

Short History of Slovene Literature

By F. T. SUHADOLNIK

When this volume of poems appeared, Askerc had already passed the summit of his poetic powers. In a composite and light versification "Pavliha na Jutrovem" which is a satire on the contemporary faults of the Austrian government, the form and the force of the poetry is completely lost and the concentration which was one of the characteristics of his poems broadened and lost its power. This is seen already in his "Nove poezije" which appeared in 1900. Now he hurried thru his compositions and wrote faster and more. In the same year as the "Nove poezije" appeared he also published three dramatic skits in prose, "Izmajlov", "Red sv. Jurija" (The Order of St. George), and "Tujka" (The Stranger).

In 1904 the "Cetrti zbornik poezij" by Askerc was published. "Balada o obleganem Dunaju" (Ballad of the Siege of Vienna) and "Homerjeva smrt" (Homer's Death) and many a poem of the collection from the "Diary of a traveler". The volume was cooly accepted by the people. In a dramatic sketch based on a fairy tale from the foothills of Triglav, the highest mountain in Slovenia, Askerc wrote or rather adapted rather freely from Dezman's story zlatorog and the Trillium his story of "Zlatorog" (The Golden Trumpet). In another, the "Zeleni Lovec" (The Green Hunter), a sort of Mephisto, Askerc exposed his pantheistic ideas. His religious views by this time were completely changed and he even waged an open fight

on Catholicism with the reversal to old themes from the time of the Anti-Reformation period of Slovene History. His main works of this nature consisted in an epic poem "Primoz Trubar" in which he sang the praises of the reformers of Slovenia, while in "Muceniki" he gave a picture of the anti-reformation. With the poem "Junaki" (Heroes) he returned—but not with his original force—to the hero poems. In dramatic form he sang the praises of the installation of the dukes of Carinthia; in a cycle of romances he tells the tale of the revolutions of the Slovenes under Duke Ljutovit Posavski. In the same style he tells the story of the heroic deeds of Rapos Stefan.

The motives and the ideas for the ballads and the romanzas 'Jadranski Biseri' he received from the tales as they were told by the fishermen along the sea coast. "Akropolis and the Pyraminds" another collection of poems which was published in 1909. Askerc again utilized the oriental and classic Grecian themes to contrast it against Christianity of Europe. Following this three more volumes by Askerc appeared; "Pesintiev peti zbornik" in 1910, "Poslednji Celjan" in 1912 and "Atilla in Emona" also in 1912.

With his ballads and romanzes, Askerc influenced the youngar generation of poets who with enthusiasm accepted the form for narrative poetry, balladry and longer epic works. Even Stritar published the novel "Olga" in verse. The most important of the younger poets was Anton Hribar of Krka who was born in 1864 and is now pastor at Zali Log. During first ten years of the activity of the "Dom in svet" the most important poet along with Medved. He devoted his efforts almost exclusively to narrative poetry. His two narrative epic peems "Prince Ljutovit" and Zupanova Minka" (The Mayor's Daughter) are too lengthy to be of great value. Put when the critics did not like them and severely cut them up, Hribar became silent.

8. EPIGONIAN LYRICISM

Lyric poetry of the 70's and the 80's received their impulse from men such as Jenko, Levstik, Stritar and Gregorcic. Willingly or unwillingly the whole succeeding generation of poets took, followed in the path that the masters laid out for hem.

Levstik's finished form was the food for the development of Josip Cimperman of Ljubljana. Very early in his life became an invalid and completed his formal education by studying the Gymnasium curriculum studies from his friends who attended the classes. He was especially interested in the Slovene and German literatures and other European languages. He made his living with his literary work, his greatest activity consisted in translating dramatic works for the Slovene stage. Later he was the critical supervisor at the Ljubljana Zvon. In 1896 he published his first volume of poems which were full of foreign influences. He became finished only after the school of Levstik who was also his personal instructor. His poems in the "Zora", "Zvon" and the "Ljubljanski Zvon" approached a formal restraint which is the special characteristic of his Sonnets in his volume "Distihov." Cimperman's poems which were published in 1888 are a living testament of the unbroken spirit of the man, with which he carried on in spite of his sufferings and incapacity, in feeling they are comewhat cold.

ANTON FUNTEK

Cimperman always delighted in gathering about him the young men who had aspirations at writing poetry, whom he instructed and explained the various forms of poetry. Anton Funtek was one of his pupils. Anton Funtek born in 1862 was at one time teacher at the folk school, now professor at the Ljubljana University. His first poems he published already as a univer i'v student in "Kres" and the "Ljubljanski Zvon" and with his talent he was soon made editor. His many poems are not distinctive because of their depth of feeling or thought but by their beauty of form and beauty of expression. Among his narrative poems the epi-lyrl cal wreath "Smrt" (Death) published in 1896 are of especial mention. After the model of Baumbach's "Zlatorog" which he translated into the Slovene he also wrote a long narrative poem of the Vrba Lake which he called "Godec" (Musician). Funtek also wrote many novels and short-stories. He was also interested ! dramae and for that purpose he wrote the libretto to the opera "Teharski plemici" and a drama "Tekma (Race). Funtek was also recognized as a translator of dramatic works for the Slovene stage. Among most important are his "Zlatorog", Shakespeare "King Lear" and the first part of Goethe's "Faust. MICHAEL OPEKA
