## HOW AT ALL BEGAN

# MINUTES OF STATE CONVENTION FOR OHIO-MICHIGAN

A beautiful, sunny day was made just for us. At 12 o'clock on May 25, 1980, a Memorial Mass was said for Albina Novak at St. Mary's Church on Holmes Ave., officiated by Fr. Victor Tome, that opened our Ohio-Michigan State Day.

A parade, led by State President, Sophie Magayna, Cheerleader, Sherry Benson, the Marie Prisland Cadets from No. 50, Honor Guards from Br. 32, the Euclid Twirlettes and colorful Slovenian National Costumes from Br. 42, led us from the Church to the National Home on Holmes Ave. A large painted emblem of the SWU greeting everyone at the hall. It was made by member of Br. 50, Carole Traven.

State Pres. Sophie Magayna opened the meeting at 2:30 p.m. after a delicious meal was served to all. This was follwed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Minutes of the 1978 State Convention in Girard was read by Recording Secretary, Marie Beck approved on the motion of Dorothy Winter and second by Sylvia Vegley.

Our Guest Speaker from Chicago was Editor of the Dawn, Corinne Leskovar who was welcomed. She explained and answered all questions pertaining to the loss of membership and reason for raising the monthly dues that was approved at the last convention. Being a burial insurance society on a small scale as far as benefits go, and due to inflation, it was very important to raise dues to cover all expenses.

At the last membership campaign, 336 new members were enrolled. We must enroll new members between the ages of 30 and 40 years of age - this is the best age for future strength. We need this to keep up the membership and to keep this organization in good standing. At present more than half the adult members are 60 or over. On the question of membership dues increases, a discussion was carried on by delegates who wish to find a solution to the problem and they asked that the Home Office establish a relief fund for members who are needy

and who have been in for 50 years. The Scholarship Fund is very strong and it was suggested that some money be obtained from it for a new relief fund. Corinne answered that since this is a special and separate fund, collected from donations for the specific use for scholarships, it would be difficult to change it and that only the Board of Directors could approve it, or the next convention. The Editor also explained that it would be easier for secretaries of the branches to collect dues once a year and to use the simplified envelopes, thus eliminating a lot of work and saving postage.

President Magayna presented the gavel to Frances Sietz, to conduct the nominations for new State or Regional President as Sophie's term has expired. Everyone complimented Sophie for her good work for the past seven years.

After the first nominations, all five members declined. On the second attempt, Josephine Comenshek accepted. The Cadets and Honor Guards escorted Mrs. Comenshek, who is the secretary for Br. 32, to the head table to be installed as the new President. Josephine is a very hard working and dependable person. All members promised to help her in her new position.

Mrs. Magayna adjourned the meeting at 6 p.m. with prayers for the living and deceased members and extinguished the lighted candles. Earlier in the meeting, a moment of spiritual thought was called and memorial to our departed national officers and members was carried on by the Cadets and Honor Guards. # THE IMMIGRANT

# ANN FROM BJELIŠČE IN CROATIA

In Bjelešče, Croatia, not far from thr capital city of Zagreb, my father was known as Frank Filipovic, but when he came to America, his name was changed to Frank Phillips.

Father served in the Austrian Emperor's Mr. & Mrs. J. E. Yane "Dragoons" or cavalry as we know it here. Upon returning home after serving three years in the military, he not only found employment in the deep woods at a lumber camp, but a wife as well. Theresa Winger, who worked for a Jewish couple as housekeeper, became attracted to Frank as well as he to her, and in August of 1903, they were married at the village church.

Mrs. J. E. Yane on their Golden Weddi was born to them.

In the meantime husband, James E. (Ja a large and beautiful

By the spring of 1905, my father had decided to go west — to America. He traveled alone because his future in the strange land could not be foretold. He planned to secure work and lodging before sending for his bride, as did thousands of other immigrant men. Upon arrival in America, he settled in North Randall, Ohio, and stayed with his brother Sam's family for nearly two years. When he accumulated sufficient money, he sent for his family.

I was two years old and my sister, Mary Urgo, about nine months, when we started our journey for the new land in 1907. We all lived at Uncle Sam's house for a short time before moving in our own house close by.

During those early years, we lived a simple and hard life in this strange country, gradually adjusted to it as the years passed on by working, learning, and enjoying a new way of life. Our family had increased to include Andrew born in 1910, Emma in 1916, and Catherine in 1918.

My sister, Mary, and I attended grammar school up to the eighth grade, then began working to help support the family. I was employed at Kohl's Grocery Store, the only one in town, where nearly every other youngster worked as he grew strong enough to do manual labor. After school and on weekends, I also waited on tables at a big boarding house.

During my teens, I found employment in Cleveland at a factory which produced rubber tires, and another that manufactured photo frames. Transportation to and from work was by the old street cars.

Many young Slovenian and Croatian families lived in North Randall, so there was never a lack of young people whom we could enjoy as neighbors and friends. As the youngsters, we were interested in going to dances, picnics, and for rides in a Model-T Ford with the young men who could afford to buy them.

Then, on October 1, 1924, we lost our father who died from pneumonia, leaving his wife and five children; the youngest was six years old, and I, the eldest, was nineteen. Life for a widow with five children appeared to be dark and the future gloomy. In addition to our own family, mother kept four boarders who worked on the Erie Railroad, the Erie Dock Company, and the iron ore storage yards. One of the boarders, Mike Vlasic, a World War I Veteran, became interested in mother, and a year later, on November 29, 1925, to be exact, Mother and Mike were married at St. Paul's Church in Cleveland.

Two years later a little girl, christened Theresa Vlasic, was born to them.

In the meantime, I had met and married my husband, James E. (Jack) Yane on April 10, 1926. It was a large and beautiful wedding with the reception at Knause's Hall on St. Clair Avenue, which lasted three days and ended at Grandma Yane's house. Almost all of our friends, neighbors, and relatives celebrated the event because it was the first wedding for both families.

We lived upstairs at Grandma Vlasic's for the next five years during which time our first daughter, Gloria Ann, was born. Then the Highway Department bought the property for a new right-of-way and we moved to a new house at Grandma Yane's.

Our second daughter, Patricia Ann, was born fourteen years after the birth of our first daughter. Both of our lovely girls received a good education and established careers for themselves before marrying and raising a family. While the girls were young and lived at home, they brought us much joy and happiness. Now we are miles apart in distance but not in memory or love. We still keep in touch with our daughters and grandchildren by phone calls, letters, and visits.

Since 1923, Jack has worked continually for a family who had been in various business during the years: trucking, hauling, and excavating. Then he switched to Public Transportation where he is still employed to this day.

My responsibilities of being a mother and housewife were supplemented by work as a waitress, and finally as a supervisor of the Club House at various race tracks around the Cleveland area. My activities keep me busy.

Now, after fifty-three years of marriage, Jack and I can look back on a very long, happy, and fruitful life together. The two of us are in reasonably good health for our age, and are still very much devoted to each other.



Barbara Rosandich, National Auditor, and Rose Pucel of Branch No. 23, Ely, Minn., share this excellent hot dish recipe for MOSTACCIOLI (OR RIGATONI) CASSEROLE that theyt helped serve for one of their church luncheons. It easily serves 24 to 30 people.

## MOSTACCIOLI (or rigatoni)

3 pounds ground beef

2 large onions, chopped

8 stalks of celery, chopped

I can tomato soup, undiluted

2 cans (15 ounces each) tomato sauce

I can (28 ounces) tomatoes

2 large cans (8 ounces each) mushrooms, drained and sliced

1 teaspoon sugar

3 pounds Mostaccioli or Rigatoni noodles

I pound Velveeta cheese, thinly sliced.

Brown the ground geef. Add the chopped onions and celery and simmer for about 15 minutes. Add the tomato soup, tomato sauce, tomatoes, mushrooms and sugar. Simmer uncovered for about 30 minutes to an hour until somewhat thickened, like the consistency of spaghetti sauce. . . Reserve 1 cup meat sauce for topping. Pour a thin layer of meat sauce in two ugreased 9 x 13 x 2 inches pans. Spread each pan with 1/4 of the noodles; then cover with thin slices of 1/4 of the Velveeta cheese. Repeat layers of meat sauce, noodles and cheese. Top with reserved meat sauce. Cover with foil and bake in 350° oven 1 1/2 hours. Let stand about 10 minutes before cutting into 3 inch squares or as desired.

#### **GREEN RICE**

Barbara Rosandich also sent this very good recipe for GREEN RICE which the women in the Methodist church prepared for a luncheon.

2 cups cooked rice (2/3 cup uncooked rice)

1 cup chopped parsley

1 cup grated cheddar cheese

1 teaspoon salt

Pepper, as desired SEPTEMBER, 1980 1/4 cup butter or oleo 3 egg yolks, beaten

3 egg whites, stiffly beaten

Heat oven to 350°. Cook rice (regular rice: 2/3 cup simmered in 1 1/2 cups boiling water and 1/2 teaspoon salt; covered). Mix in the parsley, cheese, salt, pepper, butter and egg yolks. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in greased 9 x 9 inches pan at 350° for 25 minutes. Serve with creamed crab, shrimp, tuna or chicken. Serves 6 to 8.

## DELUXE WALDORF SALAD

With apples now in season this original recipe by Faye Starman of Branch No. 14, Newbury, Ohio, is most timely. "It will provide 250 servings of 1/2 cup each," writes Faye.

I bushel apples (Rome Beauty preferred)

1 pint lemon juice

2 pounds nuts, coarsely chopped

4 boxes (1 pound each) dates, diced

4 boxes (15 ounces each) dark raisins 16 pounds celery (put on scale to weigh), finely chopped

6 quarts Hellmann's mayonnaise

Core and dice apples (leave 1/2 of the apples with skins for color and peel the other half). Sprinkle lemon juice as you go along peeling the apples; this prevents their turning brown. Add remaining ingredients. Toss lightly, but thoroughly. Refrigerate until serving time.

For 50 to 60 servings cut down to 1/4 amount.

1/2 peck apples

1/2 cup lemon juice

1/2 pound nuts, coarsely chopped

I pound box dates, diced

1 box (15 ounces) dark raisins

4 pounds celery

3 pints mayonnaise

#### BROCCOLI CHOWDER

Ann Hodnik, our Youth Director, and secretary-treasurer of Branch No. 35, Aurora, Minn., would like you to try her BROCCOLI CHOWDER.

1 package (10 ounces) broccoli

2 teaspoons instant minced onion

1/2 cup boiling water

1 teaspoon salt

2 cups milk

1 can condensed cream of potato soup (10 3/4 ounces), undiluted

1/2 cup cshredded Swiss cheese

Cook broccoli and onion in salted water and boil until tender. Do not drain. Stir in milk and soup. Heat through and add cheese and stir until melted. Cool slightly then place half

at a time in blender. Blend until smooth and serve. (Absolutely delicious and so nutritious!)

## SWISS CHOCOLATE SOUARES

The children will love these easyto-make chocolate squares. Excellent for school snacks or lunch buckets.

1 cup water

1/2 cup margarine

1 1/2 squares (1 ounce size) unsweetened chocolate

2 cups flour

2 cups sugar

2 eggs, unbeaten

1/2 cup sour cream

1 teaspoon soda

1/2 teaspoon salt

Combine water, margarine and chocolate in saucepan: bring to boil. Remove from heat. With wooden spoon stir in combined flour and sugar. Add eggs, sour cream, soda and salt. Mix well with spoon. Pour into greased and floured 15 1/2 x 10 1/2 inches jelly roll pan. Bake at 350° for 20 to 25 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean.

Frosting:

1/3 cup margarine

4 1/2 tablespoons milk

1 square (1 ounce) unsweetened chocolate

3 cups sifted confectioners' sugar

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 cup chopped nuts

Combine margarine, milk and chocolate in saucepan; bring to boil, stirring. Remove from heat. Add sugar; beat until smooth. Stir in vanilla. Frost cake while warm; sprinkle with nuts. Cool; cut into desired size squares.

# A special thank you to every participant in the third annual SWU Heritage Day!

"This is just like old times!" That expression was repeated numerous times throughout Sunday, June 22, when Heritage Day was celebrated in Joliet, Illinois at St. Joseph's Park.

During the 30s, 40s and 50s, Branch No. 20 was extremely active, as were many other fraternal organizations located in Joliet.
