"Little Census" To Be Conducted Here This Month

A "little Census" will be conducted here this month, it was announced by Director John E. Tharaldson of the Census Bureau's regional field office at Detroit, Mich.

The "little census" will consist of special questions to be asked in the March Current Population Survey in addition to the regular monthly inquiries on employment and unemployment. The special questions will be on consumer income, migration, and family characteristics. The purpose of these inquiries, asked each March in the Current Population Survey, is to supplement and keep up to date the detailed information about the Nation's population which is collected every 10 years in the decennial census.

The regional field director emphasized that all information about individuals furnished to the Census Bureau is held in strict confidence under Federal law. It is used only to obtain summary figures such as totals, averages and percentages for various groups in the population and not to show information for particular families or individuals. The information cannot be furnished to any other Government agency and thus cannot be used for investigation, taxation, or regulation.

The Current Population Survey will be conducted here and in 332 other areas of the country during the week of March 20. Information will be collected locally by duly accredited interviewers.

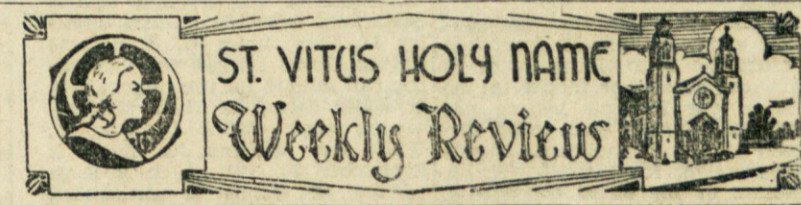
What Is the Combined Health Fund?

For fourteen years, Greater Clevelanders worried about the multiplicity of campaigns for health. It was in 1946 when the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce first urged health agencies to combine forces to reduce time, effort and costs of independent campaigns.

In 1957, Chamber of Commerce directors said: "We approve at this time a joint health campaign to be held in the spring." And in 1958, the women of Cuyahoga County launched their "Women's Revolt" which was the first attempt by citizens to organize one, single campaign for all health agencies.

The civic-minded women had started something, but they needed help to develop their efforts into a sound, going organization. They could raise the money for various causes, but they were not equipped to fairly allocate the dollars raised. The allocations had to be split on the basis of popularity; that is, designated by the giver who was not informed of the relative needs.

The Combined Health Fund, organized for its first drive in March, 1960, added the all-important allocations committee, made up of top-notch doctors and civic leaders, who reviewed the programs and finances of participating agencies and assured the giver his dollars were being spent wisely, according to the needs in Greater Cleveland.
