









**THIS WEEK IN AMERICAN HISTORY**

On September 6, 1757, Marie Jean Paul Yves Roch Gilbert du Motier, better known as the Marquis de Lafayette, was born in France. Though only 19 years old in 1776, when news of the revolt of the American colonies reached him, he fitted out a ship at his own expense and sailed for America. He was warmly greeted by General Washington and made a major-general. He fought gallantly in many battles of the Revolution and was also instrumental in persuading France to help the colonists. In 1781 his troops played a major role in the defeat of the British under General Cornwallis, which led to their surrender at Yorktown. Later that year he sailed for France and did not return to the United States until 1824. He was enthusiastically received wherever he went. Congress voted him \$200,000 and a township of land. His aid to America during the Revolution has been well remembered by the American people and has been one of the cornerstones of the many years of amicable French-American relations.

On September 11, 1609, Henry Hudson, while on a voyage seeking a Northwest Passage to Asia, discovered a river and a tree-covered island which was to play a great part in American history. The river, the Hudson, was named after its discoverer and the island was Manhattan. Hudson thought the river might connect with a sea route to Asia, but after sailing all the way to

what is now Albany, he realized that he was going to be disappointed again. The Dutch later came to look at this island, made an excellent real estate deal by buying it from the Indians for \$24 worth of trinkets and established a settlement which today is one of the most cosmopolitan cities of the world.

On September 27, 1840, Thomas Nast, the cartoonist who first conceived the symbols of the Democratic and Republican Party—the donkey and the elephant respectively—was born in Landau, Bavaria. Nast came to the United States with his parents as a child and by the time he was fifteen, was an "art-correspondent" for some newspapers. At the age of 21 he was "art correspondent" with Garibaldi's army in Italy. He later took up cartooning and became the most celebrated cartoonist of the Nineteenth Century. His cartoons, featuring the "Tammany Tiger" helped smash the corrupt political machine headed by "Boss" Tweed. Tweed has been quoted as saying about Nast's cartoons, "Let's stop them pictures. I don't care so much what the papers write—my constituents can't read—but they can see the picture." It was in the 1870's that Nast popularized the donkey and the elephant as the symbol of the two political parties and these symbols are still used today.

On September 30, 1946 William Thomas Green Morton, a Boston dentist, gave the first practical demonstration of the use of anesthetics. In extracting a tooth without pain to his patient, Morton used a gas which he called "Letheon" but which is now called ether. He first experimented on himself to make sure the gas was harmless. Two weeks later Dr. Warren of the Massachusetts General Hospital removed a tumor from a man who had received "Letheon." When the man suffered no pain, Dr. Warren said, "Gentleman, this is no humbug." Morton patented his discovery, but offered free use to all charitable institutions. Though his patent was later contested by two other doctors and he died in poverty, unable to profit from his discovery, Morton deserves credit for the first public demonstration of the value of ether to the medical profession and to the public.

On October 13, 1792, the cornerstone of the President's official residence in Washington, D. C., popularly known as the White House, was laid. James Hoban of Charleston, South Carolina, was the architect. The building is 170 feet long and 86 feet deep. Construction was not completed until 1800 and John Adams became the first President to occupy it. For many years it was the office as well as the home of the President, but President Theodore Roosevelt had an office built adjoining it and connected with it by a corridor. During the administration of President Truman, the White House underwent thorough repair.

On October 14, 1614, William Penn, founder of Pennsylvania, was born. Penn inherited from his father a money claim against the King of England. The Royal Treasury refused to honor the claim and Penn demanded and received a land grant in America instead. He was given a royal charter for land which the King named "Pennsylvania," meaning Penn's Woods. Penn, a Quaker, used the land as a refuge for other members of his religious sect which was being persecuted at that time in England. Later he came to America himself and played an important part in building up the colony. His belief in religious freedom and his good judgment in dealing with the Indians were unusual for his time. He proved a liberal and intelligent administrator of the affairs of the colony of which he was governor.

**Immigration and Naturalization**

Question: I am an alien, a member of a ship's crew and have been sailing in and out of the United States for many years, always with proper seaman's papers. Some years ago, I met an American girl and married her and we have established a home here together. I now should like to apply for a permanent immigration visa but I never seem to be long enough in any port to get my paper in order. What can I do?

Answer: It is suggested that you register for a nonquota immigration visa at one of the ports at which you are most frequently, and where there is a fairly sizable American consulate. After your wife's petition for a nonquota immigration visa has been approved by the Immigration and Naturalization Service, you should determine at which port you will be on a certain date. You should then ask the Consul at the office where your records are to transfer your files to the one you have selected and where, in your opinion, you will be on a certain date. If you give the various consular offices sufficient notice ahead of time, they will process you within one or two days of your arrival.

Question: I am a naturalized American citizen and have filed a petition with the Attorney General for a preference visa on behalf of my sister who lives in the country of my birth. The quota for that country is oversubscribed and my sister has not been able to get a visa. My petition was approved by the Attorney General two years ago. Is it still good?

Answer: No, your petition is not good because under the regulations of the State Department which were in effect until February, 1954, petitions for preference visas were valid only for one year from the time of approval. In February, 1954, the State Department amended its regulations and under the new regulations petitions for second, third, and fourth preference are valid for three years from the date of approval. You will have to file a new petition, but this will remain valid for three years. It may be of interest to know that petitions for non-quota and first preference quota visas are valid for less than three years. This is because such visas are more readily available, but since second, third and fourth preference are often oversubscribed—as you know from the case of your sister who was entitled to fourth preference only—petitions filed for these preferences are given a longer period of validity.

Question: I am an alien who came to the United States as a student some years ago. Since I came here my home country has been overrun by the Communists, but, because I had lived in South America for a number of years after leaving my home

country, my petition for adjustment of status under the Displaced Persons Act was denied. I was then put under order of deportation. The only country I can be sent back to is the country of my birth, but I am anti-Communist and do not want to go back there. Is there anything I can do?

Answer: It is against the policy of this Government to send aliens back to Communist-controlled countries where they would be subject to persecution. But the law provides that an alien claiming the danger of persecution, if he is returned to the country of his birth, must present satisfactory proof of such danger. If he can present such proof, he will not be deported to that country, and it is quite probable that no other country will be willing to receive him. That fact, however, does not legalize his status in the United States. Unless he is eligible for suspension of deportation—to be eligible he must have been here between five and ten years, depending on various factors, and he must be able to show that deportation would result in "exceptional and extremely unusual hardship"—the law does not provide

any procedure by which his status here can be legalized, except by leaving the country and, if possible, obtaining an immigration visa.

Question: I am a naturalized American citizen and have lived in the United States for many years. My nephew abroad would like to immigrate and I would like to help him. His quota is open and I believe he meets all requirements. However, the American Consul in his country told him that he is inadmissible because when he was 18 he was convicted of petit larceny for taking some wood from an empty lot. His sentence of one day's imprisonment was suspended. Is it true that this minor conviction can keep him from coming to the United States as an immigrant?

Answer: Assuming that your nephew is otherwise eligible for an immigrant visa, the law, as amended very recently, permits your nephew's immigration. Up to September 3, 1954, your nephew was excludable as having been convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude. On that date, however, President Eisenhower signed Public Law 770,

which permits the immigration of aliens in spite of the fact that they have been convicted of not more than one petty offense. A petty offense, as defined in the federal statutes, is an offense which is punishable by imprisonment not to exceed six months or a fine not to exceed \$500, or both.

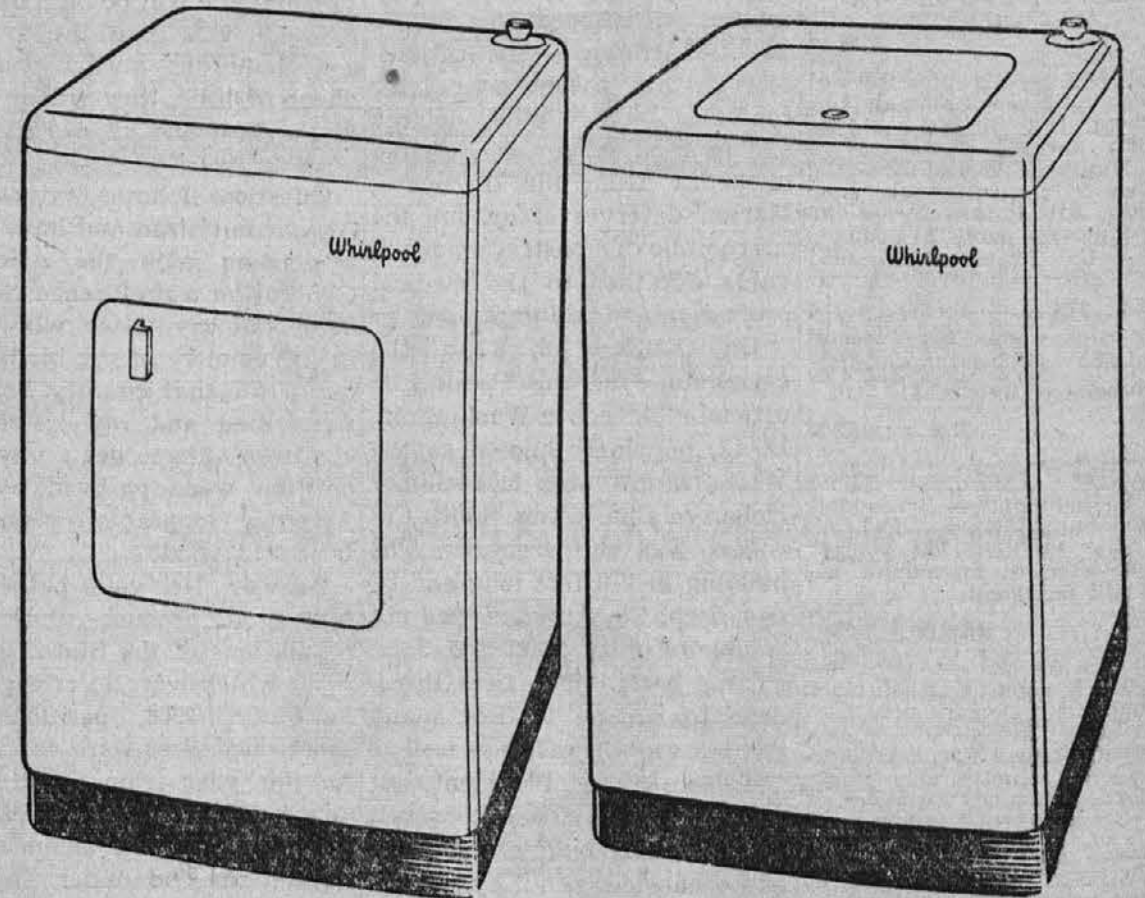
