proceduro v tem in drugih slučajih, da bo v soglasju z razsodiščem v amicus curiae v parlamentu sprejetega zakona o splošni mobilizaciji.

Izjavil je, da Japonska vlada je včeraj načinila in tako demonstrirala enotnost med Italijo in Nemčijo. Fašistični tisk napoveduje, da bo Hitlerjev obisk ojačal v Rim-Berlin in rezultiral v utrditvi vezi, katerih namen je skupna protekcija italijanskih in nemških interesov.

Tokio ignoriral zahtevo ruske vlade

Novi ukrepi japonskega režima

Tokio, 3. maja. — Japonska vlada je ignorirala zahtevo Moskve, da mora zapreti svoje konzularne urade v Kabarovsku in Blagovesčensku, sovjetska vlada pa je na to odgovorila z odredbo, ki prepoveduje konzulom pošiljanje šifriranih brzovk v Tokio.

Tokijeva vlada je zavzela stanje, da sovjetske autoritete nismo pravice na podlagi obstoječih pogodb zapirati japonskih konzulatov v sibirskih mestih. Konflikt, ki ga je izvajalo to vprašanje, je povečal napetost med Japonsko in Sovjetsko unijo.

Japonski ministri predsednik Konoe je včeraj na konferenci pokrajinskih governerjev naznani uveljavljenje novih odredov v amicus curiae v parlamentu sprejetega zakona o splošni mobilizaciji. Izjavil je, da Japonska vlada ne bo potegnila svojih čet iz Kitajske, dokler ne bo režim generala Kaišeka, vrhovnega

In accordance with the present interpretation of the law by the Insurance Department, juvenile members who joined the Society previous to Jan. 1, 1938, may remain in the juvenile department up to the age of 18 years. We kindly request that lodge secretaries as well as members having children insured in our Society, take the above consideration.

### CLEVELAND AWARDED THE 1939 TOURNEY

CHICAGO.—Chicago was the scene of the largest SNPJ Bowling Tournament in the history of the Society last week-end. Over 500 visitors from neighboring cities and states traveled to Chicago for the 1938 Bowling Classic. The Southwest Bowling Alleys were jammed with bowlers and spectators during the two-day session. Altogether 53 teams, 75 doubles and 125 singles entries were received and there was a continuous barrage of shots and thunder from 1 p. m. Saturday, April 30, to 8:30 p. m. Sunday, May 1. President Vincent Cainkar started the festivities by throwing the first ball.

Saturday night, Pioneer Lodge held its Tournament Dance at the SNPJ hall. A fine crowd attended and an enjoyable time was had. A supper, in honor of the visitors, was held Sunday night. Various encouraging talks were made and trophies were presented to the winning teams. After a spirited vote, Cleveland was awarded the 1939 Tournament.

Chicago's Pioneers had the largest representation, entering 10 men's and 3 women's teams. The Badgers of Milwaukee were right behind with 7 men's and 2 women's teams.

The Young Americans and Integrity each had 6 teams, Wolverines 5, Jolly Allis 3, Little Fort 2, Loyalites 2, and Comrades, SNPJ Officers, Francisco Ferrer, Lodge Sloga No. 14, Ladies' Lodge No. 119, Mohawks, and Calumet Sentinels, each one.

Because some of the bowlers could not be on time and because of some difficulties with the alleys, we were not able to run off the schedule as originally made and as anticipated.

As a consequence, considerable confusion arose, which, however, was gradually adjusted. We are satisfied that this was the largest Tournament in the history of our Society and hope that our many visitors and friends will forgive any misgivings.

A complete and detailed report of the Tournament will be published in the next and subsequent issue of Prosveta. As soon as the score sheets are checked, winning teams will be announced and prizes awarded and sent to them.

We have tried to arouse the interest of the young folks in this branch of activity and when we consider that every bowler not only paid his own traveling expenses to Chicago but also paid for his bowling and part of the prize money, the outcome is remarkable and we can feel fully justified that subsequent tournaments will be even bigger and more successful because of the experiences in Chicago on April 30 and May 1. The Tournament was big because our young folks made it such. that this submitted plan is to be published in the April issue of the "Mladinski List" for discussion and the Executive Committee can consider this proposed plan and work out a definite program upon the comments received from the readers. Bro. Gorski moves that such a plan shall be printed in a sufficient number of copies and sent to all local lodges. Recommendation by Bro. Molek and motion of Bro. Gorski unanimously approved.

Bro. Zupan reports that the Educational Committee discussed the possibility of inviting the juvenile singing societies of Cleveland to Chicago. Bro. Malgai moves that the Educational Committee shall prepare a detailed plan and submit it to the next meeting of the Supreme Board for discussion and approval; motion carried.

Bro. Petrovich reports that the agreement with the Six Point Reality Co. of Milwaukee, as decided upon at the last meeting of the Supreme Board, regarding the loan, is not concluded as yet and that there are all possibilities that the agreement will be concluded in the best interest of the Society before the next meeting of the Supreme Board. Bro. Godina moves that this report be accepted.

Bro. Supremo President reports that upon instructions of the last meeting of the Supreme Board, he published advertisements in Yugoslav newspapers that the Croatian Home is for sale, but no results were obtained. This property is now listed with a Real Estate Co. for disposal and up to this no offers for purchase have been received.

Bro. Petrovich reports that the Finance Committee was forced to foreclose on a 21 acre farmland in Texas, because the owner of this land failed to pay the past due interest on a mortgage loan made by the Printery; motion carried that the Finance Committee shall be vested with the rights to sell this land for the best possible price.

Bro. Vidrich was present as a representative of the Supreme Board and requests that he be reimbursed for the expenses. Motion to this effect carried unanimously.

Edward Tomšic moves that medical examination of newly admitted members of the adult department for the current year shall be paid by the Main Office; after a discussion in which all present participated, motion was carried by majority that the medical examinations of admitted new members of the adult department up to the amount of \$2 shall be paid by the Main Office.

Bro. Zaitz reports that the firm of Philip Heller, present accountant for the Society, requests an increase of 50% in his compensation for the same work and moves that increase be granted; motion seconded by Bro. Petrovich and carried by majority.

Bro. Olip recommends that a sufficient number of copies be ordered from the accountants in order that every member of the Finance Committee receives a copy.

Bro. Gradisek reports that the Canadian Sick Benefit fund is improved and, therefore, moves that the special assessment be definitely abolished; motion carried unanimously.

Bro. Vidrich moves that all the announcements published in the Official Organ by SNPJ federations shall be free of charge; motion carried unanimously.

Bro. Lotrich reports that an "SNPJ National Bowling Tournament" will be held in Chicago on the last day of April 30 and 1st of May and as the affair will be of great moral value to the Society as a spiritual means, all the members of the Supreme Board are called upon to attend this affair; that it is also the duty of all the SNPJ members living in the Metropolitan Chicago to attend. Furthermore, the National Athletic Board requested from the Executive Committee an appropriation of \$500 for this purpose; the Executive Committee granted only \$300, and therefore he requests an additional sum of \$200. Bro. Vidrich moves that this request be granted; Bro. Petrovich moves that this matter shall be referred to the Executive Committee for settlement. Motion of Bro. Petrovich carried. In the matter of "dismissal wages" Bro. Godina explains that the union now proposes one week for each year of service and that it is willing to discuss this matter further. Bro. Vidrich moves that one week salary shall be given for each year of service in case of dismissal on account of lack of work. Bro. Vogrich moves that one week for each year of service, with a maximum of five weeks, shall be allowed. Contrary motion seconded and carried unanimously.

Bro. Zaitz moves that the minutes of the fifth and sixth sessions shall be approved by the Supreme Board members living in Chicago and vicinity; motion carried.

## Minutes of the Semi-Annual Meeting of the Supreme Board

Hold February 10th, 11th and 12th, 1938, at Society's Headquarters, 2657-59

### SESSION IV

February 11th, P. M.

Meeting called to order at one o'clock; all present. Frank Zaitz moved that the committee of three, to whom the appeal of Bro. Kraucar was referred, shall be remunerated at \$1.50 each.

Motion carried.

Bro. Tercelj asks for definition of the by-laws provisions Sections 81, 82, 83. Bro. Supreme Secretary explains that in all matters pertaining to the operation and disability benefits the official blanks and the designations of the operation or disability on these blanks are considered; other blanks or reports cannot be accepted as satisfactory. Under the provisions of the Sections 81, 82 and 83, only the operations and disabilities listed in the by-laws are paid. If an operation benefit blank or disability report does not evidence the operation or disability listed in the by-laws, such operation or disability cannot be paid.

In the case mentioned by Bro. Tercelj, the surgeon designated on the operation report blank an operation which cannot be paid under the present provisions of the by-laws, and for the disability only an operation blank was submitted and not the official blank as prescribed for disabilities. The lodge secretaries have all necessary instructions, and as soon as the proper blanks as defined by the by-laws are filled out and submitted, this matter will be disposed of in accordance with the by-laws.

Bro. Supreme President submits the following plan for field work which shall be followed by the district vice-presidents and other supreme board members:

1) The duty of the vice-presidents and supreme board members shall be to campaign in their respective districts; to attend the meetings of local lodges and to be in constant contact with the local lodge officers and other members.

2) The vice-presidents shall have right to organize meetings, conferences and mass meetings whenever and wherever possible and advisable; to arrange lectures and select lecturers; at such occasions the use of the society's films may be used as inducement for better attendance.

3) They shall have not only the right to arrange parties for the juvenile members at which refreshments may be served.

4) They shall have not only the right to organize new local lodges, but also solicit and enroll new members.

All this campaign work shall be under the supervision of the Supreme President. All outlays of the vice-presidents and other supreme officers in connection with the performance of the above-listed duties and work shall be paid out of the general fund, and the executive committee shall see to it that no exorbitant bills are submitted for payment.

Bro. Supreme President informed the meeting that on the preceding evening, a conference of all the vice-presidents was held, at which they discussed this matter, and the organization of a successful campaign at length, as well as adopting this plan of action. A systematic campaign at present is necessary; especially in such localities where the lodge officers and other members are reluctant in performing such duties. Many such localities lack proper enthusiasm and the will to work.

In this connection the Supreme Secretary advises that in conformity with the decision of the Supreme Board Meeting held last August, the Executive Committee ruled that he is to undertake a campaign tour through western states; under the present schedule he shall visit the following states: Colorado, New Mexico, California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming. If there is any impression that he is undertaking this western trip for his own pleasure and enjoyment, he is ready to cancel aforementioned tour. He is going as agitator and representative of the Society, and if possible, will visit all the lodges. This trip will be a strenuous one and much work will have to be done in order to make it successful. He responded to many invitations from lodges and federations; especially on the Pacific Coast, which have never before been visited by any executive from the Main Office. He is convinced that this trip will be a success, providing it is well planned and carried out; if not immediately, later on, at least from the moral point of view.
