

ANGLIJA SKUŠA USTAVITI MUSSOLINIJEVO VOJNO

Angleški tisk priporoča militaristične sankcije

ITALIJA UTRJUJE OBREZNA MESTA

London, 14. apr.—Vodilni člani britskega kabineta so se vrli s počitnic v London, kjer bodo danes imeli izredno sejo, na kateri bodo formirali nove smerice v zvezi z italijansko-ahesinsko vojno. Zunanji minister Eden, ki je dospel iz Zeneve sinoči, bo vprašal za nadaljnje instrukcije, kakšno stališče naj zavzame, če se bodo pogajanja glede končanja afriške vojne, ki jih vodi Liga narodov, izjalovila.

Člani britskega kabineta imajo pred seboj težak problem. Sankcije, ki jih izvaja Liga narodov, so sicer omejale ekonomsko strukturo Italije, niso pa preprečile italijanskih zmag v Afriki. Poostreženje sankcij, prepoved pošiljanja olja v fašistično državo, kar bi Mussolini smatral za "sovražni čin", bi bila po mnenju angleških državljanov dvomljive vrednosti. Gotovo tudi ni, da bi odbor tri-najstoričnice Lige narodov podprl oljne sankcije, katere je Anglija v načelu odobrila.

Nekateri angleški časopisi argumentirajo, da edino militaristične sankcije lahko prisilijo Mussolinija na kapitulacijo, če pa morajo podpreti vse v Ligi narodov veljane države, drugače ne bodo učinkovite.

Da li bo Eden dobil instrukcije, naj na prihodnji seji Lige narodov pritisaka, da ta razglasi militaristične sankcije proti Italiji, v tem momentu ni znano. Nič ne verjame, da bi Francija odobrila tako akcijo in posledica bi bila poslabšanje odnosov med njo in Anglijo.

Pariz, 14. apr.—Meittem, ko italijanska armada osvaja nove kose abesinskega ozemlja in se bliža dan, ko bo Mussolini zahteval vso Abesinijo kot kolonijo, ki jo je podjarmil z oboroženo silo, je Italija zapovedala z militarističnimi pripravami doma, ker sluti, da ji bo Velika Britanija skušala iztrgati sadove italijanskih zmag v Afriki.

Italija je prepričana, da bo prej ali slej prišlo do preizkušnje, kdo naj kontrolira Sredozemsko morje — ona ali Anglija. Fašistična država sluti, da je konflikt neizbežen in je že začela utrjevati svoja obrežna mesta, katerim proti nevarnost napada s strani angleške boje mornarice.

Zanesljive informacije se glase, da Italija polaga mine na več milj dolgi črti, da zaščiti svoja pristanišča pred možnim napadom. Ta pristanišča so Neapelj, Genova, Palermo, Ostia in Messina. V zadnjem času je zgradila utrdbe za težke topove ob vseh obrežnih mestih.

Rim, 14. apr.—Fašistično časopisje je večer objavilo poročila z afriške fronte, da so prve čete italijanske armade na severu okupirale ozemlje v bližini mesta Deje, abesinske trdnjave, ki je bila pred nekaj dnevi glavni stan cesarja Selassieja. Druga italijanska kolona je zasedla polotok Gorgora, ozemlje na obrežju jezera Tana, ki izvira reke Nil, katere zalaga z vodo angleški Sudan in Egipt.

(Z okupacijo tega ozemlja so Italijanske čete prišle v direktne stike z angleškimi. Britska carinska postaja je na drugi strani Gattabata, kjer je družba letalnice za angleške aéro-

Obravnavati proti barbarom v Floridi

Trije porotniki izbrani

Barlow, Fla., 14. apr.—Včeraj, prvi dan ponovljene sodne obravnave proti sedmim bivšim policajem iz Tampe, ki so do smrti pretepli socialista Joe Shoemakerja, so bili izbrani trije porotniki ali polovica porote, kajti v Floridi zadostuje šest porotnikov. Izbiranje je težko, ker Whitaker, branitelj obtožencev, vprašuje vsakega izzbranca, če je čital ali slišal v radiu govore Normana Thomasa, socialističnega voditelja. Thomas je organiziral odbor za obrambo civilnih pravic v Tampu in Whitaker smatra ta odbor kot "grdo zaroto proti lojalnim državljanom" Tampe.

Državni pravdnik Rex Farrior je v neprestanem besednem spopadu z Whitakerjem zaradi njegovega postopanja in igranja s predsodki zoper socialiste, katere enostavno meša s komunisti. Sodnik Dewell je dovolil Whitakerju, da lahko izrablja Thomasove govore, dasi je pripomnil, da Norman Thomas ni pred sodiščem.

Izmed 108 porotnih izzbrancev okraja Polk, ki so bili navzoči, je bila skoro polovica odpravljenih, da so mogli dobiti tri porotnike.

Veleposestnik na 'relifni' listi

Federalna vlada mu je poklonila \$50,000

Washington, D. C.—(FP)—Thomas D. Campbell, "kralj pesnice", je dobil od federalne ustanove AAA \$50,000, ker ni posejal več akrov zemlje s pšenico. To je prišlo na dan na konferenci, katero je imel notranji tajnik Harold I. Ickes s časopisnimi poročevalci.

Campbell je vzel v najem 25,000 akrov indijanske rezervacije v Montani, dve tretjini od federalnega biroja in eno direktno od Indijancev. Za vsak akter neobdelane zemlje je dobil dva dolarja iz federalne blagajne.

Pred svetovno vojno je bil Campbell v službi Morganove finančne hiše kot svetovalec, po vojni pa se je preselil na zapad ter se lotil poljedelstva, kjer je pokazal svojo "sposobnost". Do čim so Indijanci, od katerih je najel zemljo, na reliefni listi, je znal on izkoristiti priliko in dobil od federalne vlade \$50,000 kot darilo, ker ni obdelal najete zemlje.

Nadaljnji dokazi znanstvenikov

Kansas City, Mo., 14. apr.—Na tukajšnjem zborovanju Ameriškega kemijskega društva poročajo o nadaljnjem odkritju na podlagi eksperimentov v kolegiju Harvardu, ki se dočela ujema s prejšnjimi dognanji znanstvenikov glede električne lastnosti življenja. Novo odkritje je, da drobni delci proteina — takozvane molekule — v človeškem telesu in ostalih živih organizmih proizvajajo električno silo iz sebe. Ta električna sila je ravnotežna, to je pozitivna in negativna.

Prej so znanstveniki mislili, da so molekule živih teles električno nevtralne, a to odkritje v Harvardu je podrla njihovo domnevo. Po tem odkritju je vsaka molekula (molekula je skupina dveh ali več atomov) elektromagnet.

Kemiki izdelujejo umeten zrak za dihanje

Kansas City, Mo., 14. apr.—Na tukajšnjem zborovanju Ameriškega kemijskega društva je bilo večer poročano, da se je kemikom v kolegiju McPherson po 14 letih eksperimentiranja posrečilo izdelati zrak, ki je bolj šel in zdravjši za dihanje kakor naradni zrak. Medicinska znanost že rabi neke vrste umetni zrak za zdravljenje pljučnice.

Ločitve zakonov so lahke v Italiji

Italijanka spravi moža v zapor z obdolžitvijo, da je žalil diktatorja

London, 14. apr.—Giovanni Giglio, kateri je bil poročevalec delavskega lista "Daily Herald" v Rimu sedemnajst let in je bil zadnji teden izgnan iz Italije, je objavil v svojem listu članek, v katerem pravi:

"Italijani kot celota so silno nezadovoljni z Mussolinijevim režimom, ki jih je potisnil v vojno, od katere ne morejo pričakovati nobene koristi. Oni vedo, da bo delala popolnoma obubožana ne glede na to, kako se vojna konča — z zmago ali porazom — toda ljudje morajo močati. Vaakdo, ki v krogu svoje družine izreče mnenje, da je Mussolini blazen, je v nevarnosti, da ga postavijo pred izjemni fašistični tribunal za zaščito države. To pomeni najmanj deset let ječe.

"Zgodilo se je že, da so se žene iznebile svojih mož, ko so povedale policiji, da so govorili zaničljivo o Mussoliniju. Temu je sledila aretacija in potem obsodba v zapor.

"Znano dejstvo je, da se je Mussolini zapletel v afriško vojno, ker se je poslabšala gospodarska situacija v Italiji pod njegovim režimom. Celotni, ki so sprvega odobraval afriško vojno, so se pričeli zavedati, da bo cena za Mussolinijevo pustolovščino previsoka in da bo deložo opravila v polom.

"Cene življenjskim potrebščinam stalno naraščajo. Olje, sladkor, kava, slanina, ribe, zelenjava in sadje stanejo zdaj polovico več kakor so pred štiri meseci."

Philadelphia, Pa.—Tukajšnja federacija delavskih unij je pozvala federalni delavski department, naj posreduje v stiski, ki je pred dvema mesecema izbruhnila proti S. L. Allen Co. firmi, katere izdeluje poljedelske stroje. V pozivu je rečeno, da kompanijski pobojniki izživajo krvave spopade s stavkarji, ki oblagajo podjetje, da prepreči importiranje stavkokazov iz drugih krajev.

Sanghai, 14. apr.—Japonske vojaške oblasti v Mandžuriji (Mandžukuo) so zadnje dni aretirale šest odličnih mongolskih uradnikov, katerim so Japonci dali visoke službe. Med aretiranimi je tudi general Ling Sen, guverner mandžurske province Hsingan. Vai so obtoženi, da so v tajni zvezi s sovjetsko Rusijo in zagovarjati se bodo morali zaradi veleizdaje.

Dva primera na Angleskem

London, 14. apr.—Londonški Medical Journal, glasilo angleških zdravnikov, je te dni poročalo že o drugem slučaju, ko je zdravnik oživel mrljca z masažo srca in injekcijo adrenalina. Mrljca v drugem slučaju je bil 45-letni Ernest Hinsley iz Washтона. Umrl je med operacijo. Srce mu je prenehalo utripati in pljuča so prenehala dihati, kar je znamenje smrti.

Dr. J. V. Fiddlan, ki je vršil operacijo, je zapravil nekaj minut z umetnim dihanjem, ki se ni obneslo, nakar je začel z masažo srca in vbrizgnil je adrenalina v srčno zaklopko. Čez dve minuti je srce oživel in začelo utripati, vzelo pa je več minut predno je Hinsley spet začel spontano dihati. Čez 40 ur se je bolnik zavedel, ni se pa spominjal ničesar in prav nič ni vedel, da je bil mrtev.

V prvem slučaju je bolnik oživel po masaži srca potem, ko je bil tri ure mrtev.

Sodnik Leja je zadnji teden obsodil v zapor štiri fašiste, ki so 12. marca streljali na socialističnega poslanca Jimineza Asuo in ubili njegovega telesnega čuvaja. Sodnika je zdaj zadelo fašistično maščevanje.

PRIČETEK VOJNE ZA ANTRACITNI PREMOG

Kompanijski gardisti streljali na butlegarske rudarje

DVA RUDARJA RANJENA

Hazleton, Pa.—(FP)—V dolgo pričakovani vojni med brezposelnimi butlegarskimi rudarji in operatorji so tukaj končno padli prvi strelji. Obstreljena sta bila dva rudarja, John Krosacvage in Metro Nestor, ki sta skušala delati si miserno življenje s kopanjem "butlegarskega" premoga kakor si ga skuša delati tisoče brezposelnih rudarjev na antracitu.

Kompanijski stražniki so nanju streljali, ko sta šla v zapuščen roj Lehigh Valley Coal kompanije in družbi nekaterih drugih "butlegarjev". Družba pravi, da so iz rova Spring Valley nakradli 19 truckov premoga v vrednosti \$494. Ta roj je "odprt". Rudarji so kopali premog, katerega ni družba mogla pobrati s parno lopato, toda ne pusti, da bi ga pobrali brezposelni rudarji. Straže so rekly, da so streljale v "samoobrambi". Ranjena rudarja sta bila odpeljana v bolnišnico. Ko je prišlo na lice mesta državno vojaštvo iz bližnjega taborišča, so se bili brezposelni rudarji, ki so organizirani v Schuylkill County Butlegers uniji, že razkropili.

Operatorji so že večkrat zahtevali od državnih oblasti, da naatopijo proti rudarskim butlegarjem. To željo jim je odbil sedanji guverner Earl kakor tudi njegov prednik Pinchot. Iz tega incidenta pa je razvidno, da bodo vzeli postavo v svoje roke in sami skušali zatreti rudarsko butlegarstvo, ki se je radi brezposelnosti zadnja leta silno razpaslo po vseh krajih antracitnega polja. Sploh od tega žive cele nasebine, v katerih je bil obrat ustavljen.

Tisoč in tisoči rudarjev na antracitu morajo izbirati med butleganjem premoga ali pa brezposelnostjo. Okrog 30,000 si je izbralo "butlegarstvo" in v zadnjih letih razvili veliko industrijo. Letna produkcija butlegarskega premoga znaša po mnenju nekaterih proučevalcev tega pojava precej nad pet milijonov ton. Radi nižje cene ima ta premog širok trg, vozijo ga do 300 milj daleč. Javno mnenje na antracitu je definitivno na strani teh butlegarjev, kar je tudi vzrok, da guverner ne mara nastopiti proti njim. Lahko pa pride do večje privatne vojne, v kateri bo tekla kri na debelo.

Kajti taka velika organizacija ne samo da ima velike potrebe, temveč je za nje bodočnost tudi važno, da se njeno poslovanje vedno izpopolnjuje in izboljšuje. Izpopolnjevanje našega poslovanja za zahteva več strojev, več omar in kartotek ter več drugih in večjih ter boljnjih shramb; da je vsaka listina, vsak dokument in vsaka reč na svojem mestu in zaeno priročno po abecednem ali številčnem redu ali kakor in kamor spada; da ni zamude z iskanjem reči in nobene nepotrebne izgube časa. Če so prostori prenatrpano polni, je tako izpopolnjevanje nemogoče. Valed pomanjkanja prostorov je zadrževanje neizogibno in prerado se kaj napakačno vložiti ali zameša kljub skrbni pažnji, marsikaj pa tudi prehitro zavre in naša organizacija je poradi tega zadnje čase precej trpela. Že s tem, kar se izgubi pri takem poslovanju na času, bi se lahko plačal precejšniji del računa za povečanje.

Vse to je važno in potrebno, da vzamemo v poštev, kadar razpravljamo o potrebi večjih prostorov za naš glavni urad! Ko torej vemo, da večje prostore moramo imeti, je tedaj na mestu le, da razmišljamo in kakor najboljšje preudarimo, kako to doseči. Priporočila, da se naj raztegneje uradi samo nad glavnimi stopnicami v dvorano, ne moremo upoštevati. Kajti na te stopnice vodi zanje zadnji izhod iz uradov, ki ga v smislu ordinanc moramo imeti. Poleg tega pa bi s tem pridobili veliko premalo za naše potrebe. To bi pač najmanj stalo, a to je edino, kar je dobrega v tem načrtu.

Tisti, ki priporočajo, da se predela in porabi velika dvorana za urade, najbrž tudi mislijo, da se to da narediti z malimi stroški. Nekaj teh argumentira tudi, da se nam dvorana itak ne izplačuje in da si naj čikaška društva sama zgrade dvorano, kakor to delajo društva po drugih naselbinah. Krži pri tem je, in največ jih najbrž na to ne misli, da je dvorana zgrajena tako kot ima biti dvorana in da zato za predelavo za druge namene ne odgovarja. Za eno nadstropje je previsoka, za dve nadstropji pa prenizka. Previsoka so tudi okna, poleg tega pa je, tudi oder neprimeren za tako predelavo. Upravni odsek je dal preračunati, koliko bi tako predelane dvorane stalo in arhitekti so nam rekli, da bi stalo ravno toliko kot če bi jo do dna podrli in znova zidali, in da bi stalo več kot če dodamo še eno nadstropje nad sedanjimi uradi. Radi tega in iz razloga, da nam je dvorana drugače koristna, pa če tudi ne absolutno potrebna, smo to idejo opustili.

Dvorana torej ostane, oziroma ostaneta spodnja in zgornja dvorana, kakor sta, in priprave so zdaj v teku, da se dozida še eno ali tretje nadstropje nad sedanjimi uradi. V zvezi s tem pa naj bo povedano, da nas čikaška društva niso nikdar vprašala, da jim jednota zgradi dvorano, in da je tudi nismo zgradili izključno radi njih, pač pa radi splošne potrebe. Naša dvorana tudi ne služi samo jednotlivim društvom v Chicagu za zborovanja in prirejanje zabav, pač pa služi kot potrebno središče vsega naprednega življa in jednota ima od tega direktne in indirektno koristi. In jednotine dvorane ne rabijo samo naši ljudje, pač pa so oddaje v najem tudi drugim, kadar je naši ne rabijo. Vsi pa morajo plačati primerno najemnino za rabo dvorane ne glede, če so domači ali tuji ali člani ali nečlani, in dvorana se nam je do sedaj že zmeraj priložno dobro izplačevala. Zato pa zunanja društva radi tega nič ne trpe, pač pa imajo tudi ona direktne koristi od jednotine dvorane, in prav nobene vzroka ni, da bi kdo čikaška društva zavidal radi tega, ker imajo jednotno dvorano na razpolago.

A brief history reveals that these Mountaineers have been broadcasting over Cleveland's Friendly Station over a period of four years. This has brought conclusive evidence that Clevelanders react favorably toward hillbillies and their rustic music. How true! If the local listeners didn't approve—the ole Grandpappy and his boys would have trekked back to the Oarks long, long ago—and then to oblivion. But apparently they, "The Boys," are still around and ole Grandpappy is always ready to swap stories around the cracker barrel. Grandpappy informs me that he got his start "back home when just a kid," related Grandpappy. "I'm sturnin' 78 winters this mornin' winter, and doggone if I don't feel just like a kid again." Born in Missouri, Hank lived most of his early life on a farm. Like other boys in rural sections, Hank had few friends and few toys, as few as the dollars in the family till. So the fields and meadows were his playground and the few toys he possessed were his world of environment. He learned the calls of the birds and the cry of native animals. Folks who lived in the country state declared him a master of his art.

When the chores about the house were through, Hank would hike himself off to the woods with a jug of buttermilk under one arm and a fiddle under the other. In his pocket, carefully guarded, was a harmonica which Hank has bought from a mail order house. He had gotten the money from a traveling salesman whose car he helped push down a muddy road. An empty buttermilk jug provided him with a new musical novelty. He discovered this one day after he had drained the last drop from the jug. Holding it above his head, the cool contents rushed down his throat—after the last drop he exhausted a breath into the jug. The sound he made induced experiment. Discovering that he could produce several different tones by blowing into the jug at various velocities, Hank immediately decided that this new "musical horn" would do no harm.

So, folks, originated the first "jug blower" of the Oarks. Tiring of his Oark Mountain home and reading stories of famous entertainers, that the streets are paved with gold for them, he decided to leave for the city. Packing his fiddle, harmonica and jug, Hank, the typical country lad, mounted the family mule and bled his mammy goodbye.

he set out for fame and fortune. Dismaled by the ways of the city, brokenhearted, Hank started back for home. With no job, his clothes shodded to rags, he started to leave. It was here that he got his first break. A gentleman by the name of Otto Gray took notice of Hank as he was passing through the city. Complaints and Charges. Lodge No. 326, Uniontown, Pa., preferred charges against the administrative committee.

The lodge No. 326 charges that the administrative committee violated article XXVIII, section 5, and article XXX, section 2.

The matter will be investigated by our committee and brought before you in the manner provided by article V of our by-laws.

This concludes our report which was unanimously adopted by the members of our committee.

Bro. Malgai had nothing of particular interest to add, except that he had attended the conference of English speaking lodges.

Report of supervising committee is accepted as read. Bro. Vidler mentioned that the supreme medical examiner had addressed a letter to this meeting in which he expressed the wish that the provisions of the by-laws pertaining to the loss of fingers, be interpreted on the basis of medical opinion.

Bro. Gradisek moved that a special committee be elected, to study appeals and complaints, and applications for special benefits. The motion was seconded and unanimously approved.

Brothers Lokar, Malgai, Somrak, Cveticovich and Ambrosich were nominated. All accepted nominations.

Bro. Zaitz moved that the aforementioned be unanimously elected. The motion was seconded and carried.

Discussion Concerning Reports and Recommendations of the Members of the Supreme Board

Bro. Cankar recommended that equipment for taking moving pictures be purchased. Pictures showing various activities of the Society, of our headquarters and transaction of business in va-

rious departments, with suitable explanations, would be interesting and at the same time serve as useful alive propaganda—not only because they move on the silver screen, but also because additions can be made of any interesting or important events, so that such a film would become a record of our history.

A lively discussion followed in which Bros. Olip, Godina, Terzelj, Lokar, Vidler, Petrovich, Zaitz, Molek and Somrak took part. The consensus of opinion was that moving pictures are modern propaganda, in the same manner as the radio, and that we should not be too conservative in such matters.

Bro. Zaitz moved that the supreme board authorize the administrative committee to acquire significant and interesting films and to have them arranged in a complete moving picture, which shall then be placed at the disposal of the lodges.

Bro. Cankar reported that the English speaking lodges wish to have Labor day proclaimed as S.N.P.J. day. This day should be celebrated by conferences, speeches, motion pictures and in various other ways.

Bro. Lokar moved that the suggestion of the English speaking lodges, namely, that Labor day be celebrated as S.N.P.J. day, be approved by the supreme board. The motion was seconded.

Bro. Petrovich made an alternative motion to the effect that supreme board instruct the administrative committee to assist the English speaking lodges to the fullest extent at their celebration in Pennsylvania on next Labor day. The motion was seconded.

During a lively debate different opinions were expressed: Some thought the real labor day—May Day—should be chosen for this. Others thought that this would be agreeable but not fitting. American Labor day always falls on Monday, which actually means two and a half day holiday.

Bro. Petrovich's motion was carried by a majority vote. The administrative committee will, therefore, offer the English speaking lodges their entire cooperation on the occasion of the celebration on this year's Labor day in Pennsylvania.

JUVENILE MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN

Bro. Vidler recommended that all members of the juvenile department be exempt from payment of two monthly assessments, in April and May. The financial standing is such as to permit this and it would serve to create great interest in our organization.

Bro. Godina moved that the assessments of the juvenile department for April and May, 1936, be omitted. The motion was seconded and carried.

Bro. Vidler reported that the federation for Milwaukee and West Allis, and Lodge 5 had recommended an extension of the membership campaign. Due notice was taken.

Bro. Vidler moved that a campaign for new members for the juvenile department be commenced on April 1st, to continue until December 31, 1936. Such a campaign is essential and must be undertaken. He further moved that awards be offered as follows:

On Bro. Petrovich's suggestion, Bro. Vidler added to his motion the following additional prizes:

Table with 2 columns: Prize and Amount. 1 prize: \$50.00; 10 prizes, each: \$10.00; 1 prize: \$25.00; 20 prizes: \$5.00.

Additional prizes will be based on the highest number of newly enrolled members for the juvenile department, that is, for the highest number the first prize of \$50.00 will be given; where two or more are entitled to the same prize, the same amount will be paid.

Prizes are to be paid only for those new members of the juvenile department, who have paid three successive monthly assessments.

The motion was seconded. A lively discussion developed, in which all Supreme Board members took part. The general opinion was that such a campaign was advisable.

Bro. Godina's motion was unanimously carried. The assessments for the juvenile department for April and May, 1936, will therefore be omitted.

The motion of Bro. Vidler, that a campaign for obtaining new members for juvenile department be undertaken from April 1 to December 31, 1936, and prizes offered, was unanimously carried.

Bro. Vidler moved that an amount of \$10,000 be transferred from the disability fund to the expense fund. In 1932 a like amount had been taken from the expense fund in order to prevent too heavy special assessments. He always regarded that transaction as a loan, although it was not definitely recorded in the minutes as such.

The motion was seconded and unanimously carried.

Bro. Gradisek recommended that the supreme board authorize the administrative committee to omit two monthly assessments in the \$1 class of the sick benefit fund. Such a step should make a good impression and serve to stimulate increased interest among prospective applicants.

A lively discussion followed, in which all supreme board members took part. Brothers Petrovich, Lokar and Ambrosich expressed the opinion that it would be more fitting if the Society sent a check for the amount equal to two months assessments to each member of this sick benefit class. This would be something new and should have gratifying results.

Bro. Podboj related his experiences as a lodge secretary. In his opinion it would be better to wait until a large enough reserve has been accumulated to permit omitting at least three assessments. This would be worthwhile and at the same time make

the work of the secretaries and in the supreme office much easier. He also thought that the next convention should increase the amount of the sick benefits. In answer to Bro. Podboj's inquiry, Bro. Vidler stated that there were about 19,000 members in the \$1 class.

Bro. Olip did not consider the matter so easily disposed of. He wondered what would happen if a special assessment was necessary in the near future. He did not consider it advisable to omit two assessments.

Bro. Podboj moved that the supreme board authorize the administrative committee to omit two assessments of the \$1 sick benefit class, whenever, in its judgment, such a step appeared advisable. Seconded and approved by a majority vote.

Bro. Molek recommended that on July 1st, when the daily celebrates its twentieth anniversary, a jubilee campaign for new subscribers to "Prosveta" be started, to last till December 31st, 1936.

Bro. Vidler moved that Bro. Molek's recommendation be adopted. Seconded and unanimously carried. Meeting adjourned at 5:15 P. M.

THIRD SESSION

Morning of February 7

Bro. Cankar called the meeting to order at 8 P.M. All Supreme Board members were present. The minutes of the first session were read and accepted as read.

The minutes of the second session were approved with a few corrections.

Bro. Molek told of the unusual interest that has been aroused among the members by the discussion about the free-thought school, the idea for which was first advanced by the editor. Such a school would serve to hold our young people in our ranks. He recommended that the supreme board endorse the idea in principle, and that they take steps to have plans prepared to put the idea into effect.

A RESOLUTION

assent the SNPJ free-thought school

The supreme board of SNPJ at its regular semi-annual meeting, held in Chicago from February 6 to February 8, 1936, approves the idea of free-thought school for the juvenile department of SNPJ, believing that such a school would be an excellent means of educating the children of our adult members in a manner conforming to the principles of the Society, and also because it would assure the retention of the younger generation in the SNPJ.

To this end the supreme board decides that three members shall be chosen from among its members to serve as a committee to thoroughly study the question and to formulate one or more practical plans for the realization of this project as expeditiously as conditions will permit. This committee shall prepare a report and submit an estimate of costs at the next regular meeting of the supreme board, who will then further deliberate and take appropriate action.

An animated discussion followed, nearly all supreme board members taking part. Some expressed doubts that the idea could be realized; they did not believe that the financial means and the necessary personnel could be obtained. Others, again, did not fancy the name 'free-thought'; they would prefer to have it called a worker's school. And others again preferred to have a plan submitted before anything else about this matter is submitted for decision.

Bro. Molek called attention to the fact that the resolution gives the task of preparing a plan to the special committee. This committee will have to explore the possibilities for such a school. Whether the plan submitted is realizable or not, will be discussed after the plan is presented to us. The name is entirely side issue. It makes little difference if we call it a free-thought school or workers' school or just school. He chose this name because the Society is a free-thought organization. Alas, many people do not understand what free-thought means. He was convinced that the question of finances could easily be solved, and that we should have no difficulty in finding about a dozen teachers from among a membership of thirty-four thousand of both sexes. It would be a deplorable state of affairs if we could not.

When the vote was taken, Bro. Molek's resolution was unanimously approved.

The following brothers were nominated to serve on the committee in question: Molek, Zaitz, Cankar, Petrovich, Olip, Vidler, Godina and Malgai. The first three of these accepted the nomination; Bro. Somrak, who presided, declared them elected to a committee for studying the question of a free-thought school. No objection was offered.

Bro. Godina stated that from time to time "Prosveta" might be published in eight pages also on some other day beside Wednesday, as circumstances and financial condition would warrant, a copy to be sent to all members.

Bro. Cankar ruled that this matter could be arranged by the administrative committee, and it was not necessary to discuss it here.

Bro. Somrak inquired if it would not be advisable to again publish the Saturday issue of "Prosveta". Bro. Vidler reported that Lodge 38 had requested the restoration of the Saturday issue.

Bro. Lokar preferred to have Wednesday's issue enlarged to twelve pages. Bro. Sular, on the other hand, considered it more advisable to have Friday's issue published on eight pages.

Bro. Godina stated that for the time being the restoration of the Saturday issue was not realizable. But that from time to time, when contributions had accumulated and when there was sufficient money on hand, the Wednesday issue could be enlarged to 12 pages, or the Friday issue to 8 pages.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

Preliminary to a discussion of our finances, Bro. Petrovich earnestly requested that the supreme board give careful consideration to what the finance committee had to report, and to hear them without bias or prejudice. As previously mentioned in their report, the members of the finance committee believe that an injustice is being done them. Their position is quite different from that of any other committee, in that whatever plans or decisions they may make, are subject to the approval by the administrative committee, so that they never can know if their plans will be carried out or not. A system of internal control is both necessary and beneficial for the Society, but it seems that the provisions of the by-laws in this respect are being abused. The members of the finance committee would like to co-operate with the administrative committee, but the members of the administrative committee seem to think that they know everything, so that, in fact, the finance committee is unnecessary—right in their opinion of short term bonds—(1) Is it best to follow the advice of Moody's Service to sell certain inferior bonds and replace them with safer investments?
