SIDELIGHTS FLORIAN CHAMPS

It has finally been established that the St. Florian path to championships in the Midwest has not been an easy one to travel. The tendency for some die-hard skeptics to call it luck has been considerably discouraged by the exhibition of grit and endurance displayed by the St. Florian teams at the recent cage tourney in Waukegan.

The Florians came to this meet somewhat handicapped through injuries and disorganized by the advent of New Deal prosperity. In the few pre-tourney games played by the heavies it was never possible to have the team compete in full strength. This was chiefly due to the fact that most of the boys had to work. Even during the tourney the team was minus several mainstays who could not forsake their jobs.

Though injuries did much to slow up the heavy weight squad, it did not frustrate the "do or die" spirit with which the boys were imbued. Despite the fact that Eddie Kucic's wrenched knee bothered him a great deal, and John Zupancic's badly swollen ankle, acquired in the opening game with Joliet team, slowed him down to a limp, and Louie Deliquadri's bruised back retarded his ability, these lads were in there playing as though their very lives depended on victory. Such a demonstration of sheer grit and determination is rarely seen in KSKJ competition, but it is the one big reason why the St. Florian Boosters are the outstanding leaders in KSKJ sports.

The semi-final encounter against the Waukegan St. Joes was the most grueling the Florian heavies have played. With two regulars like Alex Hurysz and Tony Lowery out of the lineup because of their working obligations in South Chicago, the squad went out on the floor in a very weak and crippled condition. Playing against an inspired team, they had to adopt a rugged defense. Coupled with superior shooting ability, they won the game, 18 to 11.

We are convinced that history repeats itself. In a great many ways, this year's tourney was similar to the one held a year ago. The setup was practically the same. The same teams faced each other under the same circumstances. Even down to the dramatic incidents the situation was identical at least for the St. Florian Boosters. Last year the Flo-
