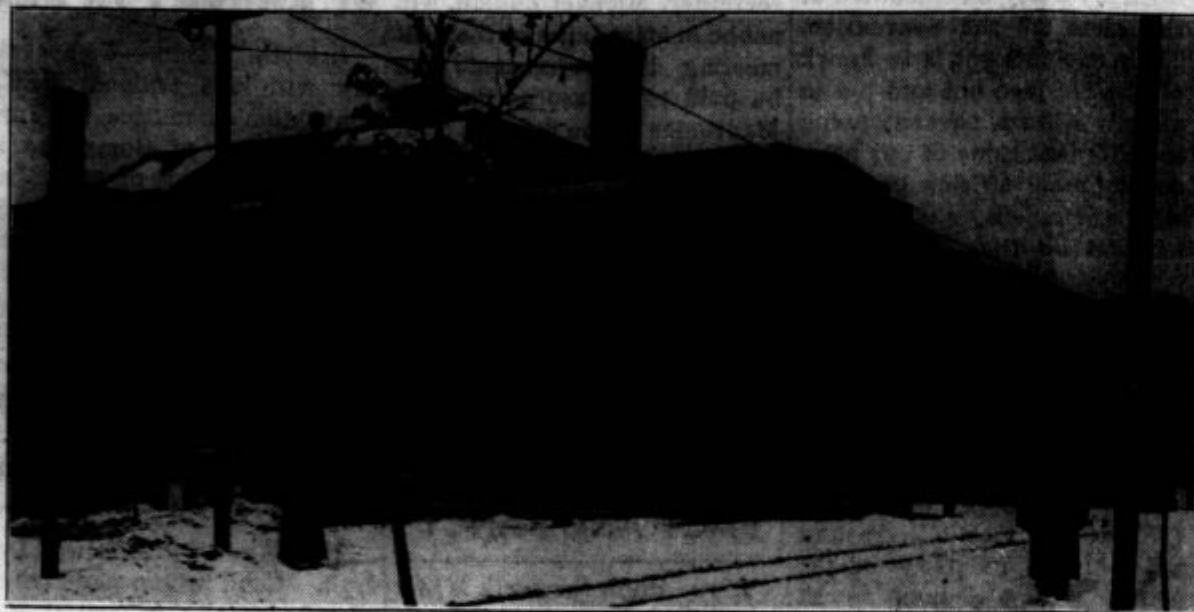

### TRANSPORTATION INFORMATION FOR KSKJ OFFICERS, DELEGATES

#### Notice to the Delegates of the Nineteenth Regular Convention

As previously announced in the Glasilo, the Nineteenth General Convention will open Aug. 15 of this year at 9 a. m. in the City Auditorium at Eveleth, Minnesota.

All supreme officers, as well as delegates, are requested to meet at the above named City Auditorium in Eveleth, Minnesota, on Sunday, Aug. 14, at 9 o'clock in the morning. From there we will proceed in a body to Holy Family Church to attend Holy Mass which will be celebrated at 10 o'clock.

All delegates leaving from Chicago are hereby notified that there will be a special train from Chicago, Ill., to Eveleth, Minn., via the Northwestern Railroad.

The special train will leave Chicago at 4 p. m. Central Standard Time on Saturday, Aug. 13, and will arrive in Eveleth, Minn., on Sunday, Aug. 14, at 7 a. m. Central Standard Time.

All delegates leaving from Chicago are urged to arrange their train schedules so that they will have sufficient time upon arriving in Chicago to make the necessary connections at the Northwestern Depot to board the special train which will leave at 4 p. m. Central Standard Time.

All delegates are requested to buy round-trip tickets to and from Eveleth, Minn.

At the same time it is also necessary that each delegate obtain a receipt from the station ticket agent showing the amount paid for railroad fare. This receipt is to be presented to the convention committee in charge of transportation, so that a record may be had of the exact amount spent for railroad fare.

The railroad company has made an announcement to the effect that each individual delegate will receive detailed information as to the time of departure and the train by which to travel, either by a special agent or by a notice through the mail.

It is recommended, however, that each delegate personally secure the information regarding trains as soon as possible from the local station agent in order that there will be no delay or confusion in reaching the proper destination at the proper time.
