EASTERN BOWLING MEET TAKES ON NATIONAL FLAVOR AS OUT-OF-TOWN TEAMS RESPOND

Canonsburg May Attend in Bus Load; Forest City to Enter

Cleveland, O.—The eastern KSKJ bowling tournament scheduled for May 2 and 3 on local alleys will have a national flavor in all respects, according to the announcement made last week by Chairman Anthony J. Grdina.

The Brooklyn Knights of Trinity of the east coast have signified intentions of participating. It will be the knights' first try at national competition.

Closer to home, yet miles from the Convention City of America, the Forest City Kay Jays are priming their teams to get them ready for the tournament that promises to eclipse the famous junior conventions of the Midwest.

"The 50-team entry list," said Mr. Grdina, "is a fair appraisal of what we expect. Last week the Canonsburg boosters asked for information with the assurance that everything possible will be tried to bring a bus load of bowlers and fans from the Pennsylvania community." The confirmation of this report will follow the meeting that was to be held last Sunday in Canonsburg.

One of the first out-of-town reports came from South Chicago, Ill. A team from that locality is assured.

In addition to the above teams are expected from the following cities: Lorain, O.;

Girard, O.; Chardon, O.; Detroit, Mich.; Indianapolis, Ind.; Pittsburgh, Pa.; Ambridge, Pa.; Joliet, Ill.; Chicago, Ill.; Waukegan, Ill. As soon as these towns respond, announcement will be made.
