Review on the Book Campaign Since Its Initiation

In this second of a series of articles reporting on the PSWA Executive Board Book Campaign, we wish to acknowledge the individual contribution of people in Slovenian communities everywhere in the United States.

Thanks to a fine working committee, Eva Coff, Theresa Gorjanc, Nežka Kalan, Alice Mirtich, Ivana Shiffner, Cečilia Šubelj, Josje Zakrajšek, with Josephine Petrič as secretary, and Vicki Poljšak as treasurer, we can report that to date our campaign has been highly successful.

Beyond the working committee, a number of people in Cleveland have worked faithfully at the project of collecting, transporting, and packing books, and to them too we wish to extend our thanks: Anna Azman, Amalia Božeglav, Vinko Coff, Jennie Dagarin, Kati and Rosa Jerman, John Kriebel, Carmin Leoni, Leo Poljšak, John Tavčar, and Andrew Turkman.

Our thanks, too, to Zarja, for the generous use of their clubroom in Slovenian National Home as a workroom and collection center.

In answer to hundreds of requests for books from Slovenia, literally thousands of books and magazines have already been shipped overseas. Several hundred new books, for which we had specific requests, were purchased, but the majority were donated by friends of the book campaign from their own libraries, and collected from their friends, from their doctors, dentists, attorneys, engineers, and other professional people. A really amazing imposing list of titles resulted from the diligence which brought this library together.

There are many interesting stories to be told about the way different people cooperated. Space does not permit the whole history, but you may be interested in a few. In one instance, a large heavy box of books was brought from California by a traveller who was returning to Cleveland: Frank Rokavec of 16122 Groveside Ave., carried with him the fine books donated in Fontana, California!

An inspiring thought led Mary Celin, a Progressive from Salem, Ohio, to the local school board with the plea that they give to our campaign whatever books were no longer in use. This initiative netted us hundreds of excellent books, some 20 odd copies of one edition, to equip a whole classroom of students in Slovenia! Just so, in Herminie, Pa., Martin Urana approached his school board, and five large cartons of really excellent textbooks were procured.

Dr. Andrew Furlan of Waukegan, Ill., was among the first to recognize the need for professional technical material in Slovenia, and his contribution was such an imposing one that the news of it preceded the shipment of his books to Slovenia, and prompted an urgent letter from the Dental Clinic in Ljubljana, requesting assurance that they would indeed be the recipients of his contribution.

In two instances, tragic circumstances prompted the donation of technical books which we were deeply honored to receive. Real selflessness prompted the parents of young students who had died to donate their books to our campaign. Such a gift is a real monument to the memory of these two young people, for their books will contribute to a new future in Slovenia, and will inspire Slovenian young people by the hundreds.

Factory workers have contributed technical pamphlets which are published by large industries describing their own particular field; these should be pure gold in a country where industry is growing apace.

A restaurant owner gave wonderful material which should contribute invaluable help to the new food industry in Slovenia.

A professional man actually purchased almost a hundred dollars' worth of fine texts, duplicating material which he has found most helpful in his own business, and then donated them to our campaign with the request that he wishes to remain anonymous!

Dr. Frank J. Kern has also given from his library material which is already in use at the medical faculty of the University of Ljubljana.

Our Slovenian students in American colleges and universities have given textbooks and canvassed their friends and fellow-students for additional material.

In West Allis, Wis., Mary Mutsch, and in St. Louis, Mo., A. Spiller made real drives, and sent us a heart-warming collection of books which fit perfectly into the requests which we have received.

An imposing shipment of books has just been received from Waukegan, Ill., which testifies to the hard work and generous contribution of a number of people working together. We have no news yet of who is responsible for this fine cooperation, but the testimony is here: Waukegan and North Chicago have done a magnificent job!

A geographical survey of our list of donors indicates that in Slovenian communities scattered everywhere throughout the United States, individual effort has added up to wholehearted cooperation from hundreds of people, without whom the vast enterprise which we undertook just less than a year ago could not have succeeded. For the committee, and for the dozens of schools, institutes, libraries, academies, etc., in Slovenia, and for the hundreds of students, who will for years to come benefit from your individual and collective contributions, our deep gratitude!

Health leaders attending Greater Cleveland's Polio Preparedness Meeting July 26 agreed that Cleveland is well prepared to give excellent care to the victims of polio. Representatives of the many groups interested in the problem of polio participated in the meeting, which was sponsored by the local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and the Division of Health.

Representatives of the medical and nursing professions, the Red Cross, hospitals caring for polio patients, and health commissioners of the area reported that adequate equipment and supplies are available. Assurance was given that nurses and volunteers who have been given specialized training will be available in case of emergency. This does not mean that a major outbreak is expected! No one can accurately predict how many cases will occur. However, there have been 50% fewer cases reported in Greater Cleveland so far this year than in the corresponding period in 1940.

Poliomyelitis isolation and quarantine regulations: Listed below are the regulations which became effective in Cleveland July 1, 1950: "In accordance with the provisions of Section 919 of the Sanitary Code of Cleveland and in conformity with revised Ohio State Sanitary Code regulations effective July 1, 1950, the following procedures relative to acute poliomyelitis are to be followed:

Straight From Washington

Washington. — The fat is in the fire. We have to face it—it is a fact that the "Korean incident" may conceivably blow up into World War III. Even if it does not, it will be a costly affair in American lives and money. Cheap wars are a thing of the past. There is no such thing as a 99 cents bargain when it comes to war.

Home Delivery

The controversial bill to restore two-a-day mail deliveries in residential areas will be voted on in the House of Representatives the forepart of August. Postmaster General Donaldson ordered this curtailment of mail delivery service. Some claim it will result in an annual saving of 40 million dollars, and that is important money. On the other hand, many businessmen with offices and plants located in residential neighborhoods are protesting that this greatly prejudices and hampers them and gives an unfair advantage to similar businessmen located in business districts where the mail is delivered twice a day or even more frequently.

Also, the argument is advanced that with increasing thousands of boys in the Armed Services, delivery of letters between them and the folks at home should be accelerated, not delayed. The committee had bottled-up this bill but it is expected this committee will now "secure a rule" and provide for debate and vote now that a majority of House members have signed a petition to discharge the committee. This will afford an opportunity for Congress to decide what policy should be in force regarding mail deliveries.

Internal Security Fearing the Korean fighting will make American Communists more active, the House of Representatives has taken steps toward internal security. With only 14 dissenting votes, it passed a bill giving heads of sensitive departments (those having something to do with our war effort), the right to discharge any employee having a poor security record and being a security risk. "Security risk" is a broad term—much broader than "disloyalty" or "subversive." Included in this category would be anyone in the habit of drinking intoxicants to excess or talking unwisely and too much.

Author! Author! Week after week U. S. Senator Joe McCarthy, in search of headlines, claimed there are Communists and Soviet spies in the State Department. By unsupported and reckless denunciations he has stirred up prejudices and hatred. Continuously repeating charges, even though groundless, may cause some citizens to have doubts. That is his hope. Furthermore, he announced he would never sink so low as to slink behind senatorial immunity yet he has very categorically refused to repeat his charges in public. Innocent persons whose reputations he has damaged therefore are afforded no redress.

It is a fact that there is not one Communist or Soviet spy in the entire State Department. This is the same McCarthy who received \$10,000 of taxpayers' money for a short article on housing, which he persuaded the Lustron Company to buy. That money he received was borrowed from the R. F. C. In other words, from you and me and other taxpayers.

Secretary of Agriculture Brannan said McCarthy would probably be better off if he quit speaking and did more writing. If he could find a market for his fiction as profitable as his article on housing, he should be able to pay his Wisconsin income taxes next year. McCarthy's article might be worth \$100. His being a senator added \$9,900 to the value of his booklet, according to Lustron Company officials who defaulted on an R. F. C. loan. The fact that the money he received was borrowed from our government.
