

However, if the Slovene peasantry did not have an opportunity to attend school, it did not mean that there were no Slovene scholars at that time. The Slovene nobility had the best of facilities for learning. Austria had the world's best university at Vienna and anyone having the means could easily familiarize himself with all the knowledge obtainable. Many nobles, who had no other occupation, often took it upon themselves, as a hobby, to become skilled professional men. Perhans at rare instances, this did help some of them, when their fortunes, through some mistake, began to dwindle and finally entirely vanish.

After reading a letter from the Austrian emperor on one November night in 1760 a young Slovene lord. Roger Boskovic, found himself in that very predicament In one instance he saw all his wealth vanish. The letter informed him that his estate had been taken away from him by the Austrian government because he had viola. ted a certain rule of the sovereign. Not only would be be deprived of all his possessions but the message also stated that by the morrow he should prepare to give himself into the hands of the royal jailer.

It has been shown in consequent events that the two principals of the tragedy have been indicted in a small town for robbery and possessing weapons but were set free with a reprimand and a small fine because it has been found that they were "first offenders." The interpretation of the first offense clause which is in the law statues everywhere has in this case been too leniently interpreted. There must be some misconception of what first offense means and the action that should be taken. Usually first offense is interpreted that it is the first appearance in court for crime. 


### DRAMATIC INCIDENTS OF SLOVENE HISTORY

In the letter the Slovene found that the quartel over the present boundary line of the state of Pennsylvania and Maryland which had waged for two generations had broke anew. The heirs had charters, but they were written so unintelligably that the dividing line could not be fixed definitely by them. Roger was familiar with the case, as often the two had discussed it.

"Now you see what I am up against. They have been appealing to me since I came to London and I can do nothing for them, as England will not spend a cent to settle the dispute."

The Slovene was perplexed. If the ministers of the greatest countries of the world did not know of a solution, how should he? But still he tried to find a key to the problem and it was not long before he had a plan in mind-only it was so simple that he was con-

"I have a very simple plan-perhaps you have already thought of it and rejected the idea. Apply pure logic and you have a solution. Franklin was full of spirit again, "Why the plan is great-how stupid of us never to have thought of it before-it is so simple. Thanks- once again you have come through for me."

It was truly a dramatic moment not only in Slovene history but in the history of the United States as well, in whose life the Mason and Dixon line still plays a very important part.
