...nogo se razpravlja o izboljšavi pravil, a žal, je med temi mnogo tudi mnogo priporavnaka in bi stanje organizacije poslabšala namesto izboljšanja. Nemam za zvišanje asesmenta, tako, ako hočemo obdržati. Isto dolgača glede podobo morala prihodnja koncija vzi v poštov zvišanje asesmentov za nekatero skladko. Po konvenciji hotela očitki sedanje asesmente, se bo sprijazniti z omejitvami ugodnosti. Posebno v sejih časih je vsekakor priporavnika omejiti podpore in skladišči asesmenta. Asesmenta mogoče tudi znižati, a vsamrjanje mora sorazmerno tudi obveznosti. Kaj nameti zniževati asesmente in ubijati za iste več kot pa se v naprej vidi, da se more po zaidevno v primanjkljaj pa doplačevati z dokladami. Isto več let povzroča jednoti neprilik visoka bolniška zavarovalnina. Ker se tridolarski razred že od nekdaj ne izplača, smatram za najumestnejše, da se ta razred sploh odprijeti pa naj se odpravi kot razred, to je, da se v bone sprejema več novih članov v razred. Članstvo tega eda je padlo pod dva tisoč, ali kolikor jih hoče ostati razred, naj se smatram redni. Ker so se v zadnjih razmerih zelo spremenile, tam tudi za umestno, da se je razred za 50c dnevne dobre podpore, s čemer bi se darilika za bolniško podporo onim članom, katerim je plačevati asesment za višo odporo. Tekom prošlega leta so znašali vsi dohodki iz članstva \$1,181,223.75 in od teh se je izdal za plače glavnih odbornikov in uslužbenec v glavnem uradu \$27,357.60 ali 2.53%.

Gornjega je razvidno, da je 2.53% vseh izplačil poseno za plače uradnikov ali dohodkov od članstva. Aziščemo dohodkom še dobre obresti, poslopja in družirov, kar je znašalo preteko \$257,000.93, vidimo, da je od skupnega prometa ali dohodka v znesku \$1,438,224.68 bljenega le 1.90% za plače druge stroške uprave skupno 5.07%. Jednota se upravlja ekonomično. Če bi zmanjšanjem plač uprav. osobiliti skupni upravni stroški problematično; jaz dvoju da bi se sploh kaj ali pa neznatno, da ni vredno očitati, možnost pa tudi obstoječe celo zvišali.

Nekateri priporočajo, da bi se pri posojilih na hiše upoštevale samo večja mesta, kar pa se meni ne zdi pravilno, nekateri pa so proti vsem posojilom na posestva. To menita zaradi tega, ker imajo sedaj državni in federalni bondi višjo ceno kot pred leti. Posojevanje na posestva je po mojem mnenju varno. Jednota bi moralu imeti eno četrtnino svojega imetja na posestvu, toda ne bi smela delati izjem, bodisi v mestih ali na deželi, ker tega ne delajo zavarovalne družbe. Posestniki kot davkoplacevalci morajo vzdržavati vse, bodisi municipalne, državne ali pa federalne bonde. Ako ne bi bilo posestnikov, ne bi bilo teh bondov. Kot že rečeno, jednota naj ima eno četrtnino imetja v posojilih na posestva, eno četrtnino v municipalnih in polovico v federalnih bondih, ako so res tako varni kot nekateri pišejo.

#### Two Hundred Delegates At Tenth Convention

According to the official report on delegates for the 10th regular convention which shall convene at the SNPJ Headquarters in Chicago May 22, the convention body will number about two hundred members. There will be over 170 delegates and 25 executive members. The previous convention, four years ago, consisted of about 230 members. ### Silver Stars of Yukon

Yukon, Pa.—Reading last week's paper we find many interesting facts and articles. One of these is the report of delegates and alternates named to the tenth regular convention to be held in Chicago beginning May 22. According to the report about 173 delegates were elected. Of this number eleven are representing the English speaking locals solely, and 21 are representing merged lodges of English and Slovene. All together 41 English speaking delegates will be represented either by a Slovene or an English lodge member. Only six English speaking lodges have a membership of one hundred or over and one of these (Pioneers of Chicago) has a membership of over 250 which allows them a representation of two delegates. No English lodge in Pennsylvania will be represented singly. At the convention several women will be found, about six or seven at the least.

In another corner we find the announcement of a levy of a special assessment upon the two and three dollar sick benefit classes. Naturally, we feel as the administrative committee, especially after hearing the report that the disbursements exceed that of the receipts in these two classes. In two dollar class a levy or 25c will be made while in the three dollar class a levy of \$1.00 will be added. In the one dollar class no extra assessments will be added. We can see that in the \$3 class more is needed because we have less younger members in it. The same is true of the \$2 class, although not as much.

In the Editorial column we read of a rare opportunity to secure new juvenile members. ## Health Talks

## High Blood Pressure

High blood pressure is a disease in which the blood pressure is permanently increased without immediate known cause. High blood pressure is one of the most common diseases of our time. There are at least 5,000,000 people in this country alone who have high blood pressure. The number of people having this disease is increasing. One reason for this is that the average life in the sixteenth century was 21 years while now in the United States it is 60 years. High blood pressure may occur at any age. It is occasionally present in children, and is not uncommon in young people. It begins most frequently, however, between the ages of 40 and 50 years. This disease is more common in women than in men.

There is little doubt that the people of the present century live under great stress and excitement. The standard exactions of modern life throw great strain upon the heart and the circulation, while the mode of life is not that which spares or strengthens the blood system.

The increased pressure of daily life is, in many people, accompanied by an increased blood pressure, at first probably necessary just as an increased steam pressure is necessary for turning larger engines. This increased pressure in both men and engines, however, produces greater wear and tear on the machine and shortens its period of activity.

Some of the associations of the onset of high blood pressure are—enlargement of the heart with acute inflammation of the kidneys; insufficiency of the large blood vessel (called aorta) which carries the blood from the heart to other parts of the body; hardening of the arteries (arteriosclerosis); hardening of the kidney; nervous causes due to prolonged mental and physical strain which is found in high strung, nervous or irritable individuals; or is the result of emotional strain, worries or business, or of unhappy domestic relations; high living; excessive eating and heavy smoking; pyorrhea, and in women high blood pressure sometimes occurs during change of life.

The earliest symptoms of high blood pressure vary somewhat. They depend partly upon the sensitiveness of the patient to his developing causes. When the heart is involved one usually experiences shortness of breath, pains over the heart due to exertion, irregularity of the heart beat, and swelling of the legs is usually one of the late symptoms. When the kidney is involved, albumen is found in the urine which means that the kidneys are not functioning properly. Under nervous symptoms, headache is the most common symptom. This headache is usually present on awakening, or wakes the patient during the early morning hours. It is generally more intense before arising but passes away either immediately after breakfast or during the course of the morning. It reappears in the same manner day after day. In some people headache caused by high blood pressure may be no more than a sensation of fullness in the head or a feeling of pressure upon the top of the head. At times severe boring pain occurs especially in the back, front and side regions of the head. Dizziness may be slight or marked; it is commonly brought on

The bowels should be very carefully watched and the routine treatment for constipation started when necessary once a week a thorough cleaning of the bowels by means of castor oil, calomel or gray powder, a teaspoonful of epsom or Glauber's salts may be taken in a half glass of warm water before breakfast, or one of the mineral waters, is advisable.

If pyorrhea is suspected, the gums and teeth should be watched carefully and treated by a dentist.

A patient suffering from high blood pressure should be under the care of a physician and undergo a thorough examination at least once or twice a year. All medicine which is necessary to reduce the blood pressure, such as glandular extracts, etc., should be prescribed by a physician.

Treatment of high blood pressure first is to control and reduce the blood pressure. The most important thing is rest and remove the nervous strain. Rest may mean absolute rest in bed for a few days or weeks. In early or mild cases when rest is combined with physics (especially calomel or gray powder) and a low meat diet, the increased blood pressure may be permanently set aside. Much can be accomplished by one or two periods of relaxation, of half hour to an hour each day.

All possible nervous tension and worry should be removed. The effect of exercise varies much in different patients. Some, especially younger men, feel that physical relaxation is attained only by strenuous exertion, such as tennis, or ball. As a rule, less active exercise such as walking, is to be preferred

Applicants under 46 years of age may apply for membership in the Sick Benefit Fund and upon payment of the following initiation fee:

At the age of Class 1 Class 2 Class 3  
16 to 22 years, inclusive \$1.00 .00 .00  
23 to 30 years, inclusive 1.50 .00 .00  
31 to 45 years, inclusive 2.00 .00 .00

and a monthly assessment of 25¢ in class 1, 50¢ in class 2, and 75¢ in class 3, be entitled to a daily benefit of

either 50¢, \$1.00 or \$1.50 per day for not more than 78 days in any one year, nor for more than a total of 468 days benefit during one or more periods of membership.

Sick or Accident Benefits are allowed only for loss of time in any remunerative occupation caused by the member being totally disabled so as to be prevented from engaging in any occupation whatsoever for compensation, gain or profit.

The membership in the Sick Benefit Fund terminates upon the member reaching age 65 years, when he may be entitled to the final benefit as shown in the table below, but in no case shall the final and the sick benefits drawn exceed the equal of 468 days benefits.

The following explains how the final benefits are figured. Example: A, B, C and D are admitted at age 16 to Class 2 of the Sick Benefit Fund and are, if disabled by sickness or accident, entitled to 468 days benefits, \$468.00 as specified in the proposed By-Laws.

Section 4 (a) provides, as shown in the above table, for age 16, Class 2, a final benefit of \$230.00 upon reaching age 65, depending upon the amount of daily benefits drawn by the member.

"A" has the good fortune of continuing good health and does not receive any daily benefit, receives a final benefit of \$230.00.

"B" is occasionally disabled and draws \$238.00 in daily benefits, also receives a final benefit of \$230.00, as the daily and final benefits together are not in excess of the limit, \$468.00.

"C" is disabled more often and draws \$400.00 in daily benefits, will be entitled to \$468.00 final benefit, the daily benefits and final benefits together totaling \$468.00.

"D" draws \$468.00 daily benefits, whereupon his membership terminates. He receives no final benefit nor is he obliged to continue paying assessments any longer after he has received the limit in daily benefits.

Members of Sick Benefit Fund who, by reason of accident not resulting in death within 90 days from the date of accident, are entitled to sick benefits, may elect to receive a cash payment in lieu of the daily sick benefits provided in the By-Laws, as follows:

Provided, such cash payment shall be in full settlement of all claims for benefit and membership in the Sick Benefit Fund shall automatically terminate upon date of such payment.

Members are only entitled to sick or accident benefits while within the boundaries of either the United States or Canada.

No member shall be entitled to benefits for the first week of his sickness or disability, figured from the day when he has been lawfully reported sick or disabled, nor shall any benefit be allowed for Sundays.

To secure Sick or Accident Benefits, the member shall observe the following:

1. He shall notify the Secretary of the Branch of this fact. When such notice is sent through the mails, the time of delivery of such letter in the post office shall be regarded as the date of the official notification. If the notice to the Secretary of the Branch has been delayed, and satisfactory reasons for the delay are furnished the Committee on Claims, said Committee has full power and authority to settle such claim for sick or accident benefits.

2. He shall submit a certificate—blanks of which are furnished by the Society—to the regular monthly meeting, such blanks to be filled out and duly signed by the attending physician.

3. Whenever the Sick Visiting Committee shall not be able to visit the sick member on account of distance, or contagious disease, the attending physician shall make affidavit as to the correctness of his report

before a Notary Public or Justice of the Peace.

4. If demanded by the Supreme Board, or the respective Branch, such medical certificate must show an affidavit as above stated, even if the Sick Visiting Committee has made the usual calls and reported thereon. No medical certificate shall be accepted as in due form, unless signed by a trustworthy, reliable and authorized physician.

5. When regaining his health and before engaging in the daily work of his profession, such member must report this fact to the Secretary of the Branch.
