

Remembering our Founder

We observe Founders' Day this month of November, especially the memory of Marie Prisland. In December, on the 19th, we will observe the 73rd Anniversary of the Slovenian Women's Union which she founded.

She often referred to her beautiful Slovenian birthplace, Rečica ob Savinji, and her grandmother who raised her. A visit there seemed so appropriate for the group of SWU members who toured the country this past September for the Beatification of Slovenia's first saint, Bishop Anton Martin Slomsek. The cover photos attest to that visit to Rečica.

In the parish cemetery we found the family grave and took a little of the earth from that hallowed place to bring home with us us. This earth will be spread onto Mrs. Prisland's grave in Sheboygan, the city in which she lived, some 3,000 miles away from Rečica.

We hoped that in this way our organization will be fortified in the pledge to follow the legacy of Marie Prisland, restated in the words of our SWU Mission Statement:

Slovenia - What an incredibly beautiful country!

When was your last visit to our homeland – Slovenia? Or are you one of the many that has not taken the opportunity? In my opinion – Slovenia is one of the most beautiful countries in the world! What other country can boast such sights, many gorgeous fresh flowers at every house blended with hills and valleys and the beautifully restored old villages and churches. All of the sites are just unbelievable and even hard to describe. You need to see it all for yourself!

The feeling I had when I first saw Slovenia was just incredible. Tears welled up in my eyes. My mother had told me that I would see – but I really didn't believe her. But what she said was so true. The countryside was full of lush green rolling hills and flowers just seem to grow everywhere. There are flowers cascading down from window boxes on the front of buildings and homes. Flowers cover the grave sites and all the church altars have magnificent sprays of every kind of flower. Every home has a well-manicured lawn with flower gardens and vegetable gardens. Many of the yards also grow fruit trees along with grapevines.

"The Many Splendors of Slovenia Tour III" as advertised in the ZARJA turned out to be better than any of us could have anticipated. Everyday was special and brought a highlight to remember. From the gorgeous clear blue water of the Adriatic coastline at Dubrovnik, Croatia to the warm, welcoming city of Ljubljana, the countryside of Slovenia, and ending in the historic city of Budapest, Hungary. We saw so much and did so much. It would take the entire issue of the ZARJA to share it all with you. I don't mean to say that everything we did was memorable but I want to share a few highlights that I thought would be of interest to you and may be even tempt you and your families to plan your trip to Slovenia in the near future.

One of my first highlights was at Medjugorje in Herzegovina, walking up the Apparition Hill. As we climbed the steep and rocky hill we prayed the Rosary. It was a difficult climb with the sharp rocks and thorny bushes along the side. We all opted to keep our shoes on, however there were many climbers who had chosen make the climb barefoot. What elation I felt when we reached the top. It was a feeling of total calm and peace. As if nothing in the world mattered, except being there, at that precise time. At the exact same moment we reached the top, we actually saw the sun pulsating and moving. It was a definite sign. Needless to say, we were all overwhelmed. That evening we attended the Holy Mass at the Church of St. James. What a wonderful way to end an extremely spiritual and emotional day. The next day we were honored to hear a visionary, Jakov Colo to share with us the messages of Our Lady of Peace. Jakov was one of the eight original children that witnessed her visit at the top of the hill in 1981. Jakov shared with us five key points: peace, faith, conversion, prayer and fasting. Our Lady visits him only once a year now. Don't you wonder if we all followed her simple requests if this world would be a better place to live in?

It was important as a member of the Slovenian Women's Union to see the childhood home of our beloved founder, Marie Prisland. Rečica ob Savinji is in a beautiful area. With the help of the pastor we were able to locate the grave of Marie Prisland's grandmother who raised her from childhood until she left for America. Corinne Leskovar, Jean Korsman and I were also able to meet woman who is now living in her grandmother's house. She was so sweet and friendly. She alowed us to take a picture with her.

The solemn mass at Maribor with Pope John Paul II for the beatification of Anton Martin Slomsek was overwhelming. There were over 200,000 people present at the

outdoor mass. The choir had 2,500 singers that had practiced the same songs for weeks before the event. They were from many different places including the USA. The service and the celebration lasted three hours. The Pope spoke to the Slovenian people in our own Slovenian language. This was his second trip to Slovenia in the past three years. He had a very positive speech and gave his hope that all people, old and young, from all banks of the river would be more tolerant and accepting of each other. He prayed for peace and friendship. I consider myself very fortunate to be there at that time. I only wish I could have gotten to see him closer.

A trip to Slovenia would not be complete without a visit with relatives. Our visit was short, but so emotional. We were able to bring our family stories up to date and share memories. I had compiled a family tree of all our relatives in America. Slovenia, and Argentina. I was amazed that they were able to provide us more information from memory, such as birth, death, and wedding dates for all of our family members living in Slovenia. They were so surprised to know that we felt they are so important and have included them in the family tree. Our relatives welcomed us with open and loving arms. I am sure that your relatives would do the same when given the chance.

There is so much more to tell, I was ready to stay in Slovenia. I really didn't want to come back home. I know have my twenty-two rolls of film and various memorabilia to sort out and put into a scrapbook. It is going to be wonderful way to relive all of the exciting moments and events I am willing to share with each and every one of you.

I am sure that I speak for all of us when I express my heartfelt thanks to Corinne Leskovar and to Rudy Crnekovic from Priority Travel for planning such a fantastic trip. They definitely put their hearts and souls into the planning of this trip.

I believe that plans are already in the works for "The Many Splendors of Slovenia Tour IV" for the fall of 2001. Start saving for this trip now. You won't want to miss an opportunity to have a lifetime of memories of our homeland.

L'Osservatore Romano – Vatican City September 22, 1999 HOLY FATHER'S VISIT TO MARIBOR, SLOVENIA

Bishop Anton Slomšek was a vine yielding rich fruits of Christian holiness and culture

On Sunday, 19 September, Pope John Paul II made his second Pastoral Visit to Slovenia, traveling to Maribor for the beatification of Bishop Anton Martin Slomšek, known as a Pastor of great devotion and learning who played a decisive role in promoting Slovenian language and culture. After brief arrival ceremonies at Maribor's airport, the Pope was taken to an open area near Betnava Castle for the solemn beatification Mass. During the liturgy the Holy Father preached the homily in Slovenian. Here are several excerpts:

"Let us now praise famous men... Their posterity will continue for ever... Peoples will declare their wisdom, and the congregation proclaims their praise (Sir 44:1a, 14b-15).

Sirach's words resound today in our assembly. Hearing them, we immediately thought of the persons belonging to this Slovenian people who were distinguished for their virtues: we thought, for example, of Bishops Friderik Baraga, Janez Gnidovec and Anton Vovk, of Fr. Vendelin Vošnjak and the young Lojze Grozde.

We remembered in particular the man the Church proclaims blessed today: Bishop Anton Martin Slomšek, the first son of the Slovenian nation to be raised to the glory of the altars. Three years after my first visit, I return today to present him to you as a model of that holiness which holds the only power that can conquer the world, as I pointed out to you then I am therefore pleased to meet you and to preside at this solemn Holy Mass.

Today's Gospel, which speaks of the vine and the branches, reminds us that it is only by abiding in Christ that we can bear fruit. In this way Jesus shows us the secret to the holiness of Bishop Anton Martin Slomšek, whom I have the joy of beatifying today.

He was a vine which yielded abundant fruits of *Chris*tian holiness, of remarkable cultural richness and of lofty patriotism. This is why he stands before us today as a splendid example of one who put the Gospel into practice.

In the new blessed it is *the values of Christian holiness* which shine the brightest. In the footsteps of Christ he made himself the Good Samaritan of the Slovenian people. Attentive to the formation needs of the clergy and faithful, with an apostolic zeal that is still an example to us today, he never tired of evangelizing by conducting popular missions, founding numerous confraternities, preaching spiritual exercises and disseminating popular hymns and religious writings. He was a Catholic Pastor in the truest sense of the word, and was entrusted by his ecclesiastical Superiors with important pastoral tasks even in other regions of the State at that time.

Faithful and docile to the Church, Slomšek showed he was profoundly open to ecumenism, and was one of the first in Central Europe to be committed to Christian unity. May his desire for unity stimulate the ecumenical commitment, so that the Christians of this Europe which was so

dear to him may cross the threshold of the third millennium 'if not completely united, at least closer to overcoming the divisions of the second millennium' (*Tertio millennio adveniente*, n. 34).

The new blessed also paid great attention to *culture*. Living in the middle of the last century, he was perfectly aware of the importance for the nation's future of the intellectual formation of its inhabitants, especially the young. For this reason, he combined pastoral action with commitment to the promotion of culture, which represents a nation's wealth and is the patrimony of all. Culture is the *soil* from which a people can draw the necessary elements for their growth and development.

Zealous promoter of national culture and social reforms

Convinced of this, Slomšek worked to open various schools for young people and saw to the publication of books useful for human and spiritual formation. He warned that if young people were corrupted, the fault could often be traced to the lack of adequate formation. Families, schools and the Church, he taught, must join forces in a serious educational programme, each preserving its own area of autonomy, but all taking account of the values they share.

Only with a sound formation can men and women be prepared to build a world that is open to the perennial values of truth and love.

The new blessed was also motivated by deep sentiments of *patriotism*. He was concerned for the Slovenian language, called for appropriate social reforms, promoted a higher level of national culture and did all he could to have his people occupy an honorable place in the concert of other European nations. And he did this without ever yielding to sentiments of short-sighted nationalism or selfish opposition to the aspirations of neighboring peoples.

The new blessed is offered to you as a model of true patriotism. His projects left a decisive mark on your people's future and made an important contribution to the achievement of independence.

Dear brothers and sisters of beloved Slovenia! Follow

in the footsteps of your upright and generous compatriot, who longed to know God's will and to fulfill it at any cost. His inner firmness and Gospel optimism were rooted in a strong faith in Christ's victory over sin and evil.

Imitate him, especially you, dear young Slovenians, and like him, do not hesitate to put your young energies at the service of God's kingdom and of your brethren. For you priests, may he be a model of zealous labour and the spirit of sacrifice. For you, responsible lay people, especially those who work in public institutions, may he be an example of honesty, impartial service and the courageous quest for justice and the common good.

Be builders of peace within Europe too! The process of unification to which the continent is committed cannot only be based on economic concerns but must be inspired by those Christian values which are its most ancient and authentic roots. A Europe attentive to the human person and to full respect for his rights: this is the goal for which we must strive! May the old Europe transmit to the new generation the torch of the human and Christian civilization which illumined the steps of our ancestors during the millennium now drawing to a close.

I would like to repeat the prophetic words spoken by Bishop Slomšek during a popular mission, 'The world has grown old; the human race is adrift; Europe is coming to an end'. Well: yes, if we abandon humanity to its natural courses to its fatal direction. No, if the power from on high that is preserved in the religion of Jesus and in his Church is poured out anew on all ranks of the human race and restores them to life.

We can lean this important lesson from Bl. Slomšek. May he, a courageous servant of Christ, help us to be branches of the immortal vine, spreading the Gospel of hope and love everywhere.

Amen!"





SLOVENIAN WOMEN'S UNION OF AMERICA NATIONAL BOARD MEETING REVIEW

July 17, 18, 19 & 20, 1999

National President Kathleen J. Dorchak called the meeting to order at 1:20 p.m. Officers attending one or more of the meetings were as follows: Kathleen Dorchak, Marjorie Church, Bonnie Prokup, Jonita Ruth, Mary Turvey, Angela Stare, Beverly Menart, Fran Morison, Corinne Leskovar, Agnes Dobczyk. Former officers in attendance were: Cirila Kermavner, Pat Figurowski, Josephine Lustik.

Current Officer absent was: Beverly Jackson, Auditor. Former Officers absent were: Jean Korsman, Evelyn Majercik and Irene Odorizzi. Meeting minutes taken by Nikki Blowers.

The minutes of the last Board Meeting in February, 1999 as published in ZARJA were reviewed and approved by the current Board in attendance. Each Board Member submitted a report of her position's intended goals which were submitted and attached to the minutes.

The National Convention Meeting Minutes were incorporated into the minutes for the record.

The importance of a Strategic Plan was stressed and Members were requested to submit all ideas and suggestions to be further reviewed at the next Board Meeting. In the meantime, immediate concerns of transition were of prime importance and attention was directed in that regard.

Convention Bylaw changes, and approval thereof, was discussed to determine the preparation of new Ritual and Bylaws publications, expecting they will be produced within the next two months. Explanation of the Bylaws to the entire membership was discussed and particularly of concern was the change that new membership after 1/1/00 would not receive an insurance benefit beyond that date. Two (2) copies of the new Bylaws would be sent to each President/Branch Secretary for their Records. It was noted that anyone requiring a copy would receive it upon request to his or her Branch Secretary or to the home office.

In the procedures of the Board Meeting, each Officer was requested to express their interests and future plans.

Report: National Vice President, Marjorie Church submitted several different ideas and tasks that would include more viable fund raising programs due to the lack of cash flow to augment the work of the future Zveza. It is important to create activities for the membership, and look to the American-Slovenian woman who wants to know about her heritage. Updating of the home office premises and bringing it into the computer age was also of importance and to be pursued.

Report: Scholarship Director, Mary Turvey suggested that the newly established tax-exempt, non-profit Slovenian Women's Union Scholarship Foundation be presented to all members so that tax free donations may be declared on income tax returns to reduce individual IRS expenditure commitments. Letter to branches and article for ZARJA will be prepared.

With regard to all the promotional materials to be created such as the donation cards, envelopes, flyers promoting Zveza etc. to be distributed amongst the membership, a discussion was held into looking for companies or trades who would donate for the publication of some or all of the materials as part of their marketing/public relations expense to help bring attention to the Slovenian Women's Union.

On Sunday, July 18th, the SWU Board Members and Members of Branch 20 attended Chicago Branch 2's Mass, Annual Picnic, and Litany at the Franciscan Seminary Picnic Grounds in Lemont, Illinois. It was a day of rest.

The second day of the meetings (Monday 7/19/99), the Board Members were advised by the President that Irene Odorizzi, Heritage Director, had a sent a letter of resignation much to the consternation of the Board. After long discussion expressing regret and sadness, Board Members wished to designate a resolution to be included in the formal Board minutes as follows:

"To Irene Odorizzi: The Slovenian Women's Union of America gives you their heartfelt thanks and appreciation for all the years you have given to this organization.

"Irene, you have served as a building block of this organization and will be missed by all. The amount of time and energy you have devoted to the SWU of America is insurmountable and no words can adequately express how your input to the organization will be missed. Thank you for the wonderful articles in the ZARJA, the poetry, immigrant columns and the genealogy articles."

Irene always gave 100% of herself; finished what she started, took time, researched and wrote a wonderful book 'Footsteps through Time' (which every Slovenian Woman should have). Irene's accomplishments were multifarious. Her resignation will be a tremendous loss to the entire organization. It is difficult to express how much the 23 years given to SWU of America mean now and meant previously to every Board Member who worked with her and how much she was appreciated. Her enthusiasm was boundless, her talent was exceptional and creativity was her middle name. The President, by direction of the Board Members, will respectfully request that Irene consider spending some time on a 'consult basis' and also consider preparing articles for ZARJA in the national interest.

Report: National Secretary, Bonnie Prokup. Prime concern is now to focus attention on redevelopment and Board Members were given an outline of short term/long term plans for this National Secretary's job (attached to minutes.) The past computerized programs have need for re-configuring and updating. The task is to bring the data base program up to complete accuracy. The National Treasurer at the home office location will accept payments, duly record, make deposits and document it to the National Secretary. Redesigning an invoice was a point of discussion, and input by the Board was submitted to the National Secretary. A special report was made by William Prokup, an Accountant, and Bonnie's husband, who made several suggestions, described the information that was received to date and was not able to determine the financial position at this time. He extended his deep interest in the financial aspect of the

organization and will in every way advise and assist the National Secretary with the transition and create procedures to avoid any gaps in the future.

Subject: The home office secretary's salary was reviewed and after discussion, motion was made to at least pay a minimum wage for a 20-hour week. Motion carried. Salary review is to be made again at the next annual Board Meeting.

At the same time, the annual salaries of the officers was discussed and by vote of delegates of the National Convention in Orlando, the following salaries were approved:

President: \$120, monthly; Vice President: \$50 yearly; National Secretary: \$1,000, monthly; Treasurer: \$50, yearly; ZARJA Editor: \$833, monthly; Each Auditor: \$50, yearly; Scholarship Director: \$600, yearly, taken from Scholarship Funds; Heritage Columnist: \$300, yearly, \$50 per issue.

Other expense issues were discussed and only those expenses would be reimbursed which pertain to the business transactions of the organization and only with full Board approval. A base per diem was established of \$50.00 per day for any Board Member who attends the annual Board meeting but will exclude a Sunday if the Board should meet over a weekend. The airfares will be reimbursed.

Report: Jonita Ruth, Treasurer and Office Manager. Written report was distributed and attached to the minutes. Many issues were discussed and the following was approved: purchase of a fax machine and installation of a dedicated phone line, establishment of a petty cash fund and purchase of an inexpensive paper shredder. Long distance phone cost was to be investigated with various carriers to find lower rates for the home office.

Report: Corinne Leskovar, ZARJA Editor. Written re-

port was distributed and copy of it was attached to minutes. Corinne also reported on the trip to Slovenia as an invited participant to a seminar for archival work to be done among Slovenian organizations in the U.S. The purpose was to make organizations aware of the need to document historical material. SWU and other fraternal, social and cultural organizations were invited.

A very interesting and important issue presented by Corinne is that the branches should now prepare historical documentation of their branches and with the assistance of the home office, Corinne and officers of the SWU, guidance and information will be available to each and every branch. One of the sources of archival information would be all the previous issues of the ZARJA Magazine which is chronicle of the SWU for 72 years. Members were reminded that for the six issues of ZARJA published throughout the year, the deadline dates are December 1, for January/February issue; February 1, for the March/April issue; April 1, for the May/ June issue, June 1, for the July/August issue; August 1 for the September/October issue; and October 1, for the November/December issue.

Report: Auditors. Recommendation was made by the auditors that an outside accounting firm audit the books in order to bring the actual financial status current for presentation to the new National Secretary.

(Agnes Dobzcyk, Women's Activities Director was absent due to illness)

Third day of meeting (July 20, 1999) Report: Angela Stare, Junior Activities Director. Written report was distributed and attached to minutes. Angela will contact each branch with a letter introducing her and will ask each branch to vote on or appoint a junior activity director to contact her. It was decided by the Board that at least an annual stipend should be paid to the Junior Activity Director in line with the other Board members' stipends and that should be \$50.00 per annum.

After long discussion of the future of the Heritage Museum, and the need for a Director to lead the way to the future, Board Members unanimously decided that Fr. David Stalzer would be an excellent candidate due to his devoted interest in the Slovenes, his interest in Slovene culture and traditions. With this in mind, he was invited to the Board Meeting to discuss this possibility. He asked for time to consider the position and respond at a later time. The Heritage Museum volunteers were also in attendance and their input ratified the Board's suggestion.

Throughout the three days of meetings, many issues were discussed, reviewed with intention of implementation in the near future and are set forth as follows with Board approval:

Creation of a Web Site for the Slovenian Women's Union of America. All offerings and history of the SWU will be incorporated in the Web Site. Web Site Master volunteer is Marc Judnik, member of Br. 20 who will process the details for inclusion.

Promotional programs need to be established to market our exceptionally beautiful cookbook. Ads to be placed in strategic publications.

The Slovenian Greeting Cards created by Bernadette Fitzsimmons of the Washington, D.C., Br. 103, were made available for sale from the Home Office.

Membership campaign was suggested for immediate

attention and write-up in the ZARJA. Members who join prior to the end of 12/31/99 will be entitled to a death benefit. Thereafter, members who join after 1/1/00 will be entitled to receive the ZARJA magazine with the offerings of the Scholarship Program, but no death benefits will be apply (As approved by the National Board and Delegates at May, 1999 Convention). Interior office and building cleaning and maintenance authorization was given to Jonita Ruth to accept appropriate bids and proceed with the best service with approval of the Board. T-shirts showing designs from the creation of Slovenian Murals (by artist Lucille Dragovan) was submitted to two printing houses for bids.

The Home Office/Heritage Building was given a walk through by Board Members to determine need for updating and re-design for future Museum development. The fire code has been maintained, but infractions because of antiquity of the building may have to be brought to code prior to establishing and/or to re-designing of Museum space. It was hoped that the building interior could be architecturally

BIOGRAPHICAL UPDATES ON OUR SCHOLARSHIP AWARDEES

Dr. Dorthyann (Zakrasek) Lindes, a member of branch 3, Pueblo, Colorado in 1967 when she received a SWU Scholarship, was gracious to share the following:

"Since 1967, when I was a recipient of a scholarship from the Slovenian Women's Union, I have graduated from Creighton University with a B.S. in biology, 'summa cum laude'. I then entered Medical School at the University of Nebraska and received my M.D. in 1975. I completed a Family Practice residency in Columbus, Ohio in 1978. I married in 1976 and my husband and I practiced in rural western Colorado until 1984, when we moved to Cleveland, Ohio. I have been in a group family practice for fifteen years. I have two sons, ages 16 and 19 and continue to carry on the Slovenian traditions in my home.

"Because of your support and that of others, I have been able to realize my goals in life. Thank you for your most worthwhile program."

Lisa Vidergar Lucas, member of branch 100, Fontana, California was a 1985 SWU Scholarship winner and has suibmitted an autobiographical paragraph for our readers.

"I studied civil engineering at the University of Notre Dame from 1985 to 1989. During my college years, I not only studied hard but enjoyed extracurricular activities, including singing in a choir and participating in various community service programs. After graduating with a B.S. in Civil Engineering, I signed on as a structural engineer at Badger Engineers in Cambridge, Massachusetts. I very much enjoyed this job and my two years in the Boston area. During this period, I was fortunate to be chosen Miss S.N.P.J. 1990 and for one year traveled extensively throughout the U.S. for numerous Slovenian cultural, social, and athletic functions. In 1991, I left Boston to attend graduate school and, unbeknownst to me, met my future husband, Keith, at Stanford University.

"By the time I completed my M.S. in Civil Engineering (with an emphasis in Environmental Fluid Mechanics), I had decided to study for a Ph.D. My dissertation research involved computer modeling of the interactions between physics (water flow and mixing) and biology (phytoplankton, or algae, dynamics) in estuaries like San Francisco Bay. The significance of this work lies in the fact that 1) phytoplanton form a basis of the marine food web, 2) many species of phytoplankton can be toxic to fish and/or humans, and 3) large amounts of algae in the water can ultimately lead to very low oxygen levels and consequent fish kills.

"While pursuing our Ph.D's, Keith and I were involved with a number of activities including the Stanford Catholic Choir (where we met), Habitat for Humanity, and food-sorting at Second Harvest Food Bank. We finished our Ph.D's in 1997 and have since remained in the San Francisco Bay area. I am currently a Postdoctoral Research Fellow at the U.S. Geological Survey in Menlo Park, California, continuing to work on physical-biological modeling studies of the San Francisco Bay-Delta System.

"I continue to sing with choirs and am currently the organizer of a group of Stanford affilitates who visit the San Jose Family Shelter monthly to read books and be with homeless children and provide some fun, creative activities for them. Through my entire life, I have continued my involvement in the Slovenian culture, attending functions at the Slovene Halls in Fontana and San Francisco several times a year, and, usually, playing my button accordion and singing."

Judith A. Jesik Chandler, a member of branch 3, Pueblo, Colorado, when she received a SWU Scholarship in 1996 has sent the following update on her life since her freshmen year of college:

"I started my college career at Western State College in Gunnison, Colorado in the fall of 1966. I married De Witt "Ski" Chandler on September 10, 1966. Due to a difficult pregnancy I had to put my college career on hold. Our first daughter, Kristie, was born on October 16, 1967. I returned to college part time. Our second daughter, Kerrie, was born on December 27, 1968. My husband got a teaching job in Pueblo, Colorado where I resumed my college degree at Southern Colorado State College. Our son Kurt, was born November 24, 1972. I earned a B.S. degree in May 1972.

"I began teaching first grade in September 1972 in Pueblo School District 60 at Columbian Elementary. I earned my Masters Degree in Education from the University of Southern Colorado in the Spring of 1975. In July of 1991, I earned my type D certificate (elementary principal endorsement). I worked for one year as an assistant principal and decided to return to my first grade classroom. I am presently completing my 27th year at Columbian Elementary. My husband is a retired teacher, both of my daughters are teachers. Kristie is a high school math teacher and Kerrie teaches 5th grade, both in Pueblo School District 60. My son works at the local Walmart store.

"My pride and joy are my "three" precious grandsons (Kristie's babies), Michael age 4, Nicholas, age 2-1/2, and Christopher, age 9 months. I was awarded the 1989 Outstanding Teacher Award, Colorado Awards; Education and Civic Achievement and the Pueblo Celebration of Women Award in Education in 1990. I am active in Our Lady of the Meadows Church and local education associations.

"The Slovenian Cultural Traditions (food and music) are a very important part of my life and influences our celebrations during the holidays (especially Christmas and Easter) and special family occasions such as baptisms, birthdays, and weddings, which involves my parents and 11 siblings and their families."

Mary Turvey:

The unshakeable faith of Bishop Baraga continues to inspire!

Baraga Days, September 4 and 5, of this year was celebrated in an old but pretty city, Escanaba, situated on Lake Michigan. Bishop Baraga often traveled there by horseback or even on foot. Escanaba means "flat rock" in Ojibway. Winter traveling was limited to dogsled and snowshoes until after 1852 when the railroad system was begun to transport people between Green Bay and Marquette, but more importantly to ship iron ore and lumber. In 1865 Bishop Baraga appointed Father Duroc to start the first parish in Escanaba, St. Joseph's Church. Then, in 1901, the Irish of Escanaba were given permission to build St. Patrick's Church, the site where the 1999 Baraga Days were celebrated.

St. Patrick's, now 98 years old, still maintains it's original interior. Large stained glass windows in deep hues, gothic arches, and a statue of St. Patrick gracing the altar in a brilliant green tunic and miter contrasted sharply with the cedar bough draped portrait of Bishop Frederick Baraga, portrayed as a young man robed in black as it faced the crowd of many devoted to the remembrance and future sainthood of Frederick Baraga. Both of these men however, worked under similar conditions in different eras and parts of the world. Both were from foreign countries, had to learn a new language, traveled and lived under difficult conditions to work for those who had been oppressed, helping them to retain their traditions, yet educating them and most importantly teaching them about Jesus and the Christian way of life. Mrs. Frances Kramer, organizer of the Toronto bus tour group brought a beautiful bouquet of red carnations and rosemary which was placed beside the Baraga painting in front of the main altar.

The Rev. Dr. Franci Šuštar of Grosuplje, Slovenia, represented Baraga's homeland as the Celebrant and Homilist at a very touching Slovene Mass. He had traveled with a bus group of Toronto Slovenians who came to this special gathering. Although the Lemont choir was unable to attend, Rev. Vendelin Spendov, O.F.M., Director of Music at Lemont furnished a prelude of Slovene music on a pipe organ with delight and gusto, and accompanied the Mass as well. Each and every pipe was well-exercised. A large gathering of Slovenes, Croats, and Native Americans from Cleveland, Toronto, Milwaukee, Chicago, Upper Michigan and Northern Wisconsin participated in singing in Mass. Few had music to read but all knew the words. At the conclusion of the Mass Father Sustar sang the most beautiful litany in Slovene that has ever been heard in this region. The congregation again sang all of the responses, a wonderful blend of voices, expressing their devotion to their beloved Blessed Mother.

Those in attendance presented themselves as being very humble, devout, fully appreciative, treasuring their Slovene ways. At times I have wondered if the work done for the Scholarship Program is really worth the time put into it, but when I sensed the love, warmth, and devotion of these people at the Baraga Mass, I truly knew that the work of all of us involved in the promotion of our Slovene heritage, be it in an organization or within our homes, is of utmost importance.

Imagine the delight of seeing potica, along with cucumber and ribbon sandwiches at a well-attended reception in Escanaba, Michigan! Then, to meet some members of the Milwaukee Branch 12 of the Slovenian Women's Union was the biggest surprise of all. Ann Grambow told of the Slovene exhibit that is held in an ethnic park in Milwaukee and also of the Slovene Chorus, "Uspeh" of Milwaukee which is invited every four years to sing in Slovenia. Many remembered Hermine Dicke and asked about her, commenting on the "Pots and Pans" cookbooks which they still enjoy. Anne Beyersdorf, also of Milwaukee, is a native of Rečica ob Savinji, Marie Prisland's home village. It became a very small world when we discovered that Marge Bartol of Cincinnati, one of my traveling companions to the Mass, has a cousin who sings in Reverend Šuštar's church choir in Grosuplje, Slovenia.

Several miracles are being investigated at this time but it has been requested that prayers for more intercessions continue. SLOVENIA'S TWO SAINTS

here are striking similarities between our two Slovenian saints, Bishop Anton Martin Slomsek and Bishop Frederic Ireanus Baraga.

Slomsek and Baraga – two very intelligent, vibrant personalities, were emotionally and deeply committed to their people. They were priests consumed with love and concern for those who were entrusted to them – and became fine leaders of the Catholic Church with the sense of organizing, putting their flocks together and at the same time, with a strong vision of what it should be.

In that sense, both transferred the centers of their jurisdictions: Slomsek from St. Andras in Austria to Maribor in Slovenia and Baraga from Sault Ste. Marie to Marquette, Michigan. Those two respected cities had served very well at the time, and both Bishops felt very settled into the structure as it was when they were placed there – but they both saw the need to connect with their people and create a better atmosphere for religious teaching, to concentrate and create a heart for their religion where they would be able to touch all of the people.

Marquette became the center of Baraga's mission. There he was able to organize and encircle the diocese and put his strong imprint into it. It then really became the core or center of activities for the American Indians of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan because it was situated in the land they occupied – whereas Sault Ste. Marie, at that time, was more of an immigration center, with the American Indian reservation situated just at the edge of it.

At. St. Andras diocese in Austria, Slomsek was a very important and highly respected church official. But he wanted to encompass the Slovenians and knew that in Austria he could not do it; he had to bring the diocese to Slovenians where most of them they actually lived. He risked a powerful future as a cleric of the highest order and through his influence the diocese was moved into the heart of the Slovenian homeland, where he was able to secure the Catholic religion for Slovenians in their own land and strengthen the Church presence in Slovenia.

What is the most illustrative point of this is that both saints knew extremely well what the mother tongue means to religion – to the values of human kind, among which is religious belief that has developed during the course of human life. In other words, both Slomsek and Baraga knew - or they both had a great sensititivity to the basic instrument which provides the sense of God in human experience, and that is, the mother tongue. As the infant establishes a basic trust and the most essential relationship with his mother, the most intimate connection, the deepest, sacred relationship from which all other relationships are modeled, this is created in the mother's communication thru language. And, the mother's language is needed in order to connect with God. In other words, to connect with God, you will use the same language used to establish the relationship between you and your mother because God and Mother are two of the innermost intimate areas of human experience.

Baraga and Slomsek both knew this – that the importance of the mother tongue is the key to religion. Both wrote books, prayer books, poems, and catechisms to support and nurture the use of the mother tongue of their flocks.

Slomsek and Baraga loved the people they served – they cared for them, each to his last breath. They fought for them, not just for their religious rights, but also for their basic human and civil rights.

Baraga defended the American Indians – Slomsek spoke publicly many times for Slovenian rights – they encouraged respect for the native languages and cultures of their people and with their writings were able to put credibility to these languages.

In death they were, for the last time, again so similar. They lived their lives as the poorest among their flocks, and kept no worldly goods for themselves. It is known that Bishop Baraga, on his death bed, bestowed all he owned – contained in a small box – to the poor of his diocese. In it were his Bishop's Cross, and a small amount of money.

Finally, they both now lie in their respected cathedrals where they are still accessible. The two saints have not vanished – they still give their spirit to everyone who comes with prayers and petitions. They are taking care of us in a very different way. Their's is a presence that inspires us to stay loyal to the values that they preached and lived.

Slovenska dva svetnika

Lahko bi rekli, da imamo Slovenci že dva svetnika: škofa Antona Martina Slomška in škofa Friderika Baraga, ki sta si med seboj izredno podobna; podobna sta si v svojem mišljenju, čutenju in zlasti v njuni neverjetni gorečnosti za poslanstvo, ki sta ga opravljala.

Slomšek in Baraga sta bila dva izredno inteligentna moža, z neverjetnimi sposobnostmi ter zlasti sta se odlikovala s svojo globoko predanostjo ljudem, h katerim sta bila poslana; skratka bila sta duhovnika, prežeta z ljubeznijo in skrbjo do ljudi, ki so jima bili zaupani ter bila izjemno vplivna voditelja, ki nista samo znala organizirati in voditi kar jima je bilo zaupano, temveč sta ob vsem zmogla vedno gledati naprej, načrtovati in s svojimi vizionarskimi sposobnostmi pronikniti daleč v prihodnost, ki sta jo tako skrbno načrtovala.

V tem smislu sta oba prenesla škofijske sedeže: Slomšek od St. Andraža, torej iz Avstrije v Maribor, v Slovenijo; Baraga pa iz Sault St. Marie v Marquette, Michigan. Mesti v katerih so prvotno bili njuni škofiji sta bili dobro izbrani, in sicer v času, v katerem sta nastopila svoji poslanstvi, vendar pa sta kmalu oba ugotovila, da se bo treba preseliti v nov center, ki bo povezoval in na novo družil.

Za Baraga je Marquette postal center njegovega misijona. Od tam je odhajal in tja se je vračal; v Marquettu je pustil najmočnejse sledove svojega delovanja, saj je ravno Marquette postal središče vseh Indijancev, ljudi, ki jih je ljubil in jim posvetil najlepša leta svojega življenja; medtem ko je bil Sault St. Marie sicer res središče, vendar bolj središče za nove emigrante, sicer pa je bilo to mesto ravno na robu velikega Indijanskega rezervata.

Ravno tako je bil St. Andraž v Slomškovem času izredno pomembno središče za tedanjo Avstrijo in verjetno bi Slomšek lahko tam postal veliki cerkveni uradnik, organizator in voditelj; ljudstvo, ki pa mu je bilo zaupano, pa bi vse bolj tonilo v globoko zrelo germanizacije. Slomškova odločitev je bila torej izredno daljnoročna: prenesel je sedež škofije v samo osrčje slovenstva, s tem pa se je seveda moral odpovedati veliki prestižni poziciji, ki bi jo lahko užival v Avstriji in obenem tvegal svoj sloves, ohranil pa je bistveno: ohranil je slovenstvo, ki ga je nato samo še spodbujal k novi in novi rasti.

Kar pa verjetno najgloblje osvetljuje veličino teh dveh svetnikov je njuna izjemna senzitivnost oziroma spostovanje materinega jezika in kaj materin jezik pomeni za najgloblje vrednote človestva, med katerimi je gotovo religija nekaj največjega. Z drugimi besedami, oba sta se zavedala pomembnosti materinega jezika, ki je edini instrument oziroma pot do najgloblje človeške intime in obenem tudi instrument, ki nas edini lahko povede v intimo Boga samega. Človeška mati in Bog sta v tem oziru dve osebi v življenju, ki zahtevata najgloblje čutenje duše in samo preko jezika, ki ga nas nauci mati, je možno z njima priti v odnos.

Tako Baraga kot Slomšek sta se tega globoko zavedala, zato sta pisala knjige, pesmi, molitvenike, katekizme in sicer vse z namenom, da bi ohranila materinščino, ki je jezik matere in jezik Boga.

Slomšek in Baraga sta ljubila in globoko spoštovala ljudi, ki sta jim služila. Borila sta se za njihove človečanske pravice. Baraga je branil pravice Indijancev; napisal ogromno pritožnih pisem na sam Ameriski Kongres samo da bi ohranil njihov jezik, kulturo in njihove vrednote. Podobno se je Slomšek boril za svoje ljudstvo, jim vlival poguma, spodbujal in učil duhovnike naj ostajajo zvesti slovenskemu jeziku in naj se trudijo za pravice slovenstva.

In končno, oba sta pokopana v njunih škofijskih katedralah, kjer sta še vedno na razpolago svojemu ljudstvu. Nadvse presenetljiva je njuna izredna radodarnost in skrb za reveže. Oba sta namreč pred smrtjo razdelila vse kar sta se imela vrednega. Baraga je oddal celo svoj škofovski križ in ves denar, ki mu je še ostal, predno je njegovo izmučeno telo leglo k počitku. Njuna duhovnost oziroma njun dih ostaja med nami; vedno se lahko obrnemo nanju po pomoč, tolažbo vedoč, da se vedno skrbita za nas.



- 1 box sour cream Crackers

Mix all of the above together in a very large bowl.

SWEDISH DREAM COOKIES

- 11/2 cups sugar
- ^{2/3} cup butter softened
- ^{2/3} cup shortening
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2^{1/3} cups all purpose flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1/3 cup coarsely chopped pecans
- 1/4 cup flaked coconut

In a large mixing bowl, beat sugar, butter, shortening and vanilla with an electric mixer until light and fluffy.

By hand, stir in flour and baking soda. Stir in pecans and coconut.

Roll cookie dough into one inch balls and place them 2 inches apart on an ungreased cookie sheet.

Bake in a 375 degree oven for 9 to 10 minutes or until the edges are lightly browned. Transfer the cookies to wire racks to cool. Makes about 48 cookies.



CONEY ISLAND SAUCE

A favorite at Chisholm's All Class Grand Reunion functions.

- 1/2 lb. lean ground beef
- 3 Tbs. vinegar
- 2 Tbs. Worcester Sauce
- 1 Tbs. sugar
- 1 tsp. Watkins Chili Powder
- 1 tsp. Watkins Paprika
- ¹/₄ tsp. Watkins Black Pepper
 ¹/₄ tsp. Watkins Cayenne Red Pepper
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- ³/₄ cup catsup
- ^{1/4} cup Watkins Barbecue Sauce
- concentrate

HARVEST-HOLIDAY COOKIES

Chocolate pieces, coconut, raisins, walnuts and oats combine to make this the cookie of cookies.

- 11/2 cups all purpose flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- ¹/₄ tsp. salt
- 1/3 cup butter
- 1 cup packed dark brown sugar
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- ^{1/2} cup cooking oil
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1^{1/2} cups regular rolled oats
- 1 cup coconut
- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts


1. In a bowl, stir together flour, baking soda and salt; set aside.

2. In a very large mixing bowl, beat butter with electric mixer 30 seconds. Beat in sugars, oil, eggs, and vanilla.

3. Add flour mixture; beat until well combined. Stir in rolled oats, coconut, raisins, chocolate pieces and walnuts.

4. Drop by rounded teaspoons 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in a 325 degree oven for 10 to 12 minutes or till edges are lightly browned.

5. Cool 1 minute on cookie sheet. Transfer to wire racks. Cool.



DEEP DARK CHOCOLATE CAKE with Citrus Creme Frosting

- 2 cups sugar
- 1^{3/4} cups all purpose flour
- ³/₄ cup Hershey's Cocoa
- 11/2 tsp. Baking Powder
- 11/2 tsp. Baking Soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1 cup boiling water

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour two 9 inch round baking pans.

Combine dry ingredients in large bowl. Add eggs, milk, oil and vanilla. Beat 2 minutes on medium speed. Stir in boiling water. (Batter will be thin). Pour into pans.

Bake 30-35 minutes. Cool 10 minutes. Remove to wire racks. Cool and frost.

CREAMY CITRUS FROSTING

Beat $^{1/4}$ cup ($^{1/2}$ stick softened butter and $^{1/4}$ cup shortening. Add $3^{2/3}$ cups powdered sugar alternately with 2 Tbs. of whipping cream; $^{1/2}$ Tbs. thawed orange juice concentrate, and $^{1/2}$ Tbs. milk. Beat well and spread between layers and frost all around.

This is a favorite of Rosemary Tanko's, who helps Rosemary Marino in St. Joseph's Kitchen for all SWU functions.

SPECIAL HOLIDAY BARS

In a 9 x 13" pan, melt and spread:

1 cup Milk Chocolate Chips ^{1/4} cup Peanut Butter.

After spreading, refrigerate until firm.

Bring to a boil and boil 5 minutes:

1/4 cup Oleo

1 cup sugar

¹/₄ cup evaporated milk

After 5 minute boil, remove from heat and stir in small jar of Marshmallow Cream. Add:

^{1/4} cup Peanut Butter 1 tsp. of pure vanilla

11/2 cups of chopped peanuts

Spread over chocolate chip mixture and refrigerate again.

Layer: Melt 1 pkg. of caramels and ¹/₄ cup whipped cream. Spread over above two layers.

Topping:

1 cup Milk Chocolate Chips ¹/₄ cup Butterscotch Chips ¹/₄ cup peanut butter.

Melt and spread over the layered ingredients. Cut and serve.

This is a specialty of Rosemary Marino's, who is a loyal supporter of the SWU.

CRANBERRY-ORANGE POUND CAKE

- $1^{1/2}$ cups butter softened (no substitutes) $2^{3/4}$ cups sugar
- 6 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla

- 2^{1/2} tsp. grated orange peel
- 3 cups all purpose flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup (8 oz.) sour cream
- 1^{1/2} cups chopped fresh or frozen cranberries

In a mixing bowl, cream butter. Gradually beat in sugar, until light and fluffy, about 5-7 minutes. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in vanilla and orange peel. Combine flour, baking powder and salt. Add to the creamed mixture alternately with sour cream. Beat on low just until blended. Fold in cranberries. Pour into a greased and floured 10 inch fluted tube pan. bake at 350 degrees for 65-70 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool in pan for 10 minutes; remove to a wire rack and cool completely.

VANILLA BUTTER SAUCE

1 cup sugar

- 1 tbs. all purpose flour
- 1/2 cup half-and-half cream
- 1/2 cup butter softened
- (no substitutes)
- ¹/₂ tsp. vanilla

In a small sauce pan combine sugar and flour. Stir in cream and butter. Bring to a boil over medium heat stirring constantly. Boil for two minutes. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Serve warm over cake. Yield 16 servings. $(1^{1}/_{2}$ cups of sauce).



No one is ever ready for death, and even when we know death is certain, it remains hard to accept.

On the morning of July 30th, I went to work at the church rectory, something I do quite often. Father Wenz greeted me at the door, and in our conversation he asked about Michael. I confided in him that I knew I was going to lose Michael, that the previous weekend had been so bad, but I also asked Father how "can I look at that child and say, 'Michael is going to die.' Father gave me his usual beautiful and comforting words, assuring me the parish was there to support me and to take "one second at a time." With that, he left to say 8:30 Mass.

When he returned about 9:00 a.m., with a fellow parishioner, the phone rang and the caller was my daughter-in-law, Lisa, with her tearful message that "He's gone."

I don't know exactly what happened next. I know Father was there to comfort me, and I know that God placed me in the rectory at the right time. I'm sure you all know the rest.

If you have not experienced the death of a loved one, you cannot comprehend the loneliness. There is an emptiness that only those who have gone through this can understood. Losing a child is part of yourself -- a mother can understand that. Until you do suffer such a loss, you cannot fully understand the true pain of separation.

I want to thank everyone for their cards, calls and other expressions of sympathy that were sent to me in memory of Michael. It is a comfort in a time of sadness to receive such beautiful expressions of sympathy. To the branches, the officers, to the individual members, my thanks comes from the bottom of my heart. Please keep all of us in your prayers; we need them desperately.

KNJIGA O SLOMŠKU

ZBORNIK OB STOLETNICI SMRTI Sestavila: Janez Poljanec in Franc Hrastelj

DIJAK V CELJU

V Celju mu je spočetka delala težave nemščina. A Slomšek je bil že trdno odločen, da nadaljuje s šolanjem. bil je že štirinajstleten, ko je začel obiskovati celjsko gimnazijo, ker je moral dopolniti svoje znanje še prej v pripravljalnem razredu. Vsako jutro je bil že zgodaj pri knjigi in je ob njej vztrajal pozno v noč. Česar ni dobil že v Prašnikarjevi šoli, je sam z marliivostio pridobil in tako dohitel, dá, celo prekašal svoje sošolce. Ob godu profesorja Küttla so se trije dijaki naučili voščilne pesmice: eden v grščini, drugi v latinščini, a tretji v nemščini. Slomšek je na skrivaj zložil slovensko voščilo in prosil, če ga sme povedati. Ta njegov nastop je vsem ugajal in profesor Zupančič ga je navduševal, naj se še izpopolnjuje v slovenščini, kar je na mladega Antona vplivalo spodbudno, saj se je po tem uspehu vse svoje žiovljenje ukvarjal s pesnikovanjem in pisanjem.

Ko pa mu je leta 1816 umrla mati, se je bilo bati, da je s tem konec Slomškovega učenja v Celju. Toda skrbna mati ga je bila na smrtni postelji priporočila Prašnikarju, naj se zanj zavzame, skrbi zanj in ga podpira. Tako se je Slomšek po materini smrti še bolj oprijel učenja in je v šestem gimnazijskem razredu leta 1819 odnesel prvo odliko.

Profesor Zupančič je v Celju razkazal ukaželjnemu Antonu svojo izbrano knjižnico, iz katere si je smel tudi izposoditi kakšno knjigo. Tako se je mlademu Slomšku širilo obzorje v smeri znanosti in umetnosti. Tudi v pesništvu ga je usmerjal, odkar je nastopil s svojo prvo pesmijo. Ko pa je bil profesor Zupančič prestavljen v Maribor, je izgubil svojega najboljšega gimnazijskega učitelja in svoje najljubše zatočišče med njegovimi knjigami. Ker se je po materini zgodnji smrti njegov oče Marko vnovič poročil in je zanj z mačeho zamrl tudi dom, se je Slomšek še bolj oklenil zadnje trdne opore - molitve k Bogu, ki se mu je že zdavnaj sklenil popolnoma posvetiti, sedaj pa se mu je v veliki osebni osamljenosti in globlje zaživljeni duhovnosti vsega predal. V tem pa je našel vso svojo pravo srečo in umirjenost, tako da je ohranil tudi kasneje še svoje dopadenje nad Celjem, ki mu je pomenilo hkrati tudi nekako kulturno središče vsega slovenskega življa na Stajerskem.

MODROSLOVEC IN BOGOSLOVEC

Ker tedanja šestrazredna celjska gimnazija ni imela dveh letnikov »liceja«, kakor sta se tedaj imenovala zadnja dva letnika modroslovja med gimnazijo in univerzo, je moral Slomšek v Ljubljano. Tu sta se Slomšek in Prešerten kot sošolca spoznala in kmalu drug drugega zacenila. Tako sta si ostala dobra prijatelja vse življenje.

Ko je Slomšek zvedel, da v Senju lahko konča oba letnika modroslovja v enem letu, je drugo polletje odšel tja, se priučil še srbohrvaščini in spet končal z odliko.

V Celovcu pa Slomšku niso hoteli priznati senjskih izpitov, zato je moral ponoviti licej in je šele leta 1821 mogel vstopiti v bogoslovje, za katero se je brez obotavljanja odločil v zavesti, da bo le tako izpolnil vročo željo svoje pokojne matere in tudi svojemu narodu kot dober duhovnik lahko največ koristil. Zdaj mu je umrl še oče in Slomšek je bil prepuščen popolnoma samemu posvetil urjenju v slovenščini, ki jo je tako odlično obvladal, da mu je ravnateljstvo bogoslovia dovolilo, da poučuje sošolce v slovenskem jeziku. Tako je postal prvi učitelj slovenščine v celovški bogoslovnici. Ohranjen je nagovor, ki ga je imel ob začetku tega poučevanja in ki se začenja takole: »O da bi mogel danes s svojo bratovsko besedo v vas zbuditi ogenj navdušenja za jezik Slovenije ter ga v tekočih dneh tega leta vzdržati tu v vaši sredi v svetlem plamenu!«

Njegovi tovariši so v slovenščini res toliko napredovali, da so svoj materin jezik v govoru in pisavi gladko obvladali in mu je ravnatelj bogoslovja ob koncu štirih bogoslovnih let v posebnem pismu čestital ter mu izrekel svoje priznanje in zahvalo: »Veliko ste se trudili štiri leta s poučevanjem svojih tovarišev v slovenščini. Dosegli ste velike uspehe, kakšnih nikdo ni mogel pričakovati. S svojo gorečnostjo in ljubeznivostio ste vcepili v mlado srce potrebno liubezen do onega jezika, v katerem bodo gospodje morali kmalu učiti in z ljudstvom občevati. Sedaj se znajo vsi dobro izražati, več jih je tudi v pisavi popolnoma zmožnih materinega jezika. V imenu prevzvišenega in v imenu vsega ravnateljstva Vam torej prisrčno čestitam ter se Vam obenem zahvaljujem za preveliki trud, ki ste ga imeli pri poučevanju. - Bog Vam stotero povrni, kar

ste dobrega storili iz čistega navdušenja za izoliko svojih tovarišev in v prospeh dušnega pastirstva. Iskrena hvaležnost moja in vseh Vaših tovarišev Vas bo spremljala po potu Vašega življenja, katero naj Bog blagoslovi.«

Slomška so v bogoslovju vsi iskreno vzljubili in se o njem izražali, da živi samo za bogoslovno učenost in za svoj materin jezik.

NOVOMAŠNIK IN KAPLAN

Že po treh letih bogoslovja je pel Slomšek novo mašo pri svojem učitelju in dobrotniku Prašnikarju, takratnemu župniku v Olimju pri Podčetrtku. Tamkajšnji ljudje so ga že poznali, saj je zahajal tja o počitnicah in pomagal v cerkvi in v šoli. Prašnikar mu je od srca govoril. Bil je to lep praznik za vso župnijo in ves ta kraj med gorami blizu Sotle, ki ga sam Slomšek riše takole: »Med zelenimi gorami, po katerih košato bukovje, pa tudi visoko kostanje raste, v lepem vinskem kraju blizu Sotle stoji Olimje v tihi dolini. Sv. Ema, ki je v teh krajih rojena, pravijo, da je počivala v tej samoti in dala v studencih postaviti kapelico Mariji devici. Pozneje so belim menihom pozidali lep samostan in postavili veliko cerkev, ki je še zdaj dragocena igla te tihe dolinice...«

Eno leto je moral Slomšek po zgodnji novi maši še v bogoslovje, nato pa je bil nastavljen za kaplana pri Sv. Lovrencu na Bizeljskem. Tam so ga ljudje kmalu vzljubili. Ker je slišal med njimi nekaj nespodobnih popevk, je sedal in takoj v nadomestilo spisal nekaj vedrih pesmi, kakor Zdravico Slovencev, Veseli hribček in druge. Kadar je pridigoval, je bila cerkev pretesna. Radi so ga poslušali tudi po okolici: v Kapelah, v Dobovi, na Sv. gorah in celo na bližnjem Hrvatskem. Obiskoval je ljudi in za vsakogar, naj si je bil bogat ali siromak, je imel dobro besedo.

A že po dveh letih je bil leta 1827 premeščen v Novo cerkev blizu Celja, kjer se je ljudstvu hitro priljubil. Tudi tu je zlagal lepe pesmice, ki so se jih ljudje hitro oprijeli, na primer Večernico: »Glejte, že sonce zahaja«... Sam je oznanjal: »Če sveto prepevaš, skušnjava bveži – nesramnega petja se škrat veseli«... Slomšek bi najraje ostal vse življenje preprost kaplan, a škof Ignacij Zimmerman ga je zaželel imeti v svoji bližini. Že po dveh letih je odšel na vplivnejše mesto.

FRANC JAKLIČ

V BALTIMORU ZADENE BARAGO KAP (9. oktobra 1866)

Kar se tiče oskrbe prečastitega gospoda, ima vse, kar želi. Njegova zadovoljnost z malim Vama je znana. Nekaj časa že skoraj prav nič več ne užije. Njegov zvesti sluga Gašper Schulte, ki je že sedem ali osem let pri njem, se noč in dan ne gane od njega. Noben mu ne zna tako postreči in tudi ne mara, da bi jaz ali kdo drug pri njem čul; neče, da bi imel kdo sitnosti z njim, če že ni posebno treba. Tako prebije čas nekaj v postelji, nekaj pa sedeč na stolu, ker mu je s tem dihanje olajšano; včasi malo zadremlje in potrpežljivo čaka Gospodovega prihoda."

SMRT (19. januarja 1868)

Omenjeno pismo je Jacker končal z besedami: 'Ne bo dolgo, ko boste spet dobili pismo od mene."

Res je tri dni potem, v nedeljo 19. januarja, obvestil Baragove sorodnike v Trebnjem, da je škof tisto jutro umrl. Piše jim: "Če ste prejeli moje pismo od 17. tega meseca, boste vsebino tega pisma takoj uganili. Kakor smo že takrat pričakovali, zemski boj Vašega prečastitega gospoda brata – moral bi zapisati strica – ni mogel več dolgo trajati. Pred eno uro – zdaj je tri zjutraj, je pobožni pastir zaprl svoje oči. Brez drugega boja – samo dihal je zadnjih 14 dni težko – je po kratki dremavici umrl in sicer, kolikor bi človek po zunanje sodil, pri polni zavesti. Tako je torej še dočakal praznik Jezusovega Imena, ki mu je bilo zmerom tako drago, ki je zanj delal in žrtvoval, ga oznanjal poganom in do zadnje ure v srcu nosil. Ne bi si bil mogel izbrati lepšega smrtnega dne. Ni mi treba tolažiti Vas; svetniško življenje in blažena smrt Vašega prečastitega brata sta najboljša tolažba."

Nadškofu Purcellu je šest dni pozneje Jacker pisal, da je škof prejel sv. popotnico v petek 17. januarja. Tudi v nedeljo zjutraj mu je hotel Jacker nesti sv. obhajilo, a je škof prej umrl. Smrtni boj je bil kratek, a kakor se zdi, hud. Umrl je ob pol dveh zjutraj.

Dočakal je 70 let, 6 mesecev in 20 dni. Njegov življenjepisec Verwyst pravi, da je gotovo umrl v krstni nedolžnosti.

Ob smrti je bil pri njem samo sluga Gašper. On mu je dal v roke blagoslovljeno svečo, on mu je zatisnil oči.

Dan pred smrtjo mu je škof Baraga izročil svojo oporoko. Naročil mu je, naj jo varno shrani. Skrbno naj pazi na vse škofijske listine in na njegovo premičnino in vse v lepem redu izroči nasledniku.

Truplo so položili na mrtvaški oder v stolnici sv. Petra, pod belimi zavesami, ki so imele na vrhu križ. Ležal je v preprosti krsti iz smrekovega lesa. Oblečen je bil v škofovsko obleko. Namesto običajnega plašča so mu pa dali bel pluviál (plašč za večernice). Stolnica je namreč premogla en sam vijoličast plašč, ki so ga pa kmalu potem potrebovali, ker se je bližal predpostni čas. Baraga je imel samo eno škofovsko kapo, dragoceno, zato so mu to dali na glavo, na roko pa dragocen škofovski prstan, dar avstrijske cesarice Elizabete. Tudi škofovsko palico so položili obenj.

S pogrebom so čakali celih 12 dni, da bi sosednji škofje in duhovniki mogli priti. Ker je bil silen mraz, so truplo v krsti lahko tako dolgo pustili v stolnici. Zaradi hudih viharjev in visokih zametov pa noben škof ni mogel priti. Škof Henni iz Milwaukeeja se je odpravil na pot in se je po železnici pripeljal do Green Baya; silen vihar je pa ustavil promet in se je moral vrniti. Od 21-tih duhovnikov v škofiji se jih je polagoma zbralo šest: Jacker, Vrtin, Terhorst, Bourion in še dva druga.

Dne 31. januarja je bil pogreb. Ker ni bil navzoč noben škof, se niso mogle vršiti žalne slovesnosti, kakor se opravijo za umrlim škofom. Pogrebne obrede je opravil in mu govoril v slovo Jacker. Cerkev je bila kljub mrazu polna ljudi vseh tam bivajočih narodnosti, katoličanov in protestantov, in vsi še noter niso mogli. V marguettu je tisti dan v vseh obratih počivalo delo.

Krsto s truplom in vsemi škofovskimi znaki so položili v grobnico, ki so jo bili v 12-ih dneh, ko so čakali na pogreb, napravili pod stolnico.

PO SMRTI

Ameriški list so s spoštovanjem pisali o umrlem škofu Baragi. Ljudstvo okoli vélikih jezer se je zavedalo, kakšen dušni velikan se je zgrudil. – Ljubljanska Zgodnja Danica je v dveh februarskih številkah prinesla žalno obvestilo, najprej 14. februarja kot govorico, 21. februarja pa kot potrjeno resnico. Slovenski listi so zato le malo pisali o Baragovi smrti, ker je bila javnost že dalj časa pripravljena nanjo.

Po Baragovi smrti so okoliški škofje poslali v Rim nov predlog s tremi kandidati za izpraznjeno marquettsko škofovsko stólico. Mrak je bil spet na prvem mestu. Škofie so mu v pism ih prigovarjali, da naj sprejme; on je bil pa tako protiven, da na ta pisma niti odgovarjal ni. Dne 25. septembra 1868 je iz Rima prišlo imenovanje; pa se spet ni nič zmenil. Šele ko so ga škofje in duhovniki zelo silili, se je vdal. Odpravil se je iz Eagle Towna v Cincinnati, a se je tudi tam pomišljal, ali bi se dal posvetiti ali ne. Bil je tako brez vsega, da mu je nadškof Purcell moral dati svoj talar, da so ga redovnice v naglici predelale. Škof Lefèvre mu je daroval prstan in naprsni križec, oboje iz srebra. Dne 7. februarja je bil posvečen. Ko se je pripeljal v Marguette, da prevzame škofijo, je bil tako ubožno oblečen, da ljudje niso mogli verjeti, da je to novi škof. S svojo ponižnostjo in skromnostjo je pa ne vse napravil alobok vtis. - Pri vodstvu škofije je bil neizprosno dosleden.

Nadškof Purcell mu je svetoval, naj vzame iz Baragove krste Škofovsko palico in dragoceni škofovski prstan. Ob sklepu misijona koncem aprila leta 1874 so grob res odprli. Navzoči so bili škof Mrak, voditelj misijona Cesney, Eis in še dva druga duhovnika. Videli so, da je bilo Baragovo truplo táko, kakor da bi bil šele pred nekaj dnevi umrl.

Po desetih letih se je Mrak odpovedal škofiji. Naselil se je v blžnjem Negauneeju in pomagal pri dušnem pastirstvu. Potem ga nekaj let spet vidimo med Otavani v Eagle Townu. Z 81-tim letom se je naselil v Marquettu v bolnišnici in bil za hišnega duhovnika. Tam je umrl 2. januarja 1901, star 90 let. Položili so ga v grobnici v gorenji predel nad Barago. Na ploščo so vklesali, da je bil "zvest Baragov sodelavec in naslednik".

Ko se je Mrak odpovedal škofiji, je bil 14. septembra 1879 posvečen zanjo janez Vrtin, torej spet Slovenec. Dne 2. okt., tri dni, preden je imel biti slovesno ustoličen, je pa Baragova stolnica do tal pogorela. Zažgala jo je zlobna roka, Baragove krste v grobnici ogenj ni poškodoval. Škof Vrtin jo je spet dal odpreti. Truplo je bilo še popolnoma ohranjeno, a izsušeno. Krsto so začasno zakopali v peščenih tleh pred škofijsko hišo.

Škof Vrtin je takoj začel graditi novo stolnico, večjo, lepšo, na pol kamnito. Delali so jo 12 let in je stala 100.000 dolarjev. Skoraj vso to velikansko vsoto so škof Vrtin s svojimi dohodki, njegov oče in njegova brata sami plačali. Skof Vrtin je dal pod novo stolnico prav pod vélikim oltarjem zgraditi grobnico za marquettske škofe. Pripravili so šest podolžnih predelov. V septembru 1897, sto let po Baragovem rojstvu, so njegovo krstopo osemnajstih letih izkopali iz začasnega peščenega groba. Ker je bil pesek nekoliko vlažen, so deske rakve precej sprhnele. Tudi truplo je začelo nekoliko trohneti. Položili so ga v jekleno krsto in položili v spodnji sredni predel grobnice. Priče tega prenosa so bili škof Vrtin, duhovnika Eih in Bourion in Anton Režek, ki je bil takrat bogoslovec.

Leta 1899 so položili v grobnici na levo stran od Barage Janeza Vrtina. – Kot škof je s svojimi domačimi tudi mnogo prispeval za šole, bolnišnice in druge

dobrodelne ustanove. Skrbel je za dobro duhovščino in duhovnikom preskrbel in uredil plače. Njihovo število je narastlo na 75. Ustanovil je več novih župnij, postavil več ko 50 cerkva. Odločno je nastopil zoper divje zakone. Starše je v pastirskih listih opozarjal na dolžnost verske vzgoje, vsaki župniji je ukazal imeti katoliško šolo. Sam je bil neprestano na delu. V marquettu in drugod v škofiji je rad pridigal in spovedoval v raznih jezikih in sploh pomagal pri dušnem pastirstvu. Pri vsej svoji molčeči možatosti je bil zelo vljuden in prijazen in je povsod imel mnogo prijateljev. Če je le mogel, je ustregel vsakomur, kdor koli je potrkal na njegova vrata. Čeprav je bil iz bogate družine, je bil zase nenavadno skromen. Ko je 1, 1887 prvič potoval v Rim, je po 24-ih letih spet obiskal svojo domovino. Rojaki, posebno Belokranici so ga navdušeno sprejeli. Po očetovi smrti je podedoval mnogo premoženja in je vsega obrnil škofiji v prid. Že dalj časa je bolehal na srcu. Zdravja je iskal tudi v čeških Karlovih varih, a ga ni našel. Jeseni leta 1897 se je pri posvečenju škofa Trobca še komaj držal pokonci. Umrl je 26. februarja 1899. Na pogrebu sta bila tudi škofa Mrak in Trobec.

Na praznik sv. Petra in Pavla leta 1897, ob stoletnici Baragovega rojstva, so v dobrniški župni cerkvi odkrili Baragov doprsni kip, ki ga je izdelal slovenski kipar Progar v Celovcu. Slovenski duhovniki v Združenih državah Amerike so plačali več kot polovico stroškov. Okrog kipa je kamniten okvir, lepo razčlenjen in zgoraj zaokrožen. Pod kipom je pa napis: Irenej Friderik Baraga, rojen v gradu Mala vas 29. junija 1797 in isti dan krščen v tej farni cerkvi. Po dovršenem pravoslovju na Dunaju in bogoslovju v Ljubljani v mašnika posvečen 21. sept. 1823. Kaplan v Šmartnem pri Kranju in v Metliki. Od leta 1831 misijonar Otava-in Očipve-Indijancev v Michiganu, Sev. Amerike; v škofa posvečen 1. novembra 1853; v Gospodu zaspal 19. januarja 1868 v Marquettu. Postavili častilci njegovi leta 1897."

Isti dan so tudi na malovaški graščini na levi strani vrat odkrili Baragi spominsko ploščo. Dal jo je napraviti tedanji lastnik Julij Treo.

Severoameriška vlada in javnost sta na različne načine proslavili Baragovo ime. Po Baragi se v zvezni državi Michigan imenujo célo okrožje (county), čigar središče je Baragov L'Anse (Assinins). "Baraga" se imenuje mestece doli v kotu Keweenawskega zaliva pod Assininsom. Njegovo ime nosi eden od poštnih uradov in eden izmed javnih parkov. Leta 1903 je ena najlepših cest v Marquettu dobila ime Baraga Avenue (Evenju). Nasproti marquettski škofijski cerkvi stoji župnijska šola z Baragovim imenom; z njo so hotel vsaj nekoliko poudariti Baragove zasluge za šolstvo in za indijansko slovstvo in jezikoslovje. Na otoku Mackinacu se neki kraj imenuje Baraga Point. – Tako se Baragovo ime v Severni Ameriki vsak dan na več krajih neštetokrat izgovori, zapiše in natisne.

Marquettska stolnica, ki jo je bil zgradil Vrtin, je leta 1935 spet pogorela. Tudi ob tem požaru je Baragova krsta s telesnimi ostanki ostala nedotaknjena. Ko je marquettski škof Plagens dal odpreti jekleno rakev, se je videlo, da je truplo v nadaljnjem razkroju. Postavili so novo, veliko, zelo lepo stolnico. Poleg nje so zgradili novo grobnico za škofe. Za Baragove zemske ostanke je narejena tako, da se vsak čas lahko spremeni v kapelo z javnim vhodom.

ZAKLJUČEK

Ko je leta 1843 Baraga začel z misijonom v L'Ansu, je imel zelo težko življenje. Vsa okolica z zalivom vred enolična in pusta. Indijanci pogani, poživinjeni od žganja. Treba je bilo postaviti misijonske zgradbe, denarja pa ni imel. Za misijonsko šolo ni imel primernih učnih moči. Protestantovski baptisti, ki je država njihov misijon radodarno podpirala, so se ga hoteli znebiti in so ga tožarili oblastem v Detroitu. Škofu Lefèvru je potožil: "Strašno preganjanje se je vzdignilo zoper mene." V pismu, ki ga je 4. okt. 1844 pisal Leopoldinini ustanovi na Dunaj, pravi, da če bi ne šlo za neumrjoče duše, bi za ves svet ne hotel ostati tam. V tem pismu tudi pravi:

"Večkrat mi tudi najbolj potrebnega manjka. Pa kako velika tolažba, kako preobilno plačilo in kako nepopisno veselje me čaka, ko me bodo na sodni dan obstopili nekateri teh mojih dobrih otrok k Kristusu, ali prav za prav vsi, kakor upam, in govorili pred ostrim Sodnikom: 'Ta nam je prvi oznanjal tvoj božji nauk; pripovedoval nam je o tvojem usmiljenju, ki si ga po svojem Sinu izkazal ljudem, in je napolnil naša srca z vero in z ljubeznijo do tebe.' – O kako sem hvaležen Bogu, da me je poklical v težavni, pa neizrekljivo tolažilni misijonski stan!"

Iz našega naroda je izšel. Slovenska mati ga je rodila.




