Perhaps many of the readers will consider us much too previous in mentioning that at this time. To those who are of such an opinion we wish to remind them that only two more meetings separate today and the December gatherings.

And two meetings is not any too much time in which the lodge membership can look about and see just which ones among themselves are capable of guiding the destinies of their lodges during 1935.

Don't wait until the annual meeting to make your selection, begin making it at the meeting this month. Look over the list of eligibles again in November and when the actual voting takes place, you will be prepared to cast an intelligent ballot.
