Roosevelt morda razpusti odbor, ki ga vodi Darrow

Washington, D. C. — V vlad-
nih krogih se govori, da bo pre-
sednik Roosevelt morda razpu-
stil "NRA review board", kate-
remu predseduje Clarence Dar-
row in kateri je sprejel žgoče
poročilo o NRA. Poročilo je bilo
zadnje dni objavljeno in obenem
je bil objavljen odgovor vodite-
ljev NRA.

Poročilo Darrowovega odbora
je pereča kritika industrijske
administracije in njenih in-
dustrijskih kodeksov ali pravilni-
kov. Darrow s svojimi tovariši
obtožuje NRA, da je vedno bolj
naklonjena trustjanskim mono-
polom in vedno bolj sovražna
malim podjetnikom, ki jih uni-
čuje. Namesto NRA za njeno "po-
šteno konkurenco", ki je nemo-
goča, priporoča Darrow odkrito
in direktno socializirano gospo-
darstvo pod vladno upravo. "U-
panje ameriškega ljudstva leži v
načrtnem gospodarstvu socializi-
ranega bogastva", pravi Darro-
wovo poročilo.

Voditelji NRA zavračajo trdi-

sem in se javijo policiji dnevno.

Dne 3. aprila 1934 je v
bolnišnici v Steubenville, O.,
umrl Peter Jovič, ki je bil
član jednote od januarja 1923
do novembra 1933; pri jednoti
je bil zavarovan za \$600 smrtni-
nine in \$2 dnevne bolniške pod-
pore. Bil je dober član jednote
in ne eden izmed onih, ki bi
bili člani jednote edino le radi
tega, da bi prejel od jednote, ko-
likor bi bilo največ mogoče, kaj-
ti knjige izkazujejo, da je pre-
jel samo šest dolarjev bolniške
podpore v 11 letih svoje članske
dobe.

Ustanovila se je pa nova pod-
porna organizacija "Internati-
onal Workers Order" in agita-
torji te organizacije so se po-
javili tudi tukaj v tej naselbini
in pričeli z agitacijo med tukaj-
šnjimi naseljenci. Pregovorili
so tudi Petra Joviča, ker so ga
poznali, da je dober član, zdrav
in kot tak dober za njih organi-
zacijo. Podal se jim je in ker
vsled slabih delavskih razmer
bi mu ne bilo mogoče plačevati
asesment v obeh organizacijah,
je prenehal plačevati asesment
pri jednoti novembra meseca
in pristopil v njih organizacijo,
t. j. "International Workers
Order". Bil je pod vtisom, da

je s pristopom v to organizacijo
postal član prave delavske orga-
nizacije, ker po tolmačenju agi-
tatorjev je SNPJ "buržujska in
social-patriotska" organizacija,
in še vse sorte, kar pride na um
raznih laži-komunistom. Torej
pri SNPJ je bil črtan decembra
meseca in njegova družina—
vdova s tremi nedoraslimi otroci,

poročevalca). He is not entitled
to receive any benefits, of what-
soever kind..." Vdovi je bilo
pojasnjeno, da je njenemu so-
prugu manjkalo še 25 dni do 90
dni od dneva, ko je bila njego-
va prošnja odobrena od "Nati-
onal Executive Committee.

v drugo, kjer niso na jasnem,
kdaj in kako so upravičeni do

Fraternal Press On Our Anniversary

The following article prepared by Bro. F. A. Vider, Supreme Secretary of the SNPJ, on the occasion of the thirtieth anniversary of our Society, appeared simultaneously in the May number of the Fraternal Age and in the Fraternal Monitor, two foremost fraternal recorders devoted to the fraternal benefit system, both of them being dependable fraternal periodicals of comment on current events and their forecast of the future:

THIRTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE SLOVENE NATIONAL BENEFIT SOCIETY

Thirty years ago on April 9, 1904, a group of Slovenes in Chicago organized the Slovene National Benefit Society, which underwent a concrete struggle for its existence. The opposition against this liberal fraternal society was tremendous, especially because of the fact that this was the first insurance organization among the Slovenes which guaranteed to its members personal freedom of religious, philosophical, ethical, and political creeds. Despite the attempts of the opposition to dim the light of its progress, the Society has gained rapidly in its membership, having reached a total of over 63,000 members, which number was reduced by some 13,000 members during the depression. As it stands today, with a membership of 50,000 members, it is the largest and most influential Slovene organization in America.

The Slovene immigrants, burdened with oppression in their mother country, seized the opportunity to enter an organization that insured them freedom in their private lives and offered them sound protection at the lowest possible rates. This rapidly expanded its membership.

The Society was the first in the fraternal field to institute new systems into its order of management. Among the laurels which the Society is acclaiming on this, the thirtieth anniversary, are included the establishment of a centralized sick benefit department and an official organ of its own. As early as 1909 it admitted women members and gave them equal privileges with men. Another important factor in its development has been the organization of a juvenile department in 1912, creating more interest for the Society in general and helping to preserve the youth in the membership. According to statistics, 98% of the juvenile members transfer to the adult department. Of special interest to the children has been a magazine of their own, furnishing them a column for their own contributions. Other important systems incorporated into the organization have been extending the right of initiative and referendum to its members, and a movement for English speaking lodges.

The Society at present consists of 635 branches, 82 of which are English speaking branches. In the period from April 9, 1904, to December 31, 1933, it has paid sick benefits, death claims, disability claims, and special benefits, amounting to a total of \$14,125,650.35. Ten regular and three special conventions have been held.

The primary purpose of the organization has been to inculcate the meaning of fraternalism into its members through constant instruction of the privileges obtainable under this system of insurance. The Society has aided its members in times of sickness; it has given \$181,289.67 in special benefits to the needy in times of distress; it has been a guiding force in cementing the Slovene immigrants and their children in a spirit of brotherhood by reaching out into their social and cultural activities.

The record of the Slovene National Benefit Society is a testimonial for the victory of fraternal societies over any other type of insurance company.

"Relief Must Continue"—W

In requesting Congress to provide \$1,000,000 to cope with the effects of Capitalism broke-down economic policies, President severl refers to his budget message of Jan 3, 1934.

"It was pointed out," he reminds Congress "that there could be no abrupt termination of emergency expenditures for recovery purposes, that the necessity for relief would continue."

Perhaps Mr. Roosevelt considers his "some pumpkins" as a prophet. Perhaps he thrills with that inner glow which comes to those who are conscious of their own when he asks again and again for public works with which to keep Capitalism and Capitalism victims alive. But what we would like to know is—

Why is it necessary that relief should continue?

Is it that the nation is poor? No, the administration has been going to long to reduce the amount of consumption which is produced within our boundaries. It that the American people are lazy and unwilling to support themselves? No, the American people will quickly respond to a call even though those jobs offer wages and conditions which are a disgrace to so many a nation.

There is one reason, and only one, why relief must continue. It is because Capitalism is continuing.

If the resources of the nation were so used and if production were regulated according to the needs of workers instead of to the needs of owners, then there would be no need for relief. Then every able adult could assume the task of producing all that the nation needs to provide high and secure living standards for all.

The only reason why people must be relieved is that they are not permitted to produce for themselves.

President Roosevelt, in common with fellow profitakers, is telling the workers content with relief until—until when the private owners of the nation find way to profitably use the workers. President Roosevelt is determined to preserve the slave and slave relationship which exists between owners and workers even though he must paupers of increasing millions of people many generations to come.

The first "New Dealer" talks as though relief is a virtue. It's not; it's a disgrace to a nation which has the natural and human resources of America.

It is possible to end the need for relief by producing wealth for use instead of profit. But that would end the parasitism which the NRA aims to preserve. It is the beneficiaries of Capitalism to give sufficient relief to keep the unwanted from starving. But it is no less the task of the workers to end the relief system by taking on the means of life and exploiting them for the common good.

Capitalism, and the relief measures are necessary under Capitalism, are a generation of the good life of their own respect. Socialism, by giving every person opportunity to assist in the nation's work would make all workers self-supporting and end the need for either private or public charity.

Pass The 30-Hour Bill

Last year, General Hugh Johnson, head of the national recovery administration, told that about 6,000,000 workers could be put back in industrial jobs before Labor day.

But Labor day came and went, "Thanksgiving" day came and went, Christmas came and went, April Fool's day came and went, and there are upwards of 10,000,000 unemployed.

The recovery administration might have made good on returning workers to their original intention: namely to shorten the hours of labor enough to take up the slack.

The hours were shortened a little, but effort at all was made to shorten them to provide employment for the masses of unemployed. It could have been done. It still is to be done. It ought to be done. But it will be done—not voluntarily by the recovery administration. Mr. Roosevelt can tap the power of Commerce on the writs all he likes, but it will bring no results, and Hugh Johnson will not insist on short enough hours.

Therefore, the 30-hour bill should be passed by congress.

It alone could bring a general shortage of jobs. It probably would not take up all of the slack, but it might afford jobs for several million now jobless workers.—Milwaukee Leader.

Notice to Local Lodge Secretaries

The local lodge secretaries are hereby requested to notify all of those passive members who became passive before July 1, 1933, that if they desire to be entitled to the privilege given them by the Supreme Board, they should become active before June 30, 1934. After this date the by-laws shall be the sole basis applied to passive members becoming active.

The privilege or exemption is as follows: Those who shall become active before June 30 shall be exempt from reimbursing assessment into the mortuary fund for the period of their passivity between January 1 and July 1, 1933. Secretaries of local lodges as well as those whom this concerns, please take notice.

Instructions and Explanations for the Campaign

The Supreme Board at its annual meeting held in February laid plans for a jubilee campaign by which to secure new members in both the adult and juvenile departments.

Juvenile Department

For each individual new members up to 5, a member will receive 25c. For 5 members an award of \$ 2.50 will be given

It is to be understood that awards will be given only as specified above, both as to number and amount.

Members of the juvenile department who enter during the campaign will be exempt from payment of two monthly assessments, and the Society will pay the expense of the medical examination up to the sum of 50c.

Adult Department

The Society will pay \$1.00 for each newly-acquired member between the age of 16 and 35 years.

During this campaign the Society will bear the expense of the medical examination for every new member between the ages specified, up to the amount of \$2.00, and each such member will be exempt from payment of \$1.00 initiation fee for the building fund.

Passive members who have not exceeded the two-year term of passivity and who become active before June 1, of the current year, will be exempt from payment of 6 months' assessment into the mortuary fund for the period prior to July 1, 1933.

The Supreme Board further decided that all members at present insured for \$600 death benefit who desire to transfer to Class "B" or "C" may do so for their previous amount of death benefit; however, this provision was made only for the \$600 class.

MORALLY BANKRUPT

That the United States Chamber of Commerce has become morally bankrupt during the past few years was again demonstrated last week when the national convention of that body cheered lustily at every mudgn exploded at the national industrial recovery administration.

However, the chamber did not dare to go on record as opposed to every theory and experiment of President Roosevelt. It approved minor attempts at recovery, but loudly condemned any further attempts to regulate banking or the stock market.

But of all the speeches which sickened even the milk-and-water representatives of the press, the address of Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., president of the General Motors corporation, took first prize.

It is a little strange that at a time when millions of workers are begging charity because there is no honest work for them that the head of one of the largest corporations in America should scoff at the shorter hour week as a method of expanding employment.

Like so many other business leaders, Mr. Sloan prefers to drive his employees 8 to 10 hours a day at starvation wages. He favors mass production on stretch-out schedules; he approves Labor-displacing machinery because it cuts down the overhead; he believes a hungry man is hungry because he hasn't enough brains to find a job, and so the public—and not private industry—should feed him.

That has always been the attitude of the United States Chamber of Commerce. Sloan merely put into words the philosophy of his own kind. It is the philosophy of moral bankruptcy.

OUR CRAZY ECONOMIC SYSTEM

The wheat crop of the Middle West has been shrinking under hot suns and drying winds at the rate of more than a million bushels a day for nearly three weeks.
