





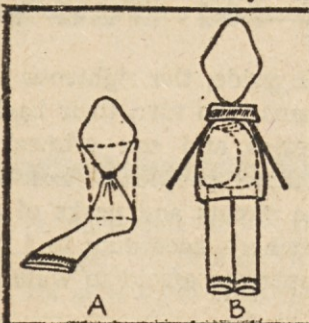






## A Golfing Mascot For Dad.

The traditional gift of socks for Father can be made doubly welcome by presenting them as an amusing mascot. Take a pair of socks of Creslan acrylic fiber, which are particularly soft and comfortable. Stuff the toe of one sock (Diagram A) and secure with a rubber band halfway up the foot. Turn the cuff up over the toe — just below the head. Wind a long pipe cleaner over the elastic, and



Let the ends hang down for arms (see Diagram B). Turn cuff back over neck for a turtle neck effect. Use the second sock to form the legs. Pin down the center of the leg to about 4" from the cuff. Insert a cylinder of heavy paper into each section to form legs. Roll up the remainder of the second sock, and stuff into the opening of the first sock, to form the body. Let the legs dangle. Finish by pinning or pasting on pieces of felt cut out to make the hat, eyes, and mouth.

## What Every Dog Should Know

Chicago, Ill. — When you walk your dog, does he lunge on the leash or drag like an anchor? When you say "Come," does he decide to play tag instead? Does he bark at the mailman and jump on your guests?

Lovable though he may be, your dog needs to learn the basics of doggy department. Teach him to obey just five words — Heel, Sit, Down, Stay, and Come — and turn your canine cup-up into a well-mannered pet you not only love, but are proud to own.

You don't have to be an expert to train a dog. Even a youngster can do it. Keys to success are patience and consistent training methods.

Your backyard, a family room, or a nearby park makes a fine do-it-yourself classroom. Choose the time and place you and your dog can work without distractions ten of fifteen minutes once or twice a day.

Equipment for dog obedience training is simple and inexpensive to acquire. You need a six foot leash with a snap fastener and hand loop, a twenty-five foot leash or length of clothes-line equipped with a fastener and loop, and a slip or "choke" chain collar.

This type of collar differs from a buckle-on collar in that it tightens around the dog's neck when the leash is pulled. The collar loosens immediately when the tension is relaxed. Properly used, it will not hurt your dog; it does allow you to control him effectively, and is approved by humane groups.

Now here are the techniques used by professional trainers to teach the basic dog obedience commands.

**Heel.** This lesson teaches your dog to walk quietly at your side without pulling or dragging on his leash. To begin, put on his collar and six-foot leash. Place him on your left side. Hold the end of the leash in your right hand with the excess length looped neatly. Stand straight and grasp the leash lightly near the collar with your left hand. Start walking at a normal pace, keeping your dog trotting at your side with short, firm tugs on the leash with your left hand only. Each time you tug, say "Heel!" Let the leash and collar go slack when he heels properly. Tighten it only when he tries to charge ahead or lag behind. As he walks along with you, praise him for good behavior.

**Sit.** Begin this lesson as you did the heeling lesson with your dog standing on your left. Hold his head up with the leash in your right hand. With your left hand, push down on his hindquarters and say "Sit." After a few tries, alternate heeling and sitting, so he'll learn to sit on command each time you stop.

**Down.** Many dogs don't like this lesson — they think it's undignified. Work until he obeys. Start by commanding him to sit. Kneel beside him, grip the leash close to the collar with your left hand, and tug downward sharply. Say "Down... Down... Down" in a firm friendly tone. Repeat the word until he lies down. Say "Down" again while he stays down and praise him lavishly after you allow him to get up.

**Stay.** Give your dog the command to sit. Holding the leash slack, walk away from him. If he starts to follow, say "No, Sit... Stay." Practice walking to the side, front and back. When he will stay on the short leash, work with the long leash. Walk as far as you can and still hold him in position with the word "Stay."

**Come.** Get your dog ready with the training collar and the long leash. Command him to stay in a sit or down position. You walk to the end of the leash, face him, and tell him to come. Like this: "Duke, Come! Pull him toward you

with easy, hand-over-hand tugs on the leash. Always insist that he comes when he is called. If he runs the other way, never chase him. Teach him that he must come to you for petting or praise and that running away wins nothing but a disapproving "no."

**Training Tips.** How quickly your dog learns each command will depend on his individual personality, coordination, intelligence, and sensitivity. Your ability to stick with it and be patient are important too. As you work, keep these tips in mind:

1. Short training sessions every day accomplish more than long lessons only now and then.
2. Give your dog exercise and an opportunity to relieve himself before the lesson begins and time to play afterward.
3. Never shout or show impatience. Give one or two word commands in a firm voice that shows you mean business.
4. Be generous with praise. Let your approval and affection be the rewards your dog works for.
5. Be sure your dog knows each command before going on to the next. If you begin and each lesson by running through the commands he does well, it makes learning more fun.

**STUDENT DRAFT DEFERMENTS.** Many young men in college or the senior year of high school have been asking, "Will I be able to finish my education before being drafted for military service?"

Here is the answer from selective service officials: In general, a full-time student who is making normal progress in his studies can count on being deferred from military service until he completes his college work, including a graduate degree. This is based on the present outlook, and an assumption that the United States will not go into full mobilization. There will be exceptions, mostly in cases of "marginal" students or those believed by their draft boards to be trying to stretch out college work solely to escape the draft.

Student deferment continues to be almost routine. Nationwide aptitude tests for college students as a basis of deferment have been discontinued. Class standings also have been dropped as a guide. Regulations still provide that a student's study must be found "to be necessary to the maintenance of the national health, safety or interest", but that is interpreted liberally to apply to practically all students carrying full courses of studies and making passing grades. Selective Service officials say they expect draft calls to level off and possibly go down from the December level of 40,200. This would lessen pressure on local boards to draft students to meet their quotas.

If a student should be reclassified as 1-A, and he feels his local board has not given proper consideration to all the facts in his case, he has the right to appeal within 10 days, but must do so in writing.
