Joliet, Ill.—Another K. S. K. J. Basketball Tourney is now history. Father Hiti and his Waukegan Committee are to be complimented upon the successful conduction of this tourney. We must say that everything was run off smoothly and to the satisfaction of all. The referees, under Mr. Englehardt, are also to be complimented for keeping things moving. A welcome addition to the refereeing staff was Mr. Presto of Barberton, Ohio. The crowds were very large. The Mother of God gym was packed to its utmost capacity in the Sunday afternoon and evening games. The Supreme Officers attending the tourney, Joseph Zalar, Louis Zeleznikar, Matt Slana besides Joe Zorc, the Athletic Director, who was always on hand, were pleased with the enthusiasm of the crowds and the spirited competition on the part of the players.

The tourney began with the St. Genevieve Girls of Joliet battling the St. Ann's of Waukegan. This game turned out to be one of the greatest battles ever staged by our girls in our tourneys. This was the only game that went over-time. The score at the end of regulation time was 29 all. We don't recall any other girls' game in which both teams scored as many points as was the case in the opening night. In the three minute overtime period, the Joliet girls scored four baskets for a total of eight points, capuring the game, 37 to 29.

As had been predicted, the winner of this game went forth to win the championship, though it must be said that the St. Stephen Girls played excellent ball in the finals. It was their tight zone defense that held the Joliet girls to 18 points, while they themselves were making 13. The St. Stephen Girls entered the finals with their last minute victory over the St. Florian Girls. The score in this game was 15 to 14.

The Heavyweight Division not only had the largest number of team entries we ever had, but also showed the best brand of basketball to date. The new comers, Sheboygan and Canonsburg made a very good showing. Sheboygan was handicapped by the lightness of their players, but considering that they were eliminated by St. George's of Joliet, the final champs, after a good battle, they may well feel proud of their achievement. It seems to observers that the strenuousness of the Pennsylvania boys trip took out of them that extra punch which they needed in the final quarter. The three teams that stood out as the best of the heavyweight class were the two finalists, the Joliet St. George's, St. Michael's of South Chicago and St. Stephen's of Chicago.

The Joliet St. George's in winning over both, St. Stephens and St. Michaels were deservedly the heavyweight champions. In fact it seems that Joliet is proving to be St. Michael's stumbling block in the tourney finals. The St. Michaels eliminated Joliet when they won the first championship in 1936. The St. Michaels won last year in their final game with St. Stephens. But in three other finals, Joliet took top honors from the Michaels. These were in the tourney of 1937 when Joliet won, 38 to 37; in 1938 when Joliet won, 44 to 37 and this year's finals.

The Lightweight Division is apparently slipping. The St. Joe's of Waukegan, this year champs, were the best of their class, but didn't seem to play as good ball as they did last year. It appears to be getting easier to win the lightweight championship, because the lightweight groups are becoming more or less just makeshift organizations. There is not enough attention being paid to them as team units. We, now more than ever, are convinced that there must be some other arrangement for the younger players who take part in the tourney. And we purposely are using the word *younger* because we think that the best arrangement would be to set an age limit for the Junior Division in future tourneys.

All who took part in this great event are already looking forward to next year's affair. It is to be hoped that since Chicago is the next convention city; that the Chicago K. S. K. J. Boosters will start the ball rolling, beginning 1942 with the Ninth Annual Midwest Basketball Tournament.

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OUR PAGE COOKING SCHOOL

This week's first "honorable mention" goes to Mrs. Rose Vichich, 1112—13th Ave., East Hibbing, Minn. Mrs. Vichich is a member of St. Ann's Society, No. 156, of Chisholm, Minn. Her recipe for "Peta," a Croatian specialty, is as follows:

Peta 4 eggs, 1 cup butter, 1 1/4 cups sugar, 4 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 7 or 8 apples.

Mix the dry ingredients as for pie crust. Then cut in your butter and mix in the well beaten eggs. Roll 1/2 of your dough to 1/4 inch thickness. Line your cake pan with this dough. Cut your apples very thin and place them all over this dough. Sprinkle these apples with 1/2 cup sugar and cinnamon mixed. Roll out the rest of the dough and place on top of all this and bake for about 1 hour. It is best baked on a cookie sheet. After it is cool cut in pieces and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Pineapple Salad 1 No. 2 1/2 can pineapple cubes, drained, 4 bananas, diced, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 10 marshmallows, quartered, 1/2 cup chopped nuts, 1 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cups pineapple juice, 2 beaten eggs.

Mrs. Frank M. Banich, 2015 W. 22nd St., Chicago, Ill., a member of Mary Help of Christians Society, No. 78, of Chicago, sends us the following advice: When the family refuses to eat stewed prunes, the following recipe will provide them with the stewed fruit in cake form.

Prune Cake 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1 cup mazzola oil, 3 eggs, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 cup buttermilk with 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 16 prunes, cooked, stoned and chopped, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts (optional).

Mix all together and bake in 3 layers in a moderate oven 1 1/2 hour. Put together with butter frosting.

Also sent in by Mrs. Banich is the following economy pound cake.

Dutch Cake 1 cup butter, 2 cups sugar, 4 eggs unbeaten, one at a time, 1 cup milk, 3 cups flour, pinch of salt, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix as for any pound cake. Bake in greased tube pan 350 degrees for 1 hour.

mother's lap—Mrs. Zivic became resigned to the participation of her oldest son into the "tough" fight business. Nothing seemed "too tough" when it brought that kind of money. That fight was Pete's first under the management of Jimmy Bronson, who, with his associate, Lou Brown, was to play an important part in the lives of all the Zivic family.

Bronson brought Pete to the McKeesport Palisades on Mar. 29, 1923, to fight Abe Attell Goldstein, another of Pete's opponents destined to become a world champion. Midget Smith was another, and their fight at Motor Square Garden was a classic meeting between boxer and slugger, as Smith was built like a middleweight, a rip-tearing, rushing stylist. These were no decision fights, supervised by the Pittsburgh City Commission, of which Garnet M. Sixsmith, then and now a prominent railroad official, was chairman.

Pete's Kayo By Tremaine!

Perhaps, the high spot in Pete's life was his most dismal. For, as Sixsmith and his associates sought to aid Mrs. Enoch Rauh's Milk Fund by staging a benefit show at Forbes Field on July 7, 1923, Pete was matched with Carl Tremaine, surly, hard-punching Cleveland featherer. It was a bad afternoon for Pete, because Tremaine nailed him with a hook in the seventh round and scored the most spectacular knockout seen here up to that time. The Milk Fund shows were jinxes for the Zivics because, as Pete suffered his worst kayo, the same show, the next year was to see Jack suffer his most unexpected and most decisive defeat in the same ring.

Tremaine's kayo of Pete is still talked about here by those who permit such things to become indelible in their memory.

At that time Fritzie was nine years old and Eddie 11, just beginning to get a thrill out of their big brothers' work.

The kayo by Tremaine was one of nine suffered by Pete during his career, which did not terminate until three years later. At that time, Bronson and Brown brought with them, from Terra Alta, W. Va., a "physical advisor" for the kids named Dr. Stanhope Scott, who remained with them in all their big fights, and was in New York with Fritzie when he won the title. Dr. Scott's town had become famous as the home of Bob Martin, heavyweight champion of the A. E. F., the fighter Gen. Pershing called "the greatest of 17 million fighting men" when Martin won the title by beating Fay Keiser, Cumberland heavyweight, in the finals in Paris in 1919. Keiser later avenged that defeat by defeating Martin in Baltimore and then went on to fight Harry Greb 20 rounds in Cumberland.

Datto Hardest Hitter He Faced Irish Johnny Curtin, Bushy Graham, Johnny Datto, Al Singer and Jack Rodgers, ponderous

punching local Negro, were others to "tag" Pete for the count during his career of 108 fights, which ended on July 18, 1930, when Al Foreman, a flash out of Washington, D. C., convinced Pete that he was through by stopping him in three rounds. Pete ended his ring life under the managing of Ray Alvis, colorful manager who first brought Tony Herrera to Pittsburgh to have the little Mexican create havoc among local lightweights.
