

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
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

When the leaders of the Obri enslaved them too much the Slovenes revolted against their masters and with the help of the Chech King Samo they threw off the yolk of slavery. Samo with the characteristic energy established a rnited kingdom of Chechs, Slovenes and Northern 'Serbs, but this kingdom-disintegrated with the death of Samo and the Slovenes came under the hold of the rejuvenated Obri. This repeated inslaving under the Obri forced the Slovenes into a friendly treaty with the Bavarians whom they helped in 743 in a battle against the Franks. In the year 745 the political leader Borut with the help of the Bavarians gained a decisive victory over them. For the help thus rendered the Slovenes were forced into a shameful treaty and they were forced to acknowledge the Bavarians their masters directly, and the Frankish King indirectly. With the advent of the German rule the road of Christianity was opened to the Slovenes. Borud, is an article of the treaty, was forced to send hostages to the Bavarians among whom were included a son Gorazd and a nephew of Hotimir. In Bavaria these two were educated in a famous school on the Island Awa where they were baptize ed. When they returned to their native land, one after the other, Gorazd in the year 750 and after his death, Hotimir in 753, they invited the missioneries from Salzburg. Among those who came at

this invitation was Modestus, a Bishop, who ordained priests and blessed churches. After the death of Modestus the pagan Slovenes revolted against the leadership of Hotimir but with no success. The repulses were not forgotten and after the death of Hotimir they conquered the Christian Slovenes and exiled the domestic, as well as foreign priests. Only after three years, when Tassilo II. a leader of the Bavarians conquered the revolting tribes was the successor of Hotimir, Volkun able to ascend Hotomir's vacancy.

The Slovenes, at this time were even more dependent upon the Frankish State the real backers of the Bryarians. Some years later, in 788, after Tassilo's unfortunate revolt, they came directly under the control of the Franks. In spite of the change tharlemagne promised the tribal chiefs and lords to remain in power. About the year 795 there is the mention of Vojnomir who helped the Franks in the wars against the Ostrogoths, and, about the year 800, the tribal chief, Inko is mentioned. After him, there is a line of chiefs that include Pribislav, Semnika, Stojimir, and Edgar. After this, there are met Bavarian names who evidently were placed at the head of the battle troops of the Slovenes. They replaced the Slovene chiefs when the Franks subdued the revolt of Ljudovik Povaski (816 to 822) whom the Slovenes also supported. In Panonia the Slovene tribal chiefs ruled to the middle of the ninth century. Christianity spread very rapidly after the defeat of the pagan revolutionists, not only in the north, on the Drave, where Tassilo established the Innichen monastary on the boundry line and another in Kremsmunster. The monasteries served as a gathering place for the missionaries and also served the south where the missionaries spread christianity. In a short time all the Slovenes, were made christians although traces of paganism and

pagan practices have continued for several centuries.

#### Culture of Early Slovenes

Not much definite is known of the culture in the prechristian era. Procopius, in his account of the Cothic war (535 to 555) mentions the most interesting and the most illuminating of all that has been written in those early times. The Slovenes at that time have entered the territory of the left bank of the Danube "the Slovenes and Anthians do not have individual leaders, but lived on a patriarchial form of government from the beginning having tribal councils where beneficial as well as harmful affairs are discussed likewise, they are, guided in all other affairs after ancient customs. They believe in one God, the maker of lightning. and who is the master of all; they offer oxen and every kind of animals as sacrifices. Fate, they do not know nor believe in; neither do they believe that the dead have any powers over the living but, if they feel that they are about to die, either in war or in sickness then they promise to make an offering to the gods and if they escape death, they fulfill their promises faithfully and think that with the offering they have purchased the right to life. They also adore rivers, goblins and other dieties and offer sacrifices to them; during the sacrifice many prophecies are incanted. They live in poor huts living individually having very distant neighbors and often change their place of living. When they go to war, they go, mainly, on foot, bearing shields and spears, they never wear armour. Neither do they have any sort of tunic nor underwear but a kind of trousers that covers their bodies for the greatest necessities; in this fashion they attack the enemy.
