## PUEBLO JOSEPHS SET MARK IN MEMBER DRIVE

### CAMPAIGN TOTAL CLIMBS AS LODGES WRITE OVER \$100,000 IN TWO WEEKS

The yell let out by the Pueblo, Colo., St. Joseph's Cowboy, in this week's report to Our Page, is in order, fitting and proper—and if it were possible to transcribe it to make it audible, no doubt the entire Kay Jay membership would join in the chorus.

This jubilation follows the remarkable showing made by the Pueblo Josephs in last week's record of the current KSKJ Building Membership Campaign. The Cowboys, as it were, made a real round-up and initiated 28 new members into their lodge. The official records supplied by Supreme Secretary Joseph Zalar indicate that the Coloradans wrote \$15,500.00 new insurance in one week, which incidentally is a new record.

The report, as last week's, is again gratifying in that 41 lodges contributed \$53,000 for the week period bringing the total to \$769,500.00, leaving a total of \$231,500 to be signed

before the end of the year in order for the drive to go over the top. The goal is within walking distance, if the enthusiastic work accomplished by active lodges in the past two weeks is an indication—in the two week period lodges wrote \$116,400. If the same pace is retained and the Kay Jay spirit of ACTION continues to spread, then it is more than a certainty that the drive will go away over the top.

The Pueblo Joseph's of which Supreme President John Germ is secretary has given a renewed spirit to the campaign. In addition to the fine showing of the Westerners, three lodges previously unheard of, joined the ranks of the workers. They are Nos. 12, 44 and 128. Substantial contributions to the record were made by St. Joseph's No. 169, Cleveland, O., \$5,000, and St. Veronica Society, No. 115, Kansas City, Kans., \$3,000.

## CANONSBURG BOWS TO BRIDGE CITY MUSHERS IN 1-0 GAME; ROSENBERGER, KRALL IN FINE PITCHING FORM

### Game Nets Only Five Safe Hits As Teams Field Faultlessly

Ambridge, Pa., Oct. 9. — While the Yanks were concluding the world series at Cincinnati yesterday, the Ambridge Kay Jays were taking over Canonsburg, 1-0 in 11 innings, at Strabane to regain the championship of the Kay Jay Association.

In one of the best pitching exhibitions of the season, John Rosenberger bested J. Krall in the third and deciding tilt of the playoff series. Ambridge was limited to two hits by Krall while Rosenberger yielded three. Twenty-seven strikeouts were recorded, Krall getting 16 and Rosey 11.

After 10 scoreless innings, Ambridge put over a run in the 11th without a hit or error being registered. A walk, stolen base and two sacrifice bunts were responsible for the one and only marker of the thrilling fracas.

S. Kokan drew a base on balls and stole second. R. Kuehel bunted and was thrown out, but Kokan advanced to third, from where he paid off, after K. Knafelic was intentionally walked, when J. Rosenberger bunted down the first base line on a squeeze play.

Canonsburg threw a scare into the local ranks in its half of the 11th when a great catch by S. Drotar saved the day. T. Verchek opened the frame with a single to left center. F. Cadez struck out. J. Tomsic lined one out to left center and Drotar made his sensational capture of the ball. Verchek was on his way to third base when the putout was executed and in returning to first base he failed to touch the second

base sack and was called out, via Drotar to Kokan to A. Rosenberger, to end the session and series.

The rival catchers put in a busy day, S. Clay for Ambridge handling 16 chances and J. Tomsic, of Canonsburg, 17. It was a faultless fielding game, as neither team was charged with an error.

The two teams completed the league schedule with nine wins and three losses each to finish ahead of Bridgeport, O., and Pittsburgh. A three-game playoff series to break the tie was played with Kay Jays winning the first, 4-3, in 15 innings, with John Rosenberger on the mound, and Canonsburg KSKJ beating Knafelic, 5-3, in the second melee. Krall pitched for Canonsburg in both contests.

The locals were the association champions in 1937 and last year Canonsburg won the crown.

**FOR GOD, HOME AND COUNTRY**

Slovenians the world over cannot fail to mourn the first cardinal of the West. In his last days he had done much to further the cause of Bishop Baraga's beatification.

He was buried on a Friday. The following day the Slovenian priests received a last message from Cardinal Mundelein, through another priest.

He had been discussing the purported miraculous cure of Father Francis Jager with Father Kemper, S. J., the Spiritual Director at the Diocesan Seminary. "Tell the Slovenian Fathers that they must get all data on this miracle in writing as soon as possible. It is very important." This message reached the Slovenian priests the day after his burial.

The promoters of Bishop Baraga's cause may well be proud that Chicago's great archbishop was thinking of the Slovenian people and their own Apostle of the Chippewas in his last days on earth.

For the same reason we have cause to mourn his loss deeply because he was determined to lead an active hand in bringing Baraga's name to the official liturgy of the Church's altar.

However that may be, he laid a foundation upon which we can build. He has advised the Bishop of Marquette, Michigan, regarding the proper steps and has paved the way for the initial process.

In faith, we can be consoled and encouraged with the thought that now in the next world, both he and Bishop Baraga can use their influence before the throne of God for the spiritual and temporal welfare of the Slovenian people.

May he rest in peace.

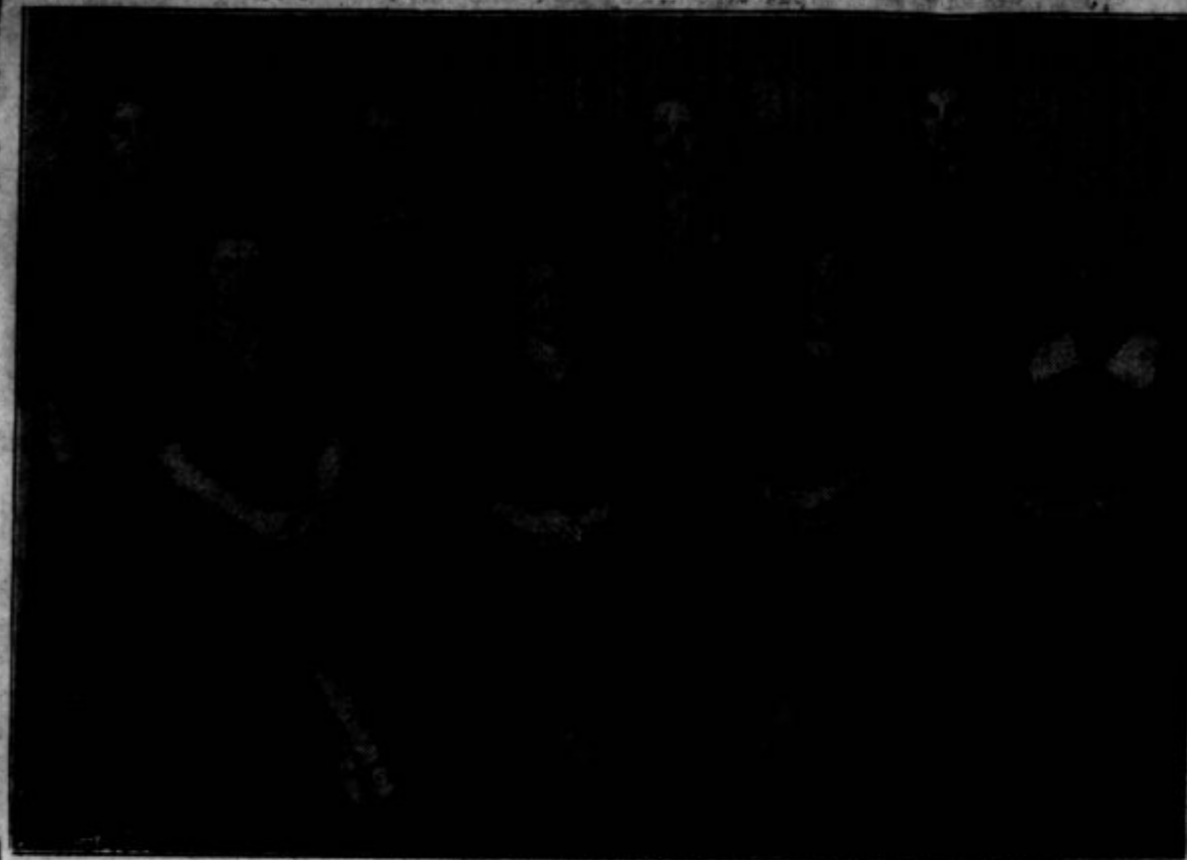
In the previous week's lineup Sray's team won two from Winter's, and Zmarzly's took two from Urbancic's team.

**PRAY FOR CANONIZATION OF PIONEER SLOVENIAN BISHOP BARAGA**

Cleveland, O.—Local Slovenians prayed Sunday afternoon, October 8, at the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes, Providence Heights, Euclid, for the canonization of the pioneer Slovenian bishop in the United States, Frederick Baraga.

The occasion was the annual pilgrimage of Slovenians to the shrine. The Rev. Francis Baraga, assistant at St. Mary Parish, Holmes Avenue, who has the same name as the Bishop but is not related to him, lead the pilgrims in the prayer.

**YOU ARE SAFE IF YOU KNOW HOW TO USE YOUR FEET**

The biggest job in the traffic safety efforts both locally and nationally is not so much to teach the public how to handle the wheel of a car. The real job is to educate ourselves on how to use our feet. Of course, the automobile was the instrument of death but in more than half of Cleveland's pedestrian traffic fatalities the cause of the accident could be traced directly to an unsafe walking habit of the accident victims.

Habits are fine providing they are good habits but just a glance at the accident records will prove that some of the walking habits of the man on foot are very dangerous. Eight persons so far this year were killed, and a hundred and thirteen more were injured in Cleveland because of the pedestrian habit of crossing against the traffic signal. Another habit, that of stepping into the street from behind parked cars has resulted in seven deaths and two hundred and fifty injury cases.

The effect of habits can be easily seen in the steady increase in the number of child fatalities. During the past fifteen years systematic school training has developed safe walking habits in the children. This same period has been a steady increase in the number of adult fatalities.

The man on foot must realize and remember that death and injury await him when he carelessly steps into the street. He must realize that his frail body is no match for the weight and steel of a swift moving automobile.

Born in Austria in 1797, the future Bishop came to the United States in 1830, laboring as a missionary among the Chippewa Indians in Wisconsin and Michigan. He was consecrated the first Bishop of Marquette in 1853, serving until he died in 1868. He was author of catechetical literature for the Chippewas.

A meeting of the Baraga Association in Joliet, Ill., elected these officers:

The Rt. Rev. John J. Oman, Cleveland, president; Anton Grdina, Cleveland, vice president; the Rev. Julius Slapsak, Cleveland, secretary; the Rev. M. J. Hiti, Waukegan, Ill., financial secretary; the Rev. Alexander Urankar, Lemont, Ill., promoter.

The Rev. Francis Jager, Minneapolis, in attendance at the meeting, announced that he had been cured of a malignant disease after he had prayed to Bishop Baraga. Since the claimed cause of Father Jager has been examined by the physicians of Minnesota State University who pronounced him free of the ailment.

**OUR PAGE COOKING SCHOOL**

Mrs. Walter Brummel of Aurora, Illinois, requests a recipe for "orehova potica." This recipe has been published three times and sent to numerous people through the mail. Once again the cooking school will publish it, and it is sincerely hoped that all those who wish to save this recipe will cut it out and paste it in a scrap book for safe keeping.

**Orehova potica**

Sponge: 2 cakes compressed yeast, 1 cup lukewarm water, 1 cup of flour.

Dissolve the yeast in the lukewarm water. When yeast begins to float on water mix in 1 cup of flour and allow to raise for 1 hour.

3 well beaten eggs, 2 cups sugar, 2 cups milk, 1/2 pound butter, 1 tablespoon salt, about 7 cups of flour.

Beat eggs well and add to the yeast sponge. Also add the butter, sugar and scalded milk. Add a tablespoon of lemon extract to flavor the dough. Mix all together into a soft dough and knead lightly. Set aside in a warm place and allow to raise for 1 hour again.

Filling: 1 pound shelled English walnuts, 1 cup hot honey, 2 egg whites, 1 cup cream, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 egg yolks.

Mix ground English walnuts with 1 cup of heated honey. Add 1 cup of cream and fold in the stiffly beaten whites of 2 eggs. Add vanilla.

To the egg yolks add the cinnamon and cloves and thicken with a little powdered sugar.

Roll out dough on floured cloth the entire width and length of table. Roll out thin. Spread the egg yolk mixture over the entire surface of dough, smearing well. Then in same manner spread the walnut mixture over entire surface. Take one end of cloth and begin rolling toward the other end, into one long roll. Cut through center making two rolls, and place each one around the tube in an angel food pan that has been well greased. Let roll remain in one and put into one big pan if one potica is desired, but the majority like to make it in two tube pans. Let dough rise until it reaches the top of the pans in which it is to be baked, then bake in a hot oven for about 1 hour.

**Cooked Grape Juice**

Use clean, well ripened blue grapes. Pick over and wash the grapes. Place in kettle barely covering with water and boil until seeds are free. Strain through cheese cloth bag without squeezing. Measure the juice and replace on fire and bring to boiling point. Add one-half cup sugar to each quart of juice and let mixture boil five minutes. Pour into hot jars or bottles and seal immediately.

**Grape Butter**

4 pounds grapes, 1 pound sugar. Wash and stem the grapes. Cook in a small amount of water until the skins are soft. Press the pulp through a strainer, to remove seeds and skins. Add the sugar and cook until thick and clear. Pour into hot, clean glasses and seal.
