



A SUGGESTION

Sports are governed by rules and regulations. Some of these rules and regulations have been in effect for several decades. Others are recent and still others have been amended to better meet the problem of the existing time. In base-ball, last year the sport moguls abolished the sacrifice fly ruling. Said rules had been in effect for many years. However it was thought best to dispense with it. Likewise, changes are being made to improve other sports, in order that present day conditions may be coped with. Perhaps if we would always have in mind the aim to make a sincere effort to offer something constructive instead of destructive, in commenting on what may seem to be an unsolvable problem, we would accomplish ever so much more. All of which brings us to the subject at hand. In view of what has been said about the modification of long standing rules, we hope that the following suggestion will be considered with an open mind as a constructive effort to help improve the boxing game.

We were much displeased in the Simms-Charles first round incident which, as the readers will remember resulted in giving Charles a second opportunity to carry on the fight after he had been knocked COLD in the opening round, only to have the bell and his SECONDS save him.


We contend that when a fighter is knocked senseless, as Charles was, he should be counted out (unless he is able to rise before the ten-count) the count to continue REGARDLESS of the bell. If however, the fighter arises and WITHOUT ASSISTANCE returns to his corner, he should be allowed to do so.

In other words, considering the Simms-Charles case as an example, if Charles, as is known was unable to regain his feet at the six-count when the bell terminated the round, the count according to the new ruling we are suggesting should have continued even after the bell rang.. Thus the round would have been extended only four seconds. At most a round under the new conditions, would never be extended more than 9 seconds.

If the fighter is so helpless that he cannot rise of his own strength, then we believe, a clean cut knockout was scored and the SHORT extension of the round would mark the DIFFERENCE between the man who can come back of HIS OWN initiative and one who has been kayced fairly, as was Frankie Simm's opponent (irrespective of what followed).

Further, such a ruling would eliminate just one more chance at dishonesty. It would prevent a timekeeper from CUTTING short a round the four or five seconds necessary for the referee to complete his count.
