Milwaukee, Wis. — A distinguished flying cross and a gold star have been awarded Lieut. Commander Louis J. (Bullet Lou) Kirn of Milwaukee in a ceremony at the marine air corps base at El Centro, Calif.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Kirn, 2501 S. Delaware Ave., Commander Kirn was awarded the decorations by Admiral Charles A. Pownall for his many attacks against the Japs in the Solomons.

Commander Kirn, a navy flier, was in the thick of the fight on Aug. 24 when navy, marine corps and army fliers and antiaircraft fire shot down 96 Jap planes. Commander Kirn himself sank a Jap destroyer with a direct bomb hit.
