We Are Pointing with Pride! . . .

During every jubilee year we are prone to look back and summarize the history of our Society. It is a short history, to be sure, yet it is so packed with good experiences, successes, and triumphs that all of us should be really proud of our fraternal organization.

"All of us" mean those members who feel satisfied with the principles and ideology of our Society and value it positively; everyone, we are sure, is satisfied with benefits in dollars and cents guaranteed by the Society, but there are some who are likely to look at the SNPJ principles negatively and, therefore, might feel unhappy about the whole thing.

But for these very principles—the freethought principles—there would be no SNPJ!

In reviewing our history every jubilee year, or whenever it is necessary, we are exceedingly proud to point out the fact that the Slovene National Benefit Society was not created as a personal affair; it was not the result of a strife or a mischief or an ambition of some conceited individual. On the contrary, the SNPJ was born of pure necessity and first of all as a principle.

The Slovene immigrants in the United States were already amply provided with insurance thirty-five years ago. There existed at that time two Slovene fraternal societies with lodges in every larger community; and there were many, as of today, American insurance companies with their agents busy selling policies in every town and camp; moreover, many industrial and mining companies conducted their own systems of insurance and provided the workers with hospital care and their beneficiaries with compensation in cases of injury or accidental death.

So it hasn't been the lack of insurance that made the SNPJ so vitally necessary. No one quarreled with the insurance features of the then existing societies. It was something else that was lacking—something that only a society of the SNPJ type could furnish.

That "something" was the freethought principle, a principle of liberty and democracy in thought and action as embodied in the best American historical traditions!

That was the underlying idea, the driving force, that created our Society thirty-five years ago, and that gave the Society the greatest impetus to live, to grow, and to expand with greater vigor and success than any other Slovene fraternal society in America has ever experienced.

The SNPJ grew in membership, lodges, and assets so majestically that it outrivaled every other Slovene society, even the biggest and the oldest, within fifteen years of its existence—and today the SNPJ still stands on the top.

No wonder we should be proud!

Dark Days Ahead for the Miners of the Greedy Pittsburgh Coal Company

STRABANE, PA.—While a few of the mines in Pennsylvania are working full time in the anticipation of the strike at the expiration of the contract between the miners and the operators this coming April 1st, the Pittsburgh Coal Company finds itself in a precarious position because it overstepped its bounds in its mad scramble for profits through the mechanization of the mines on the one hand and through the manipulation of its stock for the control of the company. And it is the miner who is their pawn that always pays.

Ole Andy Mellon passed on, but the monopoly that he personified is slowly but surely centralizing into fewer hands. He left a Frankenstein behind that not only ruthlessly exploits his slaves, but is even devouring those who fell in with his scheme of coining the blood of the unfortunate workers who have to depend upon the mines for a living.

Several years ago the workers went to bat and elected George H. Earle governor. He went farther than any state executive in Pennsylvania's history to provide justice for labor. We've had "liberal" governors before. Take "Handle-Bars" Pinchot for example. He was a friend of labor like Hoover. He talked, professed friendship and did nothing. Earle's Administration acted.

But Earle is not in office today, and why? Because the smoke screen that was thrown around the real issues in the last campaign was placed successfully between the electorate and those who fought for labor's cause.

Under Earle, troopers were called out in the Johnstown Steel strike, yes, but the troopers, instead of guarding the scabs and breaking the strike, closed the mills down to avoid bloodshed. No blood was spilled and today the steel workers are organized. Quite the reverse happened at Homestead, the 1919 steel strike, the various miners' strikes, etc.

Union organization was guaranteed. So was collective bargaining.

The working man's compensation law was liberalized. Ten or twelve thousand dollars for a coal miner's widow is nothing to be sneezed at.

And the children are taken care of up to the age of sixteen.

We got the unemployment compensation. How handy the fifteen dollars a week, for thirteen weeks, came in when we were laid off. After this runs out there is relief, then the WPA. And this means something to one who has had a taste of Harding's "normalcy," kept "Cool with Coolidge" on a Cleveland park bench, and went hungry with Hoover.

The Earle Administration was the death knell of the anti-labor injunction. The coal and iron police are no more.

All of this was done, not because labor asked for them, but because the liberals felt that they were right and just, and, to put it in the vernacular of one Slovene miner, "dat's just rajt."

No wonder "big-business" opened up their coffers and knew no bounds in mud-sliling to put across their candidate as governor. If governor Earle was "bad," take a look at this quip of James': "The finest tribute that we could pay to the 1937 Democratic Legislation would be a bonfire of 3000 pages of laws enacted." And this is the guy they are already grooming for the 1940 presidential elections. Are we going to stand idly by and let James sneak into the White House and get rid of laws enacted by con-

stituional means, by duly elected representatives, Hitler-style?

Since time immemorial state power was used to repress labor, but the struggle goes on continually on the economic field.

Since these liberal labor laws enacted the employers are trying to get rid of as many workers as possible and replace them with mechanical robots, because the workman's and the unemployment compensations come from taxes placed upon industry. The answer of a liberal administration would be a check on the machinery or make some provision to take care of the worker who is displaced. The Republicans' remedy is: BURN THE LEGISLATION!

The Pittsburgh Coal Company, for whom I worked, is in the throes of a crisis of its own creation. To save a few pennies in workman's and unemployment compensation, they threw hundreds of men out of work and replaced them with mechanical loaders.

Result: Three million dollars deficit last year. This was an investment but the Mellon interests wanted profits, NOW! This is where the free-squeeze game comes in. They withdrew their money. To operate it was necessary for the Company to borrow a million dollars. They borrowed five hundred thousand dollars, giving valuable coal land as collateral, for the payment of wages. Terms, ninety days. And the banks in the Pittsburgh areas are owned by MELLON!

The acuteness of the depression, the scheming of the manipulators, plus the refusal to extend the loan, the dead hand of Mellon has a strangle hold on the concern and he will be supreme in the end. And the man who held us in economic servitude will enslave us in economic fascism if "burn-the-law" James sneaks into the national government.

The workers can still retrieve the ground they lost in the last election if they are alert to the accomplishments of the New Deal and let the brick-bats—both from the right and from the left—go unheeded.

Of course we will be told that the deck is old, but a New Deal with an old deck is better than discarding the old without securing the new. Democracy is a process and not a theory and we will have to work up through the slush no matter how obnoxious—or perish in it.

FINANCE COMMITTEE PROCEEDINGS

of January 21, 1939

The meeting was called to order at 9 a.m. by the Chairman. In attendance were all committee members except Bro. Cainkar, who was on a speaking engagement. Dec. meeting minutes approved.

The following report was submitted by Petrovich: 1. He read a letter from Moody's Service recommending retention of Eppley Hotels' 3%. The Committee concurred in the suggestion. 2. Moody's letter on the Los Indios (Texas) Independent School District bonds, advising that further information would be forthcoming from their New York office, was placed on file.

A telegram recommending a gradual liquidation of this holding, was also placed on file. 3. A letter giving the financial condition of the Washington Square Development Company recommending retention of those bonds at the present; placed on file. 4. Purchases made since the last meeting were as follows: a) \$25,000 U.S. Treasury, 2 1/2%; b) \$25,000 Public Service, No. Illinois, 3 1/2%; c) \$25,000 Wisc. Electric Power, 3 1/2%; d) \$30,000 U.S. Treasury, 2 1/2%. Total \$105,000.

The following report was submitted by Vider: 1. A letter from the Superintendent of Schools of the Los Indios (Texas) Independent School District, explaining the financial condition and why interest could not be paid on the bonds, was read. The letter contained an offer of settlement if we are willing to dispose of our bonds. Lotrich's motion that we offer them a cash settlement of 80% on the bonds or if they will pay \$5,000 on the bonds, we will reduce the interest to 3%, was seconded and carried. 2. Philip B. Heller's letter on the Lakeshore Athletic Club reorganization was read and placed on file. 3. A letter from the Bondholders' Protective Committee advised that the assets of the Frischkorn Realty Company were sold. It was carried that we leave the bonds with the Committee and advise Mr. Heller that no further action be taken on his part. 4. A bill presented by Lotrich in connection with the sale of the property at 2670-72 East 79th Street in the amount of \$22 was approved. 5. Two bills presented by Petrovich in connection with the sale of the Wessel and Klemenc properties in the total amount of \$20, approved. 6. A letter from John Ocepok of Springfield, Illinois, who is the tenant in the Slovens Dom, asked for an allowance on his rental inasmuch as the repairs on the street slowed his business tremendously. Decided to grant him half of one monthly rental. 7. A semi-annual report of our properties in Detroit, Mich., was submitted by Peter Benedict, our representative, which report was placed on file.

Vogrich reported as follows: 1. FHA mortgages purchased in the Cleveland area amounted to \$9300; in the Chicago area, \$22,487.43; total, \$31,787.43. Bonds purchased, \$109,593.75. Total purchases for the month, \$141,381.18.—2. \$25,000 City of Chicago matured Jan. 1, 1939, and were paid. \$1000 Conrad, Montana, bonds were called. Intermountain Water Power was liquidated. 3. M. B. Vick and Company advised that there should be a much better market for our Westchester, Illinois, special assessment bonds. At the same time, they forwarded check in the amount of \$800 on past due interest and principal on those bonds. The letter was placed on file as read and the Committee decided to hold these bonds for the present. 4. There has been no response to our inquiry on the McAllen, Texas, bonds. Likewise, very little interest is shown in our Los Indios, Texas, School District bonds. The Robstown past due interest certificates have not been sold as yet. 5. In the absence of Brother Cainkar, Brother Vogrich reported on the situation at the Hrvatski Dom. So far as our Society is concerned, the situation was unchanged.

Lotrich reported as follows: 1. A proposition to exchange the Hrvatski

The main objection to this so-called additional building is because a guy named "Lindy" Lokar brought forth the idea of building a recreational center which would house eight official bowling alleys on the main floor and four balling alleys in the basement. This plan was presented in detail before the annual meeting of the stockholders and lodges last January, after which a secret ballot was taken and the vote was 128 for and only 17 against. But lo and behold! As much as we feared, personalities entered the picture, although, being in the half-dozen minority, I do not intend to criticize those who seek facts, but to knock a thing of this type without reasonable grounds makes one wonder, "How is it that we progressed as far as we did?" One realizes that opposition is always active even in the best of endeavors. Here are the facts.

The proposed building will not cost a penny over \$25,000, which will include plumbing, heating, lighting and "summer cooling" (not "air-conditioning") and other incidentals. The annex will be built so that the present club room will serve two purposes, thus requiring no additional help in the club rooms, although statistics show and will prove that revenue will be doubled as far as club rooms are concerned. As far as the bowling alleys are concerned, they will, no doubt, pay for themselves out of bowling alley profits, which profits are much greater than one realizes. The inside balling courts will keep our older Slovens whose leading sport is lawn bowling (ballina), with us the entire winter. (The profits derived from two such ballina alleys at present by the Slovens National Home speak for themselves, and the profits derived from two bowling alleys of the Slovens Home on Holmes ave., which net approximately \$1000 each per year, speak louder than words.)

The reasons for this building are many. First, we are losing all of our youth who spend their money elsewhere but who, if we had alleys to serve the purpose, would be with us. Secondly, competition on ballina courts is also very keen; in fact, everyone having a large enough yard puts them in. Thirdly, the drastic reduction in the income of the Home at present puts us in a serious plight. Therefore, something must be done. And it will require the moral backing of each one of the individuals who is for the idea.

If present indications work out, ground will be broken in spring and everything will be ready for occupancy by Sept. 1st. This addition will, no doubt, make the Slovens Workmen's Home the outstanding Slovens center in the country. So in closing, all I ask is, if you are for the program put your shoulders to the wheel and help; if you are against the idea for personal reasons, forget them.
