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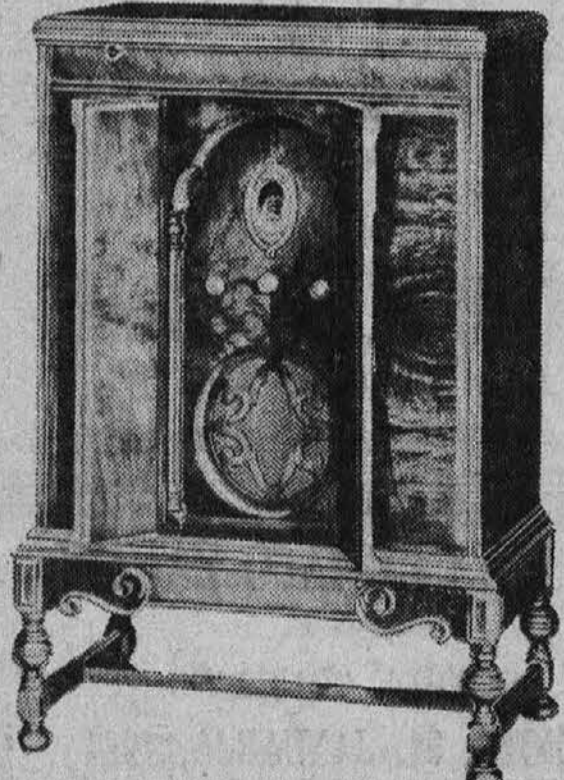

He (she?) continues: "Two Slovenes, Anthony Pozelnik, known as 'Pozy,' and Ignatius Vidvold, 'Vidi,' have starred for three years on the Latin High football and basketball teams.

"Not to forget others, Frank and Anthony Zakrajsek, brothers, on the St. Ignatius basketball team. Here's for a little more space about high school lads, who are Slovenes and are starting on their respective teams. Yours truly,

Well, Mr. Reader, you beat us to it. You see, we had a writeup about the Latin High School stars and were all set to give the Slovenian boys a nice hand.

Going way back to the year 1917 we have the first of a line of Virant stars at the Down State institution. The Rev. Ludwig Virant was the Slovenian pioneer at the Brothers of Mary School, captaining the football team in the fall prior to the signing of the Armistice.

Next in line came 'Fighting Lee' Virant who led one of the school's most powerful football squads through a successful season in 1924. Leo played guard and at present is dividing his time between running his home town of Lorain, O., as councilman, and captaining the Ohio Leo pro football team of that city.

Following Leo came little bother, (6 feet 3 inches), Johnny, who though only two years at the school played guard on the varsity eleven.

Then in the class of '27, Frank 'Box Car Bill' Belanich headed the athletic limelight. The Euclid boy starred at tackle at the institution for four years and was captain of the '26 team.

Following Belanich came Johnny 'Wep' Debesis, a Cleveland and former Latin star. Besides captaining the basketball team in his senior year, Debesis played the pivot sack and shortfield for the university nine and end on the gridiron squad.

Then we can't forget our own boss (oh Yeah!) Ray Jay, himself. You know Ray was some walker in his day. This is evidenced by the fact he established national collegiate walking records in the quarter and half-mile distances, while a member of the school track team.

Johnny Doljack, well known local baseball and basketball tosser, enjoyed two good years at the Dayton school in both of these sports.

Coupled with 'Pozy' and 'Vidi' we have a couple of Slovenian Lorain High boys who are figuring on entering the University of Dayton. They are Joe and Bernie Urbas and worked at ends of that city's state scholastic championship squad.

Joe is as much a swimmer as he is a football player, coping third place in a five-mile open race sponsored by the city, when only 15 years old.
