Declaring that he would attempt to make this a campaign of issues instead of petty personalities or cheap politics, John DeVito, candidate for council in Ward 32, presented his program to citizens of the area.

DeVito called for solving the transportation problem by presenting better service without any increase in the cost of fare; he declared that the city would go a long way toward solving the housing shortage by undertaking a program to build homes for vets and other citizens through city projects including both apartment homes and single and double family units (which is already being done in New York); and he emphasized the long-standing need for a municipal hospital in the Collinwood

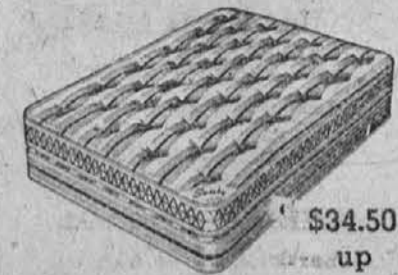
