IZKLJUČENJE LEWISOVIM UNIJ IZ FEDERACIJE

Zadevna resolucija
sprejeta na konven-
ciji ADF
CIO SE PRIPRAVLJA
NA BOJ

Denver, Colo., 12. okt.—Konvenca Ameriške delavske federacije je poverila eksekutivnemu svetu oblast izključenja "rebelnih" unij, ki tvorijo Odbor za industrijsko organizacijo in katemu načelju John L. Lewis, predsednik rudarske unije UMW. Resolucija, ki daje to oblast eksekutivni ADF, je bila sprejeta s 25,616 proti 12,377 glasovom. William Green, predsednik federacije, je v svojem govoru ob zaključku debate povabilne unije CIO, naj se vrnejo v ADF in ta jih bo z veseljem sprejela.

Delodajalci in politiki so bili tudi opozorjeni, da bodo morali izbirati med ADF in CIO v prihajajočem konfliktu med obema taborno. Ako se bodo postavili na stran CIO, jih bo ADF smatral za svoje nasprotnike in se bo maševala nad njimi pri volitvah.

Poročilo resolucijskega odsaka omenja načela, na katerih podlaga bo federacija vodila boji proti CIO, obenem pa biča pristranost članov federalnega delavskega zasedišča v prilog unijam CIO, kar tudi finančno pomoč, ki so jo te unije dale Rooseveltu, ko je ponovno kandidiral za predsednika Združenih držav. Poročilo odprti priznava, da pohoda industrijske unijam ne more biti ustavljena.

John P. Frey, predsednik delačke kovinarne unije ADF in tajnik resolucijskega odsaka, je ponovno napadel Lewis, ker sprejema podporo od komunistov. Dejal je, da je Lewis potrošil vsoto \$1,790,865, da postane sila na političnem polju. Ta denar je prišel iz blagajne rudarske unije.

Green je v svojem govoru kritiziral voditelje unije ADF, ki so v teku debate branili in zagovarjali CIO. "Nihe izmed govornikov, ki so tako vneto naglašali potrebo enotnosti v delavskem gibanju, ni pokazal poti, ki bi držala v to smer," je rekel Green. "Ali mislijo, da se mora Ameriška delavska federacija ukloniti manjšini, da bo potem mir? Vrata ADF so še vedno odprta onim, ki se hočejo vrneti."

Izmed 100 mednarodnih unij, ki so po svojih delegatih zagopane na konvenciji, je samo ena glasovalo proti izključitvi Lewisovih unij.

Atlantic City, N. J., 12. okt.—Unije CIO so na svoji konvenciji, ki se je včeraj pričela, v tem mestu, obdolžile vodstvo Ameriške delavske federacije odgovornosti za razkol v delavskem gibanju. Delegatje, ki reprezentirajo 32 unije, so z navdušenjem odobrili poročilo Johna Brophyja, direktorja CIO, v katerem je bilo rečeno, da je eksekutiva ADF skušala zakriti glavni razrok razkola med njim in CIO. Zanemarila je svojo nalogu, ker se ni potrudila, da organizira delave v Industrijah masne proizvodnje, zdaj pa kriči, da je CIO odgovoren za razkol v delavskem gibanju.

Sidney Hillman, predsednik unije oblačilnih delavcev v Amalzated Clothing Workers in načelnik tekstilnega organizatornega odbora, je namignil, da bo CIO izreklo za bojkot japonskega blaga v smislu Rooseveltovega priporočila, da je treba izolirati države, ki vodijo vojno na tujem teritoriju. Na vprašanje, kaj misli o zaključku konvencije ADF glede izključenja unije CIO, je Hillman odgovoril, "da se za stvar ne zanima, ker nobenega pomena."

'Čiščenje' udarilo lokalne vlade

Sovjetske puške najbolj
pokajo na vzhodni in
zapadni meji

Moskva, 12. okt.—Najnovješi val Stalinovega "čiščenja" je zajel predsednika vlade enajstov Sovjetske republike Azerbajzan, ki meji ob Kaspiškem morju na jugu Rusije in katero glavno mesto je Baku, center velej sovjetske petrolejske industrije. Ustojin Rahamanov, predsednik vlade republike, je bil odstavljen zaradi "separatističnega gibanja", kakor je bilo te dni uradno naznanjeno v Moskvi.

Rahamanov je predsednik že četrte sovjetske republike, ki je bil odstavljen v teku letosnjega "čiščenja". Republike Karelija na severu ob meji Finske in Täkistkan ter Uzbekistan v centralni Aziji so izgubile vse osebje lokalne vlade od predsednika do najnižjega uradnika. Razlog: se-paratistično gibanje!

Kaj se je zgodilo z odstavljenimi uradniki teh republik—dali so bili izgnani, vrženi v zapori ali ustreljeni—ni znano.

Republika Ukrajina ob meji Poljske, najbogatejša na pšenici in rizi, je bila tudi zapletena v "separatistično gibanje", toda gibanje je bilo hitro potlačeno in do kakih procesov ni prišlo. Znano pa je, da je Panas Ljubčenko, predsednik ukrajinske republike, izvršil samomor—potem ko so ga Izvestja, oficilni organ sovjetske vlade, napadla kot "trockista in izdajalec, ki je hotel Ukrajino prodati Nemcem. Poljotom in Janomom".

Vest o odstavljenju predsednika karelijske republike Kipova je prišla v javnost še po tem, ko je moskovska Pravda naznana, da je bil izključen iz komunistične stranke.

Proces "čiščenja" je najstrožji v obmejnih sovjetskih republikah: Kareliji, Belorusiji, na Krimu in v republikah na Kavkazu, dalje v Baškiriji in Turkmuniji ter ostalih mohamedanskih republikah, ki se dotikajo Afganistana in Indije, ter v Sibiriji ob Mongoliji in Mandžukuju.

Nova ustava Sovjetske unije v členu 17 izrecno določa, da je vsaki republiki, ki sestavlja Sovjetsko unijo, pridržana pravica, da se prosto loči od Unije. Ta člen je menda dal pobudo za se-paratistično gibanje, vendar praksa kaže, da je nova ustava doslej samo še na papirju. Respa je, da v obmejnih sovjetskih republikah kar margoli nemških, poljskih, finskih in japonskih vojnovov.

Nacijski homo- seksualci arretirani v Čehoslovaki

Praga, 12. okt.—Češka politična je zadnje dni arretirala včeraj število vodilnih nemških nacistev na Češkem na obtožbo nemoralnih činov. Med arretiranimi je "zunanji poslanik" nacistične stranke v Čehoslovaki Hans Rutha, urednik glavnega nemškega nacijskega lista Walter Rohr in pet drugih, ki so odlični lokalni voditelji nacistev.

Gouverner končal sede- čo stavko pod zemljo

Lansford, Pa., 12. okt.—Sedeča stavka 38 rudarjev, ki so seden dni sedeli 1300 čevljev globoko pod zemljivo v rovu Coal Mine, je bila včeraj končana. Stavko je končal pennsylvanski gouverner Earle, ki je dvakrat obiskal rudarje pod zemljivo in se pogajal z uradniki družbe. Družba je končno pristala na glavne zahteve rudarjev.

London, 12. okt.—Angleški predsednik županije posvetujejo v Londonu in Parizu, da najdejo izhod iz zastopa, ki ga je povzročila Mussolinijeva nota, v kateri je odklonil povabilo, naj poslje svoje predstavnike na konferenco treh velesil, ki naj bi se bavila z vprašanjem odpolitika "prostovoljev" iz Španije. Zdaj, ko je Mussolini odbil povabilo, možeta Anglia in Francija podvzeti prvi korak.

Francoska vlada, kakor vse druge, se ne bo uklonila pritisku levica, strank, naj odpreme Francije izvozu orožja in bojnega materiala v Spanijo, da tako podpre špansko ljudsko vlogo. Francoski poslanik v Londonu je imel včeraj razgovor s predstavniki angleške vlade.

Chicago. — Josephine Koren, članica društva SNP, je teden prejela žalostno vest, da je francoski predsednik izvozu orožja in bojnega materiala v Spanijo, da tako podpre špansko ljudsko vlogo. Francoski poslanik v Londonu je imel včeraj razgovor s predstavniki angleške vlade.

Ta zmaga je Japoncem odprila pot na vse ozemlje do Rmene reke. Na tem ozemlju živi 80,000.000 Kitajcev. To število je večje kot ima Japonska prebivalcev.

Na ozemlju petih provinc v severni Kitajski so bogata polja premoga, železa in aluminija.

Comments On This and That

THIRTY YEARS OF STEADY PROGRESS—HOW ABOUT CO-OPERATION FOR THE SAKE OF HEALTH?

Our Society has just completed the thirty-year period of planned progress, omitting, of course, the depression years which are outside our control. What is meant by "planned progress?" The plan resting upon a set of progressive measures and calculated to lift the SNPJ above all other similar organizations. And that is what happened.

These progressive measures were launched thirty years ago at the third regular convention, at La Salle, Ill., in the fall of 1907. The three most outstanding measures adopted at that time were the following:

First, the declaration of the Freethought principles which still stands at the head of our constitution and by-laws; second, the establishment of the SNPJ organ, first among all the Slovene fraternal organs—a monthly at the beginning and a cornerstone of the present daily Prosveta; third, the adoption of referendum, again the first democratic institution of this kind in the Slovene fraternal field.

These three great measures, becoming part and parcel of the SNPJ thirty years ago, have given the Society the greatest push upward and, together with the ever-improving scale of benefits in dollars and cents, were the core of stimulus which expanded the SNPJ into every corner and nook of America where your fathers and mothers toiled for their daily bread in the last three decades . . .

Remembering, as we justly should, that remarkable gathering at La Salle in 1907, let us honor the men, some of whom are still among us, who braved the adverse times and conditions in turning our Society on the path of real progress!

Glancing over the daily press reports and opinions, we notice a heated discussion among the doctors of medicine and much lay argument in regard to health insurance, or the application of the consumers' cooperative to medicine. In this discussion, the doctors, as organized in their American Medical Association, are mostly opposed to such insurance, saying that it leads toward socialism and revolution.

Of course, such a statement is plain nonsense, and no serious argument is necessary to refute it. It only shows that the doctors who talk this nonsense are ignorant of economic and social problems although they may be good and honest in their professional duties.

Last week we talked about cooperation in the fraternal and business fields, and how the rest of our economic and social life inevitably leans in that direction. There is no reason why medicine—call it health insurance, socialized medicine, or what have you—is just as logical as in distribution of milk or gasoline, and is certainly bound to come.

The American people spend about four billion dollars a year on medical care under the present individual fee system of medicine. Under a cooperative system, this stupendous sum would be sufficient to provide good medical care for everybody and better incomes for all efficient doctors. As it is, the least efficient—and among whom there are many downright crooks and quacks—are the boldest to appropriate the lion's share while, on the other hand, the ablest members of the medical profession, those most deserving, get the least compensation for their magnificent work.

The cooperative system of medicine can and will solve the health problem without government control, that is, political control. The principle of consumers' cooperation, democratically maintained, can also be the basis of cooperation, in other words, the voluntary group-payment system.

For example, in Elk City, Okla., there is a cooperative health organization with 2,500 members, and this organization provides medical, surgical, and dental care at \$25 a year, prepaid, for a member's family of not more than four. If this is possible and practical in one town, why cannot it be in every town and city of the land?

Now we can benefit in two ways—first, by keeping in train for the bowling tournament on Jan. 1, and again, by holding interesting team matches with a "kitty" to go to the winning team at the end of the season. The Athletic Committee has interesting plans in mind; there is a place for everybody.

So, whether you are a novice at the game or an old-timer, a topnotcher or a scrub, come out!

Let's cooperate and give the SNPJ Jolly Jrs. of Sygan No. 669 a boost by selling and buying their drawing tickets for the benefit of Rudy Knez, an injured soccer player on the Jolly Jrs. team. All the West Penna. lodges who perhaps have received a few books ought to try hard to sell them. By so doing, we not only assist, indirectly at least, the Jolly Jrs., but we can also pay our respects to the late and beloved Thomas Genter who worked tirelessly to forge the Jolly Jrs. to prominence.

Precisely the same is the case of the gangster in the neighborhood as the invasion of Italy in Ethiopia, a Franco and his Italian and German mercenaries in Spain, as Japan's plundering in China. In both cases, peace is threatened, decent conduct is sneered at, law and order is flouted—gangsterism is trying to gain the upper hand!

In such a situation as this the peaceful, democratic nations must act together, and act aggressively. The forces of democracy must line up against the ruthless dictatorships of Italy, Germany, and Japan, make them respect the covenant of the League of Nations and live up to the Kellogg-Briand pact and other international agreements. Use the collective boycott against them, not against helpless and innocent China or democratic Spain! To do otherwise, to be "neutral" is to permit these gangsters to further endanger the peace of the world.

Women's Round Table

Not long ago a Nazi representative tried to make fun of America because of the political and social freedom offered the women of this country. According to his bright opinion, America suffered a serious drawback culturally and politically because women were allowed to participate on an equal footing with men. The Nazis would put the American woman in her place, and show her that her assistance outside of home is not needed! Home is the most honored place for a woman to be. The Nazis have the deepest respect for women, mothers of the nation; they are ready to fight for them, as men did from the beginning of history; they are doing everything to make them happy at home—it is the duty of men to hunt around for prosperity, the women and children are the ones to enjoy it!

It sounds almost all right, doesn't it? But then about the same time this "bright saying" put itself in world-circulation, my library informed me that I can come and get the reserved book, "Under the Axe of Fascism," which was written by Gaetano Salvemini, who is anti-fascist, and well informed on general conditions in fascist Italy. Since Nazis shoot up their salutes to about everything that is practiced by Mussolini's black shirts in Italy, it is very interesting to know just what sort of a heaven of protection and happiness Italian womanhood has reached under the rule of fascism.

Signor Salvemini discusses the conditions of women in industry and in rural sections as well as the much boasted about "Protection of mothers and infants." He points out things in a most effective way: in numbers, Fascist statistics are compared with actual facts, also put down in numbers, with due comments which are calmly stated and tend to show that while Italy made great strides ahead on statistical paper, in reality, misery holds sway in the boot-land. The over-populated country never was prosperous, but black shirts added more to its already heavy burden of national debt and more or less generalized pauperism.

Naturally, a woman's position in limited circumstances couldn't possibly be considered very happy anywhere on earth, even if the whole armada is ready to fight for her sake. Tampering with her freedom probably makes it anything but happy. The position given her in society could hardly catch enough breeze of clear thought to promote mental development which is positively necessary for development of any nation's culture and true civilization. A mother in a fascist country must watch her children goose-step, and grow up even more ignorant than she.

And to give just one example how the fascists have succeeded in putting the woman in her place, I'll quote an interesting paragraph from the book: "A woman employed in a brick factory at the machine for the manufacture of common bricks transports in eight hours of work, 3,000 raw bricks, weighing altogether 15

These are people who can be counted as having played an important role in the industrial life of America.

The Industrial Expansion Act

YUKON, Okla.—What is claimed to be the solution to America's economic ills has been introduced into the House of Representatives in the name of the Industrial Expansion Act. Whether this piece of legislation, the product of long painstaking work on the part of Congressmen Amile of Wisconsin, Allen of Pennsylvania and Voorhis of California, will be met with open arms by the American people, or whether it'll be showered with ridicule depends upon an extensive educational campaign on the part of the socially inclined and progressive-minded Americans.

The Industrial Expansion Act is the first piece of legislation presented in the United States Congress that promotes increased production. Unlike all other legislative measures which attempted by scarcity to elevate our nation out of throes of the past and passing depressions, the authors of this bill realize that scarcity had been the whip that drove man not only to migrate to new lands; it was necessity that drove man into combat against man down through the centuries, but it must be admitted

The core of this Act is to increase production and give jobs to the unemployed by private industry; with government assistance to industry and protection to the workers and consumers, with voluntary agreements in the major industries to provide:

(a) For the inclusion in all agree-

ments of provisions against any rise

in price, except in a few sweat in-

dustry, where prices must be raised

somewhat in order to make possible

the payment of living wages.

(b) For coordinated increase of

production, planned according to na-

tional needs.

(c) For an equitable division of the

new purchasing power resulting from

increased production.

(d) Industry will be protected

against loss if it cooperates in the

plan by a system of purchase agree-

ments covering possible unsold sur-

pluses.

(e) Labor will be protected because

wages must be increased under the

plan; because prices will be prevented

from rising; and because it will have

equal representation with capital in

every industry authority.

In order to secure the cooperation of industry in carrying out a national plan calling for capacity production, the Federal government will depend primarily upon a processing tax similar to the one used under the AAA.

It is contemplated that a processing

tax of 25% of the value added to the

goods of the manufacturer will be

charged on the manufacturing opera-

tions under the Act. However, if the

unit cooperates with the government

in the matter of wages, output, and

prices, it will be protected to the bitter end.

The last session of Congress

gave us a lesson in politics and gov-

ernment that we should never forget.

The future of the Industrial Expan-

sion Act or any other piece of social

and labor legislation depends largely

upon the building of a powerful eco-

nomic and political movement along

progressive lines. This is more im-

portant in one specific section of the

country; the Achilles' heel of the re-

actionaries, the solid South.
