ACID TEST GIVEN CHAMPS, BUT FLORIAN SHOWED METTLE AND UPSET PRE-TOURNEY PREDICTION

Joliet Entry, Champs in Girls' Division, Versatile; Supreme Officers Attend Meet; Jay Cagers Play to Packed Gym

Waukegan, Ill.—True championship caliber is not to be denied. There is no doubt that both the light and heavyweight teams in the recent KSKJ tournament were primed to upset last year's winners. There is no doubt that they played their hardest games against the St. Florians, and as far as the crowns were concerned (in the words of Ed Kompare himself) "the majority were for the underdog." Yet notwithstanding all this, St. Florians came through with flying colors again. Their most rabid opponent must admit that they are the class of KSKJ basketball competition.

Bandaged and apparently handicapped, their ability was still greater than that of their opponents. So it is proper for all good KSKJ boosters to join us in congratulating the twice-crowned champions.

The finals of this year took on somewhat the appearance of last year's finals in both the lightweight and heavyweight divisions the opposition being the same, Joliet vs. St. Florian lights, St. Marys of Waukegan vs. St. Florian heavies.

The exception to last year's was that the Joliet girls were this year's opponents of St. Annes instead of St. Mary girls of Waukegan.

Congratulations also to the new champions in the girls' division, newcomers in KSKJ competition, but by no means newcomers in basketball ability.

After overcoming their first obstacle, and that the most serious, St. Marys of Waukegan, whom they barely conquered by an 18 to 15 score, the Joliet girls won handily in both the semi-final game with St. Marys of Chicago and in the final with last year's champs. Competition this year was keener due to the better brand of ball played. The heavyweight champions had tight games in all their three appearances. The other games likewise showed marked improvement. Perhaps the most improved teams were the St. Marys and St. Joes of Waukegan.

Milwaukee showed surprising strength in both their games. St. Michaels, the pre-tournament choices, flashed team strength which with the addition of the players already lodge members but ineligible due to the six-month ruling should prove in the years to come that they will be in the fight for honors. The new team of St. Aloysius had but one chance to display their wares, but St. Marys of Waukegan proved a bit too strong for them. The Joliet heavyweights would have perhaps reached the finals had they not met the champions in the very first encounter.

The honors of the lightweight division went entirely to Joliet and St. Florians, both winning in their first games easily. In the girls' division most added strength was seen in the play of both the St. Marys, the one of Waukegan and the other of Chicago.

The St. Stephen girls took the floor without a few important cogs, whose presence

would have done much to increase their team's chances. St. Annes of Waukegan, the previous champs, had things entirely their own way in their first two games, but the strain and excitement of defending their honors played upon them so much that in the final game they fouled themselves out of the championship, four of the regulars leaving the game by this means.

St. Anne's No. 2 squad are to be complimented on their willingness to boost the girls' section, because without hopes of winning the championship they nevertheless tried their best to upset such strong teams as the St. Marys of Chicago and St. Anne's No. 1 of Waukegan.

The crowds attended the games in greater number than those of last year; in fact, there was not even standing room for the finals.

Supreme President Frank Opeka threw up the first ball. Supreme Secretary Joseph Zalar honored the occasion by beginning the activities in the first of the championship games. The telegraphic greetings of the Our Page editors showed that they are with us in spirit. Frank Banich presented the KSKJ awards, while yours truly acted in the name of the Midwest Association as chairman of the presentations.

Individual team trophies were presented to the Joliet girls and the two St. Florian teams. Ten individual gold basketballs were presented to each of these groups.

The high score heavyweight honor, the gift of President Opeka, was awarded to St. Marys of Waukegan for their 40-point total in one game. The Joliet lights took the KSKJ Athletic Board trophy by their high score of 45 in their division.

St. Anne's girls of Waukegan were highest in the girls' division, in fact highest of the entire tourney in one game with 47 points, for which they received the Midwest Association high score award. The sportsmanship trophies were won by the St. Mary's (Waukegan) girls and the St. Aloysius heavyweights of Chicago.

The dances were attended by capacity crowds. The music furnished by Ames and his Ambassadors was acceptable. The only discord in the entire program was the trick of the weatherman in sending us a snow storm the night of the finals, a storm which made traveling to many of our visitors very inconvenient. A good many were obliged to await the arrival of daytime before they could set forth for their homes.

The high hopes set for this tournament were entirely fulfilled. Better competition, larger crowds, with the attendant sociability and KSKJ fraternalism. South Chicago in their acceptance of next year's tournament have a mark to shoot at which they may find difficult to reach.

Basketball Tourney Held in Waukegan

A number of out-of-town boys went collegiate, sleeping in the improvised dormitory of the school building. The official referees were pressed closely even after the games. They were very much in demand at the dances. The scorekeeper not only getting the lineup of girl players, but also the phone numbers of the fair damsels. The visitors made good use of the alleys. Many high score games were bowled. The church was crowded Sunday morning at all Masses by our basketeers. The semi-final and final games were so close that three referees were needed in each of them, whereas only two worked in each of the preliminary games. The victory of the Joliet girls should surely spur basketball interest in Joliet and so much so that there may be competition between Joliet and South Chicago for the privilege of the next tourney. Now the Waukeganites are already looking ahead expectantly to the grand time that they will have in South Chicago at the next tourney. We wonder what happened to the two Milwaukee lads Sunday night which made it necessary to send a party out to track them down.

THE TOURNEY STORY IN FIGURES

St. Marys of Waukegan, defeated in the final game by the St. Florians, had the high team total of 92 points. St. Annes of Waukegan came second with 82 points. St. Florian heavyweights came third with 75. The free throw honors go entirely to the Joliet girls. The records show that out of 42 shots they connected 22 times for an average of .524. The St. Anne No. 2 team, with 14 out of 28, tied with the Joliet lightweights with their 16 out of 32 for a percentage of .500. Even the champion St. Florians could not match the free throw skill of the Joliet girls, having only 17 out of 33 free throws for .472. Individual high score honors went to R. Somic of Joliet, whose 33 points barely nosed out George Stupar of the St. Mary heavyweights, who had 32. F. Gerchar of St. Mary's Waukegan heavies totaled 28 with 14 field goals, but fell behind the others due to the lack of accuracy in his free throws. His 14 field goals tied the 14 of Somic, but the Joliet star took honors with his additional five free throws. E.

Benish of Milwaukee would have perhaps been the outstanding shooting star had his team competed in another game. His two-game total gives him 21 points. Last year's individual high scorer, A. Hurysz of South Chicago, comes next with 17 points in one complete game and a part of another game. T. Bespalec showed the way to all the girl sharpshooters with 11 baskets and one free throw in two games for a total of 23 points. E. Simonich of Joliet took second honors among the girls with 20 points in three games. Omerzel of St. Stephens of Chicago and D. Wanagaitis of Joliet showed their ability with 16 points. M. Kukman of St. Marys, Chicago, was outstanding scorer of their team with 12 points. The outstanding honors for clean play go to John Treven of St. Mary heavyweights of Waukegan, who went through three entire games without one personal foul, the only member of the two heavyweight finalists to whom this honor goes.
