Short History of Slovene Literature By F. T. SUHADOLNIK

3. Era after the Thirty Years' War

The depression caused by the constant drain on the resources of the people of Europe in the constant beligerent activities that the people were slow in recuperation and post-war reconstruction. After a time, however, the people of Europe and of Slovenia awoke as from a bad dream and began to be slowly active in the cultural affairs. The first name that is met in this era is that of John Ludvig Schoenleben, a son of the mayor of Ljubljana was highly educated priest. He served as a deacon at the Cathedral at Ljubljana and as archdeacon at Ribnica. In his latter days he devoted himself exclusively to books and to study. He was responsible for the authorship of 38 books that were printed during his lifetime. The most important was the long needed translation of the Gospels and Epistles which was issued in 1672 in his "Evangelilev inu lystov" ... The Gospels and the Epistles was the only book that he published in Slovene and therefore has the greatest importance in this literary history. The others while interesting in historical content are not important in literary sense. The gospels and the espisites are the revision of Hren's effort in the same line. Schoenleben, however, corrected some of the things and he added to the purging of the language by the substitution of Slovene words instead of the foreign expression of Trubar and Dalmatin. Interesting also is the additional of a catechism of the most important prayers and the most important dogmas and the appendix of "Catholishee peiffmi, katere fe po Navadi pred Pridige imajo peiti" The hymnal contains four songs that were already met in the Protestant hymnal: the Ten Commandments of

Trubar and three national hymns, the Christmas, the Easter and the hymnal. The latter are not accepted as they appear in the Protestant but are edited according to the original before the Protestants revised them for their own use. Three other hymns that appear in the appendix are met for the first time they are a Christmas hymn and two in honor of the Blessed Virgin.

Interested as a man in literature was. Mathew Kastelic a comtemporary of Schoenleben. Kastelic was bern at Kiloveah in 1620 and later as pastor at Toplice after which he was appointed the canon at the Society of the Brothers of the Holy Rosary at Novo Mesto, where he died in 1688.

As the Perfect Kastelic published the manual of the society, "Bratovfke buquice S. Roshenkranza. The book contains the instructions of the honor and the use of the Rosary, the indulgences connected with the use of the resary and similar things. The second part of the publication is devoted to the hymns, meditation, and Latin hymns. Some of the hymns are accomparied with the notation of the songs while others are unaccompanied which shows that they were known and no notes were necessary. The books contain many hymns which were gathered from all the various sources of that time. Of twenty poems that appear 11 are adopted from the last edition of the Protestant Hymnal. Seven of them are those of Dalmatin, two are Krelj's and one of Trubar and one of Kumprecht. The remaining are compositions of songs after the style of the early writers or they follow the precepts of Latin versification. Some of the songs to the Blessed Virgin show this early influence as also the "Posravite Chriftufove Rane." The others are a conglomeration of poetical ideas which are neither ryhmed in any set form. The Ryhme consists mostly in assonance otherwise they do not follow any rules. The book was issued in a new edition four years later. Besides the manual of the society Kastelic was responsible for some other publications that appeared at the time. "Nebefhki zyl" appeared in 1684 and "Navuk christianski' in 1688. The latter is an exposition of the catholic religion in the for mof a dialogue between father and son. The historian Valvasor enum-

In style and in content the language of Kastelic is characteristic of the interior of Slovenia and the colloquialisms are a clear indication of the origin of the man himself. In purity of diction, the writings do not approach the "Gospels and the Epistles" however, the agreement of the parts of sentences are sometimes very good. Kastelic's "Nebefhki zyl" appeared as a reprint in 1768.

Scheenleben and Kastelic are the two names connected with the post Thirty Year's War revival of ecclestical literature. Toward the end of the 17th century other men took an interest in literary work and several poets make their appearance. The Marquis Franjo Krsto Frankopan, a Croatian, made use of Slovene poems in his "Gartlic za časa kratiti" an anthology of poems. He was actively interested in the dramatic works of Moliere. "George Dandin" was rendered in prose. The work was terminated with the death of Frankopan and only three scenes of the play were completed. Others who have an active interest in poetry of this are Zizenceli who wrote the introductory poems to the historical works of Valvasor "Die Ehre des Herzogthmus Crain".

Baron John Vajkard Valvasor was born in Ljubljana and interested himself and sacrificed to have his work "Die Ehredes des Hertzogthmus Crain" published. The work was written in German but its subject matter is an extensive and exhaustive history of the Slovenes and a description of the culture and the social conditions of the Slovenes of the 17th century. It is the source book for all understanding of the conditions under which the Slovenes labored during the critical times of a national existance.
