Fraternal societies authorized to do business in the state of Illinois are limited in the amount they may pay for funeral expenses of their members...

expense amount that may be specified in the certificate, and that amount shall not be in excess of \$200.00.

"Any society authorized to do business in this state may make provision for the payment of funeral benefits, which benefits shall not exceed the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00)."

Known as a philanthropist, he financed the building of a new church to replace the local edifice which burned in 1932.

In the fraternal field he will be remembered as the charter member of St. Joseph's Society. At the organization meeting he was elected treasurer, the office he had held for the past 35 years.

MISSOURI LEADS IN INTERSTATE JUVENILE MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN

Previous Reports Failed to Translate Marks to State Booster Points

Missouri leads the parade in state points in the KSKJ Golden Booster Campaign, according to this week's report issued by Supreme Office.

In the past weeks the Our Page has been erroneously reporting the standing of the states due to the fact that it failed to consider the graduation of quotas for the states.

The current report gives Missouri 5,000 points in the state contest, and shows Indiana and Ohio in second and third place, respectively.

Two outstanding leaders in the intra-state competition are Society No. 219 of Ohio, the first to make quota, and continue garnering points for a current total of 12,006. Half way to goal and the Missouri state leader is Society No. 70 with 5,000 points.
