

# Short History of Slovene Literature

By F. T. SUHADOLNIK

Besides the monumental history of literature, the most important work of Cop is the criticism of Chelica which was published as an appendix to the German criticism of Celakovski. In the appendix Cop pointed to the importance of awakening of a literary consciousness among the educated Slovenes: before there is such consciousness, he argued, there can be no possibility of putting the language itself on a higher plane. The awakening of the consciousness and the establishment of a real literary language was the aim of the Chelcica and the direct result of the writings of Dr. Preseren, who, with his poetry gave to the Slovene world a language that could be usd in Romance literature which had just been introduced and established. It will be remembered that the appendix was the cause of the precipitation of the famous Chelcica and the Metecica War. Cop, defended the old order and suggested that adoptation of the Bohemian system of alphabet.

The greatest work of Cop was not the subject for universal knowledge. His help and his activity among his friends the men who contributed to the Chelcica deserves the highest praise which he received from his friends though in the main all his activity was hidden from the public. As the leader of the literary circle which gathered around the Chelcica he was affectionally called the "giant of learning." With the courage and his knowledge he gave moral support to all the contributors and led them on to the heights that the Chelcica achieved in such a short period of time. Immemorial as were his works with others and his battles with the censorship every Slovene interested in Slovene literature will remembers the duet of names, Dr. France Presern and Matthew Cop for they were the fastest friends and were it not for the encouragement, useful criticism and the kindly help that Preseren received from Cop it is doubtful whether the name Dr. France Preseren would occupy the summit of all poets on the Slovenes and the most illustrious name that ever wrote a Slovene word.

Helping Cop at the College library was Michael Kastelic the editor of Chelice. Kastelic was born at Gorenji at Sticna on Sept. 1, 1796. He completed his education and was employed Ilirian officials. From 1825 to 1850 he filled the position of scriptor. From then until 1865 he was the librarian at the Collegiate Library at Ljubljana. He died in 1868. As the editor of Chelice he was very much interested in the contributions that were received, going over them and rounding them out to make the finished product read smoother. Even Dr. France Preseren accepted, on occasions, some of the corrections that Kastelic proposed. As a contributor to the Chelice he was one of the most active persons. He is not identified with any particular set of works nor is his fame great for some monumental work, nevertheless, he was very versitile, using all the different forms and different metres for his poetic works. His work while it is interesting to read does not show a real poetic insight. As an editor of the Chelica he does not confine his poems and songs to it but some of his contributions are found in "Liabacher Zietung" and later in the "Novicah". He also prepared a new edition of Vodnik's poems but they were never published. After the death of Korytk he with the help of Kosmac headed the publishing of the series of "Slovenfkih pifmi krajnfkega naroda" which appeared in 5 volumes.

With Cop and Kastelic at the Ljubljana College, the library became the sanctum of all the literari of Slovenia especial'y of those who lived in Ljubljana, mostly priests but a real literary society. Besides the litrarian Cop and the Scriptor Kastelic another important Chelica man was employed at the Library. He was Juri Kosmac, who besides Preseren and Kastelic was the only contributor who had his poems published in four editions of the Chelica. He also translated two of Schmidt's novels "Ita" and "Vezilo" and some

Bohemian poems. Besides Kosmac, Ignatius Holzapfel was also employed at the library. Though he was not a native of Ljubljana he came there as the chaplain of Mengs. Holzapfel contributed poems to the I and II editions of the Chelica which he wrote for the Savinja the intended Slovene supplement to the Liakacher Zitung in 1825.

The dean of the whole company of contributors of the Chelica in Ljubljana was Dr. Jakob Zupan, the professor of Theology in Ljubljana, who was later removed to Celovec because of some clash with ecclesiatical authorities. In the first edition of the Chelica is found his rhymed prose writings the Slovene Nestor, the Slovene Plutark, and Epigrams. With short stories he was one of the favored authors of the contributors to the Ilirian newspapers in which he published a collection of 500 Slovene proverbs. As an experiment with the Slovene he wrote songs without the use of the "s" or the "c" and mixed Croatian phrases. with the Slovene which he used as he thought they should be used not as they were actually intended to be used. His work was published in the Chelica not so much because of the excellence of his work but because of his intense love for the nativeland and because he was personally respected very much. He was a Jansenist but did not side with them in the defense of Metelcica but was among the first to object

Of more importance as a poet among the contributors to the Chelica was Blase Potocnik, who was born in 1799 in Struza and who was made the cathedral canon about the year 1830, from 1833 to the end of his life in 1872 he was the pastor of St. Vitus parish in Ljubljana. As early as 1827 he published an edition of the Bible in Metelcica which went through several editions. His poems appear only the first year in the Chelica. Later he contributed to the "Novice" and to the "Zgodnja Danica." He also published some religious works that have achieved some measure of popularity. Poems that bear his name are noteworthy because of their simplicity and popular tone and since the poet was also a composer of music he set many of them to music and as such they have become national in Slovene literature.

Among the later contributions to the Che the most important is the name John Cigler who tributed to the second and the third volumes. 
